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University of South Carolina in Columbia, SC, Features Works by Morgan Craig

The University of South Carolina in Columbia, SC, will present *Fulmination and the Final Fulfillment: Specters of Capital*, a solo exhibition by Morgan Craig, on view in the McMaster Gallery, from Jan. 13 through Feb. 17, 2022.

Craig believes that architectural structures acting as both repositories and as vehicles for memory profoundly influence culture and identity by providing a tangible framework through which facets of a society can be expressed. Consequently, he has been inspired to build a body of work dealing with how identity is influenced by the types of architectural edifices present in a given landscape.

Craig's work is not merely a method of documentation, but a sociopolitical/ socioeconomic commentary on the effects of hubris, avarice, free trade, outsourcing, deregulation, deterritorialization, neoliberalism, obsolescence, and international-finance-capital upon communities throughout the world. Within the realm of Jacques Derrida's theory of Hauntology, the paintings speak of the slow disintegration of the future, and the abysmal fragmentation

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SC, Features Works by Susan Lenz

Last Words, a solo show by Columbia, SC, fiber and installation artist Susan Lenz, opened at the Sumter County Gallery of Art, in downtown Sumter, SC, with an artist reception on the evening of Dec. 16, 2021. The exhibit runs concurrently with the *Sumter Artists' Guild Winners Show*. Both are on view through Feb. 18, 2022.

Last Words features a selection of Lenz's grave rubbing art quilts and framed photo transfers of cemetery angels. Vintage household linens, recycled materials, and artificial cemetery flowers figure prominently. This body of artwork reflects both personal and universal mortality. The exhibit is an exploration of lives' final words. It investigates the concept of remembrance and personal legacy. "As an installation, questions are posed," says Lenz. "The work asks: What are your final wishes? How do you want to be remembered? What last words will mark your

Over the past several years, Lenz traveled all over the USA and England for her source material. From pioneer graveyards in Oregon to cowboy cemeteries in Texas, she collected personal epitaphs from hand carved stones. From abbeys in Bath and London to churchyards in Eccles and Dudley, England, Lenz has made crayon *continued on Page 17*
