Jaime Byrd, recognized for her colorful oil paintings with Augmented Reality, captures the essence of landscapes around the world and brings a wealth of artistic prowess to this venture. Her unique style and ability to infuse emotion into her work have earned her dedicated online and in-person followings. With this new gallery she aims to share her passion with a broader audience by including larger pieces of artwork while providing an immersive experience for art enthusiasts and newcomers alike.

commonplace medium, reflects our region's heterogeneity. This grouping, in its own small way, challenges assumptions about Craft - or traditional and technical modes of handiwork as used by studio artists - and Appalachian creative production at large.
