Buy Art for the Holidays - From December 2012

It's my annual plea to call for readers to buy art for the holidays. Many of you have heard it before - many times, but I'm giving it again to remind readers that one of the best ways to help our economy especially our local economies - is to buy art from local artists, from local galleries, from local art museum gift shops, and oth er non-profit art organizations. But, make sure the works are made by local artists.

There are many ways you can accomplish this act of giving art. The most direct is buying art at one of the many Holiday art sales taking place this month at arts councils, art groups, and art organizations Many of these facilities don't show exhibits during the month of December to give local artists an opportunity to have a sales venue. Also, many outdoor art fairs or sales will be taking place.

Buying art in a gallery provides a double hit to the economy, as it helps an artist and helps maintain the main outlet for seeing and buying art in the Carolinas and around the world. Not every community has an art museum

You can also give someone an art class, an art book or some art supplies or you can make a donation to an arts organization.

There are so many ways to give art for the Holidays - just use your imagination. Why, you could buy an ad in a regional arts newspaper for an artist or art group.

Buying Art - From December 2016

Most art will not need batteries. Most art will not wear out from over-viewing. The recipient will get to enjoy your gift year after year, and year after year they will think about how wonderful a gift you have given them. And, best of all, most art comes with no assembly necessary.

OK, art can be a little pricey as a gift, but just like the economic status of our readers, good art comes in all sizes. For the price conscious, fine art crafts can offer the most bang for the buck. Reproduction prints of original works of art also come in a wide range of prices, but don't forget that fine art prints that have been handpulled by the artist and come in smaller editions can be had for about the same price as some reproduction prints. Myself, I'd always rather have an image that only a handful of people share with me vs. thousands, and having an original is even better.

Now, if you're in the category of having to find that special gift for a special person - maybe even yourself, I've got a secret I'm willing to let out of the bag. Some artists and galleries will let you make payments on artworks with a weightier price tag. It doesn't hurt to ask.

For those of you who fit into the category of, "price is no consideration", what better way to make an incredible ion than with a monster piece of art - something that can give the folks at DeBeers a run for their money. Believe me, you will make an impression on the recipient and the artist. You could become an art patron overnight.

No matter what your price range, there is art out there which can fit any taste and any price range. And, you're lucky to be in the Carolinas, as there are plenty of talented artists out there working for you.

And, one last thought - if you can make your special purchase from one of the advertisers found in this publication - it would be a lot better for me and you. After all, they have been paying for this for years. Show them your appreciation.

But, whatever you do - buy local art.

mixed media paintings that depict her nostalgia for the objects and memories of her youth in Colombia, South America. Her colorful and intuitive paintings utilize acrylic paint, collage, stencils, and various textures that draw the viewer into a whimsical story of her past. Corrigan Gallery LLC in Charleston, SC, will present Abstracted Figures. featuring a solo show of works by Ann Igoe, from Dec. 3 - 31, 2021. A reception will be held on Dec. 5, from 5-8pm. Masks are requested unless in the back garden.

The show will be comprised of monotypes in black and white for the most part. These works are interpretations of dancers in motion.

Igoe is a dancer trained in dance, painting, dance therapy, philosophy, religion, printmaking, sculpture, English and history. She studied with Martha Graham and Jose Limon. She has worked for many years with a combination of movement, marks, and words.

Igoe states that, "Movement is the basic unit. All is movement. The swirling atoms that make up everything are held together by movement. Movement when consistent, creates a rhythm. The rhythm of the movement makes the combination that forms the creation. It determines the shape of things and reveals the phenomena of our known world. In art, movement is refined into gestures. From gesture comes symbol, word, and image.

Igoe strives to capture the moment of conception when the great rush of an idea reaches you physically before the intellectual interpretation begins.

This multitalented, multidisciplined artist (and teacher) expresses that, "there is within each of us the raw material for all of our activities. It informs our everyday lives and provides the impetus for our creative work. This raw material is the force of our emotions actually moving through our physical bodies. Today we have become so intellectual and so dependent upon the word that we neglect the innate wisdom of the body.'

"Everything that we do is based on emotional feelings experienced by the body," adds Igoe. "Call these feelings physical sensations or spiritual experiences or call them the spirit itself moving through the body. It is this movement that is the source of all creation, even the creation of thoughts and the creation of words."

Igoe has frozen moments of movement in the works presented in this show. The energy of dance movements melded with the energy of the gestures

creating the marks gives platform to pure reactions without words and intel lect crowding the experience.

Solo shows of Igoe's works have been mounted in the past at the Gibbes Museum of Art, Faulkner Art Gallery in California, Santa Barbara Artist Guild, Spirit Square in North Carolina as well as Leighton Gallery in Maine, Coker College, Montecito Library, The Art Gallery of the Great Mother Conference in Maine and the former Nancy's Gallerv in Charleston. Her work has also been seen in a variety of group shows from Charleston to Maine, to California and from Greenville to Italy.

Kevin Grogan, director of the Morris Museum in Augusta, GA, gives tribute to Rice's unique vision: "Though his work is rooted in specific place and time, there are, it seems to me, two telling differences between him and many of his fellow Southern artists.

"First, there is no reluctance to view the particular part of this world into which he was born with any sense of ironic detachment.... Though he has traveled widely, by choice he has lived and worked in the Augusta area for all of his life. He is deeply, abidingly devoted to what he does and the place where he does it."

"Second, he is, personally and professionally, devoid of cynicism. His earnestness is his shield. It should be noted that his artistic interests go well beyond preservationist's ambition to memorialize structures for their own sake. While it would be an exaggeration to suggest that the buildings he paints are haunted, they are certainly evocative and redolent of heavy use. He is not just a recorder, but a seeker of wisdom and truth, whose continuing attempt to reduce the vernacular structures to their most essential formal elements achieves a higher feeling through a kind of studied minimalism. Rice achieved his reputation as a realistic painter who sought to capture the romanticism of the region's vernacular architecture in meticulously rendered paintings of the region's older structures and others



Work by Edward Rice found along the border of Georgia South Carolina. Often painted on site, these works resulted from a slow, precise and complex process through which he conveyed a vivid sense of place, season, and time."

Rice states: "My paintings are experiments in what can be done within the confines of architectural depiction. My goal is to create paintings worthy of the name: Painting.'

Rice has been exhibiting his works at Hampton III Gallery for 30 years.

This new display traces the history and art of South Carolina made quilts. Featuring pieces from the museum's collection, the exhibition highlights both the objects and their makers for an in-depth look at the quilt making process and how it relates to cultural traditions throughout South Carolina history to the modern day.

South Carolina and taught cosmetology for 35 years. I always wanted to learn to paint," professed Linda Childers, who found her second career as an artist. "Painting gives me a challenge to create and use color theory. No picture is ever the same, so I am constantly learning." Childers and most of the current students chose subjects dear to them, and they explored landscapes. Her acrylic of pet Blackberry, whose eyes define the word expressive, confirms there was a hidden talent all along.

"Everywhere I went, I would look at scenes or things and say I would love to paint that. So, in 2008, I started to attend Campbell Frost's art classes and loved it," explained Betty Lokey Furtick. During her 13 years of painting classes with Frost, Furtick has captured nature's bucolic habitats in both oil and acrylic. However, it's the cow Moo, in acrylic, decked out in bright happy colors that goes to the heart of Furtick's optimistic outlook on life.

Judy Bozard wanted to paint from the time she was a child and, for the past 20 years, has been a student of Frost. She has honed her skills both in portraits and landscapes, at home with both. An early piece, when she was still using watercolors, holds precious memories of her grandson. In First Time Piano Player, Bozard captured his first sight of a piano. Fingers are eager to touch the keys, his face fascinated by the sounds he is creating.

Lynn Joy Button's, The Return of

the King Yahshua, in acrylic, illustrates Christ, adorned with crown and robe, descending from the clouds on horseback, an original interpretation of the Second Coming. Button devoted 43 years of her life ministering as a registered nurse, then discovered a talent she did not know she possessed. Her landscapes of mountain panoramas and coastal vistas are concentrated, penetrating scenes.

Linda Bates has taken only two classes with Frost and is eager to continue. Her first work, an untitled still life in watercolor, a vase filled with flowers and complimentary greenery, is a delicate blend of subtle colors, harmoniously blending with the vase and the background.

In Shrimp Boat, an acrylic by Stan Busch, the vessel nestles beyond a mossdraped live oak on still marsh waters. The eye travels from the moss to the docked boat to an idyllic view of the low country. Busch's twin brother is a pen and ink artist; however, it was ten years ago before he tried his hand. "The more you develop your skills, the more you love to test your limits. It takes time, patience, desire and practice, practice, and more practice. Art helps you see the world and gets you to focus on the details. Wished I had started sooner in life," confesses the Columbia resident

a youth in her home country, India. After retiring from a career in higher education, Londhe began taking classes with Frost, who encouraged her to "pursue her cherished hobby of painting." She would go on to win several local and regional awards due to the training she received. In Pasture In The Morning, acrylic, Londhe uses her palette knife to create a blurry plethora of wildflowers and moves beyond to a broad flat green field, coupling a simple hut and twin bushy-leafed trees in front of a rich blue sky, merging into a rainbow-colored firmament.

Suzanne Graham was also exposed to art at an early age. Still, she admitted "my journey and passion for art began in March of 2012, with a how-to-draw book. Next step was classes with Frost and watercolors with artist Margaret Hoybach." Her aptitude, skills and mastery of themes are evident in the seven pieces being shown in the exhibition. However, Going Home, in oil, may capture all her abilities. The receding elderly male figure, one hand holding a walking stick, wearing hat, shirt, trousers and suspenders, so familiar, is on a solo journey. Home, left up to interpretation, is utopian. The sapphire sky descends from the left into a golden light, inviting, glowing to the right. The surface upon which the old man walks could be grayish, smooth cobblestones or mystic pebbles on a silvery path descending towards the golden light.

Art Education was the career chosen by Jo Wyrosdick. Receiving a Bachelor of Arts degree from Limestone College, she taught for several years in schools districts in the Midlands and the Low Country before retiring. During her years as an educator, Wyrosdick used her summer holidays to travel the world. "My life experiences and travels in countries such as Madagascar, England and France have inspired and impacted my creative development."

In From Madagascar, in oil, Wyrosdick's use of hues captures a silent rhythm in the female figure walking towards a rectangular Madagascar building; conjuring grace even as she carries a large load against her hip and upon her head.

Campbell Frost, who began offering classes at the Orangeburg County Council on Aging over 40 years ago, has managed to inspire countless numbers of seniors pursuing long-held dreams, while also establishing himself as a notable landscape artist. Frost says he realized colors fascinated him at an early age. "As a child, I loved to paint. Color was magic. My next-door neighbor, I watched how she mixed colors. I never forgot that. It just made me feel good that I could do

Inspired by her study of mosaic art in Ravenna and other sites in Italy, Kozachek was co-founder and the first president of the Society of American Mosaic Artists. She wrote for and assisted with editing the society's quarterly publication, Groutline, and co-authored the catalogue for the first national exhibition of mosaics in the United States. She also wrote for *Evening* Reader Magazine, publishing essays on art and social issues. Her series of the one hundred and thirteen small, square figurative paintings became the basis for Moments in Light and Shadow (currently in manuscript). Selected poems from Moments in Light and Shadow have been

published in Undefined and Ekphrasis.

The "Phenoumena and Earthwork" series will be on view through Jan. 31, 2022.

Greig Leach offered the following Artist Statement: "Each of us have had to discover ways to process the previous year and how it has affected each of our lives. This exhibition presents how as an artist I was left to work through the emotions, turmoil and isolation of 2020. All of my artwork addresses the world around me as I see it, experience and hold it in my mind's eye. By presenting the truth of my experiences, I hope to find the commonality in all of our realities. I am left to show what I see, with that seeing presenting questions we need to ask of ourselves. 2020 brought those questions and differing personal experiences to a sometimes violent head. For others, it left us feeling alone, isolated or confused."

"I have used different media as a methd of underscoring the different experiences that each of us have had. Our facts have been questioned, and our truths have been challenged, leaving us to give voice (or in my case image) to what we see shifting around us," adds Leach. "I have used stained glass to elevate individuals to the level of icons to the events of 2020 particularly focusing on those who have risked their lives to help us keep ours and on those who have fought for the change to have their lives valued by our society. Using stained glass gives these five people the gravitas of venerated saints that can be seen to show us a way to a more perfect life.'

"Other moments of the past year were more immediate and fluid so I chose the media of ink and wash with a scale that underscores just how quick some things were changing. The third facet of this exhibition are the large scale Shiva Paintstik works. These paintings build through the course of 2020, some spilling into 2021 much as COVID-19 and civil unrest had done the same. time in the garden as going to work a regular job is no longer a daily activity. They move through COVID-19 scares and into Shut Down protests that quickly bloomed into Black Lives Matter protests."

"While I have entitled this exhibition 20/20 clearly the things we have faced are not over, nor can they be contained within a single calendar year. And that is the point of the final two paintings in s body of work. First, 'An Analogus Metaphor' looks to our need to rebuild both figuratively and literally, and that we need to do that together despite race or nationality. Secondly, 'I Didn't Know' is my confessional that I, and therefore we, need to look hard at our position in society and to question whether we are enjoying privilege we have not earned, or treatment that is not given to others."

"The artwork in this exhibition grew out of a need to hold a visual mirror up to what was happening around me. While I can not divorce myself from what I paint, I did not set out to create an annual of a tumultuous year (how could I know in January, 2020 what lay in store?). But as I worked in the studio painting what I was seeing and experiencing, I began to see that these artworks were different and more unified than most of my work over a similar time period. So the artworks reveal the story that is being told and not the other way around.'

Cameron Art Museum in Wilmington, NC, Features Works by Stephen Hayes

The Cameron Art Museum in Wilming ton, NC, will present Stephen Hayes: Voices of Future's Past, on view from Nov. 13 through Mar. 20, 2022

Born in Durham, NC, Hayes is the 2020 recipient of the 1858 Contemporary Southern Art Prize. He is a creator who works with a variety of mediums - sculpture, casting, knitting, woodcuts, video, and audio - to explore issues of race and economics in the United States. The installation, Cash *Crop* features 15 life-size concrete statues chained to a pallet, representing the 15 million people who were transported as slaves from Africa to America.

Voices of Future's Past explores the legacy of growing up black in America. The works invite the viewer to participate, bringing a new depth to the experience of viewing art. In the Cash Crop installation, viewers walk between the figures, stepping over iron chains, connecting with the human experience of the atrocity of the transatlantic slave trade. Voices of Future's Past allows visitors to listen to the voices of young black men describing their experiences while looking at the face of an adult.

Hayes writes, "Like the works of contemporary American artist such as Willie Cole or Radcliffe Bailey, my work centers around finding beauty and understanding between myself, as a black male artist, and the nature of the object. My work fuses the past and the present, generally based on sociocultural and economic themes, highlighting American history as it relates to race, identity, and stereotypes in the areas of capitalism, commodification of beings, and the subsequent effects of cultural representation."

The last decade has been one of the most politically divisive in recent memory. The rise of cable television and the twenty-four-hour news cycle in the 1980s, followed by the ubiquitous spread of information (and misinformation) online and through social media in the subsequent decades, has led to a fevered pitch of political rhetoric in recent years. Philadelphia, PA-based artist Jen Small's works are abstract in appearance but actually record a journey of a day in the life -a practice that starts with documentation through the lens of a camera. Her eyes act as a viewfinder narrowing down the panoramic into single frames. Compiled snapshots represent blocks of time during her process of seeing and recording aesthetic significance in ordinary routine. She sees curious formal elements in common things waiting to be manipulated and transformed into abstract compositions. She collages together the single framed images, simplifies and renders them in paint to create the lines, shapes, and hues that fill the canvas. Abstracted layers build shallow spaces that depict her translation of the everyday

critique. Image & Ideology demonstrates the unambiguous ways in which imagery often symbolizes or represents political ideas. Text & Subtext includes works hat employ language, often paired with images, to further comment on power dynamics. The Body Politic explores the incorporation of the body to confront, resist, and reverse long-standing abusive authority, implicit and explicit bias, and violent, corporeal aggression. In doing so, artists use the body as a site of immense political consequence and a potential agent of change.

Over the last several years and despite greater public scrutiny of inequitable policies, individual liberties remain vulnerable to restrictive and harmful legislation. Artists play a vital role in exposing and confronting these oppressive practices. Including work by artists throughout the globe, In Relation to Power offers a glimpse into artistic gestures that encourage reflection on aspects of power, the nature of authority and authoritarian practices, and the ongoing struggle for political agency.

Mel Chin and Boris Orlov comment on the destructive forces of imperialism with imagery that takes the form of militaristic symbols. May Stevens turns a similarly critical eye toward white male patriarchy in Big Daddy, Paper Doll. Dimitri Baltermants and Anatoli Glinov glorify labor and prosperity in support of Soviet values. Mexican printmaker Reynaldo Olivares adopts an equally propagandistic message in his prints of Socialism architects Karl Marx, Friedrich Engels, and Vladimir Lenin, and the Mexican revolutionary Emilio Zapata. The juxtaposition of two very different renderings of George Washington by Mose Tolliver and Jacques Reich allows for a critical reconsideration of a figure who has become emblematic of democratic values. Collectively, these works underscore how images can reinorce, critique, or comment on ideological beliefs.

Visual artists often incorporate language and text into their work. Invariably, is text has both an explicit meaning an implicit meaning, or subtext. Artists in this gallery below, creatively leverage the power of subtext in a variety of ways to provide critical commentary, additional insight, or simply reinforce their explicit messages.

Language and text are central to the practice of Edgar Heap of Birds, who incorporates three-word phrases in his "wall lyrics" to convey both dire and hopeful messages about Indigenous identity. Sherman Fleming uses images that represent words, syllables, or phrases in his rebus paintings to create puzzles that call out harmful racial stereotypes. For decades, the Guerilla Girls have incorporated the language and graphics of the advertising industry that boldly confront gender and racial inequities. Artists such as Wendy Red Star, Jaune Quick-to-See Smith, and Alexander Kosolapov combine humorous phrases, commercial product names, and corporate logos, with charged imagery to

disarm the viewer and draw attention to issues of Native American identity, sovereignty, and imperialism.

The term "body politic" refers to a political entity such as a country, city or state, or group of people, often represented as a metaphorical human body. In this exhibition, "body politic" is a double entendre, referring simultaneously to the artists and their political interests as well as the ways in which they incorporate the body into their work.

For artists such as Zanele Muholi, Renee Cox, Genevieve Gaignard, and others, self-portraits serve as a locus for protest, empowerment, and liberation. In works by Ai Wei Wei and Gary Simmons, the absence of a body is used to draw attention to issues of cultural authority and the ways in which educational systems may perpetuate inequities, respectively. Nina Chanel Abney, Alex Bradley Cohen, Kara Walker, and others present Black bodies subjected to racialized violence, while Barbara Chase-Riboud and Peter Williams pay homage to two cultural figures known for protesting anti-Black violence: civil rights leader Malcolm X, rendered as an abstract sculpture, and activist-athlete Colin Kaepernick, surrounded by a halo of aspirational words. Together, the works in this gallery, below, remind us of the physical body's political power and poignancy.

Small enough to fit in the palm of the hand, these tiny portraits were treasured remembrances of loved ones in the age before photography. Presented in state-of-the-art display cases, and in viewable storage drawers featured miniatures include works by Mary Roberts, Jeremiah Theus, Henry Benbridge, Charles Wilson Peale, Pierre Henri, Edward Greene Malbone, George Engleheart, and Charles Fraser. Gallery 6, Permanent Exhibition - "20th Century American Regionalism and the Charleston Renaissance" At the turn of the twentieth century, American artists looked to their European counterparts and beyond as they developed identifiably American artistic movements. Two particularly strong influences during this time period were French Impressionism and Japanese woodblock prints Another prevailing theme during this period was the growing interest in American subject matter. American regionalism and social realism played important roles in the development of an in Charleston, which flourished as a destination for artists, particularly during the years of 1915 to 1945 a period now known as the Charleston Renaissance. Gallery 7, Permanent Exhibition - "Modern and Contemporary". Modern and contemporary art in America encompasses a wide range of styles, subject matter, and media. As a whole, the diversity of modern and contemporary art reflects the rich and varied heritage of our nation and the lowcountry region. Works in this gallery were created over the past forty years by artists who are native to the area, who have worked here, or who have created objects that reflect the complex story of the region. The works are grouped to reflect several themes including the southern landscape, the human figure, abstraction, and the legacy of slavery in America. Gibbes Visiting Artist Studios, Session IV, Through Dec. 5 - Daisy McClellan. McClellan. who moved to Charleston in 2020, launched a full-fledged jewelry-making business that took her on tour around the country selling her designs at various boutiques and maker markets. In 2014, she and her husband opened a brick-and-mortar retail shop in San Francisco where they featured over 200 artists and hosted creative workshops. In addition, she designed a clothing collection for

In 2003, she started sewing original apparel pieces and printing her illustrations on them, founding Jennythreads Studio, by which she has since made an independent, creative living. In 2013, her comprehensive how-to manual, "Printing on Fabric: Techniques with Screens, Stencils, Inks and Dyes" was published by Lark Crafts. Renee, Ce Scott-Fitts, Isaac Udogwu, Cedric Umoja, Sabrina White, and Thomas the Younger. Through Jan. 9, 2022 - "Michael Kenna: Venezia". Taken over 20 years, this photographic series is a moody valentine to one of the most miraculous cities on Earth. Venice (Venezia in Italian) is a floating world that sits at the crossroads of the East and West. While there are millions of travel photographs of Venice in existence, artist photographer Michael Kenna infuses his with distinct magic. Prowling the city while it sleeps, he shoots in black and white. In the late 1940s, he moved to New York City where he designed an exclusive line of ladies' handkerchiefs for the department store B. Altman, now considered vintage collectible items. He also became associated with the American Artist Group designing Christmas cards, an occupation which he kept up throughout the majority of his artistic career. Krisel was a distinguished artist, architect, and teacher as well as a loving father and husband. Though Krisel may not be a household name among Spartanburg residents, he has made a significant artistic contribution to the Spartanburg community. Born in Brooklyn, NY in 1920 Krisel's interest in art and design started at a young age. He attended the American Artist School in New York city as a teenager where he met renowned modern artists, including Piet Mondrian, who greatly influenced his

abstract style. After studying architecture at the New Bauhaus in Chicago from 1946-1949, he received his graduate degree from Illinois Institute of Technology in 1952. The following year, he began working for architectural firm Skidmore, Owings and Merrill when Roger Milliken hired them to design Milliken's new research facility in Spartanburg. Upon realizing Krisel was also a sculptor, Milliken hired him to design the spray fountain outside of the facility which functions as a recycler of air conditioning water. Organized by the Asheville Art Museum from the Museum's Collection and curated by Hilary Schroeder, assistant curator. The common idiom "it takes two to tango" is immediately called into question in both the imagery and words of the Tango portfolio. The portfolio is an expression of artist Nancy Graves (Pittsfield, MA 1939–1995 New York, NY) writer Pedro Cuperman's (1936-2016 Buenos Aires, Argentina) meditations on the dance. Their imagery and words become paired in an illustrated book though their explorations take different formats and directions. Appleby Foundation Exhibition Hall, Through Mar. 14, 2022 - "Ruminations on Memory," contends with the act of remembrance and reflection, featuring a rare presentation of all nine prints from Robert Rauschenberg's "Ruminations" portfolio, Judy Chicago's "Retrospective in a Box" portfolio. and selections from the Museum's Collection. Organized by the Asheville Art Museum and curated by Hilary Schroeder, assistant curator. Artworks are vessels for processing, recalling, and reflecting on the past. Artists often draw upon materials from their own pasts and grasp at fleeting moments in time in the creation of an object. For the viewer, observation of an artwork can draw out personal memories. Through Mar. 14, 2022 - "A Living Language: Cherokee Syllabary and Contemporary Art," features over 50 works of art in a variety of media by 30+ Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians (EBCI) and Cherokee Nation artists. Lawrence Kocher, Albert Lanier, Jo Sandman, Mim Sihvonen, Robert Turner, Gerald Van de Wiele, and more. **Debra** McClinton Gallery, Through Jan. 17, 2022 -"Walter B. Stephen Pottery: Cameo to Crystalline," features art pottery and functional vessels from each stage of Stephen's career, from his origins discovering the medium alongside his mother Nellie C. Randall Stephen in Shelby County, TN, from 1901 through 1910 to his multi-decade production just outside of Asheville Artist Walter B. Stephen (Clinton, IA 1875–1961 Asheville, NC) contributed to Western North Carolina's identity as a flourishing site for pottery production and craftsmanship in the early 20th century. In 1926, Stephen founded his third and last pottery studio, Pisgah Forest, in Arden, NC, which he operated until his death in 1961. It was at this studio that the artist perfected the "cameo' decoration technique for which he became best known. His hand-painted images, achieved with layers of white translucent clay, often feature American folk imagery, from covered wagons and livestock to cabins and spinning wheels. Ongoing - The Asheville Art Museum, the hub for 20th- and 21st-century American art in Western North Carolina, has re-opened to the public. The \$24+ million, state-of-the-art facility encompasses 54,000 square feet and adds 70 percent more Collection gallery space. Far greater than just the physical similarities, both species have large brains capable of exhibiting great intelligence as well as an incredible emotional range. Chimpanzees form tight social bonds, especially between mothers and children, create tools to assist with eating and express joy by hugging and kissing one another. Over 1,000,000 chimpanzees roamed the tropical rain forests of Africa just a century ago. Now listed as endangered. less than 300,000 exist in the wild because of poaching, the illegal pet trade and habitat loss due to human encroachment. Often, chimpanzees are killed, leaving orphans that are traded and sold around the world. In the case of chimpanzees and other great apes, research has shown that certain individuals respond to color and enjoy painting as a type of enrichment. Like human artists, each chimpanzee has a unique reaction and approach to their canvas. While most chimpanzees enjoy using their hands and feet, occasionally even their lips, some have even learned how to use a paintbrush. This is the fourth in the Ackland's series of long-term installations with works from the distinguished collection of Rhonda Morgan Wilkerson PhD. "The Shadow We Create". The exhibition raises questions about societal prescriptions, race, servitude, fear, and the consequences of not speaking through compelling works by artists Mary Bowron, Willie Cole, and Jan-Ru Wan. The exhibition is named after Jan-Ru Wan's stunning work "The Noise We Make" and "The Shadow We Create", an assemblage of hundreds of rusted bells rendered silent by immersion in wax. "The Beauties", Willie Cole's full-scale prints are pulled from blackened crushed and hammered ironing boards. With titles including "Bessie", "Carolina", "Jonny Mae" and "Jane", each print is named for a woman in Cole's family. Simultaneously they reference servitude, beauty, oppression, and darkened holds of slave ships. "Shadow" features a haunting installation of "Silent Witness", a series by Mary Bowron populated by androgynous pit-fired ceramic heads. Some are smothered in thick wax, others branded with soot from the fire of their birth, with all featureless where a mouth once was, or may still be. "Shadow" addresses fear of speaking the truth amidst racial, social, political and economic unease. This exhibition asks the viewer to contemplate ways in which silence is forced and silence is broken. Through Jan. 31, 2022 - "Pinkie's Memories," a new exhibition from North Carolina artist Pinkie Strother. Strother re-creates her childhood memories of growing up the fourth of nine siblings in rural Maryland in the 1950s and 1960s through mixed media dioramas. These miniature buildings and rooms on a 1 inch scale offer a connection to the past through the recreation of the houses, churches, schools, and libraries of Pinkie's memories. Strother received formal training in art from Bowie State University where she studied to become a teacher and a MFA from the Maryland Institute College of Art. While the trip was not possible, the main requirement for acquisitions remained the same since the founding of the program in 1962: to purchase art that reflects the times in which it was made.
