

Fuller spent her early years in San Antonio, TX, then returned to Aiken, SC, and attended the University of SC in Columbia, before finally settling down in Charleston. She works in oil and cold wax, acrylic, and mixed media with brush and knife, attributing her love of brilliant color to influences and inspirations from her mother, also an artist, and Georgia O'Keefe. She is a strong believer in allowing her stream of consciousness technique to guide her from the start to the finish of any piece she creates.

Charleston Museum in Charleston, SC, Shows Snow Days in Charleston

The Charleston Museum in Charleston, SC, is delighted to present *A Winter Wonderland in Color: Snow Scenes of Charleston*, on view in the Lowcountry Image Gallery, from Nov. 1 through Mar. 27, 2022.

Heavy snowfalls are a rarity in Charleston, as the Lowcountry is more well known for its mild winters. However, our temperate winter climate occasionally experiences a snow storm that blankets the city in white for more than a mere hour or two. This exhibit showcases colorized photographs of remarkable snow days captured by residents of Charleston dating to the late 19th and early 20th centuries.

For years, photograph colorization was used mainly by high tech production companies. Recently however, computer programmers have created colorization operating systems that use Artificial Intelligence. Modeled after the human brain, the AI software can recognize objects in a photograph and determine their likely colors. Although, it can still be time consuming and rather tricky, colorizing a historical photograph is now more accessible to everyday users. Visitors are invited to enjoy this collection from the Museum's Archives through a new lens of colorization.

from the Museum Archives. Comprising over 40,000 photographs and representing a variety of themes, subjects and locations from around the Charleston area, this collection provides a glimpse into Lowcountry life from the dawn of the photography era to the present.

The Charleston Museum, founded in 1773 and considered America's first museum, is a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization located at 360 Meeting Street in downtown Charleston. The Museum is home to the most extensive collection of South Carolina-related natural and cultural history materials known, two National Historic Landmark Houses and the Dill Sanctuary, a 580-acre wildlife preserve. The Museum's mission is to educate Charleston area residents and visitors about the natural and cultural history of the South Carolina Lowcountry through collections, exhibitions, preservation, conservation, research, and related programming.

Gibbes Museum of Art in Charleston, SC, Offers Local Artists

The Gibbes Museum of Art in Charleston, SC, has welcomed two local artists, Daisy McClellan and Susan Klein, to the museum as part of their Visiting Artist Series. They will be in residence at the Gibbes through Dec. 5, 2021. The Gibbes will also be exhibiting works from past visiting artist Jen Swearington in the Art Sales Gallery, in the exhibit *New Histories: Cut Paper Dioramas*, on view through Dec. 5, 2021.

Swearington grew up in rural Indiana, drawing since she was little. She studied fine art and art history, earning a BFA in Sculpture from Pratt Institute in 1997 and MFA in Fibers from the Savannah College of Art and Design in 2000, spent a year as

Artist in Residence at Arrowmont School of Arts and Crafts, and then settled in Asheville, NC. In 2003, she started sewing original apparel pieces and printing her illustrations on them, founding Jennythreads Studio, by which she has since made an independent, creative living.

In 2013, her comprehensive how-to manual, "Printing on Fabric: Techniques with Screens, Stencils, Inks and Dyes" was published by Lark Crafts. Beginning spring of 2018, Swearington traveled abroad for several month-long art residencies in Bulgaria, Mexico, Finland, and Greece. On these adventures, she filled sketchbooks

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
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Editorial COMMENTARY

In March 2020, Swearington relocated to Charleston and continues her creative journey here on the coast as a 2021 Gibbes Museum Visiting Artist.

Daisy McClellan utilizes century-old traditional techniques like punch needle rug making and sewing in new and creative ways to create functional objects to be used every day. She strives to spark joy every time one of their creations is worn or used, by combining her modern and bright aesthetic with the warmth and richness these techniques allow. In our culture of consumerism and fast fashion, McClellan hopes their work can encourage appreciation for lasting handmade craftsmanship.

Susan Klein is an artist and curator living in Charleston, SC. She has shown her work nationally and internationally. While in residence, Klein plans to work on mixed media paintings and drawings inspired by her sculptural work. The way that people imbue objects with the power to hold memory, tie the living to the dead, and connect past to present are ideas that influence Klein's work. A common object becomes a

sacred vessel, often passed down through generations. Like an altar, an urn, a relic, or holy water, the banal becomes spiritual. The object becomes one of devotion, turned into a votive. This is a metaphor for the act of making art. Museum visitors will experience the artist working from fired sculptures to paint and create paintings in the studio so they can see the connection between their 2d and 3d work.


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
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

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geometry and biology. Home or away, Carroll pays careful attention to his surroundings and uses the environment as a model, guide, and point of inspiration. "Often, I'm catching a moment in time," he explains. "I want to take hold of the viewer and briefly subjugate realism, to provide an alternative idea of what walking down the street and exploring our world can look like."


Carroll has been painting for more than 20 years, specializing in oil or acrylic on canvas. He received a Bachelor's degree in Media Arts from the University of South Carolina in 2004. His paintings have been displayed in numerous solo and group exhibitions throughout the Lowcountry.

Lee Garrard of Johns Island, SC, presents a collection of charcoal portraits and works in oil on canvas in his exhibit *The People You See Every Day*. Garrard's paintings celebrate the warmth, beauty, and eccentricity of our region and the people who live here. "I am inspired by the human form, especially faces," he explains. "I love the way light reflects off the human body and I love the heat and sensuality of the South. The people have a lush sense of beauty and dignity about them." Working mainly from photographs, Garrard aims to capture his subjects' expression, but also attempts to offer a glimpse into what might be going on in their lives or what they are thinking rather than revealing to the world.

A self-taught artist, Garrard has been drawing the world around him since child-

hood. He is a licensed Landscape Architect with a passion and deep abiding respect for land and the people who inhabit it. His work has been exhibited in solo and group shows throughout South Carolina and he is a member of The Charleston Artist Guild. He is also a partner and owner of MedicineWheel Land Planning, a local design studio that practices Environmental Master Planning and Urban Design.

The Park Circle Gallery is located on Jenkins Avenue in North Charleston, in what was formerly known as the Olde Village Community Building. Mary Martin Gallery in Charleston Features Works by Stephen Harlan & Charles Nkomo

The Mary Martin Gallery in Charleston, SC, will present *Along the Water's Edge*, featuring works by Stephen Harlan and *The Movement of the Moon*, featuring works by Charles Nkomo, on view from Nov. 5 - 30, 2021. A reception will be held on Nov. 5, from 5-8pm.

Along the Water's Edge will feature a collection of Harlan's work, each piece painted digitally from his imagination and inspired by his love of dramatic color, reflections, and intense shadows. "I paint places where I'd like to be, and that seems to resonate with people," said Harlan.

Harlan began to realize his love for water during his childhood in Ft. Myers, FL, spending his days sailing on a catamaran and developing an enthusiasm for the unique beauty of the waterways. Harlan and his wife are now based in Charleston, and the coastal charm continues to be a well-spring of inspiration for him.

Harlan employs the technique of digital painting, a complicated process that begins with a sketch that is transferred on his computer. He is able to zoom in and out to paint one pixel at a time, allowing his work to be hyper-detailed. His work has been chosen as cover art for national magazines and has been commissioned to create many custom pieces. He was also awarded "Best of Show" in exhibits in Los Angeles and throughout the Southern California area.

The Movement of the Moon will feature the paintings of Charles Nkomo, who was born and raised in southwest Zimbabwe. The wild animals of Africa make frequent appearances on his canvases. Distinct brush strokes accompanied by bold colors and energetic patterns all unify to create engaging

works of abstract expressionist art.

Nkomo studied art at the Mzilikazi Art Centre, and upon graduating, became a resident artist at the National Art Gallery in Bulawayo. "The subject matter in my work is influenced by the social, political, and economic forces in our lives in Zimbabwe. My art work celebrates the daily life of the people living in my country, while others are simply timeless abstracts," he said.

Both Stephen Harlan and Charles Nkomo are represented by the Mary Martin Gallery, which has attracted and maintained collectors for years because of the diversity of the excellent work carried and the quality of the professional artists represented. Specializ-

Anyone wishing to meet with Summerall during the show must make an appointment.

Summerall is a local artist and Charleston native who did the ultimate by leaving Charleston for years spent in the Boston area soaking up the history and academic energy and then returning to her roots. She is known for her portraiture, her survey of botanical and floral imagery in the history of art and her paper collages. She has also created many paintings based on mythology.

Collecting papers from many sources she pieces them together to create lovely, whimsical, and often environmental statements. The handmade papers come from all over the world, rooted in ancient craft traditions, and are increasingly hard to find. They offer certain challenges due to the unpredictable nature of their dyes and physical properties.

Summerall's portraits of Seamus Heaney and E. O. Wilson hang at Harvard and the National Portrait Gallery respectively. She maintains a summer studio/gallery in Deer Isle, Maine, when pandemics and family time permit.

The Corrigan Gallery presents art with presence and a future instilled with intellect. An eclectic collection of thoughtful,

provoking works continues to be presented in an intimate space. Bringing a lifetime of Charleston art experience to collectors and presenting artists with decades of creating as well as those in the early years of their careers, the gallery provides a contemporary, local alternative to the traditional southern art scene. The gallery does handle works from the estates of Elizabeth O'Neill Verner and Alfred Hutty and that of other important second market pieces.

"Working with shells has inspired me to creatively express nature's variety and encouraged new ways of seeing and thinking," says Farbstein. "My work is always changing, even as I create a piece. Try new ways of doing and thinking and you will always have something interesting to say."

Farbstein has exhibited extensively and won numerous awards, including Best of Show at Charleston's Piccolo Spoleto Festival. Her pieces range in size from tabletop figurines to large sculptures, teapots to outdoor fountains. Gallerie include "bonded bronze" relief sculptures. He creates them with a hearty resin material, poured into moulds (cast), and finished with a bronze coating. The bronze takes on a gorgeous green patina and weathers beautifully. They are finished with a wax and clear coat seal which will protect the finish whether displayed indoors or out.

In addition to his skills as a visual artist Palmer is a talented musician - you can enjoy his southern charm and guitar playing on festival days and Fridays on the La Petite Gallerie decks. Please stop by to see his latest creations at 56 Calhoun Street in Bluffton.

Watson Studio and Gallery in Ridgeland, SC, Opens Select Days in Nov. and Dec. 2021



The gallery will be featuring Watson's new series of work "Rorschach on Steroids". These paintings are a journey into your imagination, a look into your inner mind. Connect with these works by breaking the bonds of the traditional, seeing what can't be seen in nature but can be seen by interacting with the paintings that speak to you and "let you in". See what's "in there" not "out there". Color, movement, depth, imagery and fantasy to make your mind work and see in ways different from the typical day-to-day.

Also always on display, and for sale, is Watson's blown glass work. The blown glass freeforms with their lively, organic shapes, vibrant colors and imagery applied in multiple layers for depth and vibrancy. There are stemless winecups, also using vibrant color and imagery much like the new paintings. They differ from the freeforms not only in shape and size, but the colored glass additions (applied while molten, 2000 degrees) are applied not only throughout the

piece, but are applied heavily to the exterior as well and left raised above the surface, for the visual and tactile qualities gained by doing this.

Very different from anything you've seen before. There is also a good selection of Watson's pottery work, mostly Chawan (Japanese style tea bowls), Yunomi (Japanese style tea cups), and Guinomi (Sake or Whiskey cups). And, of course, there are always some of his original paintings from other series of work on display and for sale.

Watson has worked as an artist in various media throughout his life, and his work is in collections all over the world. Previously open by appointment only, the studio and gallery will now be open each month for 2 or 3 days each month. Times will be posted on the website, and on Facebook, at least a week in advance. Other times can still be easily arranged if the times of opening are inconvenient.

A veteran fused glass artist and a relative newcomer to the medium will present a joint exhibition. "We want people to see the different things that can be made with glass fusing – the different shapes, colors and ideas," says Judy Martin, whose years of fused glass work "morphed" from her jewelry making, sculptures to painting on glass.

Martin encouraged Thomas Zumbach, who is new to the art of fused glass, to do the joint exhibition. "I enjoy encouraging newer Artists Collective members to show their work in the galleries, so I asked Tom to share a gallery with me to display some of my new work and his emerging work for a sort of a one-on-one showing," she says, adding that the show will highlight "a veteran glass fuser wanting to show a new path and a 'newbie' wanting to show a new perspective of what can be made with glass."

"People will see the movement in colored glass, nature and abstract all made with glass," Martin continues. "This is showing two different glass artists, one new and one which has been at it for years. The different ways they think of making art from a piece of glass. We all have our own ideas and thoughts of how we want to do something and how we want it to come out."

For Martin, she looks for nature, colors, designs "and anything that makes me feel good" to create her fused glass works. "I have always enjoyed being outside, even if it is to weed the flowers because I always see something different and new. I look at the sky daily to see the colors, formation of the clouds or to see dark rain clouds. I have found this is the hardest art that I have tried, but I find it rewarding at the same time. I want you to smile and/or think when you see any of my fused glass pieces. I am not going to tell people what I see in what I make – it is for the observer to look, study, examine and think what they see in the piece."

Zumbach took several glass classes from Martin at a time when his craft was concentrated on woodworking. "For 30 years I worked in precision grinding and my woodworking career overlapped. I built handmade furniture and started traveling to

major art shows with my wood turned art," he says.

After moving to Greer, SC, from the Milwaukee area in 1996, Zumbach started a full-time woodworking business and traveled from Michigan to Florida and places in between displaying at art shows. "I became interested in fused glass while working in Tryon, N.C., for 10 years. In 2014, I took classes from Judy Martin and started my new journey with color and texture that weren't brown, as wood," says Zumbach, a member of the Southern Highlands Craft Guild and the American Association of Woodturners. He joined the Artists Collective | Spartanburg about nine months ago.

"My new journey has been extremely satisfying for me," he says. "Using learned techniques, I am trying to speak with my own voice and inspire others to appreciate the art form the way I do. This exhibit is my 'coming out party,' and hopefully the public will find what I make in my new path."

Thirty works will be in the exhibition and will be offered for sale; prices range from \$25 to \$500.

"We both feel excited for being members of the Artists Collective | Spartanburg, which gives us a place to display on a regular basis," says Martin, who has been a member for four years. "We both truly enjoy being members for the diverse amount of information that can come from the various members. If you talk and listen to others, you are able to get ideas to incorporate into your own art."

Artists Collective | Spartanburg in Spartanburg, SC, will present *Asylum Images*, featuring photographs by Chuck Reback, on view in Gallery II, from Nov. 2 - 27, 2021. A reception will be held on Nov. 18, from 5-9pm, during the third Thursday for ArtWalk Spartanburg

Spartanburg photographer Chuck Reback always had an affinity for horror movies – and abandoned buildings – so when he had the opportunity to photograph inside the now-dilapidated Trans-Allegheny Lunatic Asylum in Weston, WV, he jumped at the chance.

Six years and three trips later, the results are his upcoming solo exhibition. The building was a state-run, Victorian-era mental hospital that was used up until 1994. The building now is privately owned and open for tours. The site has a lot of deferred maintenance and is deteriorating rapidly.

Reback, a self-taught photographer and artist originally from New York City who grew up in Massachusetts, first photographed in the building in 2015, when an extra day at a landscape photography workshop gave him the opportunity to tour the asylum and take a few shots along the way.

"I then heard about a two- to three-day photo workshop in the asylum scheduled for April 2020. This would be a different type of workshop for me – the organizers arranged for two models, lighting and props. I had never shot models before, and seldom photograph people, so it sounded like a good learning opportunity in a unique setting," he says. The COVID-19 pandemic forced the shoot to be rescheduled to November 2020, and Reback returned in July 2021 for the opportunity for more photos.

Reback found the asylum to be just what you'd expect – cold, damp and filthy – and he hopes the visitors to the exhibition will view it in much the same way. "Decay, spookiness, eerie, haunted ... hopelessness," he says of what he wants the photos to convey.

"The models were the real troopers. They were usually barefoot with little, if any, clothing," he says. "It was a little spooky, but mostly just depressing to think of all the patients that went through there over the course of 100-plus years and all of the treatments they received - electroshock, ice baths, straightjackets, confinement and more."

The process of photographing the asylum and assembling the exhibit have been rewarding for Reback. "This is my first solo show and the first where I have assembled a strong theme. Hopefully, it will encourage some more people to visit the asylum. In some images, I was trying to convey how mysterious the brain can be - what are the subjects thinking, why are they doing what they are doing? The difference between the interior of the asylum and the mind and the world beyond.

"This exhibit has been a very different exhibit for me," he continues. "In addition to being my first solo exhibition, the subject matter was a departure from my usual subject matter. I primarily photograph land-

scapes and wildlife. I seldom work indoors, rarely photograph people and never before had worked with models. Hopefully, viewing this exhibit will challenge the audience much as creating it challenged me."

Reback, a retired economics professor at the University of South Carolina Upstate, says, "The Artists Collective | Spartanburg has pushed me artistically. It has introduced me to a lot of artists I would not have met otherwise." He has been a member since 2017.

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



Komos uses cultural references, garden imagery and traditional narrative devices to share this story in an abstruse manner. "The details of the story are hidden," said May, an assistant professor of art at Furman. "We don't know things like the character's name or ethnicity. Being vague with these details allows the concepts to be more ubiquitous. Specifics of the story are told metaphorically, for example, I use references like Persephone and Cerberus.

It is assumed that these canonical stories

are accessible to the viewer and suggest both the overpowering control of Cerberus and the anticipation of new life from Persephone," May added.

May received his Bachelor of Fine Arts in painting from Ball State University. Upon graduation he held several roles in a direct care capacity for children with special needs, young adults with criminal records and adults with mental illnesses. He received his Master of Fine Arts in painting from Miami University (Ohio) and has since been teaching painting, drawing, foundations and capstone classes while maintaining an active exhibition record.

Harvey B. Gantt Center for African-American Arts & Culture in Charlotte, NC, Features Works by Philip G. Freelon

The Harvey B. Gantt Center for African-American Arts & Culture, located at the Levine Center for the Arts, in Uptown Charlotte, NC, is presenting *Container / Contained: Phil Freelon - Design Strategies for Telling African American Stories*, on view through Jan. 17, 2022.

The late North Carolina architect Philip G. Freelon (1953-2019) had a remarkable career of over four decades designing public buildings with his firm The Freelon Group and later as Design Director of Perkins + Will North Carolina.

This exhibition critically examines Freelon's work, including museums, libraries, cultural centers, and public parks, with a focus on projects that foreground African American communities and identities. Freelon often noted that architecture should be more than a container, that it should help tell the story of and be integral to the content of these public institutions.

To explore the relationship between the "container" and the "contained" in Freelon's architecture, this exhibition documents and analyzes connections between the forms, materials, and meanings of the projects and the histories and cultures they celebrate.

Freelon and his team drew on histories of neighborhoods, connections to communities, and African pasts to create designs rooted firmly in place and time. For Freelon, activism and celebration of heritage are subtly present in the work. African American identity is explored through cultural relevance, connections, and the historical rootedness of the designs.

Freelon frequently employed expressive formal concepts that link architecture to the institutions contained within. He was a master of visual symbolism and intentional design metaphors that are thought-provoking and reference culture and history.

Freelon's work explored the multiple functions and meanings of skin – as both a protective covering and a visual form of identification. In his designs for African American communities and institutions, Freelon expanded the idea of skin with complex building envelopes that explored the use of color, pattern, and material.

This exhibition was researched, curated, and designed by a team of faculty and students from the School of Architecture at the University of North Carolina at Charlotte.

The team was led by Dr. Emily Makas, an architectural historian whose work focuses on connections between memory and identity and the built environment. She explores the relationships between memorials, museums, heritage, and identities and has pursued public history projects on race

and history in Charlotte and beyond. She co-lead the curatorial team for the *Legacy of Lynching* exhibition at the Levine Museum of the New South that brought to light the history of lynching in Mecklenburg County.

Professor Greg Snyder is craftsman whose research explores acts of making and construction and the phenomena and meaning that accrue in and around these acts. His current projects include an investigation of furnishings as expandable environments and alternative ways to employ standardized building systems and catalogue componentry. He has worked on numerous exhibitions of his own work and the works of others.

Teaching Fellow and former Graduate Research Assistant Fernando Claudio Rodriguez has served as project manager for the exhibition. His research establishes connections between modern technological advances and passive architectural strategies. He also has worked on a number of exhibitions. Architecture students Sierra Grant and Emma Lineberger played leadership roles in the design, layout, research, and writing for the exhibition.

Davidson College in Davidson, NC, Features Works by Nicholas Galanin

Davidson College in Davidson, NC, is presenting *Nicholas Galanin: Dreaming in English*, on view in the Van Every/Smith Galleries, through Dec. 9, 2021.

Galanin's work is rooted in his perspective as an Indigenous man, deeply connected to the land and his Tlingit/Unangax culture. Over the past two decades, Galanin has worked across media, materials, and processes - engaging past, present, and future - to expose widespread misappropriation and commodification of Indigenous visual culture, the impact of colonialism, intentionally obscured collective memory, and barriers to education.

His practice, encompassing sculpture, installation, photography, video, performance, printmaking, and textile-based works, unites traditional and contemporary processes and materials to reclaim narrative and creative agency, and contribute to the continuum of Tlingit art within an ever-evolving contemporary Indigenous practice.

Galanin's exhibition at the Van Every/Smith Galleries, *Dreaming in English*, includes an installation of the same title that speaks directly to the forced removal and relocation of Indigenous children from the reservation into residential "schools." These so-called "schools" were not focused on the acquisition of knowledge but on assimilation; the intent was to eradicate both culture and spirit.

Galanin holds a BFA from London Guildhall University in jewelry design, an MFA in Indigenous visual arts from Massey University in New Zealand, and has apprenticed with master carvers and jewelers in his community of Sitka, Alaska. His work has been exhibited widely, including in the 2019 *Whitney Biennial* at the Whitney Museum of American Art, New York, NY; the Native American Pavilion at the 2017 *Venice Biennale*, Venice, Italy; the 2019 *Honolulu Biennial*, Honolulu, HI; the Anchorage Museum, Anchorage, AK; and the Heard Museum, Phoenix, AZ, among others.

As part of the group exhibition *Art for a New Understanding: Native Voices, 1950s to Now*, Galanin's work traveled to Crystal Bridges Museum of American Art, Bentonville, AR; Memphis Brooks Museum of Art, Memphis, TN; the Nasher Museum of Art at Duke University, Durham, NC;





Works by Blue Hen Pottery

Blue Hen Pottery is the partnership of Adam Landman and Anne Pärtna. Pärtna is a graduate of East Carolina University (2007) and holds an MFA degree with concentration in Ceramics. She received her BFA degree from Estonian Academy of Art (2000), in her native Estonia where her family still resides on a farm on the Gulf of Finland. Landman is also a graduate of East Carolina University (2007) and holds a BFA degree, with concentration in Ceramics and a BS in Heavy Lifting. He loves to work in the low fire range, but currently makes use of the wood kiln to finish his wares. Child like drawings in themes of monsters, storms and conflicts are used as metaphors in narrative paintings on plates, platters and cups. He is the Project Manager at STARworks in Star NC where an abandoned hosiery mill is being transformed into a center for creative businesses.

Since graduating from Pratt Institute in 1982 with a BFA in sculpture, Marina Bosetti has spent her life devoted to clay. "Over the years, there has been a progression from sculpting to pottery to art tile and back again," says Bosetti. "Throughout it all, I have consistently worked to distill the sensual and spiritual aspects of life into flowing designs and imagery that's easy to care for and will last forever. My studio is located in historic Boylan Heights. Bosetti adds, "I am influenced by the Art Nouveau movement. I love the idea of uniting organic and geometric forms into designs that flow and follow the spirit of Art Nouveau to bring beauty to every day."

Danielle Carelock is a ceramic artist and instructor residing in Charlotte, NC. She received her Bachelor of Fine Arts degree in sculpture and ceramics at the University of North Carolina at Greensboro. She has participated in competitive residency opportunities, most notably at Salem Art Works of Salem, NY, and STARworks of Star, NC. She has also served on several panel

discussions, most recently with the Women Working in Clay Symposium. Carelock was also a 2019 and 2021 Arts and Science Council grant recipient. She has also served as a studio assistant to Lydia Thompson, former Department Chair of Art and Art History at UNCC, and also has partnered with the Bechtler Museum of Modern Art as a part of their Education program and Jail Arts Initiative, all located in Charlotte, NC.



Works by Lori Clodfelter

Lori Clodfelter is a full-time studio potter living and working in Seagrove, NC, where she owns and runs Pottery Road Studio and Gallery. She started working in clay at the age of 12 at the Gibbes Museum of Art studio in Charleston, SC. She went on to study ceramics and sculpture at Winthrop University. Clodfelter's love of the Low-country of South Carolina shines through in her work. You will find Spanish Moss trees, tidal flats, low country wildlife, wooden fences and southern charm in all her pieces. She works in white stoneware clay locally sourced in Star, NC. The majority of her work is executed in decorative relief and a process called sgraffito, which means "to scratch off." The work is then high fired in a gas reduction kiln.

Hannah Cupp received her BFA from Clemson University with a Fine Arts degree concentrating in ceramics. Growing up learning to draw and paint, she discovered pottery in college and found a way to focus these two mediums into a single practice. Cupp creates functional forms decorated with gestural and delicate line drawings intending to have a contrast between the delicate lines and the harsher volatile surface the atmosphere from wood firing creates. She currently works with potters in Seagrove, NC, learning the trade while also working in production pottery to hone her skills throwing on the wheel.

Deborah Harris has been a full time studio potter in Chapel Hill, NC, since 1997. Her pottery education began at local art centers and soon expanded to include workshops at Arrowmont and Penland School of Crafts. In addition, she has taught porcelain and glaze classes at Claymakers in Durham, NC, and Sertoma Arts Center in Raleigh, NC. Objects used and handled during everyday routines become familiar and comfortable. Functional tableware is an integral part of the routine and pottery can serve a warm and welcoming part. "My work begins on the potter's wheel. Porcelain is my first choice for a clay body. It has a silky touch while being turned and can be finished to the softest, smoothest surface," say Harris.

Susan Hendley is a nonbinary ceramic artist based in Charlotte, NC. She earned a Bachelor of Fine Arts in Studio Art and a Bachelor of Arts in Art History, from Converse College in Spartanburg, SC. Currently, she works for Clayworks and Paint Depot in Charlotte as educator and artist. Hendley's ceramic work focuses on the functionality of feminine and floral forms.

Beginning with William Luck, the Luck family has continued the time-honored techniques of wheel-thrown pottery. In 1957 by age 12, Sid Luck began turning for the J.B. Cole Pottery in Seagrove. With the encouragement of local potters such as Waymon Cole and Nell Cole Graves, he continued turning off and on for the next 30 years. A four year hitch in the Marines, stints at Sandhills Community College followed by a degree in chemistry from North Carolina

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State University and high school teaching jobs in Florida and North Carolina took precedence over pottery. He opened Luck's Ware on a part-time basis in 1987 at its current location and used both gas and electric kilns. Three years later Luck left teaching to pursue his pottery dream full time.

In 1994, Sid Luck was honored as the recipient of the Living Treasure of North Carolina Award given by UNC at Wilmington's Museum of World Cultures. On May 20, 2014, Luck was awarded the prestigious North Carolina Heritage Award by the NC Arts Council honoring his lifetime contribution to the cultural traditions of North Carolina.

A native of Lincoln County, NC, and a direct descendant of Catawba Valley potter David Hartzog, Raine Middleton grew up in western Lincoln County in the heart of pottery country. "Though my forms are influenced by the traditional NC forms, I am interested in contemporary surface design. I use porcelain clay and throw my pots on a wheel. I then apply black slip to the green ware, draw my designs, and carve out the background to reveal my designs - a process called sgraffito," say Middleton. Pots are bisqued fired and then fired in a reduction salt kiln. She works out of her home studio in Denver, NC. "I received my pottery training at Penland School of Crafts by attending summer classes as well as a concentration class with Cynthia Bringle," adds Middleton. "In 2014, I participated in the Mint Museum's Pottery Market Invitational".

Samantha Oliver began her transient lifestyle immediately after graduating with her BFA from Winthrop University in 2013. She then completed a Post Baccalaureate program at William & Mary in Williamsburg, VA. From there Oliver trekked to Highlands, NC, for a year long residency at The Bascom: Center for Visual Arts. After getting engaged in North Carolina, she promptly left Highlands for a six month residency at Brockway Center for Arts and Technology in Pennsylvania. Oliver is now residing in Tryon, NC, with her husband, many plants, and a small heard of pets. Her work is featured in galleries in Colorado, Nebraska, Georgia, South Carolina, New York, and Pennsylvania. Oliver's work is inspired by her memories of childhood wallpaper, family comforts, and enjoying the company of friends old and new.

O'Quinn Pottery was established in 1989 by Sandra O'Quinn. Her husband, Glenn McNeill started working in the pottery shop full time in 1998. Both Sandra and Glenn grew up only a few miles from where they now live and work in Seagrove, NC. Sandra traces her roots to a long line of Moore County potters and has been a potter since her early 20's. The very few times they are not working you just might find them both bass fishing!

The O'Quinns make a variety of hand-made functional pottery in vivid colors. Dinnerware, serving dishes, cookware, bread baskets, vases and decorative sculptures can all be found at O'Quinn Pottery in Seagrove, NC. The rich colors created by the gas-fired glazes mix together to produce a beautiful effect on the pottery. All of the O'Quinn Pottery is food, oven, dishwasher and microwave safe.

"My name is Mandee Pritchard and I am a native of Asheboro, NC. I have always had an interest in folk art and Seagrove Pottery," says Pritchard. "About a year ago, a mutual friend introduced me to Sid Luck. Sid was kind and patient enough to teach me how to turn clay. He and I just hit it off as friends, and I have been spending as much time as possible in his Seagrove shop ever since. Over this past year I've tried to incorporate what Sid has taught me, my love for folk art and subjects I always found myself painting: bees, birds, owls, and frogs. I have a lot to learn and look forward to doing so!" she adds.

Gretchen Quinn is a ceramic artist who lives and works in Raleigh, NC. She specializes in making functional ceramics with a clean modern feel. Much of her inspiration derives from growing up in Boston, MA, where she developed a deep love for Danish Modern and Shaker designs. The guiding principles of these styles are simplicity, utility and honesty, and this is clearly reflected in Quinn's use of clean lines, textures and simple glazes. After receiving her BA in Sculpture from Providence College in Rhode Island, Quinn worked as a graphic

designer while continuing to make pottery and hone her skills in advanced classes and workshops. A later move to Seattle provided a new perspective and esthetic in clay as she sought out the opportunity to work in many of the areas excellent community studios and to participate in her first shows.

Eamon Rogers is a ceramic artist currently living in Randleman, NC. He developed his interest and early experience in firing wood kilns as an undergraduate at Southwestern University in Georgetown, TX. Connections between local materials, the landscape, and historical pottery guided his work in college. Since April of 2019, Rogers has been working as the apprentice to North Carolina artist Joseph Sand. His tasks as an apprentice have included anything from making pots for the workshop, processing and preparing materials, maintaining and firing kilns, and assisting in sales and installations throughout the region. In his spare time, he is an avid cyclist, and uses his time riding in the hills and woods to find new inspiration in his work.

After graduating from high school in 2001, Joseph Sand went to the University of Minnesota-Duluth. He planned to study graphic design, but after feeling detached from an art form that required him to use a computer, Joseph changed his mind. In 2006, he earned a BFA in general studio art with a ceramics emphasis. Prior to graduating college, Sand studied art for one year in Cortona, Italy, through the University of Georgia-Athens. It was there that he sat at a pottery kick wheel in a 12th Century building and knew instinctively how to center clay. His future career was born.

Back in the States, Sand received the very competitive Katherine E. Sullivan Scholarship from the University of Minnesota. He used the scholarship to study art and design at the University of Wolverhampton, England. During his time in England, Sand heard from other potters about Mark Hewitt, an English potter who lived in Pittsboro, NC. While back in Minnesota at Christmas time, a potter he knew had completed an apprenticeship with Hewitt and suggested Sand do the same. He talked with Hewitt over the telephone, and then flew to North Carolina to meet him the following week. After three days, Sand was offered the three-and-a-half year apprenticeship under the master potter. Sand and his family live on 16 acres near Randleman, NC, where they established a pottery.

For over 30 years, Kathy Spado's passion has been creating pottery. She took multiple ceramic courses and has worked with talented ceramic artists in North Carolina, honing her craft. She currently focuses on hand-built pieces, and detail is added with underglaze and is highlighted with transparent glazes to emphasize the texture and design. She finds inspiration from her Ukrainian/Polish heritage and her experiences in NC, like camping trips to the mountains, coastal vacations, and gardening in the Southern warmth. Her work has been featured in *Our State Magazine* (April/May/August 2021), she is a Made in NC 2021 Finalist and has earned Honorable Mention at Art in the Park, Blowing Rock, NC. Spado works from her home studio in Charlotte, NC.

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innermost part of myself using my creativity and talent. I hope I can fulfill this goal through my studying and practice on both Asian ceramics culture where I came from and NC pottery tradition where I currently live in Raleigh." Sun received a Bachelor in Business Administration from the Jiangsu University of Science, China, (1992); a Master of Science in Computer Science from the University of Alabama, Tuscaloosa, AL, (1998); and a Master in Business Administration from the NC State University, Raleigh, NC, (2007).

William Kennedy of Uwharrie Crystalline Pottery, first began selling pottery in March 2003, he is no newcomer to the art of Crystalline pottery. Kennedy was born in Moore County and grew up in Robbins, NC, a descendent of the Kennedy Family that operated a Robbins gun factory during the late 1700's and early 1800's. After moving to Troy, he began working in a hosiery mill. "I never thought about pottery for the next 22 years." Instead, he focused on his career in the hosiery business. At the end of the 2002 work year, Kennedy was informed his hosiery job was to become another casualty of out-sourcing to Mexico. At the beginning of 2003, out of work and tired of the hosiery business, he and his wife Pamela buckled down and worked on their pottery business. They opened Uwharrie Crystalline

Pottery in Seagrove, NC, on May 23, 2003. The Kennedys have sold their Crystalline pottery to buyers from all 50 states, plus 20 foreign countries.

Evelyn Ward says, "Handmade pottery connects us with the maker every time we use it. It can be part of a humble daily ritual or a big celebration, making both a little more special. I'm hoping that my work can bring a little comfort especially in these times when we're spending so much time at home. I try to make balanced pots that are nice to have in your home for daily use or just have around to look at. I really enjoy making pots and hope that they bring a little light to people's lives."

"I'm currently working with earthenware clay because I love the rich color of the clay body and wanted to have some areas of bare clay showing through on the surfaces of the pots," adds Ward. "I also love the colors that are possible to achieve in the lower temperature range of firing. Using a printing technique called monoprinting, I cut out a design from pieces of paper and coat them with colored slip. Once the slip has dried a little, I put it on the pot, paper and all. When the slip has adhered to the pot, I pull the paper off to reveal the design. Not all of the slip always sticks, leaving the surface with an imperfect texture."

"My passion for clay and pottery began in 1974 at Shippensburg State College, Shippensburg, PA," says Jim Weaver. "I was a frustrated Accounting/Economics major and became fascinated by the art being created outside of the Arts building as I walked between classes. I graduated in 1975 with a degree in business and 12 credits of art, including an independent study in Raku Kiln building. After graduation I returned to our family business. Mary, my wife, and I were married in 1975 and later moved our family to North Carolina. It had been 18 years and the clay was still tugging at my heart. I purchased a wheel and a used electric kiln in the late 1990's."

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"As I grew in my craft, Mary has been very supportive and involved. She enjoys hand building and glazing. Through the years we have made countless Christmas ornaments for her elementary students. We now have a shop in our back yard with all the necessary equipment, including a gas studio kiln and a larger gas reduction kiln that I built. I mix my own glazes from 1970's formulas that gives us the our desired look. I am mostly self taught, but have been blessed to have Sid Luck as a mentor. He has been very gracious in passing some of his knowledge and skills down over the years. Some of our pieces are salt glazed from Sid's groundhog kiln."

Curry Wilkinson began making pottery at a young age, but only recently learned that he could in fact make a career in it. In 2014 he began an apprenticeship with Joseph Sand in Randleman, NC, and worked there until 2017 creating a solid foundation on which to continue his pottery career. Wilkinson learned to fire a wood kiln with many potters including Joseph Sand, Mark Hewitt, Danie Johnston, and Dan Trice; he was able to take that knowledge and turn it into his own style and build a wood fired kiln with a lot of hard work and the help of supporters and the Regional Artist Project Grant. For Wilkinson, being able to turn the creamy, pliable clay, so abundant in his home state, into functional art is truly a privilege. He and his wife Sarah own and operate Curry Wilkinson Pottery located in Burlington, NC.

Hadiya Williams is a designer/artist and native of Washington, DC. Her work has recently been featured on digital and in print publications including "Print", "Domino", "Travel + Leisure", "The Ceramic Podcast" and "Decorating Dissidence". She is a proud member of BADG (The Black Artists & Designers Guild) founded by artist/designer, Malene Barnett. She is also a member of The Art Brand Alliance founded by Betsy Cordes. After over 15 years experience in graphic design, Williams founded Black Pepper Paperie Co. in 2017 and has since expanded her art + design practice

to include pottery, surface, design, and visual art. Her aesthetic is inspired by the depth of Black culture across the diaspora. Black Pepper Paperie Co. is a Washington, DC-based mix-media art + design studio that focuses on creating globally-inspired surface pattern designs and one-of-a-kind handcrafted objects that include wearable ceramic art, home decor, wallpaper, and apparel.

Jared Zehmer's ceramics education began at Virginia Commonwealth University in Richmond, VA, where he earned a Bachelor's of Fine Arts Degree in ceramics. After graduation, seeking to continue his education in clay, he moved to the traditional pottery town of Seagrove, NC, where he works as a journeyman potter, turning wares on a production level for several local pottery shops while developing his own work in his home studio. Pursuing efficiency through the balance of pace and momentum, Zehmer primarily focuses on the betterment of form and refinement of skill through repetition, as well as developing personal techniques and tools to help streamline the process. He also teaches classes, workshops, enjoys kiln repurposing, and his writings can be found in "Pottery Making Illustrated" and "Ceramics Monthly".

Darr-Hope has invited two talented jewelers, Ruth Bayard and Nora Floyd, to join her for the last 3 days of her exhibition. Their ethnic inspired amulet-like creations speak to the themes found within Darr-Hope's work.

Serendipitously, the angst and the existential contemplation of COVID-19 are punctuated by moments of comforting grace that unexpectedly fold into the constant global suffering. Forced isolation naturally evoked a state of turning inwards, a time of self-reflection. When out-of-the-blue life unravels, we are forced to summon courage to begin again, to dare bravely, discovering fresh perspectives so we can start to live within our new reality.

Darr-Hope stated, "I am comfortably lost. Comfortable because I have faith in the process of artmaking as She has never failed me. She assists me in understanding my life and our unpredictable world. Living within this shattering crisis is hard to sort out but is nudging me towards a greater acceptance of the uncertainties of life, my inevitable mortality, and what matters most."

"Strangely, many of these works were started a couple of months before the pandemic. Unsure of where She was leading me, I trusted the process and kept painting. I am now living into the story these images are telling."





Asheville Art Museum in Asheville, NC, Offers Exhibit Focused on Memory

The exhibition, *Ruminations on Memory*, contends with the act of remembrance and reflection, featuring a rare presentation of all nine prints from Robert Rauschenberg's *Ruminations portfolio*, Judy Chicago's *Retrospective in a Box* portfolio, and selections from the Museum's Collection. Organized by the Asheville Art Museum and curated by Hilary Schroeder, assistant curator, this exhibition will be on view in the Appleby Foundation Exhibition Hall at the Museum from Nov. 19 through Mar. 14, 2022, in conjunction with the exhibition, *A Living Language: Cherokee Syllabary and Contemporary Art*.

Artworks are vessels for processing, recalling, and reflecting on the past. Artists often draw upon materials from their own pasts and grasp at fleeting moments in time in the creation of an object. For the viewer, observation of an artwork can draw out personal memories.

Artworks in a variety of media explore various ways of remembering, including individual memories that focus on the moments from an artist's past; generational memory that looks back to one's ancestors, whether recent or long past; and collective memory, wherein in an image might evoke bygone times that balance between constructed and real. Through these artworks that ruminate upon the past, viewers may discover the stirrings of their own thoughts and recollections prompted by the works before them.

Ruminations on Memory offers a unique opportunity to experience the entirety of a major print portfolio by American painter Robert Rauschenberg (Port Arthur, TX 1925–2008 Captiva, FL). Rauschenberg was a student at Black Mountain College in NC for the 1948–1949 and 1951–1952 academic sessions and for the 1951 and 1952 summers. His *Ruminations* series consists of nine color photogravures which were printed in 1999 and reflect on Rauschenberg's early life, his friends and family, and the memories he held dear. The series represents especially significant mature work by Rauschenberg that looks back to his most formative moments as an artist including his time at Black Mountain College and the friendships and ideas formed there.

Also presented in the exhibition is an important series of prints by Judy Chicago (born Chicago, IL 1939). Five decades into her career, Chicago stands as one of the foremost artists of the 20th and 21st centuries, having committed to socially

minded work, uplifting in particular experiences salient to her feminine and Jewish identities. *Retrospective in a Box* consists of seven prints and a portfolio created in collaboration with the master printers at Landfall Press, and provides an overview of her major motifs and ideas, including the print *Spring the Dinner*, a nod to her seminal 1979 work *The Dinner Party*.

In addition to the artworks from the Museum's Collection, visitors will be able to experience Felix Gonzales-Torres's *Untitled (L.A.)*, on loan from the Art Bridges collection. *Untitled (L.A.)* is one of the artist's iconic interactive candy installations where memories are engaged not only through sight but through sound, touch, taste, and smell as well.

The 1940s through 1970s marked a period during which many artists in the United States emulated the above words of Helen Frankenthaler, one of the most innovative and influential artists of her time. *Gestures: Mid-Century Abstraction from the Collection*, drawn from the Museum's Collection with select loans from regional collectors and institutions, highlights works in a variety of media that speak to the vibrant abstract experiments in American visual culture that emerged after World War II. The artworks shown will explore some of the many approaches to abstraction.

Aesthetic ideas emanating from institu-

tions such as Black Mountain College in Black Mountain, NC, and Hans Hofmann's School of Fine Arts in New York City are visible in the works of those who studied there. Bender Gallery in Asheville, NC, will present *Beauty is the Meaning*, a solo exhibition of extraordinary figurative paintings by internationally acclaimed portrait artist Seth Haverkamp, on view from Nov. 4 - 30, 2021. A reception will be held on Nov. 6, from 6-9pm.

Haverkamp's paintings are, in a word, gorgeous. They mesmerize the viewer with a masterful interplay of light and dark. His realistic yet expressive portraits capture the beauty and confidence of the subject.

Haverkamp describes his style as "expressive realism" and derives his primary inspiration from beauty - color, form, and the drama of light. He does not draw his subjects before painting but paints directly onto the canvas in a loose and painterly style, often incorporating four or five layers of paint. "It's liberating to not stress about

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
getting it right all at once," Haverkamp says. He explains that his "secret" is that he is not a realist; he uses whatever color he wants to, disregarding long-held views about warm light and cool shadow.

Haverkamp has created many commissioned portraits and uses live models, but his chief subject and love is his children. They always take him to new heights of creativity and beauty. He is influenced by the renowned American realist painter Andrew

Wyeth and by Viennese Secessionist painter Gustav Klimt (which is especially clear in Haverkamp's dappled multicolor backgrounds). Haverkamp's paintings are imaginative, full of passion and emotion. His paintings push beyond portraiture to convey a narrative with an element of intrigue. As for the meaning of the work, Haverkamp states, "The meaning? It is found in beauty. At the moment, that's enough".

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Haverkamp attended Cleveland Institute of Art and Memphis College of Art before earning his BA degree in painting from Carson-Newman College in Jefferson City, TN, in 2003. In 2004, he studied at Studio Incamminati with acclaimed artist Nelson Shanks who is known for his commissioned portraits of Princess Diana and Bill Clinton, among other notable figures. Haverkamp later studied with another renowned portrait painter, Robert Liberace, who had a profound influence on him. With Liberace, he felt the freedom to develop his own methods and style as an artist. Haverkamp is an accomplished teacher himself and regularly holds workshops throughout the United States.

Haverkamp received the Portrait Society of America's International Competition Draper Grand Prize in 2019 for *Mars Rising*, a painting of his son in front of a full-length mirror holding a string of origami birds. 

"From my first visit to the Estes-Winn Antique Car Museum, I was immediately inspired to recreate these cars in paint with visual impact." The vintage cars were unique, originally bold and beautifully styled, with many featuring

luxurious to sporty details, becoming sleek in silhouette by the 1950s.

Picasso, from the Icon Series is a 30" x 24" oil-on-canvas. 

It is a project, she explains, that chronicles her journey into midlife, and it began as the ten-year anniversary of her mother's death approached. "This work is an effort to summon her wisdom and guidance from beyond the grave and acknowledges the mysterious presence of absence," she says.

Shae Bishop's garments, some of them painstakingly assembled from hundreds of individual porcelain or stoneware elements, have specific functions, such as the "Swimsuit to Wear While Looking for Hellbenders," or they are meant to invoke particular characters, as in the case of a floral cowboy hat titled "Garden Variety Cowboy." Each of his seven pieces is accompanied by a photograph of the artist modeling the garment (yes, they are wearable), and they represent an impressive fusion of Bishop's love and knowledge of fashion, his sense of design, and his technical skills with ceramic materials.





In January 2021, SECCA posted an open call for guest curator submissions, seeking new voices and new perspectives for an upcoming project. SECCA hoped to develop a collaborative exhibition that showcases work being produced in response to the current moment, primarily the onset of and quarantine surrounding COVID-19 and the protests and events surrounding the death of George Floyd and the wider Black Lives Matter movement.

After evaluating numerous exceptional applications, SECCA selected Duane Cyrus for the guest curator position based on his proposal for *Black@Intersection*. The exhibition features Black and African Diasporic artists from North Carolina and beyond. The artists simultaneously exemplify and defy - yet continue to redefine the perceived norms around concepts of Blackness as we see it in our world. They resist the nullifying commodification of blackness into a type of monolith and do so by creating works that reify the world on their own terms.

Duane Cyrus is a Bessie Award nominated performer and a professor at the University of North Carolina at Greensboro where he teaches Choreography, Improvisation, Repertory, and Career Strategies for Artists.

He is also the director of Theatre of Movement, a collective that produces performing and visual art collaborations and curations - meshing Cyrus' dance background with photographers, filmmakers,

actors, poets, and musicians. Duane holds a BFA from the Juilliard School and an MFA from University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign.

The Southeastern Center for Contemporary Art (SECCA), an affiliate of the North Carolina Museum of Art, offers a front row seat to the art of our time through exhibitions, experiences, and education programs with a focus on regional working artists. Founded in 1956 and located on the scenic James G. Hanes estate in Winston-Salem, SECCA offers unique large-scale indoor and outdoor settings for exploring the intersections of contemporary art and culture.



Artworks Gallery in Winston-Salem, NC, is presenting three exhibitions including: *Wendell Myers, Enchanted Forests*; *Lea Lackey-Zachmann, Tree Translations III*; and *Kimberly Varnadoe, In a Dark Time*, on view through Nov. 27, 2021. A reception will be held on Nov. 14, from 2-4pm.

The artists of Artworks Gallery will be paying tribute to the wife of one of their own who died in September. Gallery members will show a unique collection of tribute works created to honor the music of pianist Pamela Howland. She was the wife of Artworks' member Wendell Myers. As an accomplished pianist, she taught for many years in the Wake Forest University music department. Howland also recorded 19 albums consisting of composers Chopin, Debussy, and Ravel. She performed nationally and internationally, was a Steinway Artist, a 2017-2018 Fulbright Scholar to Poland, and a Chopin specialist. The paintings of Wendell Myers are abstract landscapes, based on memories of the places he's lived and visited; the great plains, north woods and lake country of his youth, the Carolina mountains and seascapes of adult life, and the desert Southwest where he has frequently vacationed. The works in this show, *Enchanted Forests* are inspired by the countryside of Poland, where he and his wife have spent a great deal of time over the past 15 years. The se-


ries is also influenced by the works of Wolf Kahn and Mark Rothko, referring to it as a "Rothkavian lozenge of color."

Wendell Myers holds a BFA from the University of Wisconsin, Milwaukee. Early in his career, he worked as a studio potter, selling directly to the public out of his studio, at art fairs and shows in the Midwest and Northeast. Eventually, accompanying his wife, Pamela Howland, to Winston-Salem, he earned his MD from Wake Forest School of Medicine. He has been a practicing radiologist in the area for over 25 years.

12 years ago Myers returned to making art, this time choosing to focus on acrylic painting.

The large paintings in *Tree Translations III* depict trees Lea Lackey-Zachmann walks past daily. The central painted rectangle in each work represents a tree as we might view it. The smaller painted rectangles above, below, and beside, represent the tree abstractly or symbolically. Most of the artist's painting career has focused on the tension between Realism and Abstraction. Asking which best expresses the tree's true nature? All these depictions are a visual language that seeks to evoke a feeling or insight into the identity and nature of the trees shown here.

Lackey-Zachmann reveals, "This exhibit was inspired by my knowing that trees are essential to our life and happiness on earth. Our appreciation of them helps determine our future."

Lackey-Zachmann holds an MFA in painting from the University of NC at Greensboro, along with a graduate teacher's certificate in Art Education. She received a BA in Art from Winthrop University in Rock Hill, SC, and is now retired after having taught at High Point University for 29 years and Salem College for 10 years.

She has been an instructor of various classes at WFU, Guilford College, and Elon University as well as having taught and served on the board of the Sawtooth Center for Visual Art. She is dedicated to community arts endeavors of all kinds. Her paintings, prints, and drawings are in various collections on the east coast of the US. She is a founding member of Artworks Gallery.

Kimberly Varnadoe's current work represents a passage through conflicting times. She reflects, "We all have had to adjust to a different way of life during 2020-21. Some of us have gone or are going through other adjustments that are more personal." These works reflect thoughts, memories, stress, and therefore are a bit chaotic. They are personal to Varnadoe, yet they speak to what many of us think and feel during life's tumultuous changes. These works were created with a wide variety of media through-

out each piece. The meshing together of these materials is a reflection on the many layers of overlap we experience emotionally as we adjust to challenges faced day to day, embracing the complex and contemplative.

Varnadoe received her BFA in Painting from the University of South Alabama and her MFA in Printmaking from the University of Memphis. She works with experimental photography and a variety of printmaking techniques, often combining the processes. She enjoys experimentation and feels that art is most alive during the art-making -- the final work of art is the record of the art process. She has been a member of Artworks Gallery, in Winston-Salem, since 2003.

Francis Marion University in Florence, SC, is presenting *Disruptive Experiences*, featuring works by Yvette Cummings, on view in the University Place Gallery in downtown Florence, through Dec. 16, 2021.

Cummings' new exhibition is titled *Disruptive Experiences*. It includes several newly completed works, as well as pieces which have been exhibited widely at a range of galleries nationally over the past two years. ArtScape 5 is presented by the Arts Council of Fayetteville and the North Carolina Arts Council.

In the late 2000's, the Works In Progress initiative, now known as ArtScape 5, was launched as an annual public art exhibition that showcased various artwork and sculptures on display throughout the downtown Fayetteville landscape. In 2017, under the guidance of Eric Lindstrom (SBL Architects) and the Arts Council of Fayetteville, the initiative was transformed into and recognized as one of the most successful public art exhibitions in North Carolina.

Artwork and sculptures are gifted to the Fayetteville community. In the past 5 years, the Arts Council of Fayetteville, with support from private donors, have invested over \$200,000 into the initiative, culminating over 60 pieces of artwork and sculptures that have been on display, 8 of which have become permanent art pieces purchased for the City of Fayetteville.

The Arts Council of Fayetteville | Cumberland County is a tax-exempt 501(c)(3) organization based in Fayetteville, NC, that supports individual creativity, cultural preservation, economic development, and lifelong learning through the ARTS. Founded in 1973, the Arts Council of Fayetteville has served as a link between artists, arts and cultural organizations, and the greater community by administering programs in partnership with a variety of local agencies to stimulate economic growth, reinforce child education through the arts,



In May 2019, the Z. Smith Reynolds Foundation (ZSR) awarded Inclusive Public Art grants, totaling \$450,000, to ten communities across North Carolina. The Foundation’s investment in Inclusive Public Art is intended to help share stories of diversity, equality, inclusion and equity as they relate to the people and places of North Carolina, especially those whose stories are often untold. ZSR’s hope is that this effort will catalyze community conversations that can result in a shared, and fuller, understanding of our common history – and common bonds – as North Carolinians. ZSR has launched a microsite to share information about all ten Inclusive Public Art sites, which are located across the state.

This project received support of individual, corporate, and foundation donors from across the nation and is truly a community effort.

Musician and historian Mary D. Williams will perform at the unveiling at 11am. Williams has performed and provided her voice to the soundtrack of *Blood Done Sign My Name* (February 2010). She has also performed at the North Carolina State Capitol and has been featured on Dick Gordon’s *The Story*, as well as on National Public Radio.

North Carolina storyteller Carolyn Evans will perform a new story based on the true experiences of the mother of a USCT soldier in Wilmington, NC, at 12:30pm and 1:30pm. A gifted storyteller, Evans became interested in acting at Syracuse University and continued to act at the City University of New York. She has performed on stage with entertainers including Glenn Close, Melba Moore, and Terry McFadden. She

has appeared at the Apollo Theater, on New York’s WBAI radio, PENN Center Inc., at Gettysburg, as well as PBS TV and CNN TV.

Spoken word poet Johnny Lee Chapman, III will perform a new work inspired by the life of USCT Medal of Honor winner Powhatan Beaty, a soldier who fought at Forks Road and became an actor after the Civil War, at 1:15pm and 2:15pm. Chapman, III is an interdisciplinary artist from Fuquay-Varina, NC. In 2014, he leaped from the page to the stage, beginning his career as a spoken word artist. Since then, he has performed regionally and nationally and is an active voice within his Triangle community. His professional range includes spoken word performances, screenwriting and acting, facilitation of poetry showcases, craft workshops, and artist mentorship.

Beverly Fields Burnette is a storyteller (current President of the NC Association of Black Storytellers, Inc), a published poet, and a retired school social worker. Born in Rocky Mount, NC, Burnette, being the older of two children, relished hearing family stories and loved “eaves-dropping” in on the talk of the grown folks around her. These family and community stories sealed Burnette’s early “storytelling” interest, as well as her desire to research her family genealogy. She has been a consistent hunter of her ancestors for over two decades. She is a USCT descendant.

The North Carolina Association of Black Storytellers, Inc., NCABS, promotes and perpetuates the art of Black Storytelling, an art form that embodies the history and cultures of Africans and African Americans, especially those in North Carolina.

Located on the site of the Battle of Forks Road on the grounds of CAM, *Boundless* will feature the life casts of 11 African American men connected to the Battle of Forks Road and its story – USCT descendants, reenactors, veterans, and local community leaders. Josiah Patrick, a Wilmington man whose features are used in the sculpture, is a descendant of four USCT soldiers. He is just one of the local men whose features were used for the sculpture. The USCT project is timely and necessary, as the nation looks closely at issues of race and systemic racism. This project, with its goal of engaging the community and addressing race and racism through programming that contextualizes *Boundless* with local history, will benefit Wilmington, NC, a city struggling to reconcile a tragic past of white supremacy. For Hayes, the sculpture is personal. “As a Black man in America, you see the imagery of a Black person in chains, being whipped, begging, kneeling and helpless,” said Hayes. “This project is important to me because, as a creator, I get to change that narrative - by giving Black soldiers a sense of honor and pride.”

Durham-born Hayes is a recipient of the 1858 Prize for Contemporary Southern Art and teaches at Duke University. He is known for his figurative work, specifically depicting the African American experience. Hayes’ work has been featured at the National Cathedral, Winston-Salem State University, Duke University, CAM Raleigh, Rosa Parks Museum, African American Museum in Philadelphia, and Harvey B. Gantt Center, among others.

CAM stands on the site of the Battle of Forks Road, a Civil War battle won by the tenacity of the USCT leading to the fall of Wilmington, the Confederacy’s last seaport. These 2,000 USCT soldiers fought for the Union, but they also fought for their freedom and the abolishment of slavery. Their impact is significant, yet the story is virtually unknown. Cameron Art Museum is the steward of the Battle of Forks Road Historic Site and is dedicated to interpreting the contribution

The North Carolina Museum of Art in Raleigh, NC, is presenting *Alphonse Mucha: Art Nouveau Visionary*, on view through Jan. 23, 2022.

Czech-born Alphonse Mucha (1860–1939) was one of the most celebrated artists in Paris at the turn of the 20th century. As an influential force behind the art nouveau movement, he created sumptuous posters and advertising materials—promoting such everyday products as cigarette papers and tea biscuits—that transformed the streets of Paris into open-air art exhibitions.

Alphonse Mucha: Art Nouveau Visionary celebrates the Mucha Trust Collection's first major US tour in 20 years, featuring a vast array of posters, illustrations, ornamental objects, and rarely seen sculpture, photography, and self-portraits—all showcasing Mucha's distinctive style of harmonious compositions, sinuous forms, organic motifs, and lush color palettes. Additional works from the NCMA's collection highlight Mucha's influence in America and his close friendship with French sculptor Auguste Rodin.

Despite the powerful impact of Mucha's style, his ideas behind its development are less well known. *Alphonse Mucha: Art Nouveau Visionary* draws on the latest research to examine the theoretical aspects of his style, which evolved as a language for communication with the wider public. The exhibition features some 100 objects from the Mucha Trust collection, including rarely seen works from the artist's family. It also delves into Mucha's contributions to the art nouveau style and how he later used his visual language to express his vision for an independent Czechoslovak nation.



The paintings collection is complemented by examples of neoclassical sculpture on view in the Campbell Rotunda, and decorative art objects on loan from the Rivers Collection. **Gallery 5, Permanent Exhibition** - "Miniature Portraits". The first American miniature portraits were painted in Charleston, and today the Gibbes is home to one of the most prestigious portrait miniature collections in the United States. Containing more than six hundred objects, the collection spans nearly two hundred years and represents the work of over a hundred artists. Small enough to fit in the palm of the hand, these tiny portraits were treasured remembrances of loved ones in the age before photography. Presented in state-of-the-art display cases, and in viewable storage drawers featured miniatures include works by Mary Roberts, Jeremiah Theus, Henry Benbridge, Charles Wilson Peale, Pierre Henri, Edward Greene Malbone, George Engleheart, and Charles Fraser. **Gallery 6, Permanent Exhibition** - "20th Century American Regionalism and the Charleston Renaissance". At the turn of the twentieth century, American artists looked to their European counterparts and beyond as they developed identifiable American artistic movements. Two particularly strong influences during this time period were French Impressionism and Japanese woodblock prints. Another prevailing theme during this period was the growing interest in American subject matter. American regionalism and social realism played important roles in the development of art in Charleston, which flourished as a destination for artists, particularly during the years of 1915 to 1945 a period now known as the Charleston Renaissance. **Gallery 7, Permanent Exhibition** - "Modern and Contemporary". Modern and contemporary art in America encompasses a wide range of styles, subject matter, and media. As a whole, the diversity of modern and contemporary art reflects the rich and varied heritage of our nation and the lowcountry region. Works in this gallery were created over the past forty years by artists who are native to the area, who have worked here, or who have created objects that reflect the complex story of the region. The works are grouped to reflect several themes including the southern landscape, the human figure, abstraction, and the legacy of slavery in America. **Gibbes Visiting Artist Studios, Session IV, Through Dec. 5** - Daisy McClellan. McClellan, who moved to Charleston in 2020, launched a full-fledged jewelry-making business that took her on tour around the country selling her designs at various boutiques and maker markets. In 2014, she and her husband opened a brick-and-mortar retail shop in San Francisco where they featured over 200 artists and hosted creative workshops. In addition, she designed a clothing collection for women and young children, founded a bi-annual shopping market for local boutiques and worked with several artists on collaborations. The artists utilized century-old traditional techniques like punch needle rug making and sewing in new and creative ways to create functional objects. Striving to spark joy with every creation, she hopes her work can encourage appreciation for lasting handmade craftsmanship. **Session IV, Through Dec. 5** - Susan Klein. Klein is an associate professor of art at the College of Charleston. She has shown her work nationally and internationally and is a 2020-2021 recipient of a Pollock-Krasner Foundation Grant. While in residence at the Gibbes, she plans to work on mixed media paintings and drawings inspired by her sculptural work.

Ideas that influence her work include the way individuals imbue objects with the power to hold memory, how the living is tied to the dead and connections to past and present. Museum visitors will experience the artist working from fired sculptures to paintings in the studio so they can see the connections between two-dimensional and three-dimensional works. **Ruth and Bill Baker Art Sales Gallery, Through Dec. 5** - "New Histories: Cut Paper Dioramas by Jen Swearington". Swearington grew up in rural Indiana, drawing since she was little. She studied fine art and art history, earning a BFA in Sculpture from Pratt Institute in 1997 and MFA in Fibers from the Savannah College of Art and Design in 2000, spent a year as Artist in Residence at Arrowmont School of Arts and Crafts, and then settled in Asheville, NC. In 2003, she started sewing original apparel pieces and printing her illustrations on them, founding Jennythreads Studio, by which she has since made an independent, creative living. In 2013, her comprehensive how-to manual, "Printing on Fabric: Techniques with Screens, Stencils, Inks and Dyes" was published by Lark Crafts. Beginning spring of 2018, Swearington traveled abroad for several month-long art residencies in Bulgaria, Mexico, Finland, and Greece. On these adventures, she filled sketchbooks with drawings and created collapsible carousel pop-up books that could travel back in her carry-on suitcase. In March 2020, Swearington relocated to Charleston and continues her creative journey here on the coast as a 2021 Gibbes Museum Visiting Artist. **Museum Shop** - Now offering the inventory of the Tradd Street Press, reproductions of works by Elizabeth O'Neill Verner among other exhibit related art objects. 





Asheville Art Museum, 2 South Pack Square at Pack Place, Asheville. **The Van Winkle Law Firm Gallery, Through Jan. 10, 2022** - "A Dance of Images and Words: The Nancy Graves/Pedro Cuperman Tango Portfolio," features a series of eight intaglio prints that depict plants and animals alongside eleven sheets of prose that explore the steps of the Argentinian dance, the tango. Organized by the Asheville Art Museum from the Museum's Collection and curated by Hilary Schroeder, assistant curator. The common idiom "it takes two to tango" is immediately called into question in both the imagery and words of the Tango portfolio. The portfolio is an expression of artist Nancy Graves (Pittsfield, MA 1939-1995

New York, NY) writer Pedro Cuperman's (1936-2016 Buenos Aires, Argentina) meditations on the dance. Their imagery and words become paired in an illustrated book though their explorations take different formats and directions. **Appleby Foundation Exhibition Hall, Nov. 19 - Mar. 14, 2022** - "Ruminations on Memory," contends with the act of remembrance and reflection, featuring a rare presentation of all nine prints from Robert Rauschenberg's "Ruminations" portfolio, Judy Chicago's "Retrospective in a Box" portfolio, and selections from the Museum's Collection. Organized by the Asheville Art Museum and curated by Hilary Schroeder, assistant curator. Artworks are vessels for processing, recalling, and reflecting on the past. Artists often draw upon materials from their own pasts and grasp at fleeting moments in time in the creation of an object. For the viewer, observation of an artwork can draw out personal memories. **Nov. 19 - Mar. 14, 2022** - "A Living Language: Cherokee Syllabary and Contemporary Art," features over 50 works of art in a variety of media by 30+ Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians (EBCI) and Cherokee Nation artists. The exhibition highlights the use of the written Cherokee language, a syllabary developed by Cherokee innovator Sequoyah (circa 1776-1843). Cherokee syllabary is frequently found in the work of Cherokee artists as a compositional element or the subject matter of the work itself. **Judith S. Moore Gallery, Through Jan. 17, 2022** - "Huffman Gifts of Contemporary Southern Folk Art". Allen & Barry Huffman have been collecting contemporary Southern folk art for the past 40 years. Both collectors are originally from the South, and their journey together has led them around the southeastern United States, from Florida to Alabama to their hometown of Hickory, NC. In each place, they formed bonds with regional artists and learned first-hand the narratives of each artwork. Within their collection are subsets of folk art including self-taught artists driven to share their messages, crafts for the tourist market, and Southern pottery. The guiding principle evident throughout their collection and the generous donation of contemporary Southern folk art that they've gifted to the Asheville Art Museum is the story told by each of these artists through their artworks. This exhibition is organized by the Asheville Art Museum and curated by Whitney Richardson, associate curator. **Explore Asheville Exhibition Hall, Through Jan. 24, 2022** - "Gestures: Mid-Century Abstraction from the Collection," explores works in a variety of media that speak to the vibrant abstract experiments in American art making during the middle of the 20th century. **Through Jan. 24, 2022** - "Modernist Design at Black Mountain College," features the Museum's collection of groundbreaking designs from Black Mountain College (BMC)—including architecture, furniture, ceramics, textiles, and more—and situates them in the context for BMC's influences and surroundings. Artists featured in the two exhibitions include Anni Albers, Josef Albers, Ruth Asawa, Jorge Fick, Buckminster Fuller, Mary "Molly" Gregory, Karen Karnes, A. Lawrence Kocher, Albert Lanier, Jo Sandman, Mim Sihvonen, Robert Turner, Gerald Van de Wiele, and more. **Debra McClintock Gallery, Through Jan. 17, 2022** - "Walter B. Stephen Pottery: Cameo to Crystalline," features art pottery and functional vessels from each stage of Stephen's career, from his origins discovering the medium alongside his mother Nellie C. Randall Stephen in Shelby County, TN, from 1901 through 1910 to his multi-decade production just outside of Asheville. Artist Walter B. Stephen (Clinton, IA 1875-1961 Asheville, NC) contributed to Western North Carolina's identity as a flourishing site for pottery production and craftsmanship in the early 20th century. In 1926, Stephen founded his third and last pottery studio, Pisgah Forest, in Arden, NC, which he operated until his death in 1961. It was at this studio that the artist perfected the "cameo" decoration technique for which he became best known. His hand-painted images, achieved with layers of white translucent clay, often feature American folk imagery, from covered wagons and livestock to cabins and spinning wheels. **Ongoing** - The Asheville Art Museum, the hub for 20th- and 21st-century American art in Western North Carolina, has re-opened to the public. The \$24+ million, state-of-the-art facility encompasses 54,000 square feet and adds 70 percent more Collection gallery space. For the first time in the Museum's history, it has the capacity to host major traveling exhibitions from nationally recognized museums. The expansion increases its physical space and dramatically increases its role as a community center, educational resource, economic engine for WNC, and cultural concierge for the region's residents and visitors. Opening exhibitions include: "Appalachia Now! An Interdisciplinary Survey of Contemporary Art in Southern Appalachia," is the inaugural special exhibition of the newly renovated Museum. Curated by Jason Andrew, the juried exhibition features 50 artists of diverse backgrounds from

the Southern Appalachian states of North Carolina, Georgia, South Carolina, Tennessee, and Virginia. The exhibit provides a regional snapshot of the art of our time—a collective survey of contemporary Southern Appalachian culture. "Intersections in American Art," is the largest presentation ever drawn from the Museum's Collection of 5,000+ works and 4,000+ architectural drawings. It celebrates the unique qualities of art from Western North Carolina, placed within the context of art from across the United States. The intersections of regional and national art are highlighted throughout the galleries, as are three specific ways of understanding the works here: Time & Place; Experiments in Materials & Form; and Collaboration & Interdisciplinary Dialogue. Widely revered as an innovator in the non-standard use and "preparation" of musical instruments, indeterminacy, chance-based and electroacoustic music, John Cage (1912-1992) was perhaps both the most provocative and the most influential American composer of the 20th century. Cage taught at Black Mountain College in the summers of 1948 and 1952 and was in residence during the summer of 1953. While at BMC, Cage lectured on the Huang-Po Doctrine of Universal Mind and organized what has been credited as the first-ever "Happening." As the exhibition title and John Cage's own words make clear, Cage wished only "to free Zen of any responsibility for [his] actions," yet his profound influence continues to be seen, heard, and experienced through his work and the work of friends and countless followers. Don't Blame it on ZEN: The Way of John Cage and Friends presents works by Cage and his contemporaries including Nam June Paik, Yoko Ono, Laurie Anderson, David Byrne, Robert Rauschenberg, and M.C. Richards as well as those deeply influenced by his work and teachings such as composer Matana Roberts, artist and performer Aki Onda, interdisciplinary artist Andrew Deutsch, and abstract turntablist Maria Chavez. **Ongoing** - "Leap Then Look Digital Exhibition, a virtual exhibit at (<https://bit.ly/2lwoyku>). This digital exhibition brings together images and texts from Leap Then Look's BMC+AC Active Archive Digital Residency. "Leap Then Look" is a collaboration between British artists Lucy Cran and Bill Leslie. Together the duo creates artworks, participatory projects, workshops, and events for people of all ages and abilities. Over the 10 days of the Active Archive residency, Leap Then Look responded to the history of BMC—the images, stories, happenings, and people. Rankin West Gallery, Through Jan. 1, 2022 - "Emergent Landscapes: Mountains, Music, & Improvisation in the Paintings of Abie Harris". Abie Harris paints the mountains – he also paints the equally dynamic landscape of Bluegrass music. He is often doing both of these things at the same time. 

Mezzanine Gallery, Through Feb. 5, 2022 - "98.6 – A Creative Commonality," featuring artworks created by chimpanzees at Zoo Knoxville. Humans and chimpanzees share 98.6% of the same DNA. Both species have forward-facing eyes, opposing thumbs that accompany grasping fingers, and the ability to walk upright. Far greater than just the physical similarities, both species have large brains capable of exhibiting great intelligence as well as an incredible emotional range. Chimpanzees form tight social bonds, especially between mothers and children, create tools to assist with eating and express joy by hugging and kissing one another. Over 1,000,000 chimpanzees roamed the tropical rain forests of Africa just a century ago. Now listed as endangered, less than 300,000 exist in the wild because of poaching, the illegal pet trade and habitat loss due to human encroachment. Often, chimpanzees are killed, leaving orphans that are traded

and sold around the world. In the case of chimpanzees and other great apes, research has shown that certain individuals respond to color and enjoy painting as a type of enrichment. Like human artists, each chimpanzee has a unique reaction and approach to their canvas. While most chimpanzees enjoy using their hands and feet, occasionally even their lips, some have even learned how to use a paintbrush. **Mayer Gallery, Through Feb. 5, 2022** - "Matters of the Heart (and Other Abnormalities): Shawn Morin". The exhibition explores concepts of human relationships. It seems to me that since 9/11 and Y2K, there has been a fundamental shift in the way many humans act, react and navigate the world. Add to that the current worldwide pandemic and proliferation of clinical depression, especially amongst our youth, and it is easy to perceive that the world has changed dramatically. Consequently, some humans are now far kinder and more loving than they once were, while others have grown desperate, indifferent, angry, and resentful. **Gallery A, Through Nov. 6** - "Every Olive Tree in the Garden of Gethsemane: Wendy Babcox," is a suite of photogravure images of each of the twenty-three olive trees in the garden. Situated at the foot of the Mount of Olives in East Jerusalem, the Garden of Gethsemane is known to many as the site where Jesus prayed the night before his crucifixion. The oldest tree has been carbon-dated to 1092, a date almost coincidental with the first of the Crusades. The perseverance of the olive trees in Gethsemane traces a line through the centuries in concert with the history of persistent efforts by geopolitical powers to exert influence in the Middle East, particularly in Jerusalem. The oldest trees are a living and symbolic link to this distant past, while the younger saplings bridge the present moment with an unknowable future. **Gallery B, Through Nov. 6** - "Where are the birds? Retracing Audubon: Artwork by Krista Elrick," is an exhibition and book project reexamining John James Audubon's epic life journey and the production of his beloved tome, The Birds of America. While the name of Audubon is familiar and the drawings he created are still wildly popular, his eloquent writings are less well known. Where are the birds? Retracing Audubon features contemporary photographs made by Krista Elrick of the American landscapes in which Audubon traveled 200 years ago. Also included are quotes from Audubon's journals and entries Elrick made in her own travel notebooks two centuries later. **Moskowitz Gallery, Through Dec. 4** - "Father, Grandfather, Artist: A Tribute to Warren Dennis". This exhibition commemorates the life and work of prominent Southeastern artist and retired longtime Appalachian State University professor Warren Dennis, who died April 13, 2021. Father, Grandfather, Artist: A Tribute to Warren Dennis comprises paintings from the personal collections of family members. **Hodges Gallery, Through Dec. 11** - "ERRATIC: Hoss Haley." With highlights including spectacular Chinese vases, dynamic Indian Chola bronzes, and exquisite Southeast Asian sculptures, the exhibition reveals great achievements in Asian art spanning more than two millennia. This selection of masterpieces drawn from Asia Society's permanent collection is a visually stunning presentation that will illuminate social and artistic histories from across Asia and underscore the visual arts' capacity to encourage cross-cultural dialogue. **Through Dec. 26** - "Beads of Distinction: Yoruba Royal Caps from the Collection of Rhonda Morgan Wilkerson, PhD". The Yoruba peoples of southwestern Nigeria and adjacent regions have developed a rich and vibrant tradition of beadwork designs, especially after the introduction of glass beads through European trade from the late eighteenth century. The small, brilliantly colored beads were often used to decorate the regalia that denotes and celebrates the powers of the ruler (oba). This included headgear for non-ritual, minor occasions and daily wear, such as the five beaded caps in this installation, dating from the late nineteenth and mid-twentieth centuries. The caps combine traditional Yoruba iconography with a style that often reflects European or other external influences. The shapes of the hats can evoke models from Europe (the bejeweled crown, the bishop's mitre, the sailor's cap), as well as the Muslim world of northern Africa (the fez and the turban). This is the fourth in the Ackland's series of long-term installations with works from the distinguished collection of Rhonda Morgan Wilkerson PhD. **Through July 3, 2022** - "Ghost of a Dream: Aligned by the Sun (through the revolution)". In a time of travel bans, immigration debates, climate change, and a global pandemic, the artist team Ghost of a Dream has created their multi-faceted project Aligned by the Sun in an effort to bring hope to our collective experience and unify our fractured planet. To assemble the footage necessary for this endeavor, Ghost of a Dream has collaborated with artists in over 220 nations by asking them to capture a short video of the sunset. All but seven of the 195 countries recognized by the United Nations, as well as many non-UN nations and territories, are represented by these videos. These videos

provide the source material for many iterations of the project, including large installations, video collages, and still-image composites. **Through Feb. 13, 2022** - "Clouding: Shape and Sign in Asian Art". Bo Bardi's life story is interpreted by Brazilian actresses Fernanda Montenegro and Fernanda Torres, mother and daughter in real life, who portray the mature and the younger version of the Bo Bardi. **Ongoing** - The Bechtler Museum of Modern Art is named after the family of Andreas Bechtler, a Charlotte resident and native of Switzerland who assembled and inherited a collection of more than 1,400 artworks created by major figures of 20th-century modernism and donated it to the public trust. Individual works in the collection are exceptional because of their rarity, craftsmanship, provenance, or as representative examples of particular types or methods of production or decoration. **Ongoing** - "American Glass". The Museum of the Cherokee Indian, 589 Tsali Boulevard, Cherokee. **Ongoing** - Welcome to a sweeping history of the Cherokee Nation, engaging and oftentimes heart-rending, from ice age beginnings to present-day life and culture. In the brushstrokes of this fascinating heritage, you'll discover the warp and weft of treaties, the roots of a naturalistic language, artifacts of particular periods, great figures and heroes and entrancing stories of a civilization along with the Cherokee's distinctive values and ways of being in the world before and after "the Trail of Tears." A perfect place to begin exploration of Cherokee heritage and traditions is the Museum of the Cherokee Indian in Cherokee, North Carolina. Visitors are greeted at the entrance by a 20-foot hand-carved statue of Sequoyah, the inventor of the Cherokee alphabet. An interpretive site for the Trail of Tears National Historic Trail, this state-of-the-art facility traces the story of the Cherokee from the earliest inhabitants of the area 11,000 years ago to the present. An extensive exhibit of artifacts and photos is enhanced with computer-generated holograms and other imagery, sound, and special effects that leave a lasting and haunting impression on the visitor. The museum gift shop is rich in Cherokee tradition. Locally created baskets, pottery, wood carvings, decorated gourds and beadwork are among the art available for sale. Books on Cherokee history, culture, language, and genealogy line the shelves, along with audio CDs and tapes by local musicians and storytellers. Admission: Yes. In the "Cash Crop" installation, viewers walk between the figures, stepping over iron chains, connecting with the human experience of the atrocity of the transatlantic slave trade. **Through Jan. 31, 2022** - "The Shadow We Create". The exhibition raises questions about societal prescriptions, race, servitude, fear, and the consequences of not speaking through compelling works by artists Mary Bowron, Willie Cole, and Jan-Ru Wan. The exhibition is named after Jan-Ru Wan's stunning work "The Noise We Make" and "The Shadow We Create", an assemblage of hundreds of rusted bells rendered silent by immersion in wax. "The Beauties", Willie Cole's full-scale prints are pulled from blackened crushed and hammered ironing boards. With titles including "Bessie", "Carolina", "Jonny Mae" and "Jane", each print is named for a woman in Cole's family. Simultaneously they reference servitude, beauty, oppression, and darkened holds of slave ships. "Shadow"

features a haunting installation of "Silent Witness", a series by Mary Bowron populated by androgynous pit-fired ceramic heads. Some are smothered in thick wax, others branded with soot from the fire of their birth, with all featureless where a mouth once was, or may still be. "Shadow" addresses fear of speaking the truth amidst racial, social, political and economic unease. This exhibition asks the viewer to contemplate ways in which silence is forced and silence is broken. **Through Jan. 31, 2022** - "Pinkie's Memories," a new exhibition from North Carolina artist Pinkie Strother. The impact of this global pandemic is still on-going: it has claimed millions of lives and changed the ways in which each of us relates to and navigates the world. As the university responded to the challenges of safely reopening campus, the SUAAC members and faculty advisors pivoted to continue this one of a kind, nearly 60 year-old program of student's acquiring contemporary art for the WFU Art Collection. Restricted travel prevented the Committee from traveling to New York City to look at the work in person, so they instead paid virtual visits to dozens of galleries in New York City, Los Angeles, Chicago, Atlanta, Denver, and Detroit. While the trip was not possible, the main requirement for acquisitions remained the same since the founding of the program in 1962: to purchase art that reflects the times in which it was made. 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




