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The International African American Museum in Charleston, SC, **Features Works by Ming Smith**

The International African American Museum (IAAM) in Charleston, SC, is presenting a special exhibition Ming Smith: Feeling the Future, on view through Apr. 28,2024.

The exhibition explores the artist's unparalleled and under-recognized career from the early 1970s through the present. Smith's first solo exhibition at a major institution is traveling from its debut site, Contemporary Art Museum (CAM) of Houston. The collection encompasses a multitude of artistic expressions that represent her vibrant and multi-layered practice, which is grounded in portraiture, as it amplifies the heartbeat of Black life in the United States. Drawn from the full complexity of

Smith's oeuvre, *Feeling the Future* places works from the artist's five decades of creation in conversation with one another, while it embraces the cultural movements she witnessed and participated in. Exploring themes such as Afrofuturism, Black cultural expression, representation, and social examination, the exhibition offers a guided tour into unperceived moments of life as captured by one of the most profoundly gifted artists of her generation.

"Ming Smith is the one of the most important photographers of our time. As the first woman to join Kamoinge - a groundbreaking Black photography collective - she has broken barriers that live at the intersection of race and gender. Her work can be found at the most significant institutions in the world, from The Whitney to the Schomburg, and has been shown at many more, including Tate Modern and MoMA. Still, few of us are yet to know her name, though many know her work.

Her iconic images of artists like Tina Turner and Nina Simone have come across our timelines and for a moment, stopped us in time. That's how remarkable her lens is as it captures the soul of the moment, the movement, and the person. With this solo exhibition, traveling from CAM, we will have the opportunity to not only discover more of her work, but through the work, we will get to meet and to know Ming Smith,"

Gallery Listing A Bit Skimpy On Photos

You might notice that our Gallery Listings are really void of many photos of artworks this month. That was partly planned and partly due to the lack of new photos being sent by e-mail or being posted on social media.

I can't stand using some of the same photos over and over again to spice up those gallery listings. But photos of artworks make those listings more palatable to the readers - or should I say observers. As I'm

not sure anyone really reads the Gallery Listings. While those listing make up half of our publication every month, they are not as interesting as the featured articles, even though they contain lots of information.


All we need for artists and gallery owners to do is send high res images (at least 3" wide by 300dpi) with the names of the artists and the gallery which represents them.

It's a great opportunity for those galleries which do not present exhibitions to get some visibility for their artists or their gallery, as we also include images of inside galleries even the outside of galleries (as least those that look interesting from the outside).

Plus there is always the chance that a photo will catch the eye of this editor and he'll think, "Wouldn't that make a great cover." You never know, but of course then we'll need a much bigger image file for that 10" x 16" space. But that can come later after an image is first seen and then considered to fit our cover needs. And, how that selection is made is an unknown - sometimes right up to deadline.

I will mention that the deadline is always the 24th of the month "prior" to when the next issue starts. Or in the case of you sending in a press release about an exhibit you are having or a gallery is presenting - the 24th of the month "prior" to the month your exhibit will start. We like for readers to be able to attend opening and receptions.

Here's two examples: if an exhibit starts on Mar. 1, you need to send us info on that before the deadline of Feb. 24th and an exhibit which starts Mar. 26, you still need to send us that info before the deadline of Feb. 24 - not by Mar. 16 or the weekend before the exhibit starts - it takes time to put an issue together. And whenever there is a beginning date of an exhibit there is an ending date (except for some institutions). And don't forget the reception date and time.



Rolf Anthony Young was born in Vienna, Austria, and lived in London, New York City, Connecticut, and South Carolina as a young child. He spent his formative years in Reston, VA, and went on to study fine arts at Virginia Commonwealth University where he earned a BFA in Sculpture & Extended Media. He moved to Charleston, SC, in 2002, where he used his art skills to build a professional career as a graphic designer and drafter. It was not until 2016, while living in Los Angeles, CA, that his passion for art making was reborn

Anthony Young has exhibited in Northern and Southern California; Raleigh, NC, and the Lowcountry of South Carolina. In One Pueblo: Keys to Harmony, Sumaya Florez presents a collection of drawings and paintings that focus on a mixture of realism and magical realism, depicting environments and elements originating from her beautiful and beloved homeland of Venezuela. Her works focus on still-life and genre art that portrays people with vintage and classical components. She also explores Catholic imagery that calls to mind classical High Renaissance depictions of the Madonna and Child and Christ iconography, each with a twist that is unmistakably her own. A unique signature that is consistently found throughout Sumaya's works is the inclusion of a key. "This key is an homage to my Guardian Angel and a unique signature," Florez explains. Inspired by ideals of a peaceful, close-knit society, she strives to spread messages of peace, hope and joy through her art.

Originally from Maracaibo, the second largest city in Venezuela, Sumaya Florez uses her art to reminisce about the city she knew in her youth – one full of vibrance, warmth, peace, and promise, far removed from the Maracaibo that exists today due to the political unrest in Venezuela. Since childhood, she held a deep passion for all forms of art but chose to pursue her love of service, graduating first as a Medical Doctor from the University of Zulia in Venezuela and then as a Master of Public Health at the University of Miami

In 2013, Florez finally made the decision dedicate herself to the arts. She began exhibiting her paintings and drawings in 2015 and has continued to display her work in Florida and the Lowcountry ever since.

Corrigan Gallery llc in Charleston, SC will present Blueprints, featuring works by Cindy Cline, from Feb. 1 - 28, 2024. A reception will be held on Feb. 2, from 5-8pm. This exhibit is Cindy Cline's first show of cyanotypes. In 2020 Cline made her first Cyanotype and loved the process. Her reaction to the process leads her to say, "The act of making a print is both formulaic and intuitive, allowing for creativity and improvisation. It creates space to both focus and drift. The printmaking process is conspicuously devoid of technology. The process is tactile. The feel of the paper, application of the emulsion, the rinsing of the print all affect the finished image and the artistic experience."

Staffed by its knowledgeable and friendly member-artisans, Charleston Crafts Gallery is a dynamic cooperative community of more than two dozen jury-selected

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

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interesting, but we got busy and I didn't have time to keep up with that feature. This month, Murray Sease of La Petite Gallerie in Bluffton, SC, sent us an article about one of her fellow gallery artists . And she plans to visit several more during 2024.

Studio with a View by Murray Sease

Sculptor Wally Palmer may have the most picturesque workspace in Beaufort County, SC. Spectacular sunrises over the Okatie River jump start each day for this lowcountry artist. When I visited his 'Smoking Bird Studio' on a recent winter afternoon, Wally had the wood fire stoked in the indoor studio space that is chock full of the tools of his trade – brushes, paints, molds, and hand tools of all kinds. It was toasty warm and cozy, with two of his relief sculptures laid out awaiting the next step in their patina process

But looking out over his work tables, through the wall of windows, over his decks and yard filled with various projects to the incoming tide, the chilly outdoor area was irresistible. Out there on the work deck Wally demonstrated spraying the chemicals necessary to oxidize the bronze coating onto two more of his pieces, transforming them to a beautiful green patina. Next he will start the burnishing process, using steel wool to



areas to best show perfect reflections and highlights. Then will come a coat of wax and buffing which captures that 'point of perfection' which is unique to each piece.

Probably best known for these bas-relief sculptures of bronze and iron over resin, Wally's art graces many lowcountry homes and outdoor living areas. Before the final patina and buffing that I got to witness, a process of sculpting with clay, building a mold around it and mixing and pouring a resin material into that, makes each piece a multi-step endeavor. The main subject matters are local wading birds and creatures from the sea - crabs, shrimp, turtles and fish His line of palmetto trees, some featuring a South Carolina moon, are delightful. They are all substantial pieces of art that have beautiful patinas - some with iron finishes are charmingly rusty, while the bronze finishes have varying degrees of a natural green/blue patina that just looks better and better with age.

Influenced not only by his incredibly talented family of artists (including his father, famed sculptor Walter Palmer) Wally looks to the old masters as well as more modern creators like Georgia O'Keefe and Ernie Barnes for his inspiration. With these influences dancing in his head Wally designs and builds large scale sculptural pieces and fountains, sometimes including tabby (a

traditional lowcountry building material composed of ground oyster shells, lime, and sand, mixed with salt water) and glass beads. He often incorporates recycled materials such as styrofoam blocks he collects from the waterways that his studio overlooks. He is happiest as he carves out armatures for large sculptures, adding fiberglass - using both reductive and additive process of sculpting - concentrating on what he wants to say as an artist.

Wally also has a thriving sculpture repair business, dedicated to restoring his father's humorous birds and other sculptures that are so popular here and around the country. Many of them have spent their lives outdoors where the weather has been very hard on them, and the older-style materials used when they were first created have not held up well. Using improved compounds and materials, replacing wooden legs and

beaks with bronze, Wally and his crew have brought many of them back to their former glory for their happy owners. I was delighted to get to see several of these pieces in various stages of repair and recline around the studio and property.


Wally Palmer is one of six artist/owners of the cooperative La Petite Gallerie in Old Town Bluffton. When he can tear himself away from his glorious studio Wally mans the gallery desk - and garden deck - usually on Fridays and festival days. His, long-time girlfriend Denise Pope, and a fluctuating gang of local musicians often entertain visitors with foot-stomping bluegrass music during Art Walks and other outdoor events always open to the public.

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














The Greenville Center for Creative Arts in Greenville, SC, will present Long Overdue: Embracing Contributions from Women in the Arts, featuring Traci Wright Martin and Michelle Berg Radford, on view in their Main Gallery, from Feb. 2 through Mar. 27, 2024. A reception will be held on Feb. 2, from 6-9pm. During the opening reception CEO, Jess Burgess, will give remarks on all that is happening at GCCA.

In Long Overdue, Traci Wright Martin and Michelle Berg Radford underscore the importance of recognizing and acknowledging women's contributions to the arts. Traci Wright Martin's charcoal and mixed media series, "Art Herstory and the Moth," art history, paying tribute to them through visual quotations and symbolism. Michelle Berg Radford highlights the historical oversight of women's textile work and aims to bring recognition to their innovative designs as valuable artistic expressions.

Both artists challenge traditional perceptions of gender norms, albeit in different contexts. Wright Martin challenges the overshadowing of female artists in art history by drawing a parallel to imagery of moths. Often an overlooked organism, the moth in Martin's work symbolizes the need for representation of the feminine art experience. Meanwhile, Radford challenges distinctions between art and craft, conceptual and decorative, urging viewers to reconsider their attitudes toward women's stitchwork and handicrafts.

Michelle Berg Radford is a multi-disciplinary artist working at the intersection of women's craft and what is considered "fine art painting." Michelle earned an MFA from the Savannah College of Art and Design where she studied landscape painting and fiber arts. Michelle is also an educator with

For millennia, women have expressed their creativity and skill in clothing families and caring for their private spaces through textiles. Their innovative designs have often been overlooked as art, but are now slowly being recognized for the innovative and insightful works that they are.

"In this work, I join women's handicrafts with landscape painting, a well-trodden genre in art, to introduce a new way of looking at both," said Radford. "These pieces begin as flat canvas studio paintings which I then fold and stitch to create dimensional smocked paintings. I borrow a time-honored heirloom sewing technique traditionally employed by women to construct garments and translate it through scale into contemporary sculptural paintings. By presenting these works in a gallery setting in which fine art is viewed, the viewer is called to acknowledge women's stitch-work as valuable expressions of the maker and to question their own attitudes about the common distinctions between art versus craft, skilled versus unskilled, conceptual versus decorative, and fine versus ordinary."

tial portion of the painting is hidden, an apt metaphor for the hiddenness of much of women's valuable work of caring."

Traci Wright Martin is an award-winning charcoal and mixed media artist. The overall narrative in her portrait and figurative work addresses the idea of representation, weaving contemporary realism with abstract design elements. Her pioneering approach to mixed media utilizes charcoal as the foundation and brings in various combinations of paint, patterned paper collage and other experimental techniques to the finished design. The primary thematic focus in Martin's work is the legacy and evolution of the female experience and its influence on artmaking and cultural traditions. She ties an autobiographical visual philosophy to the broader, shared human experience through symbolic elements of nature in a unique, yet relatable style.

After graduating with a BA in Art from Southeastern Oklahoma State University, she spent her early career showing extensively in the Oklahoma and Texas art scenes, with artist teaching residencies in Oklahoma, Arizona and Alaska. Solo and group shows have included the Oklahoma State Capitol gallery, Oklahoma Contemporary, The Charles B. Goddard Center, IAO Gallery, 33 Contemporary Gallery in Chicago, the Wausau Museum of Contemporary Art, Brookgreen Gardens Museum, The Grand Bohemian Gallery, and both the Equity Gallery and the Salmagundi Club in



New York City.

Martin has received numerous awards and top accolades in international, national and regional juried shows, claiming multiple "Best in Show" titles. Her work has been featured in a number of publications including Fine Art Connoisseur, Artist's Network: Best of Drawing, American Art Collector, International Artist, Pastel Journal, New Visionary Artist Magazine, and a selection of titles for Poets Artists. 

thick, dark cloud runs throughout his draws, and according to him, "The sparse visual cues ironically expand the range of implicit meanings or narratives. By situating viewers on the precarious edge of meaning, they are given the problem of negotiating an ambiguous image."

Greene chooses to create narratives of dilapidation and decay by combining carcasses of local wildlife with abandoned man-made industrial materials. thing greater than ourselves. It carries our values, beliefs and morals guiding our choices and actions. The soul is eternal and transcendent.'

This is the first exhibit the two have done together, so they decided to include a collaborative piece they both worked on called "Soul Portal."

"We both have put our own hearts and souls into creating this body of work, so we hope visitors will be able to see and feel that," Crawford says, adding that the exhibit is "perfect" for February, "when many of us are thinking about love and connection. Grab a special someone and come see it together.

The pieces in the exhibit will include vibrant colors and various media, "to capture the emotions that emerge from the depth of our hearts," she adds. "The artworks evoke a sense of play and vulnerability celebrating the range of human emotions that shape our existence. By doing so, we want to inspire viewers to connect with their own hearts and recognize the power of emotional landscapes. We hope people can feel lighter, joyful and more connected to each other and to their own heart and soul."

Lady Pluuto was born Alana Hall in Austell, GA, and now is based in Spartanburg. "As a self-taught artist, I learned a lot of valuable advice from watching other great artists. Painting is more than just creating art for me, it's therapy. I paint mostly from intuition, which allows me to release dark thoughts and negative emotions, then redirect that energy in a healthy, beautiful way. Because of this, creating art plays a major role along my spiritual journey.'

Crawford, who studied at Emerson College, Massachusetts College of Art, and Rochester Institute of Technology's School of Photographic Arts and Sciences, says her mixed media art helps her to always explore and play with multiple media and develop techniques of her own.

"My current obsessions are a combination of acrylic, resin, stones, crystals, other found objects and alcohol inks. My work celebrates the unique beauty of color and

combines it with the shimmer and sparkle of crystals for an unforgettable visual experience. I strive to create pieces that evoke emotion, beauty, and spirit. By promoting the joy of exploration, I hope my work will inspire the viewer to appreciate the color and luminescence of crystals and the elusive essence of the magic of light."

Both artists are members of the Artist Collective | Spartanburg - Lady Pluuto for five years and Crawford for two. one less fireman, or policeman, or doctor or whatever. I was going to be a potter." Weber says his pots are, for the most part, vessels

"The potters of my earlier memories made traditional, utilitarian sorts of pots. Those influences coupled with my geographic location and its historic implications, shaped me into the potter I am today as surely as I shape my own work."

He adds that "function, form and color" are his primary considerations when potting. "I rarely embellish or sculpt artistic designs as an act of creative composition. I use clay more as a building material than as a canvas on which to paint - less artist, more engineer. The trend in pottery today seems to me to lean heavily toward objects of art, which happen to be made of clay, with increasingly less emphasis on traditional utilitarian forms. While I celebrate the former, I regret the loss of the latter."

Weber has taught pottery for the past 25 years to "all comers," including small children as young as 4 years old and to older adults as old as 89. He teaches two classes for those 55 years old and older at the Senior Action center in Greenville.

"I have regularly demonstrated my craft as an act of sharing, much as I saw the demonstration when I was a young child," he says. "There is a long, but straight line, from those first 'sharings' in my community, when I was too young to remember from year to year how much I enjoyed the potter and his wheel, to the classes I've taught and the demonstrations I give. It has been more

than 50 years since my first class and almost 60 years have passed since that first demo at a local art festival.

"I am now nearly the potter I once thought I'd be," he adds. "I am blessed." Weber says he's glad to be a part of the Artists Collective | Spartanburg making his pottery and showing his works. "I love the Collective. I don't know that I'd be making pots and teaching pottery at all right now if not for the Artists Collective."

Artists Collective | Spartanburg, SC, will present Shaped by Clay: Clayshaper Jim Weber, on view in Gallery III, from Feb. 6 through Mar. 2, 2024. Upstate potter Jim Weber doesn't consider himself an artist, but many of those who own some of his works may disagree, choosing to display their pieces in their homes or offices as decorative art. Weber will exhibit his "traditional utilitarian and decorative" pottery.

"I am not an artist," Weber emphasizes. I've been a potter for over 50 years, nearly 40 of those full-time."

Making those utilitarian pieces – mugs, bowls, plates, pitchers and vases - Weber says he approaches his work "more as an 'engineer' than as an 'artist.' While many of my pieces are chosen to fill a space as a decorative object, the fact remains that it is a secondary aspect of my pottery.

"It is apparent to makers that simple objects that function well also are pleasing to the eye in form," he continues. "'Form follows function' is a truth that we know. I'm a better man for my years as a potter. My 'form' has absolutely followed my 'function.' I learned all that I needed to know from my potter's wheel.'

As visitors view the numerous pieces in the exhibition, including vases and a table set with dinnerware, Weber hopes they see them as "pretty and useful" and that they will see "a lifetime of skills-gaining" as well as come away with an appreciation for

"well-crafted pottery." "These are some of the best pieces I've ever turned," he says.



Weber says he was "born an old, but not bent, potter" in Greenville, SC, which he notes is "clay country."

"My arrival in this area post-dated the decline, and eventual failure, of the local pottery industry by a matter of a few decades," he notes. "The tradition of handturned pottery for household and industrial needs ran strong there for most of two centuries. As the world turned toward modern industry, so it turned away from the artisans and craft masters who had supplied the people their needful implements of the day, including pottery. By the time I was born, virtually all of the pottery-making families had left their traditional skills or lost them as they took on new skills and traditions.

"All of these factors and considerations contributed to a very young Jimmy Weber - me - seeing a local potter demonstrate his skills at a local arts festival," he continues. "The community would have to survive continued above on next column to the right




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Columbia Museum of Art in Columbia, SC, **Features Works by Darrel Ellis & Works Focused on Modern American Spaces**

The Columbia Museum of Art in Columbia, SC, will present Darrel Ellis: Regeneration, on view from Feb. 17 through May 12,2024.

Over the course of his career, Darrel Ellis developed a distinct studio practice that merged the formal vocabularies of drawing, photography, painting, and printmaking to redefine Black male identity and family within the constructs of art history and mainstream culture.

Ellis was influential during his life, inspiring the work of other artists and participating in more than 20 group exhibitions in New York and Europe before his career was cut short in 1992 by his death at the age of 33 due to an AIDS-related illness. To produce his groundbreaking images, Ellis shifted across a wide range of media, employing painting, printmaking, drawing, sculpture, and collage to generate endless variations on a single image. This often involved projecting photographic negatives onto sculpted reliefs and re-photographing the results

This exhibition examines the full arc of Ellis's career through approximately 60 works on paper, including a historically significant body of work that captures the experiences and public perceptions of Black men living with the AIDS virus, as well as an expansive group of portraits of his family members that offer a record of Black domestic life.

Also on view will be the exhibit, Interior Lives: Modern American Spaces, 1890 -1945, from Feb. 17 through May 12, 2024.

Through the lenses of interior scenes and material culture, Interior Lives explores the ways everyday Americans lived, worked, played, and evolved their identities in the first half of the 20th century. Homes, workplaces, and the spaces between were newly envisioned in response to socioeconomic and technological shifts. American artists, many of whom continued to work in a representational style, bore witness to the inception of a modern world and interpreted it as it manifested before them. The works on view in this exhibition - primarily portraits, genre scenes, and still lifes - are often modest in scale and humble in subject vet penetrating in their cultural and psychological implications.

The exhibition takes the 1890s as its starting point, a decade that encompassed the late Gilded Age and saw the beginnings of the Progressive Era reform movement. It extends through the end of World War II, when the United States entered a new period of global influence and when abstraction took over as the dominant artistic style. Over the course of these six decades, the widespread implementation of the telephone, the building of mass transit systems, and the proliferation of industrially manufactured goods inspired a new, rapid pace of life.

Interior Lives features more than 50

The Columbia Museum of Art in Columbia, SC, announces Darrel Ellis: Regeneration, on view from Feb. 17, through May 12. 2024. The exhibition will be fêted with an afternoon of art activities and talks at the opening celebration on Saturday, Feb. 17, from 1-4pm, with Talks from 2-3:30pm.

From the exhibition text: "Can a photograph keep a memory alive? This is the question at the heart of the complex, convention-bending practice of Darrel Ellis. Ellis was a precocious artist whose major innovation involved projecting photographs he inherited from his father, Thomas Ellis, onto hand-made, sculpted surfaces, then rephotographing the distorted image. He similarly translated his own photographs into paintings and drawings."

Ellis was influential during his life, inspiring the work of other artists and participating in more than 20 group exhibitions in New York and Europe before his career was cut short in 1992 by his death at the age of 33 due to an AIDS-related illness. While his work was included in important contemporary surveys, it is only now garnering the posthumous attention it deserves.

To produce his groundbreaking images, Ellis shifted across a wide range of media, employing painting, printmaking, drawing, sculpture, and photography to generate endless variations on a single image. This often involved projecting photographic negatives onto sculpted reliefs and re-photographing the results. projected surfaces, blocking and blurring areas of the image, and experimented with post-production color tints and ink washes, producing painterly effects on the photographs. Ellis' approach to appropriation was unique among contemporaries as he often used his deceased father's photographic archives as primary source material.

Darrel Ellis: Regeneration examines the full arc of Ellis's career through approxinately 55 works on paper, including a historically significant body of work that captures the experiences and public perceptions of Black men living with the AIDS virus, as well as an expansive group of portraits of his family members that offer a record of Black domestic life. The exhibition also reveals the results of the most comprehensive technical study of Ellis' singular process and features archival materials that provide new insights into the artist's life and work.

Three decades after his passing in 1992, the CMA is thrilled to present the work of Darrel Ellis through the collaboration of The Bronx Museum of the Arts and the Baltimore Museum of Art in this exhibition, bringing fresh scholarship plus critical attention to the artist and his oeuvre.

"Today, we publicize ideas of ourselves through a plethora of digital tools at our fingertips, but before there were iPhones, filters, and Photoshop, there was Darrel Ellis, says CMA Director of Art and Learning Jackie Adams. "Ellis' multi-experimental processes proliferated from his own archive of family photographs and negatives, and

The early years were about general education in a settlement school setting, but the curriculum was soon added in mountain handicrafts to preserve skills and provide vehicles of livelihood for area residents.



The Southern Highland Craft Guild opens its first focus gallery exhibition of 2024 with Art of Detailing, featuring both traditional and contemporary craft by five members of the Guild. The exhibit will feature wool and silk by Judy Ott, pottery by Michael and Ruth Rutkowsky, sculptural and functional brooms by Peter Werner, colorful glass-blown vessels by Kathryn Adams, and foiled-stamped vessels by Kelsey Schissel.

Originally from New York, Judy Ott is a fairly new member of the Southern Highland Craft Guild (2021). She creates artful apparel in her Asheville, NC studio using techniques such as mixing yarns with varying shrinkage to create three-dimensional cloth, adding magic and surprise to both her felting and weaving work. "Almost all of my work features wool and silk. I love the way the wool shrinks and the silk does not. It allows for texture and nuance of the piece," states Ott. "Both of the felted pieces in the exhibit have a silk base and use merino wool. The woven piece is cotton, silk and merino wool where again the wool shrinks and the cotton and silk do not. That is the reason the piece looks so textural."

Husband and wife Michael and Ruth Rutkowsky are potters with over 65 years of combined studio experience, each creating their own line of work. Their studio is in the foothills of the Black Mountains in Burnsville, NC.



From Alpha to Creation distinguishes itself from antiquated or heavily stereotyped studies of Southern culture that often disregard our complexities. It instead focuses on the spiritual innovations that allow many of us to maintain a dedicated relationship with our religious heritages, from Abrahamic denominations to composite belief systems like Hoodoo. For many artists throughout the exhibition - who originated or worked extensively in the region - the South represents a unique context for religious expression reflected by our racial, political, and economic structures.

The National Association of Women Artists (NAWA) was established in 1889 and serves as an organization to promote, educate and support women in the arts. 

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

Initially grounded in documentary photography when he was the youngest photographer hired by *LIFE* magazine at age 23, his work grew into a combination of split-second impressions reflecting the human condition during his tenure as a member of the prestigious international Magnum cooperative founded by one of his mentors Henri Cartier-Bresson.

For 15 years, Uzzle was an active contributor to the evolution of the organization and served as its President in 1979 and 1980. During the 16 years he was associated with Magnum, he produced some of the most recognizable images we have of Woodstock (album cover and worldwide reproduction of its iconic couple hugging at dawn) to the assassination and funeral of Martin Luther King Jr. to our comprehension for the experience of Cambodian war refugees.

His archive spans six decades. His current work rests deep in photographic appreciation of the quiet, strong, and eloquent beauty he discovers in America's small towns and its people. It is along small back roads, limned with feelings and a surety of surprise for the heart wide open, that continue to support his understanding of how America keeps its personality out on a limb. Uzzle's current bodies of work (some of which are African-American) are artful and constructed reflections of his subjects. His hope is for a graphic presentation of something universal within the particular.

Uzzle's work has been the subject of several solo museum shows, and his work is in important public and private collections. Craven Allen Gallery is located on Broad Street in Durham.



song is a re-imagining of the myth based on the December sky conjunction of the two planets," explained Wartski. "My sculpture is a re-imagining of Mary's song. She tells the tale of Venus's yearly plea to Jupiter to accept her and Mars' love child. My Venus is dancing to please herself, and doesn't care if she has Jupiter's approval. She is dancing with her own joy.'

Botanical artist Chris Graebner was inspired by the song Cotton to look at the cotton blossom more closely. Cotton is in the mallow family which makes it a relative of hibiscus, okra and hollyhocks, among other garden favorites. Its flowers are similar to theirs in shape, but while cotton flowers are white when they open, after pollination they begin to change color and in several days they become a bright fuchsia.

Nancy Smith was inspired by the song Oleander to create a portrait. The song speaks about a mother's giving her beautiful daughter a poisonous name for protection. In creating the painting, Smith imagined the daughter holding onto her innocence despite living the legacy of her mother's curse. The images in *Deep December Dreams* provided fertile inspiration for the Hillsborough Gallery of Arts' 21 visual artists.

His ties to the Spartanburg community originate from his longtime employment at Milliken and Company Tait was born in Old Town, Maine in 1917 and graduated from the New Hampshire Institute of Arts and Science. In the late 1940s, he moved to New York City where he designed an exclusive line of ladies' handkerchiefs for the department store B. Altman, now considered vintage, collectible items. He also became associated with the American Artist Group designing Christmas cards, an occupation which he kept up throughout the majority of his artistic career. Krisel was a distinguished artist, architect, and teacher as well as a loving father and husband Though Krisel may not be a household name among Spartanburg residents, he has made a significant artistic contribution to the Spartanburg community. Born in Brooklyn, NY in 1920, Krisel's interest in art and design started at a young age. He attended the American Artist School in New York city as a teenager where he met renowned modern artists, including Piet Mondrian, who greatly influenced his abstract style. After studying architecture at the New Bauhaus in Chicago from 1946-1949, he received his graduate degree from Illinois Institute of Technology in 1952. The following vear. he began working for architectural firm Skidmore, Owings and Merrill when Roger Milliken hired them to design Milliken's new research facility in Spartanburg. 

Her vibrant and multilayered painting highlights the complexities of the Black American experience and the indomitable resilience of the Diaspora. Featuring spray paint on cut wood with custom-printed wallpaper, the central focus of this work challenges the conventions of classical portraiture by leaning into the world of the abstract motifs and visual aphorisms that surround her subject. The title of the piece, Pantheress. is a tribute to the instrumental work of the women of the Black Panther movement. The work, featuring timeless geometric and natural forms, can be seen as both a product of this past and a harbinger for a hopeful future. From crocks, jars, and jugs to pitchers, candleholders, and vases, "turning pots" is one of the oldest and richest craft traditions in North Carolina. For more than 200 years, members of the Cole family have been potting in central North Carolina - Randolph. Moore. Lee. and Montgomerv counties. Six generations of Coles, and no fewer than 18 individuals, are represented in The Mint Museum's permanent collection. More than 60 highlights of their wares are included in the installation "The Cole Family: A Dynasty of North Carolina Potters". One reason for its long-term success is that making pottery has so often been a family tradition in the state. Fathers taught the art of forming, glazing, and firing clay objects to their sons, and in later generations also to daughters, who in turn taught their children, and so on

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through the decades. These family dynasties not only helped to keep the potting craft alive, but ensured continuity in techniques and craftsmanship. as well as introduced artistic innovations in succeeding generations. "The Cole Family: A Dynasty of North Carolina Potters" presents a visual history of "turned pots" and the family that helped turn North Carolina into one of America's centers for handmade, traditional pottery. Bridges and Levine Galleries, Ongoing - "Contemporary British Studio Ceramics: The Grainer Collection" Focused on the collection of Diane and Marc Grainer, this installation is a survey of contemporary British studio ceramics. Comprising functional and sculptural objects made between the 1980s and today, the show features work by artists either born or residing in Great Britain, including established "contemporary classics" like Gordon Baldwin and Rupert Spira, and cuttingedge ceramicists such as Julian Stair and Kate Malone. Several recently-gifted works from the Grainers are included. Alexander, Spangler, and Harris Galleries, Ongoing - "Portals to the Past: British Ceramics 1675 - 1825". The Mint Museum's collection of eighteenth-century British pottery and porcelain is widely respected for its scope and quality. The collection numbers over 2.000 objects and includes important examples of both salt-glazed and dry-bodied stoneware from Staffordshire; tin-glazed earthenware from Bristol, Liverpool, and London; and creamcolored earthenware from Derbyshire, Staffordshire, and Yorkshire. Notable eighteenth-century porcelain factories represented include Chelsea. Bow, and Vauxhall in London, Longton Hall in Staffordshire, Worcester, Bristol, and others. Individual works in the collection are exceptional because of their rarity, craftsmanship, provenance, or as representative examples of particular types or methods of production or decoration. **Ongoing -** "American Glass". The nineteenth and early twentieth centuries represented a time of extraordinary growth for the American glass industry. Such companies as Boston & Sandwich Glass Company in Sandwich, MA; Steuben Glass Works in Corning, NY; and Libbey Glass Company in Toledo, OH, began operation and soon developed notable reputations for producing fashionable wares that were coveted by many middle- and upper-class consumers. "American Glass" showcases objects by these and other American glass companies, illustrating the variety of forms and styles that prevailed during this period. Glass-manufacturing techniques will be another focus of the exhibition, with representative examples of pressed, cut, blown, and molded glass. Nearly all of the works on view are from The Mint Museum's permanent collection of glass, which is second in size only to the ceramics collection in the museum's Decorative Arts holdings. Featuring many of the most iconic designs and designers from the past two centuries, "The Art of Seating" encourages visitors to reconsider objects that are a ubiquitous and often overlooked part of our everyday lives, seeing chairs as not just functional objects, but as works of art in their own right. At the same time, the objects in the exhibition also have stories to tell about the history of our country, ranging from the contributions of immigrants to changing tastes in style and aesthetics to new innovations in technology and materials. More than forty examples of seating furniture from the Thomas H. and Diane DeMell Jacobsen Ph.D. Foundation are included in the exhibition and offer a stylistic journey from the early 1800s to the twenty-first century. Through Mar. 3 - "Ajané K. Williams: Sublimations of Spacetime". Ajané K. Williams' art is out of this world. Her artist's statement reveals that she "came to Planet Earth . to show humanity how to find their higher self and travel to the edge of infinity using the power of our own consciousness." Naturally curious, Williams immerses herself in the unfamiliar. The self-described "space and time traveler" is a DJ (DJ Nebula), video artist, and Afrofuturist painter She sees Afrofuturism as "a cultural aesthetic that combines African American culture with futuristic. innovative ideas." She finds working in the genre therapeutic and her work is garnering national attention. It was part of the "Black Creativity Juried Art Exhibition" at the Chicago Science and Industry Museum. Through May 5 - "Craft Across Continents I Contemporary Japanese and Western Objects: The Lassiter/Ferraro Collection". The exhibition features more than 50 objects from the private collection of Lorne Lassiter and Gary Ferraro. Lassiter and Ferraro say they collect for the fun of it - visiting artists' studios, art fairs, galleries and museums here and abroad - but they are serious-minded collectors with a deep knowledge of contemporary craft. The exhibition will be presented in a domestic-like setting to underscore the theme of enjoying life through ving with art. The exhibition will include glass. ceramics, bamboo, and textile contemporary objects by artists from around the globe, including masterworks of glass sculpture from the Czech Republic, a seminal installation by Danish maker Tobias Møhl, and a mobile by Polish-trained artist Anna Skibska, and spectacular large glazed ceramic vessel by British maker Gareth Mason. Twenty-first century Japanese bamboo works by leading practitioners and innovative wood-fired ceramics also are highlights of the collection. Craft + Design Galleries, Ongoing - "Craft in the Laboratory: The Science of Making Things," is the first installation in the Southeast to explore how craft artists and designers use science and math concepts when creating works of art. Presented by Müller Corporation, Craft in the Laboratory also celebrates a reinstallation of the Mint's Craft + Design Galleries—the first since 2010. Co-curated by the Mint's Senior Curator of Craft, Design, and Fashion Annie Carlano and Assistant Curator for Craft, Design, and Fashion Rebecca Elliot, "Craft in the Laboratory" includes 100 works from the Mint's collection that are made from precious metals, wood, steel, polymers, and even agricultural waste, that em-

The myriad of vibrant panels that give the illusion of stained glass and celebrates the tradition of women as makers and providers. the surface, love and anarchy may seem like unrelated or even conflicting notions. Love is synonymous with care, compassion, and affection, while anarchy is generally accepted as an absence of authority, a state of disorder, or an ungovernable condition. These concepts, more than tangentially related, are often intertwined and even sometimes mutually dependent. Indeed, moments of disarray and frustration are


