## International African American Museum in Charleston, SC, Offers Exhibit Focused Holiday Observances

The International African American Museum (IAAM) in Charleston, SC, has set in place the next exhibition, *Creative Gathering: A Space for Gathering, Fellowship, and Reflection*, along with holiday observances and events running from Dec. 14, 2023, through Martin Luther King Jr. Day on Jan. 15, 2024.

The exhibition, which will be curated from the permanent collection of IAAM, is a month-long showcase that invites the community to delve into a cultural and thematic exploration of the African diaspora. It includes a series of seasonal celebrations designed to reflect IAAM's commitment to fostering an understanding of African American history and its global impact.

The Creative Gathering opening kicks off with a reception on Dec.14, at IAAM, 14 Wharfside Street, in downtown Charleston. Guests will have the opportunity to engage with artists whose works are featured in the exhibition and the museum's broader collection. They may also partake in a self-guided tour of the entire museum from 7-9pm that evening. Guests can register for the reception and tour at (iaamuseum.org). Other special celebrations and events, all of which will be held at the museum, include: A Kwanzaa Celebration | Storytelling, from Dec. 26 - 29, 2023, from 1-2pm. The IAAM invites the community to daily storytelling sessions hosted by Julian Gooding. The City of North Charleston's Cultural Arts Department is pleased to announce concurrent solo exhibitions of mixed media and fiber works by Melissa Meverden (North Charleston, SC) and Daisy McClellan (Charleston, SC).

Rick Rubin once said, "The act of creation is an attempt to enter a mysterious realm. A longing to transcend. What we create allows us to share glimpses of an inner landscape, one that is beyond our understanding. Art is our portal to the unseen world." Inspired by this quote, local artist Melissa Meverden presents *My Heart is a Forest*, an exhibition of mixed media and fiber works that explore nature and intuition.

"When I reflect on what the mysterious realm of creativity looks like, I imagine a primeval forest - full of changing light, meandering paths, and layers of rich color and texture," Meverden explains. "The works featured in this exhibition serve as artifacts from journeys into that dense
