## **Central Piedmont Community College in Charlotte, NC, Features A Group Exhibition**

Central Piedmont Community College in Charlotte, NC, will present *Weaving*, a group show featuring artists Blanca La Cortiglia, Byron Tenesaca, Natacha Sochat, Keudis Sanchez and Irlanda Ruiz, on view in the Ross and Overcash Art Galleries, from Jan. 9 through Mar. 2, 2023. An Artist Lecture will be offered on Feb. 22, at 3:30pm in the Overcash Center, 2nd Floor, Tate Hall. Reception to immediately follow.

Weaving artfully brings together a group of five talented artists with Latinx and Indigenous roots. Through a multi-disciplinary approach, each artist takes their cue from the time-honored tradition of weaving, to create artwork addressing each artist's powerful cultural heritage. "The collective work is an expression to honor our ancestors and the rich history of weaving both in the actual technique that creates wearable fabrics or functional baskets, which have provided essential survival to many cultures, but also the intangible metaphors in its use as a word." The conversations created through the artwork endeavor to open a positive space for cross-cultural sharing and revere an ancient practice responsible for artistic expression, feeding families and empowering communities.

Blanca La Cortiglia's *Basket of White Roses* represents her family name White Rose (Blanca Rosa) passed down from generation to generation. The White Rose weaves into her life and continues to serve as a sacred family tradition. Keudis Sanchez seeks to promote the importance and profound influence of notable women in his life. Sanchez's portraits come alive through augmented reality where viewers can hear the voices of the subjects as they tell a story about who they are. Byron Tenesaca pays tribute to four generations of his family through a collection of baskets. Writer, Irlanda Ruiz, combines each artists' collective interpretation of weaving into words. Natacha Sochat uses the art of crocheting, painting, and printmaking to further bring each artist together.

As a group, they believe that this exhibition will bring awareness to the art form of weaving and how it influenced their heritage and culture. The exhibition welcomes viewers to use technology, understanding, and curiosity while exploring five different perspectives.

artistic approach of photography, painting and sculpture, Delaney brings awareness to an environment under serious ecological threat. This area of the coastal dunes is one where freshwater and saltwater environments exist, in some cases, only yards apart, occasionally mixing together. As a result, several unique species evolved in this area and exist in a state of fragility.

# **Offers Works by Jacolby Satterwhite**

Davidson College in Davidson, NC, will present Jacolby Satterwhite: Finding Home Again, on view in the Van Every/Smith Galleries, from Jan. 17 through Mar. 26, 2023. A reception will be held on Feb. 9, from 6:30-8pm, with an Artist Talk at 7pm. Jacolby Satterwhite (American, b. 1986) creates immersive installations, digital media, and virtual reality works centered around labor, consumption, sex, and fantasy. His animations are the result of explorations in drawing, performance, painting, sculpture, photography, writing, and sound. He combines real and imagined objects, people, places, and personal mythologies, anecdotes, and experiences to create epic new worlds, where the artist can be seen dancing and interacting with avatars of friends and family members.

*Finding Home Again* focuses on Satterwhite's digital animated series, *Birds in Paradise*, which features a mythological, queer universe inspired by pop culture, African folklore, ritual, video games, and

personal narratives. He notes that the works are "a reflection on being reborn and recentering yourself, finding home again." For the artist, liberation, rebirth, and healing of the black, queer body is achieved through movement and sound.

Much of Satterwhite's work over the last decade may be considered a posthumous collaboration with his mother, Patricia, who *continued on Page* 15
