

Hampton III Gallery in Taylors, SC, Offers Works by Stephen Chesley

Hampton III Gallery in Taylors, SC, is presenting its first solo exhibit of works by Stephen Chesley, on view through Nov. 3,

Chesley was born in Schenectady, New York, in 1952. He exhibited a natural proclivity for drawing and art almost as soon as he could hold pastel and pencil which were often Christmas gifts from his family.

Growing up in Virginia Beach in the late 1950's, he was exposed to the 'Beat Generation' of musicians, artists, and writers when Virginia Beach was still a seasonal seaside resort. Self- motivated, he continued with his drawing and small paintings, along with exposure to local artists. Throughout elementary and high school, the art spirit continued. Collegiate exposure led to a meld of art and science with degrees in Urban Studies and a Master's Degree in Urban Planning in 1980 from the school of Architecture at Clemson University.

Graduating in a deep national economic recession, Chesley turned back to his art. Spending 5 years on rivers and sea islands led him to explore his aesthetic, subject matter, influential painters, and styles, During this period Chesley's paintings and art work began to move to the forefront. Recognized in 1981 as an emerging talent by the Columbia Museum of Art, he went on to win top 100 in the first National Parks

competition of 1987. He exhibited at the Smithsonian, and in 1996, he was recognized by the National Endowment for the Arts, Southeast Regional Fellowship, and Southeast Center for Contemporary Art.

Chesley has continued his painting, characterized as poetic realism. He also creates welded and carved sculptural pieces. In addition he has illustrated Archibald Rutledge short stories and WS Merwin's poem, "Palm," the later a broadside printed in honor of Thomas Cooper Society's Thomas Cooper Medal for WS Merwin in 2012. Stephen Chesley continues his creative journey with an art spirit in Columbia, SC.

Chesley offered the following Artist Statement: "Nature's verdant greens are a rich visual companion to the vital spirit of the wild in these times of Anthropocene

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calamity; Thoreau's doctrine of the health of solitude in a sojourn with nature is even more profound. As John Muir might reflect, trees have a way of teaching how to 'be' but it is a quiet lesson. It is perhaps through painting that the increasingly distant concepts of solitude and nature are recorded."

"The abstraction of thought is also present with the abstraction of paint rendering image, time, and emotional content. What paint laid down is decidedly American Ashcan pallet with a foundation as varied as: Inness, Corot, Blakelock, AP Ryder, Kline, Pollack, Rothko, Homer, Seurat, Hopper, Wyeth, Morris Graves, Walter Anderson, Vincent, Gauguin, Rackstraw Downes and others. A tonal pallet and brushwork convey the poetic peace of the ordinary in ways that at first reflect figuration but on closer examination deconstruct into the abstraction of nature. Narrative is often obfuscated by indistinct coloration along with temporal and spatial ambiguity. It is everything that is nothing, nothing that is everything. Titles shadow as one line haikus reflecting a theme of sublime ordinary."

"An ordinary often overlooked but rich upon rediscovery."

A reception will be held on Oct. 19, from 6-8pm.

The exhibition honors the creative spirit

that has grown through three generations and inspired six visual artists, all connected through family ties. Tom Flowers taught art at Furman University from 1959 through 1989. This exhibition showcases his work alongside works by his son, daughter, daughter-in-law, grandsons, and grand-daughter-in-law.

Tom Flowers, Professor Emeritus of Art at Furman University has won numerous

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
