#### Where Are Your Photos?

That's a good question, I'm wondering where they are too.

You sent me a press release and a link to a transfer file where you loaded your images to go along with your press release, but I couldn't access them, so I sent a request to send them to me as attachments in the body of another e-mail, but they never came. I replied to your e-mail, but you didn't respond with your images. That's why they are not included with your press release. My gosh, we're a visual arts publication - how boring is a plain text press release? Pretty boring to

Unfortunately, this happens way too often, every month. My next move is to go to the website of the sender to see if they have the photos posted there, but many times they don't even have the press release posted there.

One thing I'll never understand about the folks who run the websites in the Carolina visual art community is their habit of including every past exhibit, but never posting their upcoming exhibits, much less their current exhibit. My business is the future, not the past. My readers don't usually want to know what exhibits they missed.

And I don't understand why some marketing folks send out press releases in a one way direction - not caring to get any responses.

Why should they - everything they sent was correct - right? Not always, sometimes I get a correction to an e-mail within 10 minutes of receiving it. And sometimes, another correction to that same press release 15 minutes

I urge people to read their e-mails before they send them and read them twice to make sure the info they are sending is correct. But what really concerns me is when they send a one way e-mail they never intend to reply to, if someone has a question about the press release they sent.

The best way to communicate with us is by e-mail - sent as plain text in the body of an e-mail and with images of artworks attached. I won't open attachments if I'm not 100% sure I know what they are. Most likely I won't even open those from people I know, as they should know not to send me attachments. I used to years ago, but after some folks sent me a few surprises which cost me a lot of time and money, I don't any more.

Now as far as photos of art go, I don't want any and won't use any with artists standing in front or next to their artwork. We're not *People* magazine, we report on

I need photos to be at least 3" wide by 300dpi or of a size which will translate into that size - like an image that is more than 12" wide by 72dpi - that will work. And I really only need 2 or 3 images, even if the exhibit includes a dozen or more artists. We don't want to duplicate exhibits, we want people to go see them.

Of course if you think you have work which is cover worthy, you might want to send us an image that is 10"wide by 300ppi, but for that to work out, you might as well buy a lottery ticket - it's complicated.

I just hope when I ask you to send photos, in reply to my e-mail, in reply to your e-mail - you reply with the attached images.

## **Redux Contemporary Art Center** in Charleston, SC, Features Works by Daisy McClellan

Redux Contemporary Art Center in Charleston, SC, is presenting Art Before Dishes, featuring works by Daisy McClellan, on view in Gallery 1056, through Nov.

Art Before Dishes is comprised of work mixing various fiber art techniques including punch needle, sewing, embroidery, and rug tufting. The artist, Daisy McClellan, is a mother of three young boys and her work often reflects the stage of motherhood she finds herself in: colorful, all encompassing, and always with a sense of nostalgia for what once was.

More often than not, even in these modern times, home life is thought of as a fe-

male domain. Not only are women typically the ones who decorate the home, they are also in charge of maintaining order: taking on the majority of cleaning and organization for the household. Art Before Dishes, is an internal mantra for the artist who uses it as a daily reminder to take time for herself and her art because with the never ending responsibilities of home life thrust upon wives and mothers, it can be a struggle to do so.

These works are inspired by women who make art for their walls but aren't thought of as "real" artists or ever given any accolades despite their often self taught and deeply technical skills. The pieces seen here are
