Gibbes Museum of Art in Charleston, SC, Features Works From the Martin Z. Margulies Collection

The Gibbes Museum of Art in Charles ton, SC, is presenting *The Bitter Years:* Dorothea Lange and Walker Evans Photographs from the Martin Z. Margulies Collection, on view in Galleries 8 & 9, through Jan. 14, 2024.

Originating as a tribute to the 1962 Bitter Years photography exhibition curated by the illustrious Edward Steichen for the Museum of Modern Art, New York, the current exhibition organized by the Margulies Collection, features photographs by renowned American photographers Dorothea Lange, Walker Evans, Marion Post Wolcott, Jack Delano, and others who launched their careers as documentarians of the Great Depression.

Working for the Farm Security Administration, a branch of Roosevelt's New Deal program, these photographers were hired to capture the social landscape of the country, highlighting the challenges facing Americans between 1935 and 1944. As one photographer articulated, "the idea is to show New York to Texans and Texas to New Yorkers."

The Martin Z. Margulies Photography Collection includes over 100 vintage photographs from the Farm Security Administration, sixty-five were selected for this exhibition, which also features a series of Polaroids produced by Walker Evans in 1973 and '74 returning to themes found in the earlier works.

This exhibition was co-curated by Katherine Hinds, chief curator, and Jeanie Ambrosio, associate curator of The Margulies Collection at the Warehouse. The presentation at the Gibbes is supported by BlueCross BlueShield of South Carolina. Jane Smith Turner Foundation, and the Gibbes Women's Council.

The Gibbes Museum enhances lives through art by engaging people of every background and experience with art and artists of enduring quality, by collecting and preserving art that touches Charleston, and by providing opportunities to learn, to discover, to enjoy, and to be inspired by the creative process.

The Gibbes Museum of Art is home to the foremost collection of American art that incorporates the story of Charleston. The Museum connects the city and region's artistic past to a vibrant contemporary art scene. This is what we believe. Art is the reason.

A bustling seaport in the 1700s, Charleston was a melting pot of cultures, religions, and traditions. Powered by the labor of enslaved peoples in the rice and

indigo trades, it was the 4th largest city in America in 1790 - and the wealthiest. Like Philadelphia, Boston and New York, what distinguished Charleston then - was art.

While we were home to some of America's earliest art, collectors, and artists, who made the City both muse and subject - and took our turn as one of the nation's richest cities - in money and culture - so were we also home to America's original sin, slavery - and a war that divided our nation.

In 1888, when Charleston was financially and culturally on its knees, benefactor James Gibbes left a bequest to the City to build an art museum. When the Gibbes Museum opened in 1905, the nation celebrated what Charleston has always understood: the power of art - to inspire our imagination, heal our hurt, revel in our experience, rebuild what's broken, nourish our souls, and release all that holds us back.

In Charleston, we believe art is the difference between merely existing and being truly alive. That's why we immerse ourselves in every part of it - from fine art to craft - from nurturing its creation and celebrating its multicultural presentation to inviting its interpretation and ensuring its preservation.

In the presence of art, we have the opportunity to see inside the artist's heart, mind, and soul and feel what the artist felt. That understanding and compassion make us more understanding, compassionate people, who, in turn, create a more compassionate, understanding world.

Charleston County Public Library in Charleston, SC, Features Works by Emilya Padlowski

The Charleston County Public Library system in Charleston, SC, will present *Life in Art: Evolving Search and Experiment*, featuring works by Emilya Padlowski, on view in the Saul Alexander Gallery, located on Calhoun Street, from Oct. 1 - 31, 2023.

Emilya Padlowski is an award-winning artist, interior designer and art historian. She has a multicultural background which manifests itself in her style and her art. Born in Poland, Padlowski spent her formative years growing up in Ukraine and Azerbaijan under the careful, ever-present eyes of the Soviet communist government; this gives her a unique knowledge of life and different cultures, and contributes depth to her art.

Trained as a Russian and French Literature and Language instructor in the Azerbaijan College of Languages, she had to adjust her life after immigrating to the United States. Her love for art brought her to the Montclair State University (NJ) where she received her Master's degrees in Fine Arts and Art History. She also studied design and painting at the International American University and the Marshutz School of Art in Aix-en-Provence, France. She has now

dedicated herself to painting and making soft sculptures from recycled materials.

Padlowski's soft sculptures, both whimsical and quirky, are based on mythical stories, opera, ballet, classical music and fairytales. Her paintings have a very personal cast: the marriage of Russian, Azerbaijani and Eastern European cultures. Her art is unpredictable and uniquely attractive. Padlowski's paintings sometimes express sadness and despair, while at other times they are bursting with happiness and joyful colors. She calls her art a "symbolic continued on Page 4"

On our cover this month is a work by Mary Walker, from the exhibit, Mary's Wonderland, which will be on view at the Corrigan Gallery Ilc in Charleston, SC, from Oct. 4 - 31, 2023. A reception will be held on Oct. 6, from 5-8pm. The images are from the book, "Scenes from Alice in Wonderland", created by Walker, that will be available at the gallery and Buxton Books in Charleston. It is an edition of 150 which includes 27 images with an original print. Walker is one of Charleston's few fine art printmakers, something which she has been doing for a long time. She helped start the organization, Print Studio South, which eventually led to the creation of the Redux Contemporary Arts Center - which dates us both.

Of course they might take in a few art events during their journey in search of color. If you can't find any color outside, then look inside in a gallery.

Frustration Time - Time To Blow Off Some Steam

Remember the Who, What, Where, When, and Why - the five Ws of communicating. Well, I think a lot of you have forgotten about them or never knew about them to begin with. Unfortunately this is meant for the people who won't read my commentary, much less read our publication. This is for the folks who Hit & Run on social media - mainly Facebook and those who use Constant Contact as a catch all for marketing. The people who post but are not expecting any response, other than a thumbs up or a heart.

My frustration comes from seeing a post which only promotes an exhibit and its reception date, which is only part of the story they should be telling. If an exhibition is only going to be up or on view during those couple of hours on that certain day - they are doing a good job promoting a reception or maybe not. But more work needs to be done.

When I see an interesting image of an artwork posted, the first thing I want to know is who the artist is. Then, if it was made by a living or dead artist. Next is whether the work is part of an exhibition of works by this one artist or a group of artists - where it can be seen in person, when, and how long the opportunity to see it will last. Next, do I have to pay to see it or is that free? And then way down the line I might be curious as to how big the work is, what medium it is, and how much would it cost to make it mine. Other concerns would include how far away the venue is from me, if there is parking (free or paid) available nearby, and maybe if there is somewhere nearby where I might get a bite to eat. You could also throw in the fact that an overnight stay might be involved.

Of course I'm assuming that the work is for sale or someone wants you to pay them to see it. Otherwise why is it being posted on social media or why is someone sending me an e-mail about it?

If your intent was to see something included in Carolina Arts, you're going to need more than a photo and a reception date.

The City of North Charleston, SC's Cultural Arts Department is pleased to announce that works by members of the Redux Artists Collective will be on display at Park Circle Gallery from Oct. 4 - 28, 2023. A free reception hosted by the artists will be held at the gallery on Oct. 6, from 5-7pm. The public is invited to attend.

Metamorphosis is defined as a striking alteration in physical form, structure, or substance. All art involves metamorphosis - materials take on meanings, objects merge with subjects, and forms transform into new shapes. In their group exhibition, titled *Metamorphosis*, the Redux Artists Collective presents a collection of works in a variety of media that reflect the kinds of transformations that lie at the heart of art making. This collection, ranging from painting and sculpture to photography and collage, will be a conscious examination of the acts of metamorphosis that underlie the artists' creative practices.



Corrigan Gallery Ilc in Charleston, SC, Offers Works by Mary Walker

Corrigan Gallery Ilc in Charleston, SC, will present *Mary's Wonderland*, featuring works by Mary Walker, on view from Oct. 4 - 31, 2023. A reception will be held on Oct. 6, from 5-8pm.

"This exhibit will contain many paintings of my strange characters, along with some slightly more serious themes. Included will be a show inside a suitcase so that we will have an exhibit inside of the exhibit. The suitcase will be peopled with wooden characters," Walker says about the exhibit. She continues, "It's also very exciting to introduce my "Scenes from Alice in Wonderland" book that I've been working on for the last 6 – 8 years Children often have magical moments of discovery and wonder which usually fade with time and distraction, but a few may linger to become an inspiration later in life," says Walker about her book release.

The book, "Scenes from Alice in Wonderland", will be available at the gallery and Buxton Books. It is an edition of 150 which includes 27 with an original print.

Walker's career has included residencies in Ireland, Massachusetts, and Venice, Italy, a solo show at the City Gallery at Waterfront Park in Charleston as result of the Griffith Lowcountry Artist's Award, and exhibits throughout South Carolina, New York, Massachusetts, and North Carolina. Some of her more notable projects are a traveling show called "The Suitcase" that featured various artists all inside an old red suitcase and an anti-war project called "The

Scrolls" that involved national and international artists.

Walker's work is in several collections including Morris Museum, Springfield Museum of Art, Gibbes Museum of Art, the Sol LeWitt Collection, Jules Collins Smith Museum, and in the Special Collections of the Addleston Library at the College of Charleston.

Corrigan Gallery happily represents local artists with a few exceptions of visiting and second market artists. From the edge of traditional to as "contemporary" as is feasible, the gallery presents works with thought and depth particularly in a nontraditional manner. Second market pieces are also available and works from the estates of both Elizabeth O'Neill Verner and Alfred Hutty and other notable artists.

raised all over the US by a career Navy father and a clay artist mother, growing up surrounded by both arts and crafts & military history and design. By juxtaposing wood and metal, light and dark tones, smooth and rough textures, his furniture and woodwork is a canvas for expression. Helmkamp enjoys creating unique furniture and sculpture which ask questions, tell stories and make statements about our culture and the never-ending social avalanche we all live in. He currently lives in North Charleston, SC, where he works on commissions and makes a variety of projects and products in his home studio. He shows his work in galleries and exhibitions throughout the Southeast.

John Schumacher was born in Covington, KY, and graduated from Northern Kentucky University with a Major in Business and a Minor in Fine Arts. Many of the Civil War era houses in that area included stained glass windows in their architectural design, which he always admired, but could not afford. He decided to build a window himself, and thus began a continuing education, now lasting over 50 years.

Moving to Aiken, SC, in 1980, Schumacher pursued his professional career as a manufacturing manager, and also continued to study the masters of stained glass while refining his skills in lead, zinc and copper foil techniques. His large windows contain hundreds of individual cuts of glass. Schumacher's works have earned winning ribbons in regional competitions, encouraging him to continue his efforts.

After retirement, about 10 years ago, with children and grandchildren living in the Lowcountry, Schumacher and his wife Jane have moved once again, to Mount Pleasant, SC. He has converted his garage into a studio and spends many hours creating traditional and contemporary stained-glass pieces.

Bonnie Younginer is a fiber artist working in wool, silk and cotton. She retired from a 30-year career in Interior Design and now weaves and needle and wet felts the scenery she studies in her beautiful Low-country environment. Her weaving methods are plain weave and tapestry style weaving

using colorful wool yarns. She draws her own patterns for the weavings referred to as "cartoons" in the weaving world.

Younginer felting uses dyed fleece, either Merino or New Zealand Corriedale wool that has been carded and pulled into long strips of wool fiber. Handmade embellishments are added for texture and interest. Wet felting calls for the wool roving to be pulled apart and laid out in a way to depict the desired pattern she has designed. The loose fibers are placed on bubble wrap, covered with a nylon mesh and a warm water soap solution is spread over the wool design, the wet fiber is rolled up onto a tube and rolled back and forth until the fibers entangle and form a piece of felt "cloth."

Before drying, the "cloth" is hand manipulated into the desired form. After it is dry it is embellished and framed. Producing needle felted art she uses thin barbed needles. Following the pattern, Younginer slowly pushes the wool yarns (and sometimes silk) with barbed needles into a pre-felt cloth, bonding the yarn to the felt

The light and shadows in Hecht's paintings of dunes highlight the beauty of something as ordinary as sand, with footprints giving a subtle nod to



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

Clemson University in Clemson, SC, Celebrates 50 Years of Its MFA Program

Clemson University's Master of Fine Arts program is celebrating a half-century of art and learning with a three-part exhibition featuring a wide variety of from its graduates and receptions featuring reflections from notable alumni and supporters of the MFA program.

As Good as Gold: 50 Years of the MFA at Clemson, is being presented in three parts including: Part I, on view in the Lee Gallery, through Oct. 31, 2023; Part III, on view in the Lee Gallery, from Jan. 26 through Mar. 8, 2024, and, on view at the Brooks Center for Performing Arts - Lobby Area, through Oct. 31, 2023. 'Celebrating the 50-year anniversary of our MFA program in visual arts fills me with immense pride and excitement," said Kathleen Thum, associate professor and MFA graduate program coordinator. "This milestone allows us to honor and witness the incredible successes of our alumni, achieved over five decades, while also looking forward to the promising future

The MFA program was created in 1970 with a single student in the Department of Visual Studies, the predecessor to the De-

partment of Art. Fifty years later, it boasts more than 250 graduates.

The student who started it all was Jeanet Dreskin '73, who remains a cherished pioneer for women in the arts at nearly 102 years young.

Dreskin became Clemson's first MFA graduate and orchestrated an impressive and diverse career, beginning as a staff artist for the American Museum of Natural History, then as a certified medical illustrator, the director of the Greenville County Museum of Art school and an independent studio artist. Her artwork is

in collections all over the world, including at the Smithsonian American Art Museum, the Gibbes Museum of Art, the Asheville Art Museum and more.

A recent visit to Dreskin's room at a senior living facility in Greenville found her as sprightly and passionate as ever about the visual arts. When presented with one of the 50-year-old paintings she created while still a Clemson student, she remarked, "There's an old friend!"

She has given back to Clemson over the years, most notably through the Dr. E. Arthur and Jeanet S. Dreskin Travel Fellowship Endowment, which has had a profound impact on decades of MFA students by enabling them to study abroad, something she sees as vitally important.

"Funding travel for students was very important because I felt they needed to get a picture of what was happening in other parts of the world," Dreskin said. "My husband and I decided that one of the things we'd like to do would be to set up a program so young people could travel abroad and see what was happening in other places. It's very important, particularly with the arts, to be aware of what's going on in other areas of the world."

The MFA is considered the terminal degree in the visual arts. Clemson's program offers concentrations in the studio areas of drawing, painting, printmaking, ceramics, photography and sculpture. Interdisciplinary and collaborative projects are encouraged within the department. The primary goal of the program is to provide students opportunities to develop a high degree of professional competence in their chosen area of concentration.

En Iwamura '16 came to Clemson's MFA program after meeting Department of Art chair Valerie Zimany while she was on research leave for a Fulbright-Hays award in Japan.

"To be honest, I was born and raised in Japan, so I had no idea where Clemson was or what it looked like," said Iwamura. "I couldn't speak any English, wasn't familiar with American culture, life and customs, and I had no relatives or friends there. But Valerie convinced me an MFA degree from Clemson would set me up for success as an artist. It was the biggest decision I made in my life and the best one."

Today Iwamura's whimsical ceramic sculptures have been celebrated in exhibi-

tions all over the world, from his native Japan to France, China, Australia and all over the United States.

"I believe people need to get out from their comfortable zone to grab opportunities they haven't imagined," Iwamura said. "For me, those three years I spent at Clemson were tough but one of the brightest memories I have."

Kathleen Thum said that graduate students are the heart of the Department of Art, and their commitment to the artistic practice and academic rigor energizes the department's faculty and undergraduates.

"As we celebrate this significant milestone of our MFA program, we will continue to build upon the foundation of excellence laid down by our remarkable alumni over the past 50 years," said Thum. "Together, we will nurture a community of diverse artists and scholars, fostering creativity, collaboration and innovation as we continue to shape the future of visual arts for generations to come."

Jeanet Dreskin succinctly summed up the appeal of making a living as an artist: "I love working in the arts because it's endless. You can create in any direction you want to go."



Greenville Technical College in Greer, SC, Features Works From the Carolina Print Collective

Greenville Technical College in Greer, SC, is presenting *Exquisite Connections: A Print Installation from the Contemporary Print Collective*, on view in the Benson Campus Galleries, through Oct. 13, 2023.

Exquisite Connections is a sprawling installation of 6-inch square prints in Gallery 2. The creation of the individual prints is based on a parlor game (Exquisite Corpse) invented by the French Surrealist, André Breton. In Breton's game, player 1 would make a drawing and cover part of the drawing only revealing a connection point. The drawing was then passed on to player 2 who would add a drawing beginning at the connection point and so on. It was a process of discovery and creative solutions that would often result in an absurd product.

The Contemporary Print Collective had canceled their monthly meetings during Covid quarantine. Printmaking, being an inherently collaborative medium, the membership sought a catalyst for remote gathering and sharing. *Exquisite Connection* became the solution. Exquisite Connection follows the premises of the original game but with hand-pulled prints.

The parameters of *Exquisite Connection* specified individual prints be a 6-inch square of black ink on white paper, with designated connection points on at least two sides. The 12 participants worked in randomly assigned pairs to make works in response to each other. Interpretation and subject were unique for each participant.

The prints are now installed, matching


connection points, to produce a single work that sprawls across two walls. The magic of *Exquisite Connections* is that with only a minimum of parameters, the many parts come together as a coherent whole. It can be altered through installation design and space to create a myriad of final products.

The Contemporary Print Collective (CPC) is a group of 20+ professional artists based in the Greenville Center for Creative Arts in Greenville, SC. CPC members are actively engaged in printmaking and in the field through creations and exhibitions of fine-art prints. CPC provides a venue for printmakers and print collectors to gather, collaborate, and share on a monthly basis.

According to CPC, "It is our mission to create, exhibit, collaborate, and educate through printmaking and within the contemporary dialectic of art. We seek to foster an awareness of original, hand-pulled prints by promoting exhibitions, educational opportunities, and encouraging the art of collecting prints."

20:/20 Unity, a portfolio exchange among 19 CPC members is a bonus feature of this exhibition and is installed in Gallery 1. 20:/20 Unity was initially exhibited at the Anderson Arts Center in late 2019 and early 2020.

by our judge, Virginia Derryberry, professor of art, drawing and painting, emerita, at the University of North Carolina Asheville. From images of those entries, she could choose up to 70 for the exhibition – she selected 69. The juror only saw the images, not the names or states of the artists, when selecting those for display and the winners.'

Regula explains that once the art arrived at the gallery, it was hung and then Derryberry viewed them in person and selected the award winners. "Still, with no names or states provided; her decision was based on the merit of the art alone."

"The annual Juried Exhibition always brings beautiful, interesting and thought-provoking pieces to Spartanburg, and this year is no exception," Regula adds. "We look forward every year to meeting artists from beyond the Artists Collective's community. Being able to meet and talk with other artists broadens our knowledge of the art being made in our region."

Exhibition juror Derryberry's own artwork focuses on large scale figure narrative paintings which blend elements from mythology and alchemy, the forerunner of modern science. Her work is shown regularly in solo and group exhibitions throughout the United States and has been written about in an extensive list of publications, including exhibition catalogs, the New American Paintings magazine and the Oxford American magazine. Solo exhibitions, such as Private Domain and Truth To *Tell*, have traveled during the past five years to venues in Nevada, North Carolina, South Carolina, Alabama, Illinois, Pennsylvania, Virginia, Florida and Georgia.

In 2017, Derryberry was the recipient of the College Art Association's Distinguished Teaching of Art award and in 2020, was interviewed at the College Art Association's session on Amazing Women Artists.

Not having her desire for dance lessons fulfilled, Regula "danced" through her art. "My work has been described as lyrical, and I would agree that most of the work has a flowing expressive feeling about it."

In the exhibition, Regula has divided the works into two categories: figurative, "my version of dancers – their arms and legs appearing to be in motion, setting up movement of lines and color in the spaces around them," she says; and "scenes from nature," inspired by her garden. "I love the wind, plants, sky and water. As I look at the flowers moving in the wind, they appear to be dancing.'

Some people describe Regula's works as "other worldly." She agrees. "I really do not talk about this often, but I do feel that images come to me sometimes from another place. I cannot explain this. I just accept it and relay these images in my art to the viewer. The viewer can see or feel whatever they want to about this work."

The University of South Carolina Upstate in Spartanburg, SC, is presenting Charting the Badlands: Drawings and Meditations, featuring works by Sara Schneckloth, on view in the USC Upstate Gallery at the Chapman Cultural Center, through Nov. 2, 2023. A closing reception will be held on Nov. 2, from 5-7pm.

UPSTATE Gallery, sponsored by the University of South Carolina Upstate, is honored to announce Charting the Badlands: Drawings and Meditations, by Sara Schneckloth. Drawings and aerial videography are integrated to create a visual experience of material, landscape, and bodily space. Drawing is considered within the context of mapping landforms across periods of human activity, impact, and absence. Since 2014, Schneckloth has been creating drawings that describe the natural and built environments of rural New Mexico, focusing primarily on the badlands of the San Juan Basin.



Schneckloth's drawings originate from the physical spaces she explores in Northern New Mexico, moving between ancestral Puebloan ruins, surrounding badlands, and handheld fragments of stone. She layers and manipulates natural pigments, ink, charcoal, graphite, watercolor and wax, so that each mark echoes the surfaces and forms she has seen or touched. These drawings reference the history and physicality of place, chart-

ing an experience of this environment and the body's mark within it. Working with aerial videographer Cary Brooks to capture low-altitude drone footage of the badlands, Schneckloth's perspective is broadened. This informs her drawings and parallels the visual experience of place.

Schneckloth's expansive drawing practice has been exhibited throughout the United States, South Africa, France, Norway, and the United Kingdom. She has published numerous essays on drawing and embodiment, and runs collaborative drawing workshops at venues including the Metropolitan Museum of Art, the OXO Bargehouse, London, and at universities across the country. A professor in the School of Visual Art and Design at the University of South Carolina, she also co-curates the Seed Cultures Archive, a digital project in conversation with the Svalbard Global Seed Vault. She holds degrees from Northwestern University and the University of Wisconsin, and currently lives and works in Columbia, SC, and Regina, NM. Recently, she launched Drawing Canyon, Sage, and Sky, a summer residency and an online workshop program for artists seeking to integrate field drawing and natural materials into their studio practices.

The concept of "line" can be perceived and defined differently across various fields and perspectives. For instance, a line is one of the seven essential elements in art, considered "a moving dot." In literature, a line can be a subdivision of a poem, and in music, it may refer to a phrase or complete thought. In everyday conversations, we use the phrase "reading between the lines" to infer hidden or implicit meanings.

A Gender Line showcases the works of female visual artists and writers, all South Carolina residents from various cultural backgrounds, including African American, Asian, Latina, and Persian. The exhibition responds to Ruth Bader Ginsburg's statement, emphasizing the need to break free from gender barriers and promote gender equality.

University of South Carolina at Lancaster, SC, Offers New Exhibits

The University of South Carolina at Lancaster, SC, is presenting two new exhibitions including: *Backyard Vines: Artwork by Nancy Basket*, featuring long leaf pine needle baskets, kudzu paper art, and other organic woven wonders made by traditional artist Nancy Basket, on view in the Center's North Gallery through Feb. 15, 2024, and *More than a Game: Indigenous Sports and Athleticism*, on display in conjunction with the 18th Annual Native American Studies Week, *Indigenous Athletes and Athleticism: Vital Contributions to a National Passion*, on view in the Center's Five Points Gallery through Aug. 5, 2024.

A culmination of her four-month appearance as the Center's Artist-in-Residence during fall of 2019, the exhibit What Do You Have in Your Back Yard?: The Traditional Artwork of Nancy Basket was open for a handful of weeks at the Center before the facility's temporary closure in March 2020. Some of the artwork featured in the original exhibit will return, such as the 8-feet sculptures of the Uktena (featuring motion-sensor eyes) and Thunderbird, along with new pieces, like oversized kudzu chandeliers.

Also included in the exhibit are thumbsized miniatures, pine needle baskets, woven baskets, manikin floor lamps, and more. In addition to working with pine needles and kudzu, Basket has woven with corn

husks, rye straw, horsehair, wisteria, grapevines, and cattails.

Basket has worked with long leaf pine needles for over 40 years, helping form the first basketry guild in North America with friend Vi Phillips. "I'm very excited to have another show after the first one was only open to the public two weeks during the Covid shutdown," said Basket. "Come see what you, too, can do with pervasive vines. Got any in your yard?"

Columbia Museum of Art in Columbia, SC, Offers Fashion **Photography Exhibit**

The Columbia Museum of Art in Columbia, SC, will present Lee Alexander Mc-Queen & Ann Ray: Rendez-Vous, a major fashion and photography exhibition on view from Oct. 7 through Jan. 21, 2024. Curated and organized by Barrett Barrera Projects, Rendez-Vous debuted at the Crocker Art Museum in Sacramento, CA, and will make its second stop at the CMA this fall before continuing its multi-city tour.

"McQueen continues to endure, inspire, and fascinate, and this exhibition gives rare access to be up close to a designer who transcended the world of fashion," says CMA Director of Art and Learning Jackie Adams. "The intimate portraits Ann Ray captured of her friend reveal genuine moments of the designer's creativity, strength, vulnerability, and individualism, giving viewers authentic moments of the person versus the persona."

Lee Alexander McQueen & Ann Ray: Rendez-Vous explores the 13-year friendship and intimate creative collaboration between the late British designer Lee Alexander McQueen - one of the most renowned contemporary fashion designers of our era - and French photographer Ann Ray, whom McQueen personally selected to document his design process and the behind-thescenes experience of his runway shows.

"You know, it was simple. He was part of my life, we loved each other, I had rendezvous," said Ray. McQueen and Ray's friendship began with a simple agreement in which money, business considerations and fashion had no place. "I like your images but I'm broke. Give me your photos, I'll give you clothes," Ray recalls McQueen expressing to her early in their relationship.

The exhibition features more than 60 photographs taken by Ray, reflecting her unique relationship with McQueen between the years of 1997 and 2010, alongside garments McQueen gifted to her over the course of their work together.

Rendez-Vous also features over 50 spectacular McQueen pieces from Barrett Barrera Projects' collection, the largest private collection of McQueen's work and owner of Ray's full McQueen photographic archive. Altogether, these garments, photographs, and corresponding ephemera tell the story of the iconic duo's intertwined artistic journey and friendship.

"With Columbia being central to fashionloving cities such as Charleston, Atlanta, Savannah, and Charlotte, Rendez-Vous has great potential to attract visitors regionally, and we're excited to be a hub for folks from our community and beyond to experience the work of a revered and respected icon of fashion," says Adams.

Lee Alexander McQueen was born in 1969 to a working-class East London family. At the age of 16, he dropped out of high school to pursue his love of fashion first as a tailor's apprentice on Savile Row and later in the prestigious MA Fashion program at Central Saint Martins. In 1993, he founded his eponymous label, which he oversaw until his death in 2010. Between 1996 and 2001, McQueen served as the creative director of the storied Parisian couturier Givenchy, a subsidiary of the luxury conglomerate L.V.M.H. He was awarded British Designer of the Year multiple times, and in 2003 he was awarded the C.B.E. (Commander of the Order of the British Empire) by Queen Elizabeth II. Over the

course of his brief 18-year career, McQueen singlehandedly altered the course of modern fashion with his decade-defining silhouettes and expressive runway presentations that combined the conceptual depth of avantgarde performance art with the high glamor of luxury fashion.

Ann Ray is a multidisciplinary French artist, filmmaker, and author. Her professional career began while working for Givenchy in Japan in the 1990s. While living there, she became immersed in Japanese culture and craftsmanship, learning philosophies of creation from senseis in various trades such as ceramics, painting, and kimono design. These relationships had a fundamental impact on her own art and professional life at Givenchy. When she met Lee Alexander McQueen at Givenchy in Paris in 1997, marking the start of their 13year creative partnership and friendship, the artistic point of view she acquired during her time studying under Japanese masters formed the basis of their early conversations. In the performing arts sphere, Ray works for Opéra Garnier in Paris and New York's Metropolitan Opera. Her work has been exhibited at venues worldwide, including Palais du Tau in Reims, Palais Garnier in Paris, Ca'Pesaro Museum in Venice, the Museum at FIT in New York, and Rencontres d'Arles. Ray's artworks appear in art collections internationally, including the Victoria & Albert Museum, Museum of Fine Arts Boston, and Fondation Carmignac (Paris). She has published seven books, including Nicolas Le Riche (2008), Love Looks Not with the Eyes (2012), Les Inachevés (2018), and Eyes Shut (2022). Ray works and lives in France between Paris and

Asheville Art Museum in Asheville, NC, Explores the Captivating World of Photorealism

The Asheville Art Museum in Asheville, NC, is pleased to announce Beyond the Lens: Photorealist Perspectives on Looking, Seeing, and Painting, on view through Feb. 5, 2024.

Throughout the history of painting from the mid-19th century forward, artists have used an endless variety of approaches to record their world. Beyond the Lens: Photorealist Perspectives on Looking, Seeing, and Painting continues this thread, offering an opportunity to explore a singular and still forceful aspect of American art. Photorealism shares many of the approaches of historical and modernist realism, with a twist. The use of the camera as a basic tool for organizing visual information in advance of painterly expression is now quite common, but Photorealists embraced the camera as the focal point in their creative process.

Beyond the Lens presents key works from the collection of Louis K. and Susan Pear Meisel, bringing together paintings and works on paper dating from the 1970s to the present to focus on this profoundly influential art movement. The exhibition includes work by highly acclaimed formative artists of the movement such as Charles Bell, Robert Bechtle, Tom Blackwell, Richard Estes, Audrey Flack, and Ralph Goings as well as paintings by the successive generations of Photorealist artists Anthony Brunelli, Davis Cone, Bertrand Meniel, Rod Penner, and Raphaella Spence

Featured artworks in the exhibition include diverse subject matters, but the primary focus is on the common and every day: urban scenes, "portraits" of cars, trucks, and motorcycles, still life compositions using toys, food, candy wrappers, and salt and pepper shakers. All provide opportunities for virtuoso studies in how light, reflection, and the camera as intermediary shapes our perception of the material world.

This multigenerational survey demonstrates how the 35-mm camera, and later technological advances in digital image-making, informed and impacted the painterly gesture. Taken together, the paintings and works on paper in Beyond the Lens show how simply spellbinding these virtuosic works of art can be.

"Beyond the Lens offers a fascinating look into the Photorealism movement and delves into the profound connection between the artists' observation and creative process," says Pamela L. Myers, Executive Director of Asheville Art Museum. "We are delighted to present this curated collection of artworks encapsulating the creative vision and technical precision that defines this artistic genre."

Photorealism found its roots in the late

1960s in California and New York, coexisting with an explosion of new ideas in art-making that included Conceptual, Pop, Minimalism, Land and Performance Art. At first, representational realism coexisted with the thematic and conceptual explosion but was eventually relegated to the margins regarding critical and curatorial attention. Often misunderstood and sometimes negatively criticized or lampooned as a betrayal of modernism's commitment to abstraction, the artists involved in Photorealism remained committed explorers of the trail they had blazed.

In the decades of the late twentieth century and early twenty-first century, realistic and symbolic painting experienced a renaissance, as contemporary artists are increasingly drawn to narrative and storytelling. Concurrently, using a camera as a preparatory tool equally legitimate and valuable as pencils and pens has made the rubric of Photorealism increasingly

Terrie Sultan states, "The works presented in *Beyond the Lens* are artistically diverse and survey the evolution of Photorealism, a genre that has continuously pushed the boundaries of perception and representation. 

The Southern Highland Craft Guild in Asheville, NC, is presenting Finding Balance, featuring works by Barbara Jones, Elaine Dohms, Deneece Harrell, Thomas Irven, and Janice MacDonald, on view in the Folk Art Center's Focus Gallery, through

This exhibition features the work of five Guild members: Barbara Jones and Elaine Dohms in fiber, Deneece Harrell in clay, Thomas Irven in wood, and Janice Mac Donald in mixed media.

With a professional background in illustration, graphic design, quilt design, long-arm quilting, and a love for mixed media art, Barbara Jones manipulates natural and synthetic fabrics, threads, yarns, and ribbons creating intricate colorful designs. "I work in an improvisational style; I don't have a blueprint or a set of tried-and-true instructions to create one of my pieces."

"There is no Step 1, Step 2, Step 3 - it's more like the fiber and I take a journey together. The fiber may pull me one way or I may nudge it in a different direction; sometimes we have a destination in mind, or sometimes we just wander, roaming and rambling until we realize we've arrived. I'm always thrilled by this process of discovery and refinement, and I hope the result intrigues and involves the viewer," states

Another style of framed fiber in the exhibit is by artist Elaine Dohms, who uses a needle to merge layers of assorted wools, tussah, and margilan silk, creating landscapes full of textures and colors.

Her pieces reflect the scenes around her of mountains and trees, framed in burled and natural edge wood such as walnut and ambrosia maple.

Visitors may recognize the work of 2022 Craft Fair of the Southern Highlands featured artist, Deneece Harrell, who manipulates layers of porcelain into organic asymmetrical sculptures with gold leaf interiors. Her white and gold pieces captivate viewers, inviting one to reflect on life's experiences.

When asked about her process Harrell states, "Questioning, searching, and wrestling with ideas of purpose, identity, and worth drive my creative process. Experiences layer, fusing the unexpected and predictable, the uncontrolled and intentional. The juxtapositions that create the story of our

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lives are reflected in my sculptural porcelain vessels. I am learning to see and to treasure life, shaped by beauty in the hands of love."

Possibly Thomas Irven's most recognizable pieces are wooden acorn sculptures and boxes made in various sizes, shapes, colors, and from different types of trees, but this nationally recognized artist makes a variety of wooden sculptures, lamps, and furniture.

Irven is an award-winning artist who has produced custom furniture in his Bellaire, TX, studio since 1987 before moving to Waynesville, NC. With an earned BS in Business and an MS in Occupational Education, Irven has taught woodworking and drafting in public schools and in private institutions. Irven apprenticed under an English master craftsman and has conducted seminars in which he has taught woodworking, woodturning, and design.

The mixed metal sculptures on display are made of scraps of fabric, mica chips, wire, aluminum, recycled materials, cast bronze, complete with metallic, epoxy, and acrylic glazes and show a range of work by Janice MacDonald. Working in mixed media materials for over a decade, MacDonald states, "The goal is to show that ordinary can become extraordinary with little cost, no experience and few tools by anyone with an idea and a need to express themselves by igniting the create spirit."

Though she had not yet begun any ceramics work herself, Cercone's studies would bring her to Japan to observe the culture and crafts in person. It was there that she developed a strong desire to produce functional pottery for everyday use.

An excellent cook himself, Shawn Ireland often thinks of the perfect serving piece while setting his table, and retires to his studio to create it. His work is both sculptural and functional, with a foundation in folk tradition. Ireland combines materials from NC & GA into his handmixed clay bodies, creating a rustic charm and deep sense of place. His clay and

glazes are composed of NC feldspar, TN ball clay, and ash from his woodstove and his kiln is fueled with natural gas and wood salvaged from a nearby furniture

Winton & Rosa Eugene are the husband and wife team that create Pottery by Eugene. Though the influence of other potters and artistic movements can be identified in their work, they have created a style that is unique and easily distinguishable from that of other Southern potters. Winton and Rosa's pottery ranges from the delicately painted functional, to concept pieces dealing with various social and global issues. No matter the piece, it is created with great forethought, meticulous attention to detail, and is the product of true collaboration.

Blowing Rock Art and History Museum in Blowing Rock, NC, Offers Several New Exhibits

The Blowing Rock Art and History Museum (BRAHM) in Blowing Rock, NC, is presenting several new exhibits including: Sketching the Personal: Works on Paper by Philip Moose, on view in the Rankin East Gallery, through Nov. 3 and HIGHLIGHTS: Selections from BRAHM's Permanent Collection, on view in the Cannon Gallery, through June 30, 2024.

Philip Moose, his name and his paintings, are nearly ubiquitous in Blowing Rock and the surrounding High Country. Best remembered for his landscapes, especially his countless scenes of Grandfather Mountain, Moose approached painting with a disciplined studio practice, producing a constant stream of pictures that found his work in the homes of so many in this community. Less known is his equally rigorous drawing practice.

Moose was a prolific world traveler, finding himself throughout Europe, Central America, South Asia, and elsewhere - always with a sketchbook in tow. Where his paintings capture the splendor of mountain scenes with texture and precision, Moose's drawing practice, like so many other artists, tended towards the prosaic recording of his surroundings.

Not every drawing was a preparatory sketch for a grand painting. Some of these images instead seem to be meditations on an especially intriguing object or place. Architectural sketches and cityscapes are common among his works on paper, and suggest a fascination with the built environment, which is particularly evident during his sojourns in cities far and wide. For this artist, his drawings appear to both inform his better known paintings while also serving as an intimate tool in documenting the world he traversed.

Moose is often remembered as a quiet man, but these works on paper indicate that, while not especially loquacious, he was always looking at and considering the

BRAHM stewards a growing Permanent Collection of over 800 objects, as shown in the exhibit HIGHLIGHTS: Selections from BRAHM's Permanent Collection.

Museums build collections for a variety of reasons: preserving artworks and other objects of historical importance for future generations; cataloging, documenting, and researching said objects; and displaying and interpreting the collection for the public through exhibitions, publications, and other educational programs. Each museum approaches collection development with a slightly different ethos or goal in mind. There are many museums eager to share established and innovative art historical narratives or highlight emerging and already significant artists. However, every institution must contend with limited resources and diverse audiences with a seemingly limitless array of visual culture vying for their attention.

Collecting institutions are compelled to articulate their particular identity, and, at just over a decade old, BRAHM has begun in earnest to refine its own. This museum was explicitly founded with an expansive focus on the art and culture of Southern Appalachia. Time and coincidence as well as strategic leadership, philanthropy, and staff expertise have augmented and refined that vision for BRAHM and its collection over the following years. This exhibition works to articulate that emergent trajectory for the museum, identifying the strengths of its Permanent Collection and highlighting the exciting directions in which it is beginning to grow.


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Franklin G. Burroughs-Simeon B. Chapin Art Museum in Myrtle Beach, SC, Features Works by Kristine Mays

The Franklin G. Burroughs-Simeon B. Chapin Art Museum in Myrtle Beach, SC, will present Kristine Mays | A Time for Everything, featuring sculpture you can see right through, from Oct. 3 through Dec. 31,

Each work in the exhibition is something of a mystery. Within each of the artist's hollow wire sculptures - in either life-sized human form or the shape of a garment - is a surprise: another figure, a small creature of nature, or a message. Each piece invites the viewer to look closer to find the hidden meaning beyond the mere shape of the artwork, as it challenges viewers' perceptions of identity and awareness.

Mays' works are sculpted from thousands of pieces of wire hooked and looped together; yet despite the hardness of her medium, the artist achieves a fluidity to her forms that suggest the softness of a human body, with its fleeting gestures and expressions.

"As an artist I am very aware of the impermanence of life," Mays writes. "With metal wire I have timelessly captured a fleeting moment that I hope will last for decades. My artwork points to the soul and spirit, transporting the viewer into another place... I create the outer shell, the exterior of a human being, but provoke you to see what's within."

Mays, a San Francisco native, has been exhibiting her work since 1993 in both solo and group exhibitions. Collectors of her work include Star Wars creator George Lucas as well as many private collectors throughout the United States.

Among some of her more unusual projects were her participation in the Hearts in San Francisco program in 2015, creat-

ing a large 400-pound heart for their annual public art installation; as a featured artist in the San Francisco Art Commission's "Art in Storefronts" program, which transformed vacant storefronts and commercial corridors into a destination for contemporary art; and as a collaborator on a large scale public mural in San Francisco, which features large wire feathers placed among the portraits, reflecting the fleeting existence of black

Mays received her Bachelor Degree in Arts Administration from DePaul University and has occasionally served as a grant review panelist for the San Francisco Arts Commission.



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and political dialogues while also speaking with revelatory tenderness to his own communities, and to personal struggles, sorrows, and self-illuminations. Groupings centered around singular Shadow Works will expand upon these multiple through lines, including Harris's continued examination of otherness and belonging; the framing and self-presentation of Black and queer individuals; violence as a dark undercurrent of intimacy and desire; tenderness and vulnerability; and notions of legacy - both inherited and self-defined.

Working for the Farm Security Administration, a branch of Roosevelt's New Deal program, these photographers were hired to capture the social landscape of the country, highlighting the challenges facing Americans between 1935 and 1944. As one photographer articulated, "the idea is to show New York to Texans and Texas to New Yorkers." The Martin Z. Margulies Photography Collection includes over 100 vintage photographs from the Farm Security Administration, sixty-five were selected for this exhibition, which also features a series of Polaroids produced by Walker Evans in 1973 and '74 returning to themes found in the earlier works. Gallery 5, Permanent Exhibition -"Miniature Portraits". The first American miniature portraits were painted in Charleston, and today the Gibbes is home to one of the most prestigious portrait miniature collections in the United States. Containing more than six hundred objects, the collection spans nearly two hundred years and represents the work of over a hundred artists. Small enough to fit in the palm of the hand, these tiny portraits were treasured remembrances of loved ones in the age before photography. Presented in state-of-the-art display cases, and in viewable storage drawers featured miniatures include works by Mary Roberts, Jeremiah Theus, Henry Benbridge, Charles Wilson Peale, Pierre Henri, Edward Greene Malbone, George Engleheart, and Charles Fraser. Gallery 6, Permanent Exhibition - "20th Century American Regionalism and the Charleston Renaissance". At the turn of the twentieth century, American artists looked to their European counterparts and beyond as they developed identifiably American artistic movements. Two particularly strong influences during this time period were French Impressionism and Japanese woodblock prints. Another prevailing theme during this period was the growing interest in American subject matter. American regionalism and social realism played important roles in the development of art in Charleston, which flourished as a destination for artists, particularly during the years of 1915 to 1945 a period now known as the Charleston Renaissance. Gallery 7, Permanent Exhibition - "Modern and Contemporary". Modern and contemporary art in America encompasses a wide range of styles, subject matter, and media. As a whole, the diversity of modern and contemporary art reflects the rich and varied heritage of our nation and the lowcountry region. Works Titlis gallery were created over the past lorty years by artists who are native to the area, who have worked here, or who have created objects that reflect the complex story of the region. The works are grouped to reflect several themes including the southern landscape, the human figure, abstraction, and the legacy of slavery in America. Visiting Artist Series, Session III: Through Oct. 8 - "Javonte Jenkins and Nathan Durfee". Johnson (1901 - 1970) was a man between worlds: raised in the rural South, but educated in New York; black, but his unknown father was white; American-born, but lived much of his adult life in Europe. This diverse heritage gave Johnson a unique perspective and insight, but at times it was also a difficult shadow which followed him as he traveled the world in search of his true artistic voice. Eventually, after many years away from his hometown of Florence, SC, Johnson returned to the United States. Although living in New York, his art began to focus almost entirely on the lives and experiences of African Americans in the rural South. "My travels taught me that an artist must live and paint in his own environment... This development shall continue for the rest of my life, and it is the painting of my people," said Johnson in 1941. Special Exhibit Gallery, Through Jan. 28, 2024 - "Openings: Joseph Kameen". In his recent paintings, South Carolina artist Joseph Kameen investigates how the search for meaning in everyday moments becomes distorted as internal thoughts are projected onto inanimate surroundings, blurring the line between reality and memory. With their strong compositions, intense interplay of colors, and theatrical effects of light and shadow, the paintings' characters, objects, and events take on a dream-like presence that is both familiar and elusive, suggesting meanings that remain slightly out of reach. His images occupy a space somewhere between the observed and the observer, achieving a subtle symbolic ambiguity and leaving room for multiple interpretations. Kameen's work has been exhibited in New York, London, and Berlin. He received his MFA in painting from Indiana University following a BFA in painting and sculpture from Boston University. He is currently Assistant Professor of Art at the University of South Carolina Aiken.



Since that time, glass artists like Ken Carder, Rick and Valerie Beck, Shane Fero, and Yaffa Sikorsky and Jeff Todd-to name only a few-have flocked to the area to reside, collaborate, and teach, making it a significant place for experimentation and education in glass. The next generation of artists like Hayden Wilson and Alex Bernstein continue to create here. Mint Museum Randolph, 2730 Randolph Road, Charlotte. Through Jan. 21, 2024 - "Walter Scott Lenox & American Belleek". Featuring 80 works from the Mint's permanent collection, as well as other notable public and private collections, this exhibition focuses solely on the earliest decades of American Belleek production and the role Walter Scott Lenox played in its development as an art form. Curated by Brian Gallagher, the Mint's senior curator of decorative arts, The Mint Museum is the exhibition's only venue. In 1857, McBirney and Company in the village of Belleek in County Fermanagh, Northern Ireland, began producing a new type of porcelain renowned for its light, delicately thin, ivory-colored body. Named for the town in which it was created, Belleek porcelain quickly became prized among discerning customers in the British Isles. As its popularity then spread across the Atlantic. sev eral American ceramic manufactories in Trenton. New Jersey, sought to make their own version of Belleek. In 1882, Ott and Brewer became the first to succeed. Art of the Ancient Americas collection on the second floor of the Museum, Through Oct. 31 - "Guiding Winds," an installation by Rosalia Torres-Weiner, curated by Jennifer Sudul Edwards. The installation is part of the "Interventions Series", a new series at the Mint in which contemporary works are placed amongst permanent collection installations to create a critical dialogue between past and present. The history of humanity is a story of movement - groups migrating over land and water, carrying their ancestral practices with them. Traces remain, even when a tribe has moved on or hostile outsiders try to erase those traditions. Stories and symbols integrate, creating cultural strata that create a timeline of all who lived on a land. The maps and explanations throughout museum galleries illustrate this - sometimes overtly, other times subtly. Ongoing - "The Cole Family: A Dynasty of North Carolina Potters". From crocks, jars, and jugs to pitchers, candleholders, and vases, "turning pots" is one of the oldest and richest craft traditions in North Carolina. For more than 200 years, members of the Cole family have been potting in central North Carolina

- Randolph, Moore, Lee, and Montgomery counties. Six generations of Coles, and no fewer than 18 individuals, are represented in The Mint Museum's permanent collection. More than 60 highlights of their wares are included in the installation "The Cole Family: A Dynasty of North Carolina Potters". One reason for its long-term success is that making pottery has so often been a family tradition in the state. Fathers taught the art of forming, glazing, and firing clay objects to their sons, and in later generations also to daughters, who in turn taught their children, and so on through the decades. These family dynasties not only helped to keep the potting craft alive, but ensured continuity in techniques and craftsmanship, as well as introduced artistic innovations in succeeding generations. "The Cole Family: A Dynasty of North Carolina Potters" presents a visual history of "turned pots" and the family that helped turn North Carolina into one of America's centers for handmade, traditional pottery. Bridges and Levine Galleries, Ongoing - "Contemporary British Studio Ceramics: The Grainer Collection". Focused on the collection of Diane and Marc Grainer, this installation is a survey of contemporary British studio ceramics. Comprising functional and sculptural objects made between the 1980s and today, the show features work by artists either born or residing in Great Britain, including established "contemporary classics" like Gordon Baldwin and Rupert Spira, and cuttingedge ceramicists such as Julian Stair and Kate Malone. Several recently-gifted works from the Grainers are included. Alexander, Spangler, and Harris Galleries, Ongoing - "Portals to the Past: British Ceramics 1675 - 1825". The Mint Museum's collection of eighteenth-century British pottery and porcelain is widely respected for its scope and quality. The collection numbers over 2,000 objects and includes important examples of both salt-glazed and dry-bodied stoneware from Staffordshire; tin-glazed earthenware from Bristol, Liverpool, and London; and creamcolored earthenware from Derbyshire, Staffordshire, and Yorkshire. Notable eighteenth-century porcelain factories represented include Chelsea, Bow, and Vauxhall in London, Longton Hall in Staffordshire, Worcester, Bristol, and others. Individual works in the collection are exceptional because of their rarity, craftsmanship, provenance, or as representative examples of particular types or methods of production or decoration. Ongoing - "American Glass". The nineteenth and early twentieth centuries represented a time of extraordinary growth for the American glass industry. Such companies as Boston & Sandwich Glass Company in Sandwich, MA; Steuben Glass Works in Corning, NY; and Libbey Glass Company in Toledo, OH, began operation and soon developed notable reputations for producing fashionable wares that were coveted by many middle- and upper-class consumers. "American Glass" showcases objects by these and other American glass companies, illustrating the variety of forms and styles that prevailed during this period. Glass-manufacturing techniques will be another focus of the exhibition, with representative examples of pressed, cut, blown, and molded glass. Nearly all of the works on view are from The Mint Museum's permanent collection of glass, which is second in size only to the ceramics collection in the museum's Decorative Arts holdings. Ongoing - "Arts of Africa". The African continent is remarkable in its geographic, social, political, and cultural diversity. This impressive diversity is reflected in the visual arts through a variety of media and forms including ceramics, masks, textiles, sculptures, prestige staffs, and shrines. Mint Museum Uptown, Levine Center for the Arts, 500 South Tryon St., Charlotte. Through Feb. 25, 2024 - "The Art of Seating: 200 Years of American Design". The exhibition, drawn from the rich holdings of the Thomas H. and Diane DeMell Jacobsen Ph.D. Foundation provides a rare opportunity to survey the history of American craftsmanship and ingenuity, seen through the lens of seating furniture. Featuring many of the most iconic designs and designers from the past two centuries, "The Art of Seating" encourages visitors to reconsider objects that are a ubiquitous and often overlooked part of our everyday lives, seeing chairs as not just functional objects, but as works of art in their own right. At the same time, the objects in the exhibition also have stories to tell about the history of our country, ranging from the contributions of immigrants to changing tastes in style and aesthetics to new innovations in technology and materials. More than forty examples of seating furniture from the Thomas H. and Diane DeMell Jacobsen Ph.D. Foundation are included in the exhibition and offer a stylistic journey from the early 1800s to the twenty-first century. Through Oct. 1 - "The Vault," curated by Jessica Gaynelle Moss, will open at the Mint Museum Uptown early July 2023. This exhibition will explore some of the distinctly different approaches and philosophies of art collecting by prominent Charlotte-based collectors Judy and Patrick Diamond, Nina and James Jackson, Christy and Quincy Lee, and Cheryse and Christopher Terry. This dynamic group will present a range of collector theory, methodology and objects made by Black artists from their private collections. Visitors will be able to explore vintage photography, original paintings, prints, sculptures, furniture, vinyl records, and other culturally specific ephemera. The Vault illustrates the significant responsibility and privilege that comes with being a collector or custodian of Black art. In 2018, the National Art Services Executive at U.S. Trust, Bank of America Private Wealth Management, Evan Beard, published an article called 'The Four Types of Art Collectors' on Artsy, the world's largest online art marketplace. In the article, Beard categorized all art collectors into four general groups: The Connoisseurs, The Enterprising Collector, The Trophy Hunter, and The Aesthete. The four Charlotte-based collectors featured in "The Vault" have distinctly different approaches and philosophies of art collecting that mirror this framework. Craft + Design Galleries, Ongoing - "Craft in the Laboratory: The Science of Making Things," is the first installation in the Southeast to explore how craft artists and designers use science and math concepts when creating works of art. Presented by Müller Corporation, Craft in the Laboratory also celebrates a reinstallation of the Mint's Craft + Design Galleries—the first since 2010. Co-curated by the Mint's Senior Curator of Craft, Design, and Fashion Annie Cananc and Assistant Curator for Craft, Design, and Fashion Rebecca Elliot, "Craft in the Laboratory" includes 100 works from the Mint's collection that are made from precious metals, wood, steel. polymers, and even agricultural waste, that emphasize the preciseness of science used to craft works of art. Made by nationally and internationally renowned artists, the objects are organized by material and subject throughout the galleries. Now - The Mint Museum's new four-story installation "Foragers" offers a transcendent experience while celebrating the tradition of women as makers and providers. Unlike anything ever seen at The Mint Museum before, Brooklyn-based artist Summer Wheat's "Foragers" is a monumental piece of public work of art spanning 96 windows, four stories, and 3,720 square feet at Mint Museum Uptown's Robert Haywood Morrison Atrium. The myriad of vibrant panels that give the illusion of stained glass and celebrates the tradition of women as makers and providers. "Foragers" is part of a larger exhibition "In Vivid Color," which brings together four innovative contemporary artists - Wheat, Gisela Colon, Spencer Finch, and Jennifer Steinkamp—who create works celebrating the power of color and its ability to permeate the space around us. The Museum of the Cherokee Indian, 589 Tsali Boulevard, Cherokee. Ongoing - Welcome to a sweeping history of the Cherokee Nation, engaging and oftimes heart-rending, from ice age beginnings to present-day life and culture. In the brushstrokes of this fascinating heritage, you'll discover the warp and weft of treaties, the roots of a naturalistic language, artifacts of particular periods, great figures and heroes and entrancing stories of a civilization along with the Cherokee's distinctive values and ways of being in the world before and after "the Trail of Tears." The museum offers courses and workshops that combine scholarly content with voices of Cherokee people and experiences on the Qualla Boundary. A perfect place to begin exploration of Cherokee heritage and traditions is the Museum of the Cherokee Indian in Cherokee, North Carolina. Visitors are greeted at the entrance by a 20-foot hand-carved statue of Sequoyah, the inventor of the Cherokee alphabet. An interpretive site for the Trail of Tears National Historic Trail, this state-of-the-art facility traces the story of the Cherokee from the earliest inhabitants of the area 11,000 years ago to the present. Love is synonymous with care, compassion, and affection, while anarchy is generally accepted as an absence of authority, a state of disorder, or an ungovernable condition. Indeed, moments of disarray and frustration are intrinsic to love, while love sometimes emerges out of disorder and chaos. NC State's School (now College) of Design became a reality in September 1948, and rapidly gained a reputation as one of the top design schools in the nation. The most progressive school of architecture and allied arts in the South, it served as a hub of modernist creativity for the entire region and greatly influenced the land-scape and architecture found throughout the Triangle Area today. "Leading by Design" celebrates

the design school's legacy by showcasing artworks from the Gregg Museum's permanent collection created by professors and instructors associated with it in its formative years along with an audiovisual element that marks its ongoing impact in the 21st century. Adams and Woodson Galleries, Through Oct. 7 - "This is Not: Aldwyth in Retrospect," curated by Mark Sloan. Now in her mid-eighties, the artist Aldwyth has lived and worked alone in an octagonal house overlooking a salt marsh on one of South Carolina's sea islands since 1980. For most of her adult life she has maintained her seclusion from the larger art world while utilizing the history of art and ideas as a catalyst for complex found-object sculptures and increasingly epic-scaled collages that often recall medieval manuscripts writ large. This retrospective spans nearly seventy years of Aldwyth's work, beginning with photography and moving through experimental painting, assemblage, and collage while touching on personal themes and fascinations that have remained remarkably consistent throughout her career. A tireless innovator, Aldwyth's self-imposed rules both limited and liberated her, allowing her work to be self-contained and self-referential. Each piece is an illustration of the description that defines it, and vice-versa. Ongoing - "Selections from the Collections". The semi-permanent Selections from the Collections exhibition in the historic Residence seeks to remedy that. This new rotating installation will ensure that there will always be fascinating things to see and share at the Gregg! What part of your identity do you share with your peers, your teachers, your family? Teen artists were asked to reflect on how their personalities manifest in different spaces and with varied social groups in order to create a work of art that likewise drew inspiration from multiple works in the People's Collection at the NCMA. East Building, Level B, Photography Gallery 2 (Allen G. Thomas Jr. Gallery), Through Jan. 28, 2024 - "The Surrealist Impulse". The early 20th-century movement surrealism was groundbreaking for its time. Developed in response to the travesty of World War I, the art and literary phenomenon invigorated artists and thinkers to explore dreams, the irrational and uncanny, and the poetic in their works. The black-and-white photographs of Kristina Rogers adopt techniques of cropping and layering to blur reality and subtly serve as societal critiques. From these specific qualities and others, the artworks on view exhibit surrealist tendencies and demonstrate how many contemporary artists revel - whether discreetly or not - in the movement's legacy. East Building, Level B, Photography Gallery 1 (Julian T, Baker Jr. Gallery), Through Jan. 28, 2024 - "Luis Rey Velasco". Luis Rey Velasco (b. 1969) creates evocative photographs that capture labor histories, cultural traditions, and everyday people. He came of age in the San Joaquin Valley, a region of California where the history of Latinx farm labor is intrinsic to its identity. Mexican migrant workers arrived in the 1940s due to a set of agreements between the United States and Mexico. The program ended in 1964, but immigration to the region continued. Immersed in this history, Velasco moved to North Carolina in 1999 to photograph children of migrant farm workers. Featured in this exhibition are a selection of photographs Velasco executed between 1998 and 2005, many portraying members of farm worker communities in California and North Carolina. These compelling images emphasize his longtime focus on communities, histories, and regions that are largely hidden yet integral to the American economy.
