$\frac{Pink Dog Creative in Asheville, NC}{Arts District Presents the Santorini}$ **Imagine Pyramid**

The Marquee in Asheville, NC's River Arts District will present the Imagine Pyramid, created by Dee and Bruce Santorini, on Dec. 3, 2023, from 1-4pm. The Imagine Pyramid will be on display at Marquee through the end of 2023.


The Imagine Pyramid started with a song. That song, "Imagine" by John Lennon, is all about everything we stand for and believe in. Peace. Love. A world without hatred and war.

In this world of conflict and pain, the Santorini's are compelled to produce art that sings with hope - the beauty of the Earth, the possibilities of humanity and all creatures - these are at the core of the art they produce. And what greater inspiration than the peace and love vibrating through John Lennon's song, "Imagine"?

Dee and Bruce Santorini, artists in Asheville's River Arts District, have created a raku sculpture honoring the great John Lennon. They have spent months building a five-foot-tall pyramid out of clay - rolling it into just the right shapes, then carving the designs and textures - including Lennon's face.

"It's been a long process," says Bruce. Putting on his heat-rated leather gloves





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and taking off the lid of the raku kiln, he grabs the raku tongs to reach inside the kiln, still glowing orange at about 1800 degrees F.

As Bruce works the tongs around the clay he swings the piece up out of the kiln and carries it over to a sandpit where his partner, Dee, waits to dump a washtub filled with shredded paper, leaves and pine cones on top of the hot clay piece. Smoke billows out around the edges.

Says Dee, "Raku is magic! It's mostly the smoke...It seeps into the unglazed clay and turns the white clay a smokey black color. Then it gets into the glaze and makes it hazy and metallic looking. It's awesome! I love it!"

The Santorini's have always been mesmerized and inspired by the ancient pyramids that eventually became a focus for the shape of their work. And the nice thing about this pyramid, is that there are three sides that allow it to be turned to show three unique pieces of art! One side is a tribute to John Lennon and the ethics behind his music, the other two sides represent the

The Santorini's will be at Marquee in Asheville's River Arts District on Dec. 3, between 1-4pm, to speak about their pyramid process while doing demonstrations. They welcome all to stop by, sip a Mimosa, continued on Page 20
