The unique physical properties of encaustic - a mixture of beeswax, dammar resin and oil paint combined with heat - allow endless possibilities, as surfaces can be manipulated, cooled and reworked over and over.

Klich's process combines painting, drawing, collage and transfers of photographs. Layers of rich, deep colors create a smooth translucent surface, while heavily threedimensionally textured areas intrigue and beckon the viewer. She resides in Nashville, TN, where she teaches encaustic workshops and also works part times as a corporate art consultant.

The exhibition will also feature ceram-

ics by Paula Smith. Creating decorative and functional work with a light hearted, whimsical and narrative approach, Smith draws inspiration from the natural world and love of more sculptural forms. Teapots and vases are shaped like leaves and trees, cups and dishes are adorned with flowers and bugs, woodgrain texture abounds, and animals inspire in her fanciful pieces. She lives in Rock Hill, SC, and is a ceramics instructor at CPCC in Charlotte, NC.

Native American Studies Center in Lancaster, SC, Features Works by Catawba Artist DeAnn Beck

USC Lancaster's Native American Studies Center in Lancaster, SC, is presenting The View from My Window, featuring the watercolor paintings and graphite drawings of Catawba artist DeAnn Beck, on view through Jan. 30, 2019.

The self-taught artist has done some quilting and crochet work in the past, but otherwise had no formal education in drawing or painting when she became interested in working with watercolors.

"About three years ago, I had seen online where someone had done a tutorial for watercolors," said Beck. "I was just so interested and told my husband that I wanted

After about two years of honing her newly-learned skills. Beck participated in a craft fair at the Catawba Indian Nation Longhouse and has done work for the Catawba Cultural Preservation Center and the ISWA Head Start program.

Beck says her interests lie in painting flowers and other botanical items, a subject she finds relaxing to paint. The new exhibit features her renderings of these flowers, animals, and other natural items one might see when looking outside of a window.

"Because I am Native American, people really expect that I should only paint Native American things," said Beck. "It's not the only thing that catches my interest and I feel like people shouldn't expect me to do just that because that's my background."

One botanical work in the exhibit is a painting of a Violette de Bordeaux fig, just one fig variety growing in the fruit orchard at Beck's home. Beck bought a fig tree as a gift for her husband, who immediately became interested in learning more about the figs through online forums. His eagerness in researching and posting information in these forums provided Beck the inspiration for the piece.

'There is a process of when we pick it, we slice it in half, take a picture, and describe the flavors, because some taste like strawberries and some taste like peaches," said Beck. "So this one we had sliced and had ready for his post on the forums."


