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## NC Museum of Natural Sciences in Raleigh, | Gallery C in Raleigh, NC,



The North Carolina Museum of Natural Sciences in Raleigh, NC, will present Lift, featuring work by Salisbury-based Ingrid Erickson, on view in the Museum's Nature Art Gallery, from Sept. 6 - 29, 2019. A reception will be held on Sept. 7, from 2-4pm.

Erickson's work in cut paper reflects the intersection of art and science. She explores the ornithology, botany and ecology of ecosystems through the rendering of specific species. Each project involves extensive on-site research. "I enjoy working with and learning from scientists," she says. "I work from life, as well as from natural history collections and specimens, radiographs, and my own photographs and video taken on-site. Each piece is individually hand cut using an X-Acto knife and scissors, with up to several thousand tiny cuts per piece. I add color after cutting is complete using up to 20 layers of light-fast acrylic spray paint."

Erickson recently completed a course in Bird Biology from the Cornell Laboratory of Ornithology in Ithaca, NY, and is an active participant in Citizen Science projects, as well as a wildlife rehab volunteer at the NC Zoo. The recipient of a 2015 North Carolina Arts & Science Council Artist Project Grant, Erickson recently transformed 300 feet of paper into large scale paper cuts featuring the 32 species of raptors being rehabilitated at the Carolina Raptor Center in Huntersville. Other recent partner organizations include The Field Museum, Chicago; Patuxent Wildlife Research Center, Laurel, MD; the International Crane Foundation, Baraboo, Wisconsin; and The Duke Lemur Center.

The North Carolina Museum of Natural Sciences in downtown Raleigh, on W. Jones Street, is an active research institution that engages visitors of every age and stage of learning in the wonders of science and the natural world. # NC, Features Works by Ingrid Erickson | Features Works by Josef Albers


Gallery C in Raleigh, NC, will present Ode to the Rainbow: Serigraphs by Josef Albers, on view from Sept. 6 - 28, 2019. A reception will be held on Sept. 6, from

Josef Albers (1888-1976) was a German born American artist who developed the basis of modern color theory in the 20th century. Albers is best known for his work as an abstract painter and theorist.

In 1933, Albers emigrated to North Carolina to escape Nazi pressure. He taught at Black Mountain College where he headed the painting program until 1949.

At Black Mountain, his students included Ruth Asawa, Ray Johnson, Robert Rauschenberg, Cy Twombly, and Susan Weil. He also invited important American artists such as Willem de Kooning, to teach in the summer seminar. Weil remarked that as a teacher Albers was "his o academy". She said that Albers claimed that "when you're in school, you're not an artist, you're a student", although he was very supportive of self-expression when one became an artist and began on her or his journey. Albers produced many woodcuts and leaf studies at this time.

In 1950, Albers left Black Mountain to head the department of design at Yale University in New Haven, CT. While at Yale, Albers worked to expand the nascent graphic design program (then called "graphic arts"), hiring designers Alvin Eisenman,

Herbert Matter, and Alvin Lustig. Albers worked at Yale until he retired from teaching in 1958. At Yale, Richard Anuszkiewicz, Eva Hesse, Neil Welliver, and Jane Davis Doggett, were notable students.

Albers published Interaction of Color in 1963, which presented his theory that colors were governed by an internal and deceptive logic. The very rare first edition was a limited edition of only 2,000.

UNC-Chapel Hill in Chapel Hill, NC, will present She Who Tells a Story: Women Photographers from Iran and the Arab World, on view at the Ackland Art Museum, from Sept. 20 through Dec. 1, 2019.

During this critical time for Iran and the Arab world, as national and personal identities are being dismantled and rebuilt, contemporary photography reflects the complexities of unprecedented change.
