Southeastern Center for Contemporary Art in Winston-Salem, NC, Offers **Group Fiber Exhibition**

The Southeastern Center for Contemporary Art in Winston-Salem, NC, will present The Threads We Follow, a group exhibition of fiber-based works by leading global artists, on view in SECCA's Main Gallery, from Nov.16, through Mar. 10, 2024. An opening reception with the artists and curator Maya Brooks will be held on Nov. 16, from 5 to 8pm, with remarks at 6pm and an opportunity for visitors to meet the artists at 6:30pm.

Over several centuries, artists and craftspeople have used fiber to challenge identity-based oppression throughout various global cultures. Many of these artists specifically contemplate the historic devaluation of textiles based upon their association with domestic labor and craft making, where women and communities of color have long interpreted social politics.

The Threads We Follow acknowledges the foundations of fiber arts rooted in explicit gender and cultural expression while demonstrating contemporary understandings of the malleability of identity. The artists throughout this show experiment with structure and form to translate their experiences to materials like thread, fabric, and even hair, creating nontraditional designs including busts, sculptures, and suspended pieces. Ultimately, each of these artists emphasizes the exploratory nature of fiber
