# The Bascom in Highlands, NC, Offers New Exhibitions

The Bascom, a center for the visual arts in Highlands, NC, is presenting new exhibits including:

On view in the Thompson Gallery, through May 11, 2024, is *Satellites & Salamanders IV*, featuring works by Walker Tuffs. A reception will be held on Mar. 23, beginning at 3pm. Through sculptures, films and cut text works, *Satellites & Salamanders IV* attempts to re-member hidden and lost parts of artist Walker Tufts' legacies. The installation orbits around a pair of 1:1 scale models of NASA satellites that become an escapepod/tiny house, a climbing wall, a vertical forest, and more

On view in the Bunzl Gallery, through Apr. 27, 2024, is the exhibit, *Emergence: A Survey of Southeastern Studio Programs* 2024. A reception will be held on Mar. 23, beginning at 3pm. The exhibition celebrates the role of teaching and mentoring in artistic development, highlighting works by faculty mentors and their students. The 35 pairs of artists presented in this exhibition represent 23 institutions of higher education from the Southeast.



# The Art Gallery at Congdon Yards in High Point, NC, Features Works by Jessica Singerman & Local High School Students

The Art Gallery at Congdon Yards in High Point, NC, announces its newest exhibits, *A Place of Leaves and Earth*, featuring works by Jessica Singerman, on view through Apr. 19, 2024 and the *Annual High School Show*, on view through Mar. 27,2024.

A Place of Leaves and Earth showcases the work of award-winning artist Jessica Singerman. She earned her Bachelor of Arts with highest honors in 2002 from the continued above on next column to the right College of William & Mary, and her Master of Fine Arts in 2004 from the University of Delaware while on a fellowship. Her awardwinning paintings and drawings are exhibited and collected internationally. Singerman lives and works in Winston-Salem.

"Making my work and moving my body outside have always been the ways that I process things," Singerman said. "The work in this exhibit is deeply personal, generated by the time I spend in nature alone and with family and friends. It is also born from the range of emotions I feel as I read the news and make my way through the world as a human. My grief and anger and fear over our changing environment and socio-political upheaval are filtered through the quiet meditative space I find when I'm moving through nature and is sublimated into the artwork."

This exhibit is comprised of paintings, video, sound, sculpture, and installation made in the last five years, a culmination of ideas that have percolated over the last two decades. Singerman learned new techniques and ways to engage the senses.
