Corrigan Gallery LLC in Charleston, SC, Features Works by Ann Igoe

Corrigan Gallery LLC in Charleston, SC, will present *Abstracted Figures*, featuring a solo show of works by Ann Igoe, from Dec. 3 - 31, 2021. A reception will be held on Dec. 5, from 5-8pm. Masks are requested unless in the back garden.

The show will be comprised of monotypes in black and white for the most part. These works are interpretations of dancers in motion.

Igoe is a dancer trained in dance, painting, dance therapy, philosophy, religion, printmaking, sculpture, English and history. She studied with Martha Graham and Jose Limon. She has worked for many years with a combination of movement, marks, and words.

Igoe states that, "Movement is the basic unit. All is movement. The swirling atoms that make up everything are held together by movement. Movement when consistent, creates a rhythm. The rhythm of the movement makes the combination that forms the creation. It determines the shape of things and reveals the phenomena of our known world. In art, movement is refined into gestures. From gesture comes symbol, word, and image."

Igoe strives to capture the moment of conception when the great rush of an idea reaches you physically before the intellectual interpretation begins.

This multitalented, multidisciplined artist (and teacher) expresses that, "there is within each of us the raw material for all of our activities. It informs our everyday lives and provides the impetus for our creative work. This raw material is the force of our emotions actually moving through our physical bodies. Today we have become so intellectual and so dependent upon the word that we neglect the innate wisdom of the body."

"Everything that we do is based on emotional feelings experienced by the body," adds Igoe. "Call these feelings physical sensations or spiritual experiences or call them the spirit itself moving through the body. It is this movement that is the source of all creation, even the creation of thoughts and the creation of words."

Igoe has frozen moments of movement in the works presented in this show. The energy of dance movements melded with the energy of the gestures

creating the marks gives platform to pure reactions without words and intellect crowding the experience.

Solo shows of Igoe's works have been mounted in the past at the Gibbes Museum of Art, Faulkner Art Gallery in California, Santa Barbara Artist Guild, Spirit Square in North Carolina as well as Leighton Gallery in Maine, Coker College, Montecito Library, The Art Gallery of the Great Mother Conference in Maine and the former Nancy's Gallery in Charleston. Her work has also been seen in a variety of group shows from Charleston to Maine, to California and from Greenville to Italy.

The Corrigan Gallery has presented for over 15 years art with presence and a future instilled with intellect. An eclectic collection of thoughtful, provoking works continues to be presented in an intimate space. Bringing a lifetime of Charleston art experience to collectors and presenting artists with decades of creating as well as those in the early years of their careers, the gallery provides a contemporary, local alternative to the traditional southern art scene. The gallery does handle works from the estates of Elizabeth O'Neill Verner and Alfred Hutty and that of other important second market pieces.
