Western Carolina University in Cullowhee, NC, Offers Exhibit Focused on Indigenous Women

Western Carolina University in Cullowhee, NC, is presenting We Will Not Be Silenced: Standing for Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women, on view at WCU Fine Art Museum, through Dec. 9, 2022. A reception will be held on Nov. 2, from 5-7pm. Complimentary hors d'oeuvres and drinks will be served at the reception, and free parking is available at the Bardo Arts Center parking lot at 199 Centennial Drive, Cullowhee, NC.

We Will Not Be Silenced, aims to raise awareness about the astonishingly high rates of violence experienced by Indigenous women in the United States and Canada. Developed by the WCU Cherokee Center in partnership with the WCU Fine Museum, this exhibition features artwork by six Indigenous artists - Ashley Tyler Evans, Dylan Rose, Moe Hernandez, R.A. Johnson, Chi Myriah Shipman, and Jaime Black - who are amplifying the voices of those seeking to end this violence.

Photographs in the exhibition portray groups of Indigenous women gathered on the site of Kituwah Mound, an important Cherokee Mother Town, bearing the red handprint of the Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women (MMIW) movement. Other works use symbolic imagery to express the feelings of danger and loss experienced by Indigenous women, their families, and their communities as a result of this ongoing violence.

The We Will Not Be Silenced project started with a photo session held by the WCU Cherokee Center in March 2022. Cherokee, Choctaw, Coharie, and other Indigenous women posed for portraits set

against the backdrop of the mountains at Kituwah Mound to advocate for justice. Over forty women participated in the photo session, including mother and daughter pairs, survivors of violence, and respected elders. Their wide range of ages underscores the generational trauma that exists because of this violence and the extent to which the entire Indigenous community is affected.


Wearing both contemporary and traditional dress for their cultures, each woman painted a red handprint over their mouths, a symbol that represents their refusal to be silenced. They stand together as a voice for the missing and murdered in their communities and as a call to action urging everyone to help them in their search for justice.

Join the WCU Fine Art Museum as it works to move the conversation forward about the need for change and to raise awareness regarding Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women.



It doesn't matter if you live up the hill or across the state. The Studio Tour provides an adventure for the intrepid seeker of the art experience. Artist studios come in many iterations - the building off to the side of the house, or across the field or down the road or right off the main road or down a gravel one-lane. Two-stories with a gallery space or small and cozy with a table set up or cleared off for display. Still there are others that devote a corner to each artist sharing the space. Wherever and however they are set up, the studios are exciting places to visit because they demonstrate the dynamic process used to create a finished piece. Every artist has their own way of telling a story, inviting visitors to ask questions, hold their work, and share a moment.

The art is as diverse as the artists who

"Every year is unique. The artists change, and the work evolves. I'm always excited when the boxes arrive - to see a new artist's work or the evolution of a more seasoned artist" said Kathryn Andree, who has been Toe River Arts Exhibits Coordinator for over a decade. The participant shows are the biggest exhibits during the year, averaging over 150 pieces on pedestals, tables, walls, with a few bigger pieces relegated to the floor. They are the most diverse, with media ranging from 2-dimensional to glass, clay, wood, and fiber - something for every palate, every wallet.
