Gibbes Museum of Art in Charleston, SC, Offers An Exhibit to Examine Queer Influence on the Charleston Renaissance

The Gibbes Museum of Art in Charleston, SC, is presenting *Something Terrible May Happen*, on view through Mar. 10, 2023.

This month, the Gibbes Museum of Art will unveil a landmark exhibition exploring the queer influences on the Charleston Renaissance, the interwar period when Charleston flourished as an arts hub. By examining the stylistic affinity of a collection of works by Charleston Renaissance artist Edward "Ned" I.R. Jennings (1898–1929) and famed English illustrator Aubrey Beardsley (1872-1898), this special exhibition will, for the first time, establish the British Aestheticism Movement, defined by its resistance to Victorian social conventions, its call for artistic, sexual and political experimentation and its close association with Oscar Wilde, as an important influence on the visual arts of Charleston.

The exhibition will coincide with exciting programming that will bring the curator of drawings and paintings at the Musée d'Orsay, Paris, France to the Gibbes, a masquerade ball, and more! Special programming offered throughout the exhibition includes:

On Nov. 15 - Queering the Charleston Renaissance with Harlan Greene. Join award-winning author and historian, Harlan Greene, who has written extensively about the Charleston Renaissance and Charleston's LGBTQ history, for a special talk illuminating the people, places and artists that shaped the Renaissance and the visual arts in Charleston in the 20th and 21st cen-

turies with a special focus on the contributions and presence of Charleston's LGBTQ community members of the time. For more information, visit (https://bit.ly/3tdfFDm).

On Dec. 16 - In a Grotesque Way – The Art of Aubrey Beardsley. Featured in the exhibition *Something Terrible May Happen*, Aubrey Beardsley depicts the grotesque, the decadent and the erotic at the turn of the century, defining the British Aestheticism movement and disturbing the social mores of the Victorian Era. Join Caroline Corbeau-Parsons, curator of drawings and paintings at the Musée d'Orsay, in conversation with *Something Terrible May Happen* curator Chase Quinn. They will explore what inspired the artist and defined his images of the Fin de siècle. For more information, visit (https://bit.ly/3ZGvmiF).

Charleston's only art museum, the Gibbes is home to the foremost collection of American art that incorporates the story of Charleston. The museum's permanent collection boasts an exciting and growing modern and contemporary collection including works by Mary Jackson, Kara Walker, Jonathan Green and Jasper Johns. In addition, visitors can discover 18th and 19th-century landscapes and portraits, 20th-century impressionist objects, the most comprehensive public collection on the Charleston Renaissance (1915–1940), and outstanding miniature portraits on ivory.

We're Here For You When You Need Us

Have you ever seen anything on your Facebook feed which caught your attention for awhile, but then you went shortly on your way scrolling through your feed again - then later trying to find that post again to take another look - but you just can't find it a few hours later? Well, I have and it's very frustrating.

Sometimes I can remember who the sender was and I can go to their page and find the post I was looking for and sometimes my memory is not so good and other times the person who posted it to my feed is not the person who originally posted the post you're looking for. Such is social media here today and gone tomorrow. In my case, I have a lot of people posting on my feed and what I'm looking for might still be there, but it takes hours of scrolling to find it. And eventually, I give up looking for it.

In some respects, someone could say the same about *Carolina Arts*. You could remember seeing something in one of our issues, but can't remember which month it was. You may have already dumped the latest issue you downloaded and unless you're like us and save several months on your desktop for quick reference - it's gone - it's history. You can do a Google search or go to our website and go back through several years of issues or just give up. If you're not interested in doing research like you did back when you were in college - so be it. I'm in a position where I have had to do lots of research before doing my commentary, finding a few more details about an article or finding a photo to go with an article. The point is, we, *Carolina Arts*, are recording history and we're saving it so people can find out what was happening in the Carolinas, in the visual art community. Not everything, but everything people send us. We put it all in one place so an answer can be found if it happened and we covered it.

It's not perfect, but many times searching back through issues of *Carolina Arts*, *South Carolina Arts*, and *Charleston Arts*, I can find out what happened during a certain time period. We have boxes full of back printed issues and all our digital issues on our website. And, if what I'm looking for didn't show up in one of our issues, there is always the local library. I love libraries.

Over the years, I have used local libraries, different city libraries and even state libraries to do research. I've made trips to Columbia, SC, to visit the SC State Library to find out info about the SC Arts Commission. I've visited the Charlotte-Mecklenburg Library in Charlotte, NC, to find old issues of the *NC Arts Journal*, which gave me the idea to do an arts publication in the first place. And, when we lived in downtown Charleston, a week would not go by without a trip or two to the Charleston County Public Library.

So if you're looking for something you think you saw in an issue of *Carolina Arts*, start with a Google search, then go to our website at (www.carolinaarts.com) and search our archives. We have an index for articles and ads in the front of every issue. And, if you are looking for something from way back, before 2010, you can call me, or visit a few reference libraries, one at the Charleston County Public Library's Main Branch and the SC State Library in Columbia, SC. We left copies there every month.


Corrigan Gallery llc in Charleston, SC, Features Works by Peggy Howe

Corrigan Gallery llc in Charleston, SC, will present *Works from Life*, featuring works from Peggy Howe, on view from Nov. 1 - 28, 2023. A reception will be held on Nov. 3, from 5-8pm.

Howe has been exhibiting in Charleston since the late 1970s with her first exhibit entitled "A Slice of Life" being held at her studio on Chalmers Street. In 1992 Howe joined Jean Smith and Kristi Ryba to create Print Studio South, Inc., a fine art print cooperative based on Wentworth Street. PSS eventually evolved into Redux Contemporary Art Center and is now memorialized in the print group Imprimatur Charleston. Howe is primarily a figurative artist with some sensual pears thrown in. Her loose, sketchy landscapes express her appreciation of her environment. Howe's pieces are shown each year in the Piccolo Spoleto "Art in the Park" and her work is included in the collections of the South Carolina State Museum, Hugo Museum, City of Charleston, City of North Charleston, and the Gibbes Museum of Art. Charleston Crafts Gallery is spotlighting three artists producing fine craft in three very different mediums. These highlighted artists will be on display during the entire month of November. While these talented artists will be featured, the work of all Gallery members will also be on display in our new larger space and all art is available for purchase, including jewelry, wood puzzles, encaustic paints, fiber art, mixed media collage, apparel and accessories, plus functional and decorative objects in wood, ceramic, and glass. Our new location has also afforded us the opportunity to jury in additional new talented artisans to our growing Fine Crafts Cooperative. Dedie Story is a fused glass artist and has been interested in creating and making things her entire life. She began with sewing which she still does often. As a garment embellisher, she began making glass beads with a torch. Her glass journey blossomed from there. There is always more to learn. Story finds glass to be fascinating, exciting, and ever changing and she endeavors to create designs that interweave beautiful colors and textures and sometimes just a little fun. Susan Livingston has been a mixedmedia fiber artist for many years. Some days she spends dyeing beautiful fabrics and some days she spends stitching (always by hand) on these fabrics. Other days she spends walking and collecting the found objects that are often inspiration for her mixed-media fiber collages. Livingston's work includes shibori-resist silk scarves in indigo and other natural dyes, vintage napkins she collects and also dyes, textile panels, and framed mixed-media fiber collages. Courtney Powers crafts useful upcycled

leather accessories, is new to South Carolina, and was born and raised in the D.C. area. She started sewing at the age of After her husband retired and the youngest went off to college, together, they ventured south to the Outer Banks in Corolla, NC. While living there, they both started creating; her husband crafted upcycled pallet wood into usable objects and she started sewing again. Powers had always enjoyed using fabric remnants but ventured into leather while helping her husband find a new handle idea for his wooden trays. Powers suggested leather for handles and that was the perfect touch for the trays. Since she was not comfortable buying a hide, she discovered she could purchase new leather left behind as remnants from the furniture industry. Realizing she had previously not given much thought to how and where an item was made, she decided to offer a new eco-friendlier option. That's when her love affair with leather began. Her style is minimalist and highlights the natural beauty of each unique piece of leather and by not using a template, each piece is truly one of a kind. Her process of design is very simple. She plays with different colors of continued on Page 6





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fabric or leather until something works.

Why the name Restoried? Powers' designs are centered around reuse; giving a new story to materials that have been discarded. She uses two types of leather; scrap remnants from the furniture making process or reclaimed leather which she has stripped from discarded leather bags or furniture. She strives to use every scrap, transforming those pieces into totes and from the tote's scraps, a wallet or bracelet is made, leaving only the scrap of a leather "string" she uses to tie her tags onto recycled grocery bags she uses for purchases. Powers hopes her leatherwork will make people feel good knowing it was crafted by hand here in South Carolina with a purpose of reuse in mind. Using the image of a wild horse, in her logo, honors the places they have lived,

such as Corolla, NC and Hilton Head Island, SC., where wild horses have roamed.



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
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

Greenville Center for Creative Arts in Greenville, SC, Features Works by Leigh Mitchell

The Greenville Center for Creative Arts in Greenville, SC, will present *Mono No Aware*, featuring works by Leigh Mitchell, on view in the Community Gallery, from Nov. 3 through Dec. 20, 2023. A reception will be held on Nov. 3, from 6-9pm.

Exhibiting artist Leigh Mitchell presents over 30 black & white photographs inspired by the ephemeral nature of things. Included in the exhibition are images that metaphorically allude to all the trees humans have cut down and all the pollution humans are adding to the land and atmosphere.

Mitchell's work speaks to the precarious situation and tangled mess humanity and the earth are in and to the eerie sense of foreboding for what may lie ahead. 'Mono No Aware,' is a Japanese term meaning "beauty tinged with sadness." More specifically, the term alludes to the bittersweet awareness that all things inevitably change form or come to an end. Both a deep ache and a deep appreciation accompany the awareness that we don't know how long human life and the earth as we know it will last.

Mitchell is a photographic artist and educator. She obtained a master's degree in Studio Art from Western Carolina University, and she was a college instructor for twelve years, teaching Film Photography I and II, Digital Photography I and II, and Photography Appreciation. Her work has been exhibited in a variety of locations, including The Center for Fine Art Photography (Fort Collins, CO), The Asheville Area Arts Council (Asheville, NC), The SE Center for Photography (Greenville, SC), Rochester Contemporary Art Center (Rochester, NY), and The Asheville Art Museum.

Mitchell was the juror for Knoxville Photo at the Emporium Center in 2018 in Knoxville, TN, was a Regional Scholastic Art Judge through the Asheville Art Museum in 2011, 2013, and 2018, and juried the *Diverse Works* exhibit at the YMI Cultural Center in Asheville, NC in 2015. Her sensibility is toward images that have a lyrical quality while, at the same time, are able to capture the tension and reality of life.


Missing Pieces was inspired by the toys, specifically Legos, that Warren played with as a kid. He remembers taking the pieces apart and putting them back together to see how they worked. As an artist, it felt like a natural progression for Eli to create a body of artwork from Lego pieces because it allowed him to revisit the curiosity that fueled his imagination as a child while utilizing the skill set that made sculpture accessible to him.

The body of work included in *Missing Pieces* depicts recognizable yet unexpected scenes of Greenville, SC. By using familiar scenes of Greenville, Warren connects the importance of place to the toys that defined Page 8 - Carolina Arts, November 2023

his childhood. Warren states, "I hope the work inspires viewers to remember the sense of wonder and playfulness that we all had as kids before we had the weight of the *continued on Page 9*

world on our shoulders".

To create the work included in *Missing Pieces*, Warren worked in Blender, a 3D modeling and animation software similar to the programs used in the making of movies such as *Up* and *Toy Story*. He creates the basic structures of the buildings, referencing satellite and street view maps, then turns the structures into bricks, making each window, door, and accessory individually using a combination of modeling, sculpting, and physics simulations to give them a toy-like appearance.

Finally, Warren completes a composition using a 3D camera, adding colors and textures to each individual piece, and finishing by lighting the scene. Art & Light Gallery is a woman owned and operated fine art gallery that has been bringing incredible artistic talent to novice and seasoned collectors alike since 2007. Featuring a roster of over 50 artists, from emerging to established, we strive to create a thoughtful and special collection of work in a space that is uniquely southern and inviting. From sculpture to paintings and original works on paper, we strive to provide something for everyone looking to enhance their space and tell their one-of-akind story.

Italy, *Biennale*, where she was an award winner. Walker regularly shows in galleries across the Southeast. She has taught at Furman University where she earned her BA in studio art. She holds an MFA from the University of Georgia and studied and taught in the University's Cortona Study Abroad program in Italy. Her work appeared in *New American Paintings*, Vol. 40, 2002.

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
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Mint Museum Uptown in Charlotte Shows Works by Ajané K. Williams

The Mint Museum Uptown in Charlotte, NC, is presenting *Ajané K. Williams: Sublimations of Spacetime*, on view through Mar. 3, 2024.

Ajané K. Williams' art is out of this world. Her artist's statement reveals that she "came to Planet Earth ... to show humanity how to find their higher self and travel to the edge of infinity using the power of our own consciousness."

Naturally curious, Williams immerses herself in the unfamiliar. The self-described "space and time traveler" is a DJ (DJ Nebula), video artist, and Afrofuturist painter. She sees Afrofuturism as "a cultural aesthetic that combines African American culture with futuristic, innovative ideas."

She finds working in the genre therapeutic and her work is garnering national attention. It was part of the "Black Creativity Juried Art Exhibition" at the Chicago Science and Industry Museum.

"Every time I make something, it's healing to me as a Black woman [who suffers] from generational and karmic curses from my family lineage. Afrofuturism is healing my Black self, and – I hope – healing humanity," she says.

Williams was born in 1999 on a military base in Fort Stewart, GA, and spent her youth in Alaska, both Carolinas, Germany, Japan and Korea. After graduating with a BFA in painting from UNC Charlotte, she

moved to Columbia, SC, where she currently lives.

She's fascinated by UFOs, death, the afterlife, and reincarnation. A related belief is that "children born within your own family might be here to finish something a past family member wasn't able to complete."

Such is the case in her family. Her great grandfather, Harvey Williams, was a left-handed painter, as is she. He was a surrealist who painted gospel and jazz album covers. He couldn't afford to be an artist and support his family, so he gave up art. Williams believes she's here to fulfill his purpose. Another late relative was a DJ; Williams feels she's meant to finish his work, too. Here is a look at a day in her life.


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
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
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Southern Highland Craft Guild in Asheville, NC, Offers Final Exhibit of 2023



In the lighthearted painting "Strange Bedfellows," a door swings open to reveal an astonishing assembly of three figures from diverse backgrounds and their animal escorts. Unperturbed by the intrusion, they do not directly engage with the viewer who interrupts their private rendezvous.

The portal is open in "Walking Into the Space Between" to an imagined Asian night ritual. The meditative "Circling Consciousness" depicts brilliant abstract shapes floating in a serene white space. Their gentle movement calms, and their intricate detail invites contemplation. The same hues and intricate brushwork of "Dragon Protector" symbolize the intensity of emotional conflict. The vibrant colors of the whimsical "Catching Flight" evoke a fantasy of reaching for a magical being, personifying the fleeting moments of mystical awareness.

Drawing on her background as an educator, writer, dancer and psychotherapist, Geller's visualizations are stimulated by what matters to her in the outer world, topics of relationship, diversity, climate change and animal extinction. The paintings juxtapose people from different cultures, religious backgrounds, mythologies and races interacting with each other and spiritual beings, surfacing from the personal experience

of traveling, teaching and working with diverse populations of people.



Today our home faces unprecedented ecological challenges, demanding our attention and care. Ferreira's artworks are a laborious record of environmental crisis and a radical call for systemic changes. Each artwork stitched at great lengths of time, Ferreira harnesses the power of technology at a meticulous pace to raise a collective spirit and hand craft solutions.

"Central to my work is the employment of the most paradoxical of all materials, plastic," adds Ferreira. Curated by ceramic artist, Kirsten Stingle, In.Visible explores reimagining myths and tales to better address the climat



Hunt and Dalglish collaborate as Bandana Pottery from their studio on Conley Ridge Road, not far from Penland School of Craft. They make their work slowly handbuilding with clay slabs, carving into solid blocks of clay, or throwing on a kickwheel - using raw materials they gather in their neighborhood and refine in their home studio. They fire their pots in a large woodfired kiln. The scale of their work goes from bowls and plates to large vessels inspired by the Korean onggi tradition and multi-part compositions mounted on the wall.

Mark Hewitt described the color palette of their clay as "an earthy rainbow of brown - white brown, cream brown, pink brown, and purple brown." Many of their pieces are decorated with white kaolin slip, which they use to create marks and patterns that contrast strongly with the dark shades of the clay. All of this work is united by a strong aesthetic of form and surface treatment that is immediately recognizable as their work and their work alone.

This exhibition will present the full range of Hunt and Dalgish's ceramics not simply

Works by Michael Hunt and Naomi Dalglish as a collection of pots, but as an ongoing creative exploration.

Also on view is a smaller exhibition titled Motion Capture that presents work by ceramic artist Yael Braha and photo-based artist Bridget Conn. Braha's functional ceramics are characterized by bold surface designs based on optical illusions, patterns, and tessellations. Conn's sewn photographic collages are built from images that are made by exposing photo paper to light, resists, and traditional photographic chemistry.

Newly installed outside the gallery are two brightly-colored, billboard-sized murals based on paper collages by artist Anne Lemanski.

The Penland Gallery also includes a sales gallery with work in many media by as well as the social, economic, and political upheaval of modernity. David Abram says, "Before you can restore the land, you must re-story the land."

Here's Some Information From Wikipedia About *The Joy of Painting* TV Show And Bob Ross

Bob Ross was born in Daytona Beach, FL, to Jack and Ollie Ross, a carpenter and a waitress respectively, and raised in Orlando, FL. As an adolescent, Ross cared for injured animals, including armadillos, snakes, alligators and squirrels, one of which was later featured in several episodes of his television show. He had a half-brother Jim, whom he mentioned in passing on his show. Ross dropped out of high school in the 9th grade. While working as a carpenter with his father, he lost part of his left index finger, which did not affect his ability to later hold a palette while painting.

The Joy of Painting was aired and produced by non-commercial, public television stations. The first season aired in early 1983 and was produced by WNVC in Falls Church, VA. Starting in the second season in late 1983, the show was produced by WIPB in Muncie, IN, until its end in 1994, and later by Blue Ridge Public Television in Roanoke, VA. The show is currently being distributed by American Public Television. Reruns began syndication at PBS stations in the United States in 1992, under the moniker The Best of The Joy of Painting, featuring a collection of Bob Ross's favorite paintings from past seasons. By the early 1990s, nearly 300 episodes of The Joy of Painting were on the air in the United States on PBS and in Canada on CBC Television. The Joy of Painting later began broadcasting in different places around the world, such as Mexico, Costa Rica, Colombia, the United Kingdom, Latin America, Greece, the Netherlands, Germany, Switzerland, Austria, Turkey, Iran, South Korea, Australia, and Japan.

During Ross' 20-year Air Force career, Ross developed an interest in painting after attending an art class at the Anchorage USO club. He found himself frequently at odds with many of his painting instructors, who were more interested in abstract painting. Ross said, "They'd tell you what makes a tree, but they wouldn't tell you how to paint a tree."

Ross was working as a part-time bartender when he discovered a TV show called *The Magic of Oil Painting*, hosted by German painter Bill Alexander. Alexander used a 16th-century painting style called alla prima (Italian for 'first attempt'), widely known as "wet-on-wet", that allowed him to create a painting within thirty minutes. Ross studied and mastered the technique, began painting and then successfully sold Alaskan landscapes that he would paint on novelty gold-mining pans. Eventually, Ross's income from sales surpassed his military salary. He retired from the Air Force in 1981 as a master sergeant.

Ross returned to Florida, studied painting with Alexander, joined his "Alexander Magic Art Supplies Company" and became a traveling salesman and tutor. Annette Kowalski, who had attended one of his sessions in Clearwater, FL, convinced Ross he could succeed on his own. Ross, his wife, and Kowalski pooled their savings to create



said he did the show for free and made his income from how-to books, videotapes and art supplies.

The show ran from Jan. 11, 1983, to May 17, 1994, but reruns still continue to appear in many broadcast areas and countries, including the non-commercial digital subchannel network Create and the streaming service Hulu. In the United Kingdom, the BBC re-ran episodes during the COVID-19 pandemic while most viewers were in lockdown at home.

During each half-hour segment, Ross would instruct viewers in the quick, wet-onwet oil painting technique, painting a scene without sketching it first, but creating the image directly from his imagination, in real time. He explained his limited paint palette, deconstructing the process into simple steps.

Artist and art critic Mira Schor compared Ross to Fred Rogers, host of *Mister Rogers' Neighborhood*, noting that Ross's soft voice and the slow pace of his speech were similar.

With help from Annette and Walt Kowalski, Ross used his television show to promote a line of art supplies and class recordings, building what would become a \$15-million business – Bob Ross Inc. – which would ultimately expand to include classes taught by other artists trained in his methods. Following Ross's death, ownership of the company was passed to the Kowalskis.

Ross also filmed wildlife, squirrels in particular, usually in his garden, and he would often take in injured or abandoned squirrels and other animals. Small animals often appeared on his *Joy of Painting* canvases.

Ross painted an estimated 30,000 paintings during his lifetime. Despite the unusually high supply of original paintings, Bob Ross original paintings are scarce on the art market, with sale prices of the paintings averaging in the thousands of dollars and frequently topping \$10,000. The major auction houses have never sold any of Ross's paintings, and Bob Ross Inc. continues to own many of the ones he painted for The Joy of Painting, as Ross himself was opposed to having his work turned into financial instruments. "A Walk in the Woods," Ross's first television painting, was sold in a pledge drive offering shortly after the first season aired; it is, as of September 2023, in the hands of Ryan Nelson, a Minnesotabased art dealer who acquired it from its original buyer and has been the primary dealer for the few Ross paintings that have reached the open art market. Nelson has

his company, which struggled at first.

Ross was noted for his permed hair, which he ultimately disliked but kept after he had integrated it into the company logo.

In 1982, a station in Falls Church, VA, aired a taping of his art class as a pilot, and 60 PBS stations signed up for the show in the first year. In 1983, PBS station WIPB lured him to Muncie, IN, with the promise of creative freedom, and he found a kinship with the staff. He moved home to Florida in 1989 but continued to travel to Muncie every three months to tape the show. Ross placed an asking price of \$9,850,000 for the sale of the painting and has indicated he has other plans for the painting if it does not sell for that price.

In contrast to more traditionally famous artists, Ross's work, described by an art appraisal service as a cross between "fine art" and "entertainment memorabilia" - is most highly sought after by common fans of *The Joy of Painting*, as opposed to wealthy collectors. The artwork circulating among collectors is largely from Ross's work from before he launched the television show.

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Cameron Art Museum in Wilmington, NC, Offers New Exhibition

The Cameron Art Museum in Wilmington, NC, will present *Monument*, featuring works by artists Sonya Clark, Stephen Hayes, Alison Saar, Augustus Saint-Gaudens, and Kara Walker, on view from Nov. 10 through Mar. 31, 2024.

Monument takes inspiration from Boundless, the public sculpture on Cameron Art Museum's grounds by Stephen Hayes honoring the United States Colored Troops (USCT) and their fight for freedom. Through their work, artists Sonya Clark, Willie Cole, Stephen Hayes, Juan Logan, Alison Saar, Augustus Saint-Gaudens, Kara Walker, and others create a dialogue acknowledging, questioning, and confronting the idea of commemoration in the built environment in the United States. Exhibition includes loans from Nasher Museum of Art at Duke University, Saint-Gaudens National Historical Park and the collection of the Cameron Art Museum.

Stephen Hayes, who teaches at Duke University, has created a new work specifically for this exhibition, featuring additional casts of descendants of the USCT that he made when creating *Boundless*. Hayes, who participated in artist Kehinde Wiley's artist residency Black Rock Senegal in January, believes that artists are as much translators as they are creators, and his work often gives voice to the African American experience, through both historical interpretation and contemporary mixed-media artwork.

Dr. Sonya Clark's work, *Monumental Cloth*, explores the legacy of symbols and challenges the power of propaganda, erasures, and omissions, through the recreation of the Confederate Flag of Truce. Dr. Clark is a Professor of Art at Amherst College in Amherst, MA, and her work has been exhibited in over 350 museums and galleries in the Americas, Africa, Asia, Europe, and Australia.

rial History of the Civil War (15 prints in the portfolio) weave imagery of the antebellum South with racist stereotypes. 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NC State University in Raleigh, NC, Offers Exhibition of Inflatables

NC State University in Raleigh, NC, will present *BLOW UP II: Inflatable Contemporary Art*, on view at the Gregg Museum of Art & Design, The Historic Chancellor's Residence, from Nov. 4 through Jan. 28, 2024.

BLOW UP II: Inflatable Contemporary Art explores the medium of inflatable art with figurative, conceptual, and abstract imagery. These large-scale inflatable sculptures, conceived by nine artists and art collectives, connote fun and whimsy, are familiar yet strange, and challenge the definition of art. Here, in an unusual feat, artists use air as an active tool in their work to subvert our perspective and surprise us.

Inflatables have a long history, dating as far back as the 18th century, and were initially perceived as innovative, if not magical, objects. Today, inflatables are often associated with happy memories. Lawn inflatables, bouncy houses, and party balloons are ubiquitous at holidays and celebrations. Water wings, inflatable inner tubes, and rafts conjure thrilling vacation memories. The awe-inspiring hot air balloon challenges our feet-on-the-ground perspective, allowing us to levitate and explore the land from above like a bird.

The inflatable is also well-known for its effective marketing abilities. Who hasn't been drawn to the dancing street inflatable near the shopping center or the massive blimp with a scrolling electronic sign flying over a stadium? Plain and simple: humans are attracted to inflatables. However, what happens to our experience of large, art-filled objects – typically encountered outdoors – when we place them in an art gallery and play with their scale? The result is what you will find in *BLOW UP II*, the second iteration of Bedford Gallery's traveling inflatable exhibition.

This show's roster of artists includes: Nicole Banowetz, Sharon Engelstien, FriendsWithYou, Josh Harker, Susan Lee-Chun, Matt Ritchie, Lizbeth Rossof, Jen Stark, and Max Streicher – many of whom have never worked in the inflatable medium previously. The resulting artworks reflect various themes, including consumerism, pop culture, history, and even mortality. Some convey a surreal sensibility through oversized scale or an uncanny human connection, like Max Streicher's sculptures that appear to be living, breathing beings.

From the outset, the artworks in *BLOW UP II* appear fun and playful; however,

there is a touch of melancholy throughout the show as we are reminded that these objects live their full lifecycle every day. Once the gallery lights dim, the artworks deflate and await their resurrection the following day. There is an odd relationship with these inflatable objects as they too are dependent on air.

Another oddity is the unusual coupling of subject matter and media – for example, Josh Harker's sculpture, *Crania Geodesica*. Harker marries soft materials with a subject matter that is the opposite in reality – a hard, human skull. Through scale and medium, viewers are asked to reflect upon the fragileness and importance of the skull. Artist Lizabeth Rossof's *5 XI'AN AMERICAN WARRIORS* series subverts cultures as she translates stone and Chinese history into portable American pop culture idols.

Then there is form. What exactly is Sharon Engelstein's large, pink, billowy sculpture? Engelstein has left her creature open to interpretation. Is it friend or foe? One could say the same about Matt Ritchie's rat inflatable. Is it cute or terrifying? Does it conjure up ideas of lab testing, or do you want to cuddle with it? Perhaps the idea is to evoke a sense of compassion for the misconceived and vulnerable.

Amusement is undeniably evoked by several of the works in *BLOW UP II*. The Los Angeles-based art collective, FriendsWithYou is known for their friendly, anime-like characters that ooze happiness as they smile back at you, and Susan Lee-Chun's enormous flamingos seem ready for a ride. The instant joy that is sparked when seeing everyday objects enlarged to an aweinspiring scale allows viewers to revel in the hilarity and exuberance of these outsized and outlandish sculptures. Universal connections are built when we find familiarity in the absurd.

Holding our attention with wonderment and delight, *BLOW UP II* creates a spectacular, immersive environment that inspires deeper contemplation. By harnessing the power of air, the ideas and possibilities in art-making seem endless, and creativity takes flight.

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perhaps unearthed later. "I believe there is a lifeforce in the materials I work with," says Beerman. Embracing the life and will of his materials and combining that with his own vision for a painting leads to the landscapes for which he is so well known.

Beerman has long had a presence on the national stage, and his work can be found in the collections of some of the most prominent American institutions, including The Metropolitan Museum of Art and The Whitney Museum of American Art. Closer to home, his *Three Trees, Two Clouds* is an icon of the North Carolina Museum of Art's collection. This is John Beerman's fourth show at Craven Allen Gallery; he spent much of his career in New York, and now resides in Hillsborough, NC.

John Beerman is a landscape painter and North Carolina native and current Hillsborough resident whose work has been exhibited nationally and internationally. John received his degree from Rhode Island School of Design, and he attended the Skowhegan School of Painting and Sculpture.

His 35-year career has garnered recognition at the highest levels of fine art. He has received several awards and fellowships, including the Pollock-Krasner Foundation Award and the Yaddo Artist Colony Fellowship. His work is in the collection of numerous museums across the country, including the Metropolitan Museum of Art, New York; the Whitney Museum of American Art, New York; the Museum of Fine Arts, Houston; and the North Carolina Museum

Holiday ornaments and other decorations are an annual specialty. Painter Chris Graebner creates small scratchboard ornaments. Starting with a 2" square of clayboard she covers the clay with black ink, then scratches through the ink creating the image of an individual flower, a tulip, an orchid, a poppy, a lily, etc. Each one is different. She paints the scratched image with colored inks, scratching and inking repeatedly to achieve the desired depth and color. Then she covers the back of the ornament with gold leaf. Each ornament is different, and each is an original piece of art.

Artist Lynn Wartski creates small, felted wool ornaments of polar bears and puffins. She uses a wire armature covered with quilt

batting and colored wool which she needlefelts to achieve the desired shape and fullness. This year Wartski has some larger one-of-a-kind ornaments, including a bear on skis and a coffee drinking mouse. Lynn also has needle-felted trees in various sizes.

Furniture maker Pete Rodrigues made ornaments by cutting thin slices of hardwood with an interesting grain and filling any voids in the wood with transparent colored epoxy. He also has charcuterie boards and coasters.

Potter Evelyn Ward has created handbuilt, raku-fired bird ornaments in many sizes and colors. Jude Lobe has more southwestern themed shaman ornaments this year. As always, glassblower Pringle Teetor has made many beautiful blown-glass balls in many colors, patterns and textures. She also has her lighted fairy orbs for the second year.

In his recent paintings, South Carolina artist Joseph Kameen investigates how the search for meaning in everyday moments becomes distorted as internal thoughts are projected onto inanimate surroundings, blurring the line between reality and memory. With their strong compositions, intense interplay of colors, and theatrical effects of light and shadow, the paintings' characters, objects, and events take on a dream-like presence that is both familiar and elusive, suggesting meanings that remain slightly out of reach. His images occupy a space somewhere between the observed and the observer, achieving a subtle symbolic ambiguity and leaving room for multiple interpretations. Kameen's work has been exhibited in New York, London, and Berlin. He received his MFA in painting from Indiana University following a BFA in painting and sculpture from Boston University. 

Mint Museum Randolph, 2730 Randolph Road, Charlotte. Through Jan. 21, 2024 - "Walter Scott Lenox & American Belleek". Featuring 80 works from the Mint's permanent collection, as well as other notable public and private collections, this exhibition focuses solely on the earliest decades of American Belleek production and the role Walter Scott Lenox played in its development as an art form. Curated by Brian Gallagher, the Mint's senior curator of decorative arts, The Mint Museum is the exhibition's only venue. In 1857, McBirney and Company in the village of Belleek in County Fermanagh, Northern Ireland, began producing a new type of porcelain renowned for its light, delicately thin, ivory-colored body. Named for the town in which it was created, Belleek porcelain quickly became prized among discerning customers in the British Isles. As its popularity then spread across the Atlantic, several American ceramic manufactories in Trenton. New Jersey, sought to make their own version of Belleek. In 1882, Ott and Brewer became the first to succeed. Ongoing - "The Cole Family: A Dynasty of North Carolina Potters". From crocks, jars, and jugs to pitchers, candleholders, and vases, "turning pots" is one of the oldest and richest craft traditions in North Carolina. For more than 200 years, members of the Cole family have been potting in central North Carolina Randolph, Moore, Lee, and Montgomery counties. Six generations of Coles, and no fewer than 18 individuals, are represented in The Mint Museum's permanent collection. More than 60 highlights of their wares are included in the installation "The Cole Family: A Dynasty of North Carolina Potters". One reason for its long-term success is that making pottery has so often been a family tradition in the state. Fathers taught the art of forming, glazing, and firing clay objects to their sons, and in later generations also to daughters, who in turn taught their children, and so on through the decades. These family dynasties not only helped to keep the potting craft alive, but ensured continuity in techniques and craftsmanship, as well as introduced artistic innovations in succeeding generations. "The Cole Family: A Dynasty of North Carolina Potters" presents a visual history of "turned pots" and the family that helped turn North Carolina into one of America's centers for handmade, traditional pottery. Bridges and Levine Galleries, Ongoing - "Contemporary British Studio Ceramics: The Grainer Collection". Focused on the collection of Diane and Marc Grainer, this installation is a survey of contemoorary British studio ceramics. Comprising functional and sculptural objects made between the 1980s and today, the show features work by artists either born or residing in Great Britain, including established "contemporary classics" like Gordon Baldwin and Rupert Spira, and cuttingedge ceramicists such as Julian Stair and Kate Malone. Several recently-gifted works from the Grainers are included. Alexander, Spangler, and Harris Galleries, Ongoing - "Portals to the Past: British Ceramics 1675 - 1825". The Mint Museum's collection of eighteenth-century British pottery and porcelain is widely respected for its scope and quality. The collection numbers over 2,000 objects and includes important examples of both salt-glazed and dry-bodied stoneware from Staffordshire: tin-glazed earthenware from Bristol, Liverpool, and London; and creamcolored earthenware from Derbyshire, Staffordshire, and Yorkshire. Notable eighteenth-century porcelain factories represented include Chelsea, Bow, and Vauxhall in London, Longton Hall in Staffordshire. Worcester. Bristol. and others. Individual works in the collection are exceptional because of their rarity, craftsmanship, provenance, or as representative examples of particular types or methods of production or decoration. Ongoing - "American Glass". The nineteenth and early twentieth centuries represented a time

of extraordinary growth for the American glass industry. Such companies as Boston & Sandwich Glass Company in Sandwich, MA; Steuben Glass Works in Corning, NY; and Libbey Glass Company in Toledo, OH, began operation and soon developed notable reputations for producing fashionable wares that were coveted by many middle- and upper-class consumers. "American Glass" showcases objects by these and other American glass companies, illustrating the variety of forms and styles that prevailed during this period. Glass-manufacturing techniques will be another focus of the exhibition, with representative examples of pressed, cut, blown, and molded glass. Nearly all of the works on view are from The Mint Museum's permanent collection of glass, which is second in size only to the ceramics collection in the museum's Decorative Arts holdings. Ongoing - "Arts of Africa". The African continent is remarkable in its geographic, social, political, and cultural diversity. The exhibition, drawn from the rich holdings of the Thomas H. and Diane DeMell Jacobsen Ph.D. Foundation provides a rare opportunity to survey the history of American craftsmanship and ingenuity, seen through the iens of seating furniture. Featuring many of the most iconic designs and designers from the past two centuries, "The Art of Seating" encourages visitors to reconsider objects that are a ubiquitous and often overlooked part of our everyday lives. seeing chairs as not just functional objects, but as works of art in their own right. At the same time, the objects in the exhibition also have stories to tell about the history of our country, ranging from the contributions of immigrants to changing tastes in style and aesthetics to new innovations in technology and materials. More than forty examples of seating furniture from the Thomas H. and Diane DeMell Jacobsen Ph.D. Foundation are included in the exhibition and offer a stylistic journey from the early 1800s to the twenty-first century. Through Mar. 3, 2024 - "Ajané K. Williams: Sublimations of Spacetime". Ajané K. Williams' art is out of this world. Her artist's statement reveals that she "came to Planet Earth ... to show humanity how to find their higher self and travel to the edge of infinity using the power of our own consciousness." Naturally curious, Williams immerses herself in the unfamiliar. The self-described "space and time traveler" is a DJ (DJ Nebula), video artist, and Afrofuturist painter. She sees Afrofuturism as "a cultural aesthetic that combines African American culture with futuristic, innovative ideas." She finds working in the genre

therapeutic and her work is garnering national attention. It was part of the "Black Creativity Juried Art Exhibition" at the Chicago Science and Industry Museum. Craft + Design Galleries, Ongoing - "Craft in the Laboratory: The Science of Making Things," is the first installation in the Southeast to explore how craft artists and designers use science and math concepts when creating works of art. Presented by Müller Corporation, Craft in the Laboratory also celebrates a reinstallation of the Mint's Craft + Design Galleries - the first since 2010. Made by nationally and internationally renowned artists, the objects are organized by material and subject throughout the galleries. Now - The Mint Museum's new four-story installation "Foragers" offers a transcendent experience while celebrating the tradition of women as makers and providers. Unlike anything ever seen at The Mint Museum before, Brooklyn-based artist Summer Wheat's "Foragers" is a monumental piece of public work of art spanning 96 windows, four stories, and 3,720 square feet at Mint Museum Uptown's Robert Haywood Morrison Atrium. The myriad of vibrant panels that give the illusion of stained glass and celebrates the tradition of women as makers and providers. "Foragers" is part of a larger exhibition "In Vivid Color," which brings together four innovative contemporary artists-Wheat, Gisela Colon, Spencer Finch, and Jennifer Steinkamp-who create works celebrating the power of color and its ability to permeate the space around us. may seem like unrelated or even conflicting notions. Love is synonymous with care, compassion, and affection, while anarchy is generally accepted as an absence of authority, a state of disorder, or an ungovernable condition. These concepts, more than tangentially related, are often intertwined and even sometimes mutually dependent. Indeed, moments of disarray and frustration are intrinsic to love, while love sometimes emerges out of disorder and chaos. Drawn from the Nasher Museum's extensive historical and contemporary collections, "Love & Anarchy" demonstrates some of the ways in which these two concepts have inspired artists, visually and conceptually, over millennia. Love has been a subject in art for eternity. In antiquity, Aphrodite, goddess of beauty and love, and her offspring, Eros, repeatedly appeared in painting, sculpture, and pottery. From an ancient Greek depiction of the goddess to a 12th century sculpture of the Virgin enthroned to Marc Quinn's 21st century rendering of animal carcasses in Mother and Child, Aphrodite's image resonates across eons. Contemporary depictions of love reveal recognizable poses, gestures, or touch as in Zanele Muholi's photograph, "Katlego Mashiloane" and Nosipho Lavuta, "Ext. 2, Lakeside, Johannesburg". Gregg Museum of Art & Design, The Historic Chancellor's Residence, NC State University, located at 1903 Hillsborough Street, Raleigh. Through Apr. 13, 2024 - "Leading by Design: Celebrating 75 Years of the College of Design". NC State's School (now College) of Design became a reality in September 1948, and rapidly gained a reputation as one of the top design schools in the nation. The most progressive school of architecture and allied arts in the South, it served as a hub of modernist creativity for the entire region and greatly influenced the landscape and architecture found throughout the Triangle Area today. "Leading by Design" celebrates the design school's legacy by showcasing artworks from the Gregg Museum's permanent collection created by professors and instructors associated with it in its formative years along with an audiovisual element that marks its ongoing impact in the 21st century. Nov. 4 - Jan. 28, 2024 - "BLOW UP II: Inflatable Contemporary Art". The exhibit explores the medium of inflatable art with figurative, conceptual, and abstract imagery. These large-scale inflatable sculptures, conceived by nine artists and art collectives, connote fun and whimsy, are familiar yet strange, and challenge the definition of art. Here, in an unusual feat, artists use air as an active tool in their work to subvert our perspective and surprise us. Inflatables have a long history, dating as far back as the 18th century, and were initially perceived as innovative, if not magical, objects. Today, inflatables are often associated with happy memories. Lawn inflatables, bouncy houses, and party balloons are ubiquitous at holidays and celebrations. Water wings, inflatable inner tubes, and rafts conjure thrilling vacation memories. The awe-inspiring hot air balloon challenges our feeton-the-ground perspective, allowing us to levitate and explore the land from above like a bird. The inflatable is also well-known for its effective marketing abilities. Who hasn't been drawn to the dancing street inflatable near the shopping center or the massive blimp with a scrolling electronic sign flying over a stadium? Plain and simple: humans are attracted to inflatables. However, what happens to our experience of large, art-filled objects - typically encountered outdoors - when we place them in an art gallery and play with their scale? The result is what you will find in "BLOW UP II", the second iteration of Bedford Gallery's traveling inflatable exhibition. This show's roster of artists includes: Nicole Banowetz, Sharon Engelstien, FriendsWithYou, Josh Harker, Susan Lee-Chun, Matt Ritchie, Lizbeth Rossof, Jen Stark, and Max Streicher-many of whom have never worked in the inflatable medium previously. For many years, Gregg audiences have been treated to wide ranging but relatively short-term exhibitions that explore topics or present artists' works for a matter of months, and then get changed out and replaced by entirely new shows. While this will continue, most visitors have departed without realizing that the Gregg staff also maintains vast collections used for teaching, research, supporting student projects, and, on occasion, as source material for the exhibitions in the public galleries. The semi-permanent Selections from the Collections exhibition in the historic Residence seeks to remedy that. This new rotating installation will ensure that there will always be fascinating things to see and share at the Gregg! Historic Residence, Ongoing - One of NC State University's most historic buildings is now the permanent home of the Gregg Museum of Art & Design. From these specific qualities and others, the artworks on view exhibit surrealist tendencies and demonstrate how many contemporary artists revel - whether discreetly or not - in the movement's legacy. East Building, Level B, Photography Gallery 1 (Julian T, Baker Jr. Gallery), Through Jan. 28, 2024 - "Luis Rey Velasco". Luis Rey Velasco (b. 1969) creates evocative photographs that capture labor histories, cultural traditions, and everyday people. He came of age in the San Joaquin Valley, a region of California where the history of Latinx farm labor is intrinsic to its identity. Mexican migrant workers arrived in the 1940s due to a set of agreements between the United States and Mexico. The program ended in 1964, but immigration to the region continued. Immersed in this history, Velasco moved to North Carolina in 1999 to photograph children of migrant farm workers. Featured in this exhibition are a selection of photographs Velasco executed between 1998 and 2005, many portraying members of farm worker communities in California and North Carolina. These compelling images emphasize his longtime focus on communities, histories, and regions that are largely hidden yet integral to the American economy. Ongoing - "Break the Mold: New Takes on Traditional Art Making". The exhibit showcases contemporary artists who use traditional modes of art making and crafting to tackle timely subject matter.
