SEA to SEE is a unique installation by North Carolina-based artist and 2019 Mac-Arthur Fellow Mel Chin, commissioned to accompany The Mint Museum's exhibition Connecting the World: The Panama Canal at 100. In lieu of making an additional artwork regarding the man-made canal, the artist created a work that focuses on the oceans it connects. Instead of expressing the sea in symbolic form, Chin created two unique cinematic portraits, one of the Atlantic and one of the Pacific Oceans, utilizing animated visualization of oceanographic data.

Because the research is vast and diversified, the artist sought a format for creativity and collaboration, looking to engage scientists/historians to work with him and to have their inquiry, or area of expertise, developed into a unique film. The challenge was to translate the research visually and to render it as a moving current on the screen. The films were layered together to create composite portraits of the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans.

Museum visitors stand before two massive hemispherical glass projection screens facing each other in the installation. Designed with the skeletal frames of the

canal's lock doors in mind, they appear as 12ft.-in-diameter bulges holding back the Atlantic and Pacific waters that lie on opposite sides of the historic canal. The glass panes sandwich translucent plastic debris and sprays of crude oil (a reference to the islands of plastic waste and oil spills) to create a surface for back-projected films that loop in 10-minute sequences.

The information presented is based on research on the transformation of the oceans during the 100 years since the building of the canal, conveying the impact of human constructions on the ecology of the oceans.

SEA to SEE is on loan from the collection of The Mint Museum.

Central Piedmont Community College in Charlotte, NC, Features Works by Lee Malerich

Malerich spent most of her career with a needle in her hand, producing small stitched narratives describing the experiences of women's lives. Her work became very topical as she waged her battle with colon cancer, illustrated in these embroideries. For this textile work, she earned some acclaim and much discussion. The work has been exhibited widely.

Malerich moved a 1939-built farmhouse in 2004 and renovating it required most of her creativity. At the end of this period, she emerged with an interest in working with wooden windows, tongue and groove, and sanding in patterns. It took more than six years to retrain for the new medium. It was not until she was given a warehouse full of damaged chairs that the work began to flourish. Her narrative is constant throughout her work, but the words telling the story have changed.

As an artist and art teacher, Malerich's goal is to foster an environment where the maker and the viewer can think outside of the box. Using reclaimed objects such as bookcases, instruments, and discarded furniture, Malerich finds numerous methods and compositions in each of her sculptures. Viewers will be treated to a variety of pieces, including Telegraph Hill, comprised of assemblage art inspired by personal experience. Malerich's intuitive approach to art making can be seen throughout the exhibit as she wipes away the time-honed tradition of searching for formal compositional elements, requiring the viewer to deeply consider the work in front of them. What is it made of? How is it put together? What is the possible significance of the materials and three-dimensional composition? Central Piedmont Community College is a public community college in Charlotte, North Carolina. The photographs are the result of Andrews' work with the Baba Yelka Cultural Expedition in Kirovohrad Oblast, Ukraine. The founders of this organization seek to document the unique cultural markers of this region including; culinary traditions of the grandmothers, textiles, music, song and dance.

Throughout the exhibit, Resilience offers a glimpse into village life in the Kirovoghad Oblast of Ukraine, before Russia's inva-

sion, and focuses on the lives of Ukrainian women as they actively seek to preserve their culture and traditions. Andrews' photographs document the culture of the Ukrainian people in music, dance, food, language, and art. Resilience seeks to show the viewer how the women featured in the photographs use their personal agency to preserve their way of life, emerging as the catalysts for the preservation of historical memory and cultural traditions.

With a strong focus on women, the exhibition illustrates how a country and culture survives insurmountable odds. The focus on Ukraine emphasizes the urgency and value of unrelenting traditions and cultural and societal values. This story of Resilience exemplifies how women, specifically the babusyas (grandmothers), empower themselves and their families, through sustained cultural traditions that preserve their Ukrainian heritage and identity. Resilience: The Heart of Ukraine celebrates cultural traditions through the medium of photography.
