Gibbes Museum of Art in Charleston, SC, Features Works by William H. Johnson and WPA Artists

The Gibbes Museum of Art in Charleston, SC, is presenting its major spring exhibition, *Fighters for Freedom: William H. Johnson Picturing Justice*, on view through Aug. 7, 2022.

This exhibition brings together 28 paintings by the South Carolina born artist, which have not been seen together for almost 75 years. Organized by the Smithsonian American Art Museum, the exhibition will premiere at the Gibbes before a national tour. Additionally, the Gibbes will host special programming and an accompanying exhibition, *A New Deal: Artists at Work*, which includes works from the museum's permanent collection by artists like Johnson that benefited from the Works Progress Administration's Federal Art Program in the 1930s.

"Nearly 50 years ago, the Gibbes exhibited a collection by William H. Johnson – which was the first solo exhibition by a Black artist at the Gibbes," says Angela Mack, executive director of the Gibbes Museum of Art. "We are proud to once again showcase the work of this great American artist, who was born in South Carolina, and reflect on our commitment to feature artists from diverse backgrounds and experiences."

Drawn entirely from the collection of more than 1,000 works by Johnson given to the Smithsonian American Art Museum by the Harmon Foundation in 1967, this exhibition is the first-ever presentation of this series in Johnson's home state of South Carolina. William H. Johnson painted his "Fighters for Freedom" series in the mid-1940s as a tribute to African American activists, scientists, teachers, performers and international heads of state working to bring peace to the world.

Fighters for Freedom: William H. Johnson Picturing Justice celebrates these fighters and their accomplishments while still acknowledging the realities of racism, violence and oppression that they faced and overcame. This series includes some familiar figures – Harriet Tubman, George Washington Carver, Marian Anderson and Mahatma Gandhi – as well as other lesser-known individuals whose equally-important determination and sacrifice have been eclipsed over time.

The Gibbes will host several special programs to further analyze the themes in *Fighters for Freedom: William H. Johnson Picturing Justice*, for more information, visit (www.gibbesmuseum.org).

To accompany Fighters for Freedom: William H. Johnson Picturing Justice, the Gibbes will exhibit A New Deal: Artists at Work. The museum is one of a select group of institutions across the country

that houses works from the Federal Arts Project. During the Great Depression of the 1930s, President Franklin Delano Roosevelt launched his ambitious Works Progress Administration (WPA) programs that sent millions of unemployed Americans back to work, including more than 5,000 artists.

From the WPA came the Federal Arts Project, which awarded opportunities to a diverse group of artists, including women, African Americans and recent immigrants from China, Russia and Germany. This monumental effort to put artists back to work resulted in a collection of artwork intended to capture the national spirit at the time and encourage creativity in the face of great challenges. A New Deal: Artists at Work is a collection of these works from a diverse group of artists during a very challenging time in American history.

Fighters for Freedom: William H. Johnson Picturing Justice is organized by the Smithsonian American Art Museum with generous support from Art Bridges, Faye and Robert Davidson and the Jacob and Gwendolyn Lawrence Foundation.

Home to the Carolina Art Association, established in 1858, the Gibbes Museum of Art is recognized among the oldest arts organizations in the United States. Housing one of the foremost collections of American Art from the 18th century to the present, the museum's mission is to enhance lives through art by engaging people of every background and experience with art and artists of enduring quality and by providing opportunities to learn, to discover, to enjoy and to be inspired by the creative process.



On Our Cover This Month

On our cover this month is a work by Susan Lenz, who will be taking part in the fourth annual Cottontown Art Crawl, with 114 other artists (115 in total) to show and sell their original work in the downtown Columbia, SC, neighborhood. The event will be held on Saturday, Mar. 12, 2022, from 10am to 3pm with more art, more artists, more food and more fun for visitors. The event brings artists and entertainment to front porches and lawns in a historic downtown neighborhood.

Lenz has become the most mentioned SC artist having exhibits all over North and South Carolina, as well as all over this country during the last few years. So, of course she will be taking part in this event in her own backyard in Columbia.

I've never heard of Cottontown before, but then a few gallery owners and yours truly invented a section of downtown Charleston and called it the French Quarter.

Tired of the Old Photos

When working this month on our massive Calender listings I just threw my hands up and said, "Enough, is enough!", meaning I was tired of using the same old photos to make the 29 1/2 pages of galleries showing art a little more interesting than just words on a page. There is nothing worse in my book than looking at a page full of text with no images.

I save every photo that is sent to us every month and use them, when I can, to make the pages look a little better - easier on the eyes. But, this month I just got tired of using some of those same old photos, some I've used, maybe 5 - 10 times or more. I use the ones that pertain to current exhibits when I can - depending on how

the listing falls on the page. You have to have room to put the photo in and the gallery listing after it, so there has to be room. Sometimes I have a great photo to use, but the spacing isn't right. I hate it when that happens. But on many of those pages I've had to use photos from a stock pool of photos I've used over and over.

So, if you are tired of seeing those same photos as much as I am - send us new ones. I don't want to use those old images any more. I'm glad I had them and they represent some great works of art, but they should be in history books or a book on the history of Carolina Arts - which I might stop doing all this and write one day, but not now. Some are hoping I die before I get the chance to tell that story, but we'll see what happens.

So here's the deal. First, if you're having an exhibit - at any venue in North or South Carolina - in the next month or so, send us a press release about it and a few high res images of art from that exhibit. If more than one artist is involved, identify the artwork. If you are represented by a gallery that is included in our Gallery listings, get the owner to send us some photos of artworks on display (identified). If your gallery or venue is not included, get someone to send us the info, you can find what info we need on our website at

(www.carolinaarts.com) under the heading of "How the Paper Works".


What's a high res image? Well, it can be a Tiff or Jpeg, which is at least 3" wide by 300ppi. If you don't know what ppi means - look it up or just send a Jpeg that is at least 11" x 14" in size at 72ppi (the norm) and I can make it the right size and ppi.

Do not send images of yourself or you standing in front of your artwork, we are not People magazine - we won't use it. Do

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Dyani White Hawk, "I Am Your Relative (back)" art along with the visual languages and traditions of Native people. In doing so, her work spotlights Native women, whose strength and fortitude over centuries have helped their peoples' languages and cultures to survive.

On view in *Hear Her*, White Hawk's video installation LISTEN presents a eries of Native women speaking the language of their people. Each film takes place on the land of each participant's nation, and viewers hear the respective languages without translation. As such, White Hawk puts a focus not only on the resonance of each speaker, but she also reveals society's collective ignorance of the people, culture, and language of those native to the land on which we live.

White Hawk's photography installation I Am Your Relative confronts the gross stereotypes and distorted caricatures that dehumanize and commodify Native women. The exhibition serves as a true locus for the convergence of multiple Humanities including the visual arts, language, human geography, and history, all working in sync to give visibility to the invisible and fill a vital gap in our collective knowledge.

Dyani White Hawk (Sičánğu Lakota) is a visual artist and independent curator based in Minneapolis, MN. White Hawk earned an MFA from the University of Wisconsin-Madison (2011) and BFA from the Institute of American Indian Arts in

Santa Fe, NM, (2008). She served as Gallery Director and Curator for the All My Relations Gallery in Minneapolis from 2011-2015.

Support for White Hawk's work has included a 2021 Anonymous Was A Woman Award, 2020 Carolyn Glasoe Bailey Foundation Minnesota Art Prize, 2019 United States Artists Fellowship in Visu Art, 2019 Eiteljorg Contemporary Art Fellowship, 2019 Jerome Hill Artist Fellowship, 2019 Forecast Public Art Mid-Career Professional Development grant, 2018 Nancy Graves Grant for Visual Artists, 2017 and 2015 Native Arts and Cultures Foundation Artist Fellowships, and 2014 Joan Mitchell Foundation Painters and Sculptors Grant.

White Hawk has participated in residencies in Australia, Russia, and Germany. Her work is in the collections of the Museum of Modern Art, Walker Art Center, Crystal Bridges Museum of American Art, Pennsylvania Academy of the Fine Arts, Denver Art Museum, Minneapolis Institute of Art, The Smithsonian's National Museum of the American Indian, Tweed Museum of Art, IAIA Museum of Contemporary Native Arts, and Akta Lakota Museum and Cultural Center among other public and private collections. She is represented by Bockley Gallery in Minneapolis.



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

Redux Contemporary Arts Center in Charleston, SC, Features Works by Susan Vitali

Redux Contemporary Arts Center in Charleston, SC, will present *Correspondence*, featuring works by Susan Vitali, on view in Gallery 1056, from Feb. 4 through Mar. 26, 2022. A reception will be held on Feb. 4, from 5-8pm.

The artwork in this exhibition investigates slow thoughtful cursive writing vs. today's digital technology. Writing a letter is a personal way to connect with another person: a slowing down and giving consideration to the words chosen, the mood conveyed. The slant and size of the letters and visual execution speak to the personality of the writer. Today few correspond by hand due to texting, phone calls and email. Cursive is a dying art.

Vitali is a collector of objects, images, and human experiences. Her work begins with gathering and researching aspects of the human condition expressed in collections of handwriting, ephemeral paper, photos and objects from nature. Then, utilizing that data, she produces poetic abstract paintings, prints, drawings, and objects. Using the irresistible sensuality of textures and materials, she creates physical and metaphoric spaces that are both intimate and expansive for intuitive, emotional responses. While some objects in her work are recognizable, most are ambiguous. Abstraction lies at the core of

her work as an open-ended language of spiritual experience and human emotion.

Vitali holds an MFA in Print Media from Cranbrook Academy of Art. Her work is held in multiple private and corporate collections including the Ford Motor Company and Aflac Insurance. She has exhibited in Italy, Canada, Australia, and across the US.

City of North Charleston, SC, Offers Works by Morgan Serreno East and Marie Carladous

The City of North Charleston's Cultural Arts Department is pleased to announce that concurrent solo exhibitions of mixed media works by Morgan Serreno East and photographs by Marie Carladous will be on display at Park Circle Gallery from Feb. 2-26, 2022. A free reception hosted by the artists will be held at the gallery on Friday, Feb. 4, from 5-7pm.

In Natural Wonder, local artist Morgan Serreno East explores her fascination with the power, uniqueness, and sheer beauty found in nature through a series of mixed media portraits of women. The woman in each painting is purposefully clothed in a light dress, which, at some points, appears to blend in with the environment around her. This creates an airy, seamless world that invites the viewer to become one with it. Each painting is built up with layers of house paint, oil paint, tissue paper, and ink to create an organic texture that represents the constant ebb and flow of nature around

"While the images in this body of work are not self-portraits in the literal sense, they represent my connection with the Earth and the calmness I feel when I am physically connected with it—whether I am taking a hike in the woods, walking along the beach, or floating in the ocean," Serreno East explains.

Serreno East earned a BS in Graphic Communications with a minor in Advertising from Clemson University in 2006. For the next 11 years, she focused on her career in printing and publishing. In 2018, she completed an online program through the Visual Arts Passage for Illustration and attended the Illustration Academy in Kansas City, MO, that summer. In January 2019, she took a three-month sabbatical from her role as a Senior Program Manager for Amazon's self-publishing company in Charleston, SC, to focus on building her Illustration portfolio and to travel.

During her second round at the Illustration Academy in June 2019, with her teacher's guidance, she decided to focus mainly on Fine Art.

Serreno East currently resides in North Charleston, SC, and participates in group pop-up events around town including the Park Circle Art Walk, which she began organizing during quarantine in 2020. Her work can be found at The Station and Accent on Wine in Park Circle. An

Charleston, SC, based photographer Marie Carladous invites the viewer to dig deep into our cultural past through photographs of America and her native France in her exhibit An Exploration of Alternative Photography. The featured photo graphs embody a small part of the analog world of photography, exploring different techniques such as lumen printing, solarization, and instant photography. Carladous' photography work is very eclectic, ranging from portraiture, to architecture, to abstract imagery. The unifying element in her pieces is experimentation. "A lot of the techniques displayed here were discovered by accident, resulting from a mistake," she explains. "I explored them without much information being available, going in with both feet not knowing what the results would be, which makes it extremely fun."

Originally from Nice, France, Carladous moved to Charleston 10 years ago to complete her studio art degree at the College of Charleston with a focus in film photography. After graduating in 2013 she became a freelance photographer, as well as a Darkroom member at Redux Contemporary Art Center, where she processes all film and paper herself. In 2018, she established the French Dark Room and is now a

not send a PDF of an image!

Some publications make you pay to have an image of your artwork included don't, as long as there is a place it fits. Now if it's a bad photo or something that doesn't look like it should be in a fine art publication, we won't include it, but I'm not that picky. I have no problem with nudity (male or female) or politically hot

Also, if by some strange chance that next month every venue in our, almost 30 pages, sends us high res images we won't be able to fit them all in it - it would take too long and look pretty strange. And remember, sometimes, when we have a photo to use, but the listing falls in a bad space on the page - we won't be able to use it, but that's only when the exhibit doesn't last for several months, as in those cases, we might be able to use it the next month or the month after that.

Photos of artwork that is just at a gallery or venue, which is not related to an exhibit, can be used any time throughout the year or for years - we've already done that in some cases. Of course, if you leave that gallery or venue, you should let us know - that has happened a few times. continued above on next column to the right | Still, like they say, all publicity is good

publicity. I don't believe that, but they say it - whomever "they" are.

What you do NOT need to send me is images of your work and you are NOT having an exhibit or are represented by a gallery or art venue. And don't send images of work you have at a gallery or art venue without running it past that gallery owner - unless you want to be kicked out of that gallery or art venue.

And don't send me an image that you think would make a great cover on our next issue. I select the cover images and it's not easy working all those details out and I don't need to be explaining to a lot of folks why we are not using their image - as great as it is. And please don't mention that it's better than what we have been putting on our covers, as I have a list of those artists who will never have their work on our cover - no matter how important the exhibit or venue. We don't reward people for being rude. And, I've been told that I'm the King of rudeness and I don't want anyone taking my crown from me. I never knew that asking folks to supply complete info and to be given it on time was a rude act, but so be it.

Excuse me for wanting to publish on time and provide all the info people need to go see the art we tell them about.

"Some of our artists have wanted to do this so they can have more room in their studios to make more art," Martin continues. "Three-D artists are always experimenting with new ways of doing something in their medium. Some things are pleasant surprises, but with experimentation there is always a learning curve and those pieces are good but not up to what is wanted by the artist.

"Seeing newer artists such as Tom Zumbach starting out in a new medium, fused glass, and wanting to try everything in glass, he will have some that he doesn't care for, for example," she adds. "As a veteran glass artist, there are many pieces I have kept for looking back on the journey of 15 years, and now is the time to make more room."

anxiety and depression.

"From acting in stage plays, singing, dancing and the paintings, not to mention he loved his community, he cared for others and was actively helping them while struggling himself," she continues. "He lived life to its fullest. He lived life the way he wanted to - unapologetically."

"I absolutely love his art. He left us all a piece of him in his work. I can feel his energy and awe him in every piece. I can go downtown Spartanburg and he's everywhere. I'm very proud of him," Gil-

Cardell, a native of Spartanburg and graduate of Winthrop University, was outspoken about issues he saw in his home community and the changes he sought in improving it. He provided a voice for Black artists and community members and was an active voice in conversations on equality and access. In 2019, he helped orchestrate the painting of the Black Lives Matter mural on West Broad Street in downtown Spartanburg. It was the site of an impromptu memorial when the community learned of his death.

Cardell once said, "As people, we have to look and see that our color palette has more colors than just one, not just ones that match our skin tones."

'Roderice believed art could change people," Spartanburg Councilwoman Meghan Smith said shortly after his death. "He lived that passion. He was an example of channeling hurt and frustration into a craft to create a better world. He has left a real gift."

Regula says, "Rod was an exceptional artist and a well-loved member of the Artists Collective. Through this exhibition, we want to honor him as an artist and give the community an opportunity to see a large body of his work displayed in our Solomon Gallery.

"Rod in many ways was a bridge between the different communities of Spartanburg," she continues. "He worked with children, was a performer, and was passionate about social justice. He spoke up and showed up. I remember when we interviewed him for membership in the

Collective, one of our board members asked him how we could reach out to the Black community. He sat still for a minute and then said, 'You have to go to them.' With that answer, he became our ambassador in the community.'

"Cardell's family, per his wishes, will set up a foundation for underprivileged children with the proceeds from the sale of his works at the exhibition," Regula says. "We hope that those who knew and loved Rod will be able to purchase a work and know that they are helping to fulfill Rod's desire to help others. He was a member of this community and touched many lives. Through his art, more lives can be touched. We hope the community will support the family in making Rod's wishes come true."

Roderice Cardell, who died in January 2021 at the age of 33, left behind him a legacy through his music, his art and, most importantly, his love of his community and his commitment to making it a better place. Nearly 100 of Cardell's paintings – many never before seen by the public - will be displayed in this exhibi-

Cardell's works – neo-expressionist abstract paintings done on canvas and wood – will be offered for sale, with the proceeds going to Cardell's family foundation to help underprivileged children in the Upstate.

"When Rod left us, he left behind over 80 pieces of art at the Artists Collective," says Beth Regula, chair of the Collective's board. Cardell was a member of the Collective, where he had a studio.

"We locked the works away until the family was ready to decide what to do with them," Regula continues. "Only a few members of the Collective and his family have seen this work since last January. Since then, we have been working with the family to bring the work back into our largest gallery so that the community could once again see his work.

"Rod – known as MADDDARTIST –

as an artist was prolific, talented and passionate," Regula says. "He cared deeply that people saw his work and respected him and his work. He wanted to show it and share it. As a person, Rod was kind, compassionate, and willing to help others. He saw and felt that injustice existed and was willing to speak up and show up to try to make the world a better place.'

Cardell's mother, Tonya Gilliam, says her son's body of work is important "beause he chose to take his frustrations and emotions out on his pieces. He expressed himself and encouraged others, especially the youth that struggled with anxiety and mental hurdles, to have a positive outlet by utilizing the canvas. That's why his slogan was 'turning chaos into beauty.'"

Gilliam says visitors to the gallery should see that his art has deep meaning. "If you look closely at some of his pieces, you will see messages, words or the mention of his relationship with God. You will see his life as it evolved from the beginning, where he used eyes in a lot in his work, to the times of protesting, love and peace.'

'What I want people to know about my son and his art is that he was passionate in everything he did," continues Gilliam, who says when her son first began painting, she thought it was just a hobby but saw it grow as he used it after recovering from a near-death experience in a motorcycle accident. "He said that when he painted – when he created – it allowed him to express himself and be free from

During a time of political and cultural unrest, Jo-Ann Morgan turned to quilt making, a medium that is familiar, comforting, and traditional, through which she was able to make strong, even provocative, statements in an approachable way Crafting stories through quilts, Morgan continues the tradition of representing pivotal moments of the African American experience.

Morgan is Professor Emeritus of African American Studies and Art History at Western Illinois University, and author of The Black Arts Movement and the Black Panther Party in American Visual Culture (Routledge, 2019). Her book *Uncle* Tom's Cabin as Visual Culture won the prestigious Seaborg Award for Civil War Scholarship in 2008.

On view in the Perimeter Gallery is the exhibit, Last Looks, featuring works by Renee Cloud.

Our literate brains cannot ignore words; we see them as a string of letters that convey a meaning, and never just a series of marks. We are always reading, always consuming information without pause," said Cloud. Her work aims to bring people closer together through shared experiences while using her personal experiences as a platform. Language is Cloud's medium, and the semiotics

embodied by written words fascinates her. This series of etched glass mirrors offers the viewer an opportunity to reflect and connect with the language featured on the reflective glass surface. A wall of portals, the focus is on the self-seen in and through the mirrors.

Cloud (b. 1992) is a Charlotte, NC, native and received her BFA in Studio Art from Appalachian State University in 2015. Using a combination of text art and mixed media, Cloud creates work that focuses on the personal narrative, the Black experience, and the power of the written word. The text incorporated into her work provides only a fraction of the narrative, leaving the viewer to create the rest. Cloud is currently working as a freelance creative within her community.

Harvey B. Gantt Center for African-American Arts + Culture in Charlotte, NC, Offers Three New Exhibitions

The Harvey B. Gantt Center for African-American Arts + Culture in Charlotte, NC, is presenting three new exhibits including: Reflections of a People: Photographs from the Archive of Jamel Shabazz, curated by Dexter Wimberly, on view through Mar. 6, 2022; Visible Man: Art and Black Male Subjectivity, curated by Michael D. Harris, PhD, on view through Apr. 24, 2022; and FuturePresent: Acquisition Highlights from the Permanent Collection, on view through June 26, 2022.

Jamel Shabazz is a rare photographer whose work stands as a testament to the lived experiences of Black people in America for over 40 years. His impressive oeuvre is engaging and highly recognizable. This exhibition brings together selections from Shabazz's extensive archive of photographs.

The son of a veteran, Shabazz was born and raised in Brooklyn, NY. He picked up his first camera at the age of 15 and soon after began photographing his friends and relatives. As Shabazz's practice evolved, the streets and the New York City subway system also became the backdrop for many of his photographs. Shabazz has drawn inspiration from noted studio and documentary photographers, most influentially Leonard Freed, as well as James VanDerZee, Gordon Parks, Robert Capa, and Eli Reed.

Shabazz has stated that his goal is to contribute to the preservation of world history and culture. *Reflections of a People* offers a glimpse into a past time and place, capturing moments of Black life for future generations.

Visible Man: Art and Black Male Subjectivity offers a creative look at the complexity of African-American males through cultural, racialized, and personal lenses

For two centuries, African-American masculinity has been demonized or challenged visually in art and popular culture. Physical differences were turned into symbols of deviation or inferiority or a lack of civility, and the social position of African-American males was distorted into icons of inferiority. Images, both artistic and from popular culture, went a long way toward defining Black masculinity and creating tropes and symbols about character, identity, and social location in the Americas.

Visible Man emphasizes the creative expression surrounding the representation of Black males, elevating the voice of the subject, the diversity of perspectives and nuances of their representation - whether by self-representation or representation through observation - and the complexities of men in the African diaspora.

Rather than exploring the Black male body, this exhibition focuses on the multiple possibilities as seen and experienced from within the African diaspora and will privilege the voice of the subject as well as the voices of women artists who share the cultural and racialized experience of being Black. The artists are male and female, young and old, American and Caribbean, from the Midwest and the coasts, well-known and less so. It is an attempt to avoid notions of the 'Black body' and a discourse which emphasizes racial categorization in favor of a more nuanced and diverse cultural view.

Visible Man was organized by Bowling Green State University Fine Arts Center Galleries with support from the BGSU College of Arts & Sciences, the Ohio Arts Council and Ohio Humanities. It is dedicated to the memory of Dr. David Driskell and BGSU alumnus Edward Sewell.

FuturePresent: Acquisition Highlights from the Permanent Collection examines the Harvey B. Gantt Center's legacy of collecting.

Since the organization's inception in 1974, the Gantt Center has primarily built its collection from works gifted to the institution. Over the decades, John and Vivian Hewitt collected paintings, prints, and drawings from artists near and far. And in 1998, Bank of America acquired the collection from the Hewitts and pledged it to the then-named Afro-American Cultural Center.

The Hewitts' stewardship culminated in a collection of artwork by 19th and 20th century masters including Romare Bearden, Elizabeth Catlett, and Henry Ossawa Tanner. Although the media and scale of creations by African-American artists have evolved, the Gantt Center's focus for its collection remains the same to build on the cultural foundation of John and Vivian Hewitt by supporting future

masters and creative leaders of African-American art and art history.

FuturePresent embodies this idea through the presentation of works that are pioneering in their concept and execution. Artists such as Stacy Lynn Waddell and Radcliffe Bailey push the boundaries of the traditional canvas and frame while Phillip Thomas explores landscapes and societal themes through a contemporary lens. From John and Vivian Hewitt's collecting past, to the institution's present mission, this exhibition visualizes the future of art at the Gantt Center and beyond.

Since its establishment in 1974, the dream of the first visionaries has elevated to unforeseen levels. Located in the heart of Uptown Charlotte, October

2009 marked the opening of the Afro-American Cultural Center as the Harvey B. Gantt Center for African-American Arts + Culture. The naming of the new facility is in honor of Harvey Bernard Gantt, a well-respected community leader and businessman. He is a trailblazer as the first African-American student admitted to Clemson University and later served as Charlotte's first African-American mayor. This humble leader continues to impact the lives of the local citizenry and individuals well beyond the borders of Mecklenburg County.

Jerald Melberg Gallery in Charlotte, NC, is presenting *The Quarry Paintings*, featuring works by Lee Hall, on view through Feb. 19, 2022.

Jerald Melberg Gallery is pleased to present our sixth solo exhibition for Lee Hall, focusing on paintings Hall made over fifty years ago of a quarry in Maine, several of which were exhibited at the Betty Parsons Gallery in 1975.

"Whether it is the play of light and shadow on the craggy blocks of an abandoned quarry or the drifting sea fog covering and uncovering the shore of an island in Maine...Hall may spend weeks and months telling in images the different aspects and moods of her object. What she is speaking of are adventures of her eyes," said Wolfgang Zucker in an essay he wrote.

Lee Hall (1934-2017) was a North Carolina native and renowned Abstract Expressionist, whose muses were the American and Mediterranean landscape. Loosely titled by the locale they represent, her poetic landscapes are iterations of the tradition of abstraction derived from meditations on nature, whose forebear-

ers include a myriad of great minds from painters of the Sung Dynasty to modernist John Marin.

Hall's legacy is one of an exceptional painter as well as a respected educator and writer. Hall stood with the great artists of the New York School, earning herself representation at Betty Parsons' famed New York gallery. She also served as President

of the esteemed Rhode Island School of Design, and she has written a number of books, including biographies of Willem and Elaine DeKooning and Betty Parsons.

Hall generously left her estate to the Bechtler Museum of Modern Art. The proceeds from acquisitions of her work through the gallery directly fund the museum's educational programs.

Hall was born in Lexington, NC, in 1934 and pursued her academic career at the University of North Carolina, Greensboro, where she studied with the painters John Opper and George Ivy. She received her MA in 1958 and her PhD in 1965, both from New York University, and continued her post-doctoral work at the prestigious Warburg Institute at the University of London with research fellowships from the American Philosophical Society.

In New York, she forged close relationships with leaders in American modern painting, including Elaine and Willem de Kooning, and exhibited alongside Jackson Pollock, Mark Rothko and Robert Motherwell. Hall was represented by Betty Parsons, one of the most important gallerists of the period, and eventually became her close friend and biographer.

Hall's work was reviewed frequently and favorably in the central periodicals of the day, including ArtNews, Art in America, The New Yorker, Artforum, Arts Magazine and The New York Times by the widely respected critics Clement Greenberg, John Russell and Hilton Kramer, among others.

Hall's works are held in the permanent collections of several museums, including the Indianapolis Museum of Art, the Montclair Art Museum, the Seattle Art Museum, the Newark Museum, the Hudson River Museum, the Weatherspoon Art Museum, the Mint Museum (Charlotte, NC) and the Johnson Collection (Spartanburg, SC) as well as in many corporate collections such as Chase Manhattan Bank, Citibank and Prudential.

She was the recipient of many awards, including an Honorary Doctorate of Fine Arts from the University of North Carolina, the Childe Hassam Purchase Award from the American Academy of Arts and Letters and the Athena Medal from the Rhode Island School of Design. In 2016 she was awarded an Alumna of Distinction Award by the College of Visual and Performing Arts at the University of North Carolina at Greensboro.

Alongside her lifelong devotion to

making art, Hall also pursued a career in academia beginning in 1958. She taught at the University of New York, Potsdam and then Winthrop College in Rock Hill, SC. She spent almost a decade at Drew University where she left as full professor and Chair of the Art Department. She then served as the Dean of Visual Arts at the State University of New York at Purchase where, in 1975, she left to begin her tenure as President of the prestigious Rhode Island School of Design. There, she served for eight years before becoming the Director of Arts and Communication and Senior Vice President at the Academy for Educational Development in New York

Notwithstanding her many accomplishments as an academic, historian, university leader and teacher, throughout all of her life, Hall was first and foremost a painter. She drew great inspiration from her engagements with the landscapes and history of Greece, Rome and her love of the New England countryside. She continuously experimented in drawing, collage, oil and acrylics. Her interests were expansive, deep and informed by her pragmatism, empathy and seductive sense

Hall's growth as an intellectual and artist was persistent and enduring. As she wrote once, "A painter should live a long time. It takes decades of work, of arduous search and fretting, to know that labels don't matter, and to find what will suffice.'






point into conversations about identity, race, and masculinity. His paintings, largescale blacklight sculptures, and video installations draw inspiration from history, popular culture, and daily, personal meditations.

The exhibition includes Benjamin's largest vinyl text installation to-date, Black Haiku, along with blacklight and shattered glass installations, more than 100 works on paper, and a large-scale video installation, Sonata in Absolute

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with South Arts, the umbrella organization for state arts agencies in nine Southern states. South Arts launched the Southern Prize & State Fellows awards project in 2017, the first two years without an exhibition component. The inaugural 2019 exhibition traveled from 701 CCA to the Bo Bartlett Center in Columbus, GA, which since also has hosted the 2020 and 2021 exhibitions.

"Each year that South Arts makes these awards, we are awed by the depth and artistry in our region," South Arts president and CEO Suzette M. Surkamer, a former head of the South Carolina Arts Commission, wrote in the exhibition catalogue.

When South Arts in 2017 launched the first cycle of Southern Prize and State Fellowships recipients, Surkamer wrote, "we did not know what to expect and were positively blown away by the response." The current cohort, Surkamer wrote, reminds us "what it means to be resilient." The emotionally taxing times of COVID-19, political upheaval and urgent calls "for long overdue justice and equity" did not stop the 2021 South Arts fellows, Surkamer added. "Each artist took what 2020 gave them and declared that 2021 will be brighter and stronger."

For the Southern Prize, artists from Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, North and South Carolina and Tennessee can submit a portfolio of their work. An independent jury selects one fellow from each state, from which a second jury panel selects two finalists for the Southern Prize. Each state fellow receives \$5,000, the Southern Prize runner-up receives an additional \$10,000, and the winner, an additional \$25,000. Both finalists also receive a residency at the Hambidge Center for Creative Arts and Sciences in Rabun Gap, GA. South Arts has so far awarded \$400,000 through

the project to contemporary artists living and working in the South.

In addition to Williams and Plaisir, the artists in the current exhibition are Tameca Cole of Alabama, Raheleh Filsoofi of Tennessee, Joyce Garner of Kentucky, Myra Greene of Georgia, Jewel Ham of North Carolina, Ming Ying Hong of Mississippi and artists duo Keith Calhoun and Chandra McCormick of Louisiana. The 2021 cohort of South Arts fellows is the most diverse group to date. Of the six American-born artists, all but Garner are African American. Filsoofi is from Iran, Plaisir was born in France but has roots in Guadeloupe and Hong was born in China but raised in Los Angeles.

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ARTSVILLE Collective in Asheville, NC, Showcases Two Guest Artists & **More at Its First Gallery Exhibition**

ARTSVILLE Collective, at the new Marquee in Asheville, NC, opens its first public exhibition showing guest artist Micah Mackenzie's mixed media and Rhona Polonsky's ceramics along with the works of founding artists Daryl Slaton, pop animation and Louise Glickman, mixed media. Between the Lines will be on display from Feb.1 through Apr. 24, 2022, at 36 Foundy in the RAD. The styles of each artist differs greatly but connect through thoughtful storytelling, coming alive in a mix of mediums, paint, clay, textiles and animation. The viewer is encouraged to consider how they come together, to read "between the lines."

Micah Mackenzie mixes media with mark making into imposing layered abstracts mimicking memories from childhood: playfulness and whimsy with splashes of color, seemingly with abandon. A closer look reveals balance and harmony within the chaos. Coatings of storytelling lead us to consider the human condition from the subversion of mythology to the magic of science. He invites us to see inside what is intrinsically beautiful and empowering.

Rhona Polonsky's pottery uses the language of lines and spaces that merge and connect to reveal their meanings: lines as boundaries to be crossed or parallels to read between. Her doodling since childhood grew in expression as she traveled the world, teaching young international students for over thirty years in Asia and Africa, from Indonesia to India. Her sgraffito vessels, lively and offbeat, evoke amusement, playfulness, whimsy and enthusiasm. They speak to us in a special language that warms our hearts with both simplicity and sophistication.

Daryl Slaton's work is overtly whimsical as he introduces his newest anthropomorphic character Gallagher, a play-

ful tiger cub who entertains us through animation and augmented reality. Over twenty panels speak to us through the digital powers of augmented reality and the eyes and antics of Gallagher, a character staunchly loyal to people and place. These narratives bring both smiles and amazement evoking warm memories for adults with their own stories to tell their families

Louise Glickman's storytelling is revealed through weaving of nets and textures where lines move over, under and around using bits of fabric, paint and plant materials. Her highly textural works are largely connected through her own life experiences and a love of nature and travel. Select pieces reveal her special interest in understanding the yin and yang of countries and cultures that have informed her worldview, from her childhood in New Orleans to travel with the Penland School

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to Cuba, Japan and Denmark.

ARTSVILLE Collective falls under the umbrella of Sand Hill Artists Collective (SHAC) in partnership with Crewest Studio/LA. They show, tell and talk about creativity at this new gallery and gathering space at Marquee in the RAD. 

The thrill of creating something unexpected is an elixir to her, with reds and fuchsia being her favorites. When creating an abstract, she begins by thinking about color, then a story begins to grow, which leads to a visual symbol or image, loaded with meaning related to the story. All of this happens before she puts the first brush stroke on the silk or the wood. Her process is interactive and she lets the painting create, then lead her.

"Color captivates me especially when winter begins to change into spring. The Lenten Rose is the first to emerge in late winter, with subtle and muted colors... unlike the later flowers of spring and summer," says Goodson.

Margie Kluska has been drawing since she was a child. She enjoys studying the works of the classical artists and Hudson River School painters, and she has only recently taken up oil painting. Her inspiration is taken from nature; landscapes, wildlife, and flora. Living surrounded by the beauty of the Blue Ridge Mountains has inspired her to paint views that take one's breath away. Distant mountain rang-

es, glorious sunsets, soaring hawks, and ever-changing weather patterns offer her extensive references which she captures on canvas. Her style, "loose realism", captures the reality of each scene with a slight bent towards Impressionism.

"Light affects our moods. Whether it's a sunrise, sunset, or storm clouds parting to expose a blue sky, our moods are instantly transformed," says Kluska.

An award-winning artist, Johnnie Stanfield is known for her colorful, vivid watercolor and acrylic paintings of horses, fishing lure studies, and local landscapes. She is inspired by the emotion created when she sees an object or something in nature that recalls a past memory. She is then compelled to paint it, to convey and share that feeling with the viewer.

Stanfield will paint a subject in watercolor to give it a softer feel so the viewer can devote their own emotion to the painting or add to the emotion she has created. If it is detailed, she will usually use acrylic or oil. Her paintings hang in private collections throughout the Southeast.

Her work, Sheltering in Place, was inspired by her cat, during the shelter in place mandate in Spring, 2020. "Like all of us, we waited for the sunshine, to renew our spirit and celebrate its warmth, while wondering when we could go back out into the world and resume our life as usual," said Stanfield.

Asheville Art Museum in Asheville, NC, Offers Work by the Wyeth Family

The Asheville Art Museum in Asheville, NC, will present The Wyeths: Three Generations | Works from the Bank of America Collection, providing a comprehensive survey of works by N. C. Wyeth, one of America's finest illustrators; his son, Andrew, an important realist painter; his eldest daughter, Henriette, a realist painter; and Andrew's son Jamie, a popular portraitist. Through the works of these artists from three generations of the Wyeth family, themes of American history, artistic techniques, and creative achievements can be explored. This exhibition will be on view in the Asheville Art Museum's Explore Asheville Exhibition Hall, from Feb. 12 through May 30, 2022.

N. C. Wyeth (1882–1945) has long been considered one of the nation's leading illustrators. In the early 1900s, he studied with illustrator Howard Pyle in Delaware. In 1911, he built a house and studio in nearby Chadds Ford, PA. Later, he bought a sea captain's house in Maine and in 1931 built a small studio, which he shared with his son, Andrew, and his daughters, Henriette and Carolyn. The exhibition includes illustrations for books by Robert Louis Stevenson and Washington Irving as well as historical scenes, seascapes, and landscapes.

Andrew Wyeth (1917–2009) is one of the United States' most popular artists, and his paintings follow the American Realist tradition. He was influenced by the works of Winslow Homer, whose watercolor technique he admired, as well as by the art of Howard Pyle and his father, N. C. While Andrew painted recognizable images, his use of line and space often imbue his works with an underlying abstract quality. The exhibition includes important works from the 1970s and 1980s as well as recent paintings.

Henriette Wyeth (1907–1997) was the eldest daughter of N.C. Wyeth and an older sister to Andrew Wyeth. Like other members of her family, her painting style was

realist in a time when Impressionism and Abstraction were popular in the early 20th century. She studied painting at the Pennsylvania Academy of the Fine Arts and was an acclaimed portraitist, though perhaps not as widely known as her father and brown Most notably she painted the portrait of First Lady, Pat Nixon, which is in the collection of The White House.

Jamie Wyeth (born 1946), like his father and grandfather, paints subjects of everyday life, in particular the landscapes, animals, and people of Pennsylvania and Maine. In contrast to his father - who painted with watercolor, drybrush, and tempera - Jamie works in oil and mixed media, creating lush painterly surfaces. The 18 paintings in the exhibition represent all periods of his career.

This exhibition has been loaned through the Bank of America Art in our Communities® program.

Asheville Art Museum in Asheville, NC, Features Works by William Waldo Dodge Jr.

Asheville Art Museum in Asheville, NC, will present *Useful and Beautiful: Silvercraft by William Waldo Dodge* features a selection of functional silver works by Dodge drawn from the Museum's Collection, on view in the Debra McClinton Gallery, from Feb. 23 through Oct. 17, 2022. Organized by the Asheville Art Museum and curated by Whitney Richardson, associate curator.

William Waldo Dodge Jr. (Washington, DC, 1895–1971 Asheville, NC) moved to Asheville in 1924 as a trained architect and a newly skilled silversmith. When he opened for business promoting his handwrought silver tableware, including plates, candlesticks, flatware (spoons, forks, and knives), and serving dishes, he did so in a true Arts and Crafts tradition. The aesthetics of the style were dictated by its philosophy: an artist's handmade creation should reflect their hard work and skill, and the resulting artwork should highlight the material from which it was made. Dodge's silver often displayed his hammer marks and inventive techniques. revealing the beauty of these useful household goods.

The Arts and Crafts style of England became popular in the United States in the early 1900s. Asheville was an early adopter of the movement because of the popularity and abundance of Arts and Crafts architecture in neighborhoods like Biltmore Forest, Biltmore Village, and the area around The Grove Park Inn. The title of this exhibition was taken from the famous quotation by one of the founding

members of the English Arts and Crafts Movement, William Morris, who said, "have nothing in your house that you do not know to be useful or believe to be beautiful." Not only did Dodge follow this suggestion; he contributed to American Arts and Crafts silver's relevancy persisting almost halfway into the 20th century.

"It has been over 15 years since the Museum exhibited its collection of William Waldo Dodge silver and I am looking forward to displaying it in the new space with some new acquisitions added," said Whitney Richardson, associate curator.

Established by artists and incorporated in 1948, the Asheville Art Museum is committed to being a vital force in community and individual development and to providing lifelong opportunities for education and enrichment through the visual arts. The Museum's mission is to engage, enlighten, and inspire individuals and enrich community through dynamic experiences in American art of the 20th and 21st centuries. Alamance County Arts Council in Graham, NC, Features Works by Sia Yazdabfar

The Alamance County Arts Council in Graham, NC, will present *Accidental Traveller: Sia Yazdabfar*, on view in the Sisters Galleries, at the 1873 Capt. James & Emma Holt White House, from Feb. 7 through Mar. 19, 2022.

Yazdanfar is a freelance photographer, born and raised in Iran, with extended time throughout his formative years spent in Spain, Pakistan, and Nigeria. He has resided in the United States for most of his adult life. A few years ago, he went back to his motherland to explore the timeless traditions and trades of different regions in the country. His series of exhibitions upon his return stateside served as a visual tapestry of the millennia-old architectural wonders of Iran.

Yazdanfar's current exhibition took form over the course of explorations of various Persian Gulf islands and coasts, from August through December of 2021. He had once again returned to Iran during this seemingly endless pandemic, intending on trekking around the provinces of East and West Azerbaijan, in the northwest reaches of the country. When travel restrictions forced him to cancel, fate and chance recommendations landed him in the opposite direction, on the subtropical southern fringes of his motherland.

Boasting some of the most colorful landscape and locals he had ever encountered, Hormozgan Province borders the gulf where it meets the Strait of Hormuz, the preeminent strategic chokepoint on Earth. He believes these voyages yielded some of the most kaleidoscopic and engaging photos he has had the privilege to shoot, capturing some of the lesser known parts of the Middle East.

Travelling to distant places and exploring ways of life different than our own informs our worldview. Even prior to the pandemic, there was a sense of fragmentation in our common fabric. The Coronavirus disease and necessary self-isolation seemed to magnify some of our existing societal ills. As our society opens back up, there is no better time to embrace our differences and similarities than now.

The guiding philosophy and the impetus for this exhibition is twofold. First, through sharing photographs and stories from a misunderstood side of our planet, Yazdanfar hopes to dispel preconceived ideas of life seldom shared with a western audience. Second, he wants to insert the viewer into a world far away, and allow them to draw comparisons with their own everyday routines.

"We all seek familiarity, & I use the medium of photographic storytelling to deliver that," Yazdanfar said.







he was doing and where he was when he created each piece."

Scott has a connection to the Grand Stand via local collectors Charles and Sally Brodhead of Pawleys Island, SC. Miller noted that Where I Long to Be was selected specifically as the 2022 opening exhibition, which will be paired with Synchronicity with works by Alice Ballard and Brian Rutenberg, for the new year.

"New Year, new exhibition," said Miller. "We haven't shown abstract work in a while, so we're excited to kick off the new year with something fresh for our viewers. 

For her first public showing and in celebration of Black History Month, Goldsboro native Mollissie Peterson will bring a sampling of her vast collection of art and artifacts to share with residents of her hometown.

"Who we are as a people is the sum total of the stories we tell ourselves, handed down from generation to generation in a painting, sculpture or even a chair," explains Peterson. "I've been moved to start collecting in an effort to pull together the stories of the past. In my journey, I realized there's pain in our history, but also there's so much strength, joy and celebration to be remembered and passed on. This Black History Month, I'm excited to share this work in my hometown because Goldsboro is where my story began, and I'm hoping to stir the soul of conversation and remembrance."

The founding arts and cultural curator of the Rosepot Collection, Peterson seeks to tell the story of the African diaspora through her vast collection of art and artifacts that spans centuries, starting from the early 12th century to present day. Today, the Rosepot Collection consist of more than 1000 pieces, including ceremonial masks from West and Central Africa, antebellum slave writings, art procured by famous American literary icons, such as

Maya Angelou and Alex Hailey, and fine art by internationally acclaimed artists Ernie Barnes, Charly "Carlos" Palmer, and Margaret May Dashiell.

While Peterson has been collecting pieces for over 30 years, her love for cultural preservation started with her grandfather William Henry Peterson, a community man and 32rd degree mason from North End District of Goldsboro. From her grandfather's 1850s Planters Clock, the Rosepot Collection has grown into an homage to the thriving and resilient heritage of African Americans.

Peterson, a 1982 graduate of Goldsboro High School, currently resides in Burlington, NC.

Emergence, an exhibit of artwork by Maximillian Mozingo, will also open at the ACWC on Feb. 4 and will be up through Mar. 18. This is his second exhibit in the ACWC's main gallery. His work also has been shown in Kinston, New Bern, Raleigh and New York.

Born in Goldsboro into a creative family of musicians and authors, Mozingo's artistic process began as a child sketching cartoons and comic book heroes. He is self-taught and relies on instinct to guide his bold and attention grabbing creations.


Mozingo designed the mural *Together We Rise* that's located on the exterior of the Arts Council building and led community members in its painting last year.



The North Carolina Museum of Art (NCMA) in Raleigh, NC, will host Container/Contained: Phil Freelon Design Strategies for Telling African American Stories, on view from Feb. 26 through

The exhibition celebrates the accomplished North Carolina architect Philip G. Freelon (1953–2019) and his remarkable career of over four decades designing public buildings with his firm, The Freelon Group, and later as design director of Perkins&Will North Carolina

"We're honored to help tell the story of Phil Freelon and his incredible accomplishments. The symbolism and metaphors in the buildings he designed celebrate Black communities and histories in a lasting way," said Museum Director Valerie Hillings. "Freelon served on the North Carolina Museum of Art Foundation Board from 2008 to 2012, so we are especially pleased to present this exhibition focused on his groundbreaking career."

This exhibition, organized by a team of faculty and students led by Dr. Emily Makas from the School of Architecture at the University of North Carolina at Charlotte, debuted at the Harvey B. Gantt Center for African American Arts and Culture in Charlotte, NC. It examines Freelon's work, which includes museums, libraries, cultural centers, and public parks, with a focus on projects that embrace Black communities and identities. Freelon often noted that architecture should be more than a container - it should help tell the story of and be integral to the content of public institutions. To explore the rela-

tionship between the container and the contained in Freelon's architecture, this exhibition analyzes connections among the forms, materials, and meanings of his projects and the histories and cultures they celebrate.

Freelon's notable designs include the National Museum of African American History and Culture in Washington, DC; the National Center for Civil and Human Rights in Atlanta; the Museum of the African Diaspora in San Francisco; the Harvey B. Gantt Center for African American Arts and Culture in Charlotte; the Mississippi Civil Rights Museum in Jackson; and the

forthcoming Freedom Park in Raleigh. Freelon and his team drew on histories of neighborhoods, connections to African American communities, and African pasts to create designs rooted firmly in place and time. Activism and celebration of heritage are subtly present in Freelon's work.

He was a master of formal symbolism and design metaphors that are thoughtful and thought-provoking and reference culture and history. Freelon's work, for example, examines the multiple functions and meanings of skin - as both a protective covering and a visual form of identification. In his designs for African American communities and institutions, he expanded the idea of skin with complex building exteriors that explore the use of color, pattern, and material.

The exhibition was researched, curated, and designed by a team of faculty and students led by Dr. Emily Makas from the School of Architecture at the University of North Carolina at Charlotte. This work was made possible by support from UNC Charlotte's School of Architecture, College of Arts and Architecture, Chancellor's Diversity Grant Program, and Office of Undergraduate Research, as well as from Perkins&Will. During the Great Depression of the 1930s, President Franklin Delano Roosevelt launched his ambitious Works Progress Administration (WPA) programs that sent millions of unemployed Americans back to work, including more than 5,000 artists. The Federal Art Project, formed under the WPA, afforded opportunities to a diverse group of artists, including women, African Americans and recent immigrants from China, Russia and Germany. This monumental effort to put artists back to work resulted in a collection of

challenges. The Gibbes is one of a select group of institutions across the country that houses a historic collection of Federal Art Project prints. Gallery 2 & 3, Through Feb. 20 - "Light Effects: The French Impressionists". The works of French masters Edgar Degas, Paul Cézanne, Auguste Renoir, Paul Gauguin, and others drawn to the short loose brushstrokes, bright colors, and focus on modern life that became the language of Impressionism are highlighted in this exhibition. Featuring artworks from private collections located across the country, including Charleston, this show is part of the Gibbes collectors' exhibition series and is organized with the assistance of The Fine Art Group. This exhibition is made possible by support provided by Lynch Cracraft Wealth Management of Raymond James; UBS; PURE Insurance, The Cuddy Family; Jack Hoey; Hall and Christine McGee, and Judith Green and Dr. Michael Fritz. Feb. 25 - Oct. 9 - "William Eggleston Photographs from the Laura and Jay Crouse Collection". It is said that William Eggleston's unique ability to conflate the epic and the everyday has made him one of the most impactful figures in late 20th century photography. A native of Memphis, TN, Eggleston first photographed his local environs in the 1950s in black-and-white but became one of the first fine art photographers to use color to record his observations in a more heightened and accurate way. Today, his strikingly vivid yet enigmatic images of parked cars, billboards, storefronts, diners and other artifacts of the ordinary world are considered groundbreaking. The photographs presented in this edition of the museum's Charleston Collects exhibition series were selected from the Laura and Jay Crouse Collection and represent many of the pioneering artist's most notable works. The exhibition will be accompanied by a full-color catalog with an essay on the artist by Simon Constantine, Ph.D., professor of photographic history at Birkbeck, University of London, and Sotheby's Art Institute. Galleries 1, 4, and 5, Permanent Exhibition -"18th and 19th Century American Paintings and Sculpture". American paintings, from colonial portraits to Civil War-era landscapes, occupy the Gibbes Main Gallery. Portraits of leading political, social, and military figures include works by Jeremiah Theus, Henry Benbridge, Benjamin West, Gilbert Stuart, Thomas Sully and Samuel F.B. Morse. The gallery also features landscape and genre scenes by Angelica Kaufmann, Louis Mignot, Eastman Johnson, Conrad Wise Chapman, and William Aiken Walker. The paintings collection is complemented by examples of neoclassical sculpture on view in the Campbell Rotunda, and decorative art objects on loan from the Rivers Collection. Gallery 5, Permanent Exhibition - "Miniature Portraits". The first American miniature portraits were painted in Charleston, and today the Gibbes is home to one of the most prestigious portrait miniature collections in the United States. Containing more than six hundred objects, the collection spans nearly two hundred years and represents the work of over a hundred artists. Small enough to fit in the palm of the hand, these tiny portraits were treasured remembrances of loved ones in the age before photography. Presented in state-of-the-art display cases, and in viewable storage drawers featured miniatures include works by Mary Roberts, Jeremiah Theus, Henry Benbridge, Charles Wilson Peale, Pierre Henri, Edward Greene Malbone, George Engleheart, and Charles Fraser. Gallery 6, Permanent Exhibition - "20th Century American Regionalism and the Charleston Renaissance". At the turn of the twentieth century, American artists looked to their European counterparts and beyond as they developed identifiably American artistic movements. Two particularly strong influences during this time period were French Impressionism and Japanese woodblock prints. Another prevailing theme during this period was the growing interest in American subject matter. American regionalism and social realism played important roles in the development of art in Charleston, which flourished as a destination for artists, particularly during the years of 1915 to 1945 a period now known as the Charleston Renaissance. Gallery 7, Permanent Exhibition - "Modern and Contemporary". Modern and contemporary art in America encompasses a wide range of styles, subject matter, and media. As a whole, the diversity of modern and contemporary art reflects the rich and varied heritage of our nation and the lowcountry region. Works in this gallery were created over the past forty years by artists who are native to the area, who have worked here, or who have created objects that reflect the complex story of the region. The works are grouped to reflect several themes including the southern landscape, the human figure, abstraction, and the legacy of slavery in America. 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

Born in Brooklyn, NY in 1920, Krisel's interest in art and design started at a young age. He attended the American Artist School in New York city as a teenager where he met renowned modern artists, including Piet Mondrian, who greatly influenced his abstract style. After studying architecture at the New Bauhaus in Chicago from 1946-1949, he received his graduate degree from Illinois Institute of Technology in 1952. The following year, he began working for architectural firm Skidmore, Owings and Merrill when Roger Milliken hired them to design Milliken's new research facility in Spartanburg. Upon realizing Krisel was also a sculptor, Milliken hired him to design the spray fountain outside of the facility which functions as a recycler of air conditioning water. He then went on to design the Trident

Far greater than just the physical similarities, both species have large brains capable of exhibiting great intelligence as well as an incredible emotional range. Chimpanzees form tight social bonds, especially between mothers and children, create tools to assist with eating and express joy by hugging and kissing one another. Over 1,000,000 chimpanzees roamed the tropical rain forests of Africa just a century ago. Now listed as endangered, less than 300,000 exist in the wild because of poaching, the illegal pet trade and habitat loss due to human encroachment. Often, chimpanzees are killed, leaving orphans that are traded and sold around the world. In the case of chimpanzees and other great apes, research has shown that certain individuals respond to color and enjoy painting as a type of enrichment. Like human artists, each chimpanzee has a unique reaction and approach to their canvas. While most chimpanzees enjoy using their hands and feet, occasionally even their lips, some have even learned how to use a paintbrush. Mayer Gallery, Through Feb. 5 - "Matters of the Heart (and Other Abnormalities): Shawn Morin". The exhibition explores concepts of human relationships. It seems to me that since 9/11 and Y2K, there has been a fundamental shift in the way many humans act, react and navigate the world. While Inuit are linked together through art, language, food, and more, there are many unique Inuit communities, dialects, and lifeways across lands that have been renamed Alaska, Russia, Greenland, Canada and beyond. Gallery B, Through May 7 - "In the Garden of Healing: Dara Mark". "The paintings in this ex hibition were made over the five year period after my husband died. Each of them reflects my emotional state during the process of grieving and healing and describes in abstract terms an arc of personal growth. The paintings were not conceived of as therapy per se, but as the only way forward for me as an artist. The medium watercolor on Yupo paper – and the formal issues of transparency, flow and balance, were and are a continuation of my longtime studio practice. Color is always key. For the first year I used black, white and blue exclusively, because that felt right. Two years later, diagnosed with breast cancer, I was drawn to the warm colors of the spectrum: red, pink, orange, yellow," said Mark. 
