Shortly after moving to New Bern they had a joint exhibition at the Bank of the Arts and now 30 years later, they're exhibiting at the Bank of the Arts once again.

and New Bern. This past year she experimented with a new medium, oil painting.

Tokarski's work focuses on utilizing rich colors and smooth blending to create energy and motion. She finds inspiration in nature, specifically her backyard where she paints the natural patterns she observes.

Jeff Sherman is a member of a local photo club, Coastal Photo Club, and an avid photographer. He learned his craft from his father, a professional photographer. He enjoys capturing moments of intimacy with his photographs and then manipulating the images digitally on his computer. This allows Sherman to enhance details and create the mood he wishes to convey.

Using his own printer to render his images, Sherman hopes the images convey the same mood and feeling he witnessed while capturing the photograph. Sherman previously owned a photography studio where he specialized in weddings, bar mitzvahs, portraits and commercial art. He also previously owned a printing lab for professional photographers called Sherman Color Labs.

Craven Allen Gallery in Durham, NC, **Features Works by Beverly McIver** 

Craven Allen Gallery in Durham, NC, will present Beverly McIver Passage: Paintings 1983-2022, on view from Nov. 17 through Mar. 4, 2023. A reception will be held on Nov. 19, from 5-7pm.

Passage features a comprehensive selection of paintings spanning more than thirty years of Beverly McIver's career. Following McIver through the most pivotal moments in her life, the exhibition reflects the passage of time and its effects on Beverly as an artist, a sister, a daughter, and a friend. Passage surveys McIver's most recent paintings, and archival works complementing the museum retrospective of McIver's career, Full Circle. That exhibition, curated by Kim Boganey, opened early this year at the Scottsdale Museum of Contemporary Art.

Uniting all the paintings in *Passage* are McIver's unmistakable brushwork, expert use of color and unflinching gaze

Painted in 2022, Daddy Sleeping with Clasped Hands, Grief and Passage, are among new works of McIver confronting the death of her father earlier this year. Caring for her father in her home during his decline over the course of several months was demanding, as he could not walk and needed to be fed. Despite the challenges, McIver says she is grateful for the opportunity to grow closer to him. "I fell in love with him, and he gave me permission to love him."

Archival paintings include Untitled (Self-Portrait) from 1983, a sensitive early work; Dear God (Friends), a heartfelt painting from her iconic 2013 series, and Chelsea Girl, a monumental 2004 portrait painted in New York of the artist in a defiant pose, in blackface with a blonde wig.

Beverly McIver is among North Carolina's most noted artists, with work in major public and private collections. She is featured in Art of the State, Celebrating the Visual Art of North Carolina, by Liza Roberts, who will host a conversation with the artist at the gallery at a date to be announced.

Recent honors include the Rome Prize, a lifetime achievement award from the Anyone Can Fly Foundation, in a ceremony hosted by Faith Ringgold. She is featured in the Emmy-nominated documentary, Raising Renee, and teaches at Duke University.

McIver offered the following statement, "I try to face whatever is going on in my life, joyful or painful, through my paintings. I express myself with brushstrokes. It's how I process my happiness or grief, and how I communicate with the world."

"Passage tells stories from my life and celebrates the people who have nurtured and loved me over the past 50 years. These paintings tell my story over time. I try to live with intent, examining everything both good and bad - the human condition - and to share my experience honestly."

"Some of the newest paintings in *Pas*sage explore my grief surrounding the death of my father earlier this year. I try to pour my soul into the canvas, not the page, so

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
