She helped start the organization, Print Studio South, which eventually led to the creation of the Redux Contemporary Arts Center - which dates us both.

This is for the folks who Hit & Run on social media - mainly Facebook and those who use Constant Contact as a catch all for marketing. The people who post but are not expecting any response, other than a thumbs up or a heart.

My frustration comes from seeing a post which only promotes an exhibit and its reception date, which is only part of the story they should be telling. If an exhibition is only going to be up or on view during those couple of hours on that certain day - they are doing a good job promoting a reception or maybe not. But more work needs to be done.

When I see an interesting image of an artwork posted, the first thing I want to know is who the artist is. Then, if it was made by a living or dead artist. Next is whether the work is part of an exhibition of works by this one artist or a group of artists - where it can be seen in person, when, and how long the opportunity to see it will last. Next, do I have to pay to see it or is that free? And then way down the line I might be curious as to how big the work is, what medium it is, and how much would it cost to make it mine. Other concerns would include how far away the venue is from me, if there is parking (free or paid) available nearby, and maybe if there is somewhere nearby where I might get a bite to eat. You could also throw in the fact that an overnight stay might be involved.

Of course I'm assuming that the work is for sale or someone wants you to pay them to see it. Otherwise why is it being posted on social media or why is someone sending me an e-mail about it?

If your intent was to see something included in Carolina Arts, you're going to need more than a photo and a reception date.
