Sumter County Gallery of Art in Sumter, SC, Features Works by Sumter Guild Show and Diane Kilgore Condon

The Sumter County Gallery of Art in Sumter, SC, is presenting two exhibitions including the Annual Sumter Artists' Guild Winners Exhibition and Diane Kilgore Condon, Wild Kingdom, both on view through Feb. 12, 2021. Diane Kilgore Condon will give an artist talk Thursday, Feb. 11, at 5:30pm.

When COVID isolation and post-holiday cabin fever have set in, the Sumter County Gallery of Art provides the perfect getaway with two fantastic exhibitions in a welcoming, safe space.

Because the annual January South Carolina Watermedia Society Exhibition, is completely virtual, SCGA staff went in search of an artist that would be a great complement to the Sumter Artists' Guild Winners Exhibition. We are excited to present the art of Diane Kilgore Condon. Kilgore Condon is a painter who was born in Wisconsin and lives and works in Greenville, SC, and is the owner of ArtBomb Studios. Kilgore Condon received a BFA in Fine Arts from Bob Jones University in Greenville, SC. There she studied with renowned South Carolina artist, Carl Blair.

Established in 2001, ArtBomb launched what is now Greenville's important Pendleton Street arts district. From a September 2019 article in *Livin' Upsate SC* magazine: "In 2001 Diane Kilgore Condon wasn't trying to be a trailblazer, she simply needed a new spot for her studio. Working full time as merchandising manager for Belk department store, Kilgore Condon had an art studio in downtown Greenville where she painted part time. When her landlord decided on another use for the space, she began searching for a new place to paint. In 2001, the Village of West Greenville didn't exist. Only a handful of retail and restaurants remained open, with empty storefronts and homes in decline dotting the landscape of the once thriving textile mill community."

"When Kilgore Condon stepped inside the two-story brick building that originally housed the Brandon Mill Company store, she did so with an open mind. The place was pretty big, and she remembers thinking, "that maybe I should ask a few artists to come along,". At the end of the conversation the owner said he'd be willing to sell it. Having left her job to become a full-time artist, Kilgore Condon formed ArtBomb Studios, a nonprofit organization, and invited other artists to move their studios to Pendleton Street. A genuine desire to see each other flourish is another part of The Art Bomb's success, according to a resident artist of 15 years." 'The resident artists all root for each other and are thrilled with each other's success. Many credit ArtBomb as being the catalyst for what is now the trendy, artistic and entrepreneurial district called The Village of West Greenville. It continues to be a close-knit community where artists can create, and a place where lasting friendships form - some of the four-legged variety. In the past 20 years, ArtBomb artists have rescued 44 dogs from the streets of West Greenville. Kilgore Condon's beloved Elsie, a puppy she found abandoned on a nearby street, was her constant companion for 14 years and a muse for many of her paintings. Several of the paintings in the Sumter exhibition feature Elsie.' Kilgore Condon has had three solo exhibitions in South Carolina at Bob Jones University, the Greenville County Museum of Art, and the Pickens County Museum. exhibitions throughout the South including the Morris Museum in Augusta, GA, the Burroughs & Chapin Museum in Myrtle Beach, SC; the Sumter County Gallery of Art in Sumter, SC, and the City Gallery at Waterfront Park in Charleston, SC.

Her paintings are a profusion of flora and fauna (dogs, birds, rabbits) spilling out of large – and small canvases, hence the title Wild Kingdom, and are very pleasing to the eye. Kilgore Condon is among the Upstate's most prolific and respected painters and the Sumter County Gallery of Art is very excited to present an exhibition of her work.

The Sumter Artists' Guild is one of the most active Artists' Guilds in the state. President Laura Cardello – a multi-talented artist, has worked tirelessly to expand the Guild's artistic presence in Sumter in a variety of creative ways. It has been especially challenging in 2020. She is supported by a group of hardworking officers, Vicki Hagner, Jennifer Franklin, Erin Duffie, and Lisa Melton.

SCGA director Karen Watson notes, "This year's COVID edition of the Sumter Artists' Guild Exhibition which opened July 30th without an opening reception saw slightly fewer entries but overall, the exhibition was one of the strongest in years. Watson is quick to point out though that every Guild Exhibition is strong, but this year had a little something extra. The judge for the 2020 Guild Exhibition was Robert O. Keith IV and he picked out an amazing array of vinners. When we add Geneviève Rath the 2020 Peoples Choice Winner for her exquisite watercolor Owl, SCGA staff knew our audience could look forward to a stellar Sumter Artists' Guild Winners Exhibition.

Asheville Art Museum in Asheville, NC, Offers Exhibition Focused on the Moon

The Asheville Art Museum in Asheville, NC, will present *Meeting the Moon*, an exhibition featuring prints, photographs, ceramics, sculptures, and more from the Museum's Collection, on view in the Museum's McClinton Gallery, from Feb. 3 through July 26, 2021.

2021 marks the 60th anniversary of the beginning of the Apollo space program at NASA, but its inception was hardly the beginning of humankind's fascination with Earth's only moon. Before space travel existed, the moon - its shape, its mystery, and the face we see in it inspired countless artists. Once astronauts landed on the moon and we saw our world from a new perspective, a surge of creativity flooded the American art scene, in paintings, prints, sculpture, music, crafts, film, and poetry. This exhibition, whose title is taken from a 1913 Robert Frost poem, examines artwork in the Asheville Art Museum's Collection of artists who were inspired by the unknown, then increasingly familiar moon. Meeting the Moon includes works by nationally renowned artists Newcomb Pottery, James Rosenquist, Maltby Sykes, Paul Soldner, John Lewis, Richard Ritter (Bakersville, NC), and Mark Peiser (Penland, NC). Western North Carolina artists include Jane Peiser (Penland, NC), Jak Brewer (Zionville, NC), Dirck Cruser (Asheville, NC), George Peterson (Lake Toxaway, NC), John B. Neff (NC), and Maud Gatewood (Yanceyville, NC).
