"I want to evoke the charge, or feeling, of what a scene means to me when I look

at it," Bayless says. "The vitality of the color, the energy between the viewer and the subject, whether it's a vibrating, sunny landscape or a still controlled interior; those are dynamics important to me."

Bayless' bold colors, rich impasto and aggressive brush strokes reaffirm his belief that beauty and serenity are always present for us to see, if we only look for them.

Elder Gallery's exhibition features twenty-five new paintings which promise to intrigue and excite. "I paint because I have to. To me painting is spiritual. It's more than just a way to make sense of my world. It is a sacrament" says the artist.

## **Hodges Taylor Art Consultancy** in Charlotte Offers Exhibition of Works by Ann Conner

Hodges Taylor Art Consultancy in Charlotte, NC, will present an exhibit of works by Ann Conner, on view from Jan. 10 through Feb. 25, 2011.

Conner is a nationally acclaimed artist known for her distinctive color woodcuts. She lives and works in Wilmington, NC. Using non-endangered native wood and brilliant color palettes, Conner creates colorful, conceptual woodcuts that employ the intrinsic grain of the wood.

"Working in woodcut always is a challenge as the grain of the wood is so captivating. My images are, in many ways, a response to this. I like working with the natural material wood, however using it in a high-tech manner. Woodcut is the oldest form of printmaking, and it continues to have relevance for me. I approach the medium nontraditionally by drawing mechanical images with a high-speed power chisel. Woodcut is a traditional art form. In my work however you will not see the gouges and cuts typical of woodcut. I try to conceal the process," says Conner.

This exhibition features her Park suite. The series evokes an East/West sensibility. Carved as straight drawings-in-wood, with a Spirograph (except Park 1 which was drawn with a compass), the prints are Western/American in being centered images in halves, thirds, or quarters of

the blocks, literally drawn into the wood, and carved with a power chisel. Printed on dyed, Asian papers, Thai Unryu, Thai Chiri, and Natsume, the images take on an Eastern sensibility and content. The ephemeral is captured in the corpulent. Recalling Oriental-hanging screens, they call the viewer to contemplation. They are a paradox of density and fragility, a blend of Asian and American influences. Conner chose the suite's title because of its subliminal Oriental sound.

In addition to extensive exhibitions, Conner's work is included in over forty major museum and corporate print collections in the US and internationally, including The Museum of Fine Arts, Boston; California Palace of the Legion of Honor, San Francisco; Equitable Center, NY; Colorado Springs; Equitable Life Midwestern, Chicago; New York Public Library; Fogg Art Museum, Harvard University; The Library of Congress, Washington, DC; List Visual Arts Center, MIT; Credit Suisse First Boston, London; and Louise Wells Cameron Art Museum, Wilmington, NC.

## Mint Museum Uptown in Charlotte, **NC, Offers Exhibit of British Ceramics**

The Mint Museum of Craft + Design at the Mint Museum Uptown in Charlotte, NC, is presenting the exhibit, Contemporary British Studio Ceramics: The Grainer Collection, on view through Mar. 13, 2011.

Drawn from the collection of Diane and Marc Grainer of suburban Washington, DC, this exhibition is the first comprehensive survey of Contemporary British Studio Ceramics in the United States and Great Britain. Comprised of functional and sculptural objects made between the 1980s and 2009, the show features work by 100 artists either born or residing in Great Britain, including established "contemporary classics" like Lucie Rie and cutting-edge ceramicists such as Julian Stair, Kate Malone, Neil Brownsword, and Grayson Perry.

The Grainers are well-known in the

United States as collectors of Studio Furniture and American craft in general, and as leaders in the craft community through their work with the American Crafts Council, the Furniture Society, the James Renwick Alliance, and the Founders' Circle, the national support group of the Mint Museum of Craft + Design. Their extensive and virtuoso collection of contemporary British ceramics is perhaps their greatest contribution to the field. Over a 30-year period, the Grainers' keen connoisseurship skills and tenacity led them to acquire some of the very best work.

Rooted in the materiality of clay, a hallmark of studio pottery, the ceramic art featured in the exhibition chronicles the history of Contemporary British Studio Ceramics. Whether a pot or sculpture, the continued on Page 9
