## Greenville Technical College in Greer, SC, Features Works by Janet Orselli and Ryan Roth


Greenville Technical College in Greer, SC, will present *Slippers and Wingtips*, featuring works by Janet Orselli and Ryan Roth, on view in the Benson Campus Galleries, from Jan. 10 through Feb. 4, 2022.

Slippers and Wingtips includes two exhibitions, Janet Orselli's installation Treading Lightly and Ryan Roth's Seasonal Business. Laths, shoe stretchers, roller skates quietly prance through Treading Lightly's circuitous parade installation while wingtips trample through Seasonal Business' paintings and sculptures. Though each presents different world

views they both elicit a chuckle. Orselli finds humor in the discarded bits of life rescued from trash piles and flea markets. Roth exposes humor by contrasting the tightly controlled pursuit of business success with fanciful flowers or an uninhibited snow angel or discarded power ties morphed into blooms in pots.

According to Orselli, "The feet in *Treading Lightly* represent all of human-kind attempting to do just that; trying and failing, getting up and trying again, each in their own unique and ofttimes convolut-

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
