## **Robert Lange Studios in Charleston Celebrates 15 Years with 50 Artists**

The Robert Lange Studios in Charleston, SC, will celebrate its 15 year anniversary with the exhibit, Everyone's A Winner, featuring works by 50 artists from around the globe, on view from Sept. 6 - 25, 2019. A reception will be held on Sept. 6, from

This September Robert Lange Studios will celebrate 15 years of bringing contemporary artists to Charleston with a group show featuring 50 artists. Each artist will create one work exemplifying their specific style, genre and subject matter.

"We are celebrating the 15 year anniversary of Robert Lange Studios opening its doors. When we reflect back on all that has happened over these years, one element stands out above all else, we have worked with some brilliant painters who have colored this entire experience. That being said, we wanted to put together an exhibit that is spirited, light hearted and yet filled with profound work. We are going to ask 50 painters we have worked with since 2004 to make one special painting," said gallery owner and artist Robert Lange.

This annual themed group show at Robert Lange Studios has been happening for 15 years and was developed to connect artists from the Charleston area with not only collectors but also other painters practicing in their field. Artists will present their work in Robert Lange Studios' 2 Queen Street gallery space and to add an element of levity there will be awards presented to each piece in the show as the title "Everyone's a Winner" implies

Robert Lange says of this new body of work, "In a lighthearted way we thought it would be fun to give everyone an award in categories like, "Best Use of a Panda" or "Best use of Prussian Blue". In general we just think that art is extremely subjective and that all of these incredible artists deserve individual recognition for what they

One such artist that was invited to the show is JB Boyd, who recently began a meticulous painting of rain drops in a puddle. Each subject is very personal for the artist in both selection and execution. Boyd has a permanent studio located in the gallery where he paints often. He says, "As one of RLS's very first artists I've been amazed by the inclusivity of the gallery from the way people are greeted when they walk in the door to the continued support the artists receive from owners Rob and Meg."

After the success of numerous group exhibits, Lange says, "We have worked with hundreds of artists over the years but there are many that we always gravitate back towards."

Artists like Reuben Negron who said, "I've long been interested in using art to tell stories. Beyond the larger ideas that hold up contemporary art, an image's ability to transport me into a narrative has always resonated most. Taking a page from those I've worked with in the past, this new series allows me to turn my lens inward for the first time to tell my own personal narrative. Each image in this new body of work is approached as a passage (and in some cases a full chapter) in what is essentially a visual novella. Over the next year or so this series will touch on themes of loss, sexuality, memory, and discovery... All while pushing and expanding my relationship with watercolor - finding ways to utilize the medium in a manner that challenges public perception of what it can or should be.'

Also, artist Megan Aline, who studied in both the US and London has created a figurative piece entitled "Grow Tall" using a double exposure painting technique. A silhouetted figure is seen gently holding her child. The layers of paint within the silhouette create a vast forest perfectly creating an added dimension to the narrative.
