North Carolina Museum of Art in Raleigh, NC, Offers Exhibit Geared Toward People's Senses

The North Carolina Museum of Art (NCMA) in Raleigh, NC, will open the free exhibition PARTICIPATE: Activate the Senses on Dec. 18, 2021, in the Museum's East Building. Running through July 3, 2022, the exhibition encourages visitors to interact with art through a variety of experiences tailored to the senses.

Using their own sense of sight, sound, touch, and even smell, visitors can engage with select works of art. Participants can experience the whistle of an ancient vessel, the feeling of the beadwork on

a ceremonial belt, and even the scent of the food featured in a still-life painting. PARTICIPATE displays objects from five Museum collections, including Ancient American, African, American, Contemporary, and European.

"PARTICIPATE brings these works of art to life in a new way," said Felicia Ingram, manager of interpretation, accessibility, and diversity.

"The exhibition encourages visitors to engage with and experience art in ways

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they may never have before," said Valerie Hillings, Museum director.

The exhibition also offers a more accessible experience for visitors. Tactile stations, including a digital-touch painting, a touchable replica of a painting featuring all the brushstrokes, and texture and touch-activated audio descriptions, assist individuals who are blind or have low vision. Wall labels feature larger, more legible typefaces to aid visitors with low vision. All videos and digital content contain captioning for those who are deaf or hard of hearing. Sensory stations are at a height that benefits wheelchair users. In addition to physical accessibility tools, the Museum offers captioned American Sign Language and audio tours. Both are available on the Museum website and in

the gallery by scanning a QR code.

The North Carolina Museum of Art's permanent collection spans more than 5,000 years, from antiquity to the present, making the institution one of the premier art museums in the South. The Museum's collection provides educational, aesthetic, intellectual, and cultural experiences for the citizens of North Carolina and beyond. The 164-acre Museum Park showcases the connection between art and nature through site-specific works of environmental art. The Museum offers changing special exhibitions, classes, lectures, family activities, films, and concerts.
