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Louise B. Tannenbaum and Louise D. and Herbert S. Falk, Sr. Galleries, and The Gregory D. Ivy and the Weatherspoon Guild Galleries, Through Dec. 4 - "Seven Masters: 20th-Century Japanese Woodblock Prints". Early in the 20th century, during Japan's rapid Westernization and industrialization, a desire to revive the great Japanese tradition of woodblock prints (known as ukiyo-e) in the context of Japan's dynamic, modern life gave rise to an art movement known as shin hanga or the "new print." Around 1915, a small group of artists began mingling the old with the new, creating beautiful, enticing pictures reproduced as prints of almost unsurpassed guality. "Seven Masters: 20th-Century Japanese Woodblock Prints" focuses on the seven artists who played a significant role in the development of the shin hanga print and whose works boldly exemplify this new movement: Hashiguchi Goyō, Kawase Hasui, Yamamura Kōka, Torii Kotondo, Itō Shinsui, Yamakawa Shūhō, and Natori Shunsen. Gallery 6, Through Dec. 11 - "Splinters of a Secret Sky Angela Fraleigh: Falk Visiting Artist". In Angela Fraleigh's dynamic paintings, female subjects culled from art history become active protagonists in newly imagined spaces. In their original contexts, these figures were largely painted as docile objects for the male gaze. Fraleigh, however, reimagines them in dreamlike scenes where they exist for one another instead. They converse, engage, and share-they acknowledge the eyes upon them, look back at the viewer, and then return to one another. While mining art history broadly, Fraleigh also digs deep into particular stories-often drawing inspiration from specific museum collections. For her Weatherspoon exhibition, she turns to the legacy of Claribel and Etta Cone—the formidable sisters whose transformative gift of artworks helped establish the Museum's collection. 1st Floor: Weatherspoon Atrium Mural, Ongoing - "Pause and Breathe, We Got This," a mural by Sheena Rose. A homecoming is in the works. The Weatherspoon is excited to announce its commission of a major new artwork by artist Sheena Rose, MFA '16. A multidisciplinary artist working in animation, drawing, painting, and performance, Rose's vibrant and energetic work is at once anchored in her Caribbean heritage and expansive in its explorations of culture and human experience. Greenville Museum of Art, 802 South Evans Street, Greenville. The Francis Speight and Sarah Blakeslee Gallery, Ongoing - Is dedicated to the work of these two artists. Speight was born in Bertie County, North Carolina, and moved back to Greenville to teach at East Carolina University after spending a majority of his career at the Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts. Blakeslee was born in Illinois and met Speight at the Academy as a student. The couple lived outside of Philadelphia until moving to Greenville in 1961. The Kenneth Noland Gallery, Ongoing - Celebrates the art and legacy of Black Mountain College, an innovative liberal arts college that operated between 1933 and 1957. Kenneth Noland, born in Asheville in 1924, attended Black Mountain College on the G. I. Bill from 1946 to 1948. He studied under Josef Albers and Ilya Bolotowsky, who introduced him to the work of artists interested in geometry and color. The Rachel Maxwell Moore Art Foundation Gallery, Ongoing - Features rotating works purchased for the Museum by the foundation. Rachel Maxwell Moore was a leading civic figure and arts advocate in Greenville. and was central to the founding of the Museum's predecessor in 1939. She established the Rachel Maxwell Moore Art Foundation in 1963, and before she passed away in 1964, bequeathed funds to the foundation for the sole purpose of purchasing works of art for the Museum's permanent collection. Ongoing -GMoA has a strong collection of North Carolina pottery, and especially from Jugtown Pottery in Seagrove, North Carolina. Jugtown Pottery was opened by Jacques and Juliana Busbee in 1921.

They were influential at Jugtown and elsewhere in Seagrove by introducing local North Carolina potters to international ceramic styles and glazes. Much of our pottery collection was given to the Museum by Mrs. Lindsay Savage in 1948 and Dr. James H. Stewart in the 1980s. Admission: Free. Hours: Tue.-Sat., 10-4:30pm. Using her innate flair for abstract design, Susana Allen Hunter (1912-2005) created hundreds of colorful improvisational quilts throughout her lifetime.
