## NC Wesleyan College in Rocky Mount, NC, Features Bob Ross Exhibition

NC Wesleyan College in Rocky Mount, NC, will present Fantastic Little Paintings by artist, Bob Ross, on view in the newlyrenovated Mims Gallery in The Dunn Center from Nov. 2, through Jan. 4, 2024.

Did you grow up watching Bob Ross paint happy little trees on PBS' The Joy of Painting? If so, we have just the thing for you coming this fall to NC Wesleyan University. With over 75 original paintings, this will be the first time a Bob Ross exhibit has been to North Carolina and the largest exhibition ever seen under one roof globally. This exhibition will be open to the public and tickets are now for sale at \$15 per person, children under five receive free admission, and school field trips are \$7 per student with two free chaperones.

Ross, an American painter, art instructor and television host known by so many for his hair and calm voice, showed the world how to paint. He was the host of *The Joy of* Painting, the television program that aired from 1983 to 1994.

During each thirty-minute episode, Bob would teach his viewers a quick, wet-onwet oil painting technique. He would paint a



scene without sketching it first, creating the image directly from his mind in real-time. He made the process simple for everybody to understand in easy to follow steps. Ross soothingly reminded his viewers that "we don't make mistakes, just happy little accidents."
