## **Burroughs-Chapin Art Museum** in Myrtle Beach, SC, Features Works by Bill Scott

The Franklin G. Burroughs-Simeon B. Chapin Art Museum in Myrtle Beach, SC, opens its 2022 exhibition season and 25th Anniversary Year - with a bold, expressive exhibit to inspire and delight audiences. Bill Scott | Where I Long to Be will be on view through Apr. 2, 2022.

Philadelphia-based abstract painter and printmaker Bill Scott presents Where I Long to Be, a retrospective exhibit of works on paper and etchings from 1980 to 2021.

Scott's signature style invokes brightness and light, with geometric patterns and layers of vivid color. In brilliant hues of blue, yellow, red and purple punctuated with black lines and strokes, Scott's works achieve luminosity with their saturated color. His pieces evoke environments within the natural world while reaching beyond it, allowing the viewer simultaneously a sensory and emotional experience.

"Bill's work exhibits a masterful employment of both color and opacity that creates a sense of depth and place," said Art Museum curator Liz Miller. "One might first be drawn to the work by Scott's attractive palette and composition, and secondly by the layering effect created by his translucent applications of color. The longer one holds their gaze, the more they will reap in terms of what the works might conjure in their minds."

The artist's corresponding narrative brings an additional dimension to the artistic experience.

"What I love most about this exhibition – aside from the art itself – is the commentary Scott has written for each painting and prints," said Miller. "Scott takes us on a journey by offering the viewer wonderful glimpses into his life and past experiences that correlate to what

he was doing and where he was when he created each piece."

Scott has a connection to the Grand Stand via local collectors Charles and Sally Brodhead of Pawleys Island, SC. The Brodheads introduced Scott's work to the Grand Strand in 2017 when the Art Museum presented Grand Strand Collects, an exhibition of art selected from private collections of residents in Horry and Georgetown Counties.

Miller noted that Where I Long to Be was selected specifically as the 2022 opening exhibition, which will be paired with Synchronicity with works by Alice Ballard and Brian Rutenberg, for the new year.

"New Year, new exhibition," said Miller. "We haven't shown abstract work in a while, so we're excited to kick off the new year with something fresh for our viewers. And I just love the way that Scott's work presents concurrently with that of Brian Rutenberg – so much brilliant color and abstraction. The galleries are really going to pop."
