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geometry and biology. Home or away, Carroll pays careful attention to his surroundings and uses the environment as a model, guide, and point of inspiration. "Often, I'm catching a moment in time," he explains. "I want to take hold of the viewer and briefly subjugate realism, to provide an alternative idea of what walking down the street and exploring our world can look like."

Carroll has been painting for more than 20 years, specializing in oil or acrylic on canvas. He received a Bachelor's degree in Media Arts from the University of South Carolina in 2004. His paintings have been displayed in numerous solo and group exhibitions throughout the Lowcountry.

Garrard's paintings celebrate the warmth, beauty, and eccentricity of our region and the people who live here. "I am inspired by the human form, especially faces," he explains. "I love the way light reflects off the human body and I love the heat and sensuality of the South. The people have a lush sense of beauty and dignity about them." Working mainly from photographs, Garrard aims to capture his subjects' expression, but also attempts to offer a glimpse into what might be going on in their lives or what they are thinking rather than revealing to the world.

Harlan began to realize his love for water during his childhood in Ft. Myers, FL, spending his days sailing on a catamaran and developing an enthusiasm for the unique beauty of the waterways. Harlan and his wife are now based in Charleston, and the coastal charm continues to be a wellspring of inspiration for him.

Harlan employs the technique of digital painting, a complicated process that begins with a sketch that is transferred on his computer. He is able to zoom in and out to paint one pixel at a time, allowing his work to be hyper-detailed. His work has been chosen as cover art for national magazines and has been commissioned to create many custom pieces. He was also awarded "Best of Show" in exhibits in Los Angeles and throughout the Southern California area.

The Movement of the Moon will feature the paintings of Charles Nkomo, who was born and raised in southwest Zimbabwe. The wild animals of Africa make frequent appearances on his canvases. Distinct brush strokes accompanied by bold colors and energetic patterns all unify to create engaging

works of abstract expressionist art.

Nkomo studied art at the Mzilikazi Art Centre, and upon graduating, became a resident artist at the National Art Gallery in Bulawayo. "The subject matter in my work is influenced by the social, political, and economic forces in our lives in Zimbabwe. My art work celebrates the daily life of the people living in my country, while others are simply timeless abstracts," he said.
