In Narratives Ending in Separation, McCune's mixed media sculptures traverse emotional autobiographies that memorialize cherished family, childhood fears, and a young woman's longing for children. These sculptures give the opportunity to remember and honor the importance of the everyday, of family. Her finely crafted structures are embedded with made and found objects to imbue her sculpture with an abstract spirituality and a ritual of symbolic details. She reminds us that all our past can be prophetic to our present.

McCune's home and continuing family ties to rural Tennessee greatly influence her multiple media sculptures and drawings constructed in her home studio in Greer, SC. She has been featured in numerous exhibitions across the US and internationally

McCune recently retired from Greenville Technical College's Department of Visual Arts, as Academic Program Director and Lead Professor in art history, fine arts and art education. These artworks present a conversation that offers different moments in this transformative process: with ceramics, Arend forges the result of alchemical change; Gearhart explores, in video, the nonsensical decay inherent in the metamorphosis into the future self; Glenn envisions the timeless space of waiting in sculptural form; and through reclaimed textiles, Meginnes examines the breaking down of the past self. Emblematic of a human need to always

Between States of Being provides moments for meditation-a pause between past and future. This period of nothingness is a suspension of time for the viewer to reflect on where we were, where we are, and where we might be going.
