Johnson wants everyone to know you can never create enough! However, the most challenging part about being an artist in today's world is, for Johnson, the pressure of having to keep up with the market-place trends. She choses to not feel rushed in her creative process and while she pays some attention to the trends, she very purposefully creates work that incorporates her own interpretation of those trends.

The Artists Collective | Spartanburg in Spartanburg, SC, is presenting its *5th Annual Juried Exhibition*, on view in the Soloman Gallery. through Oct. 28, 2023. A reception will be held on Oct. 19, for 6-8pm, during the Spartanburg Art Walk.

Artist Lindsay Carroll of Fleetwood, NC, won first place in the Artists Collective I Spartanburg fifth annual Juried Exhibition that showcased the diversity of works within a five-state region.

"Artists from South Carolina, North Carolina, Georgia, Tennessee, and Virginia submitted work for the *Artist Collective | Spartanburg's Juried Exhibition* this year," says Beth Regula, chair of the managing board of ACS. "Nearly 200 artists entered almost 500 pieces of art to be considered

by our judge, Virginia Derryberry, professor of art, drawing and painting, emerita, at the University of North Carolina Asheville. From images of those entries, she could choose up to 70 for the exhibition – she selected 69. The juror only saw the images, not the names or states of the artists, when selecting those for display and the winners.'

Regula explains that once the art arrived at the gallery, it was hung and then Derryberry viewed them in person and selected the award winners. "Still, with no names or states provided; her decision was based on the merit of the art alone."

"The annual Juried Exhibition always brings beautiful, interesting and thought-provoking pieces to Spartanburg, and this year is no exception," Regula adds. "We look forward every year to meeting artists from beyond the Artists Collective's community. Being able to meet and talk with other artists broadens our knowledge of the art being made in our region."

Exhibition juror Derryberry's own artwork focuses on large scale figure narrative paintings which blend elements from mythology and alchemy, the forerunner of modern science. Her work is shown regularly in solo and group exhibitions throughout the United States and has been written about in an extensive list of publications, including exhibition catalogs, the New American Paintings magazine and the Oxford American magazine. Solo exhibitions, such as Private Domain and Truth To *Tell*, have traveled during the past five years to venues in Nevada, North Carolina, South Carolina, Alabama, Illinois, Pennsylvania, Virginia, Florida and Georgia.

In 2017, Derryberry was the recipient of the College Art Association's Distinguished Teaching of Art award and in 2020, was interviewed at the College Art Association's session on Amazing Women Artists.

In 2023, Derryberry was awarded an artist grant from the North Carolina Arts Council. Her drawings and paintings are in numerous private and public collections, including the Carnegie Museum in Pittsburgh, the Asheville Art Museum, the Tennessee State Museum, the State of West Virginia permanent collection, and the Morris Museum of Art. Two public art installations include 16 paintings at the Hartsfield-Atlanta International Airport and a 10-piece multipanel painting at the Knoxville Convention Center.
