Franklin G. Burroughs-Simeon B. Chapin Art Museum in Myrtle Beach, SC, Features Works by Kristine Mays

The Franklin G. Burroughs-Simeon B. Chapin Art Museum in Myrtle Beach, SC, will present Kristine Mays | A Time for Everything, featuring sculpture you can see right through, from Oct. 3 through Dec. 31, 2023.

Each work in the exhibition is something of a mystery. Within each of the artist's hollow wire sculptures - in either life-sized human form or the shape of a garment - is a surprise: another figure, a small creature of nature, or a message. Each piece invites the viewer to look closer to find the hidden meaning beyond the mere shape of the artwork, as it challenges viewers' perceptions of identity and awareness.

Mays' works are sculpted from thousands of pieces of wire hooked and looped together; yet despite the hardness of her medium, the artist achieves a fluidity to her forms that suggest the softness of a human body, with its fleeting gestures and expressions.

"As an artist I am very aware of the impermanence of life," Mays writes. "With metal wire I have timelessly captured a fleeting moment that I hope will last for decades. My artwork points to the soul and spirit, transporting the viewer into another place... I create the outer shell, the exterior of a human being, but provoke you to see what's within."

Mays, a San Francisco native, has been exhibiting her work since 1993 in both solo and group exhibitions. Collectors of her work include Star Wars creator George Lucas as well as many private collectors throughout the United States.

Among some of her more unusual projects were her participation in the Hearts in San Francisco program in 2015, creat-

ing a large 400-pound heart for their annual public art installation; as a featured artist in the San Francisco Art Commission's "Art in Storefronts" program, which transformed vacant storefronts and commercial corridors into a destination for contemporary art; and as a collaborator on a large scale public mural in San Francisco, which features large wire feathers placed among the portraits, reflecting the fleeting existence of black jazz musicians.

Mays received her Bachelor Degree in Arts Administration from DePaul University and has occasionally served as a grant review panelist for the San Francisco Arts Commission.
