shows throughout the southeast, including the University of Alabama - Huntsville. Unlike Logan and Floyd, Eckersley's work eliminates images of people and focuses on the residue of human existence and labor. Poignantly selected items of clothing are depicted in the work for this show. These are feminine garments that are embellished with dainty pastel embroidery of flowers and butterflies.

Fine needlework and crisp cotton fabric folds are crudely besmirched with sweat and food stains associated with domestic tasks in the kitchen and the banality of daily provision. These pieces communicate overarching themes of fragmented memory and the tension that occurs when familiar items are seen out of their expected context. There is a haunting quality that reaches beyond mere nostalgia or sentimentality.

Campus galleries and showcase include: Lee Gallery in Lee Hall I, the Acorn Gallery in Lee Hall II, College of Architecture Arts and Humanities Dean's Gallery in Strode Tower, the lobby showcase at Brooks Center for Performing Arts and in Sikes Hall on the ground floor.

The Rudolph E. Lee Gallery showcases regional, national and international artists exploring a broad range of ideas, materials and creative processes. In partnership with academic programs and university initia-

University of South Carolina Upstate in Spartanburg, SC, Features Works by Katie Walker

The University of South Carolina Upstate in Spartanburg, SC, is presenting Embedded Stories, featuring new paintings by Katie Walker of Greenville, SC, on view in the Curtis R. Harley Art Gallery, through Sept. 20, 2019. A reception and gallery talk will be held on Sept. 5, beginning at 4:30pm.

"My work is a calculatory process where one calculation leads to the next and so on, until the dialectic, the energy and the opposing forces are interesting and complete to me," says Walker. "The finished image is a compilation of my ideas and experiences


and my reaction to the materials I am using. I manipulate them to build a language of personal imagery that, to me, is aesthetically pleasing, thought-provoking and at times, humorous."

"Lately I have been [focused on] expressionistic map-making but, as personal meaning and influences evolve, I am attempting to reconcile new information and knowledge with what is known. By merging residue of the past and imagined scenarios with my daily life, I am making abstract works that reflect broader experiences of life and memory. I encourage the viewer to interpret their meaning based on their own experiences. I work primarily with acrylic on canvas, paper, and wood," said Walker.

Walker earned her Bachelor of Arts degree in studio art from Furman University and a Master of Fine Arts from the University of Georgia. In 2012, she was included in the South Carolina State Museum's exhibition Abstract Art in South Carolina 1949-2012. She was also selected for the 701 CCA South Carolina Biennial 2011 and 2015 at 701 Center for Contemporary Art in Columbia, SC. Her most recent museum solo exhibition was in 2014 at the Greenville County Museum of Art. In 2015, she was part of the Columbia Museum of Art's exhibition Independent Spirits.

Walker was represented at the 2005 Florence Biennale in Italy, where she was an award winner. Her work was included in New American Paintings, Vol. 40, 2002, and the publication's 2010 anniversary edition. She currently lives and works out of
