Mint Museum Uptown in Charlotte, NC, Features Works by Bearden & Picasso

The Mint Museum Uptown in Charlotte, NC, at the Levine Center for the Arts, will present *Bearden/Picasso: Rhythms and Reverberations*, on view from Feb. 11 through May 21, 2023.

Bearden/Picasso: Rhythms and Reverberations examines the impact of Pablo Picasso's rich artistic practice on Romare Bearden and his work. The exhibition is divided into four sections: Bulls & Bullfights; Music & Rhythm; Doors & Windows; and Line & Color. Each section will feature works by Pablo Picasso and Romare Bearden.

While various aspects of Bearden's engagement with Picasso and Cubism have been occasionally explored, this is the first museum exhibition organized to explore the parallels between the artists. The works in the exhibition are drawn from the Mint's deep holdings of Bearden's art, as well as from both private and museum collections.

Bearden was an ardent scholar of art history who saw many examples of Picasso's work in New York in the 1940s. Bearden wrote about various aspects of Picasso's work during that time and also met Picasso in Paris in the 1950s. The influence of Cubism, and of Picasso's work in particular, can be seen across Bearden's career, from his early oils and watercolors of the 1940s in which his subjects are presented in abstracted planes of color. In the 1950s, Bearden's experimentations with pure abstraction and Cubism can be seen at play. Bearden's

later collages reveal the impact of various aspects of Picasso's work, ranging from the way in which he constructed pictorial space to his use of silhouetted figures and African masks.

though his art focused nearly exclusively on African American subjects, he believed his work had a broader appeal, stating, "I like to think that my work has a universality to it. I deal with love, hope, courage, freedom, and dignity – the full gamut of the human experience."

This exhibition will examine the ongoing relevance of White's artistic achievement today. Featuring a number of extremely rare and significant works, as well as his series of paintings created for Lerone Bennett, Jr.'s "The Shaping of Black America," the galleries will present a monumental reflection on the nature of beauty, aspiration, struggle, and dignity.

It is worth noting several works in this collection were included in *Charles White: A Retrospective*, which traveled from the Art Institute of Chicago, to MoMA, to the Los Angeles County Museum of Art. The itinerary of this widely acclaimed 2018 tour

The Arts Center of Kershaw County in Canden, SC, is presenting *This Far by Faith: Carolina Camp Meetings, An African-American Tradition*, featuring works by Dr. Minuette Floyd, on view in the Bassett Gallery, through Feb. 28, 2023.

This exhibition represents a fourteenyear journey of research, photographs, and video footage by Dr. Minuette Floyd, professor of art education in the School of Visual Art & Design at USC Columbia's campus. Consisting of 42 large black and white photographs, this exhibit explores both the history and traditions of camp meetings that take place annually in the Carolinas.

Floyd's interest in camp meetings derived from her own personal experiences of attending camp meetings in North Carolina. Upon returning to this tradition as an adult, she realized that research and publications were extremely limited and decided to capture the tradition for future generations. Since 2001, Floyd has travelled to seven African-American campgrounds and captured the rich tradition through photography, video, and oral interviews.

A graduate of Winston-Salem University, Floyd also holds a master's degree from the University of North Carolina at Greensboro, and a doctorate degree from Florida State University. Currently, an associate professor at the University of South Carolina, she serves on the Arts in Basic Curriculum Steering Committee, the board of the South Carolina Alliance in Arts Education, and the education advisory committee at the Columbia Museum of Art.
