"My sculpture is a re-imagining of Mary's song. She tells the tale of Venus's yearly plea to Jupiter to accept her and Mars' love child. My Venus is dancing to please herself, and doesn't care if she has Jupiter's approval. She is dancing with her own joy.'

Botanical artist Chris Graebner was inspired by the song Cotton to look at the cotton blossom more closely. Cotton is in the mallow family which makes it a relative of hibiscus, okra and hollvhocks, among other garden favorites. Its flowers are similar to theirs in shape, but while cotton flowers are white when they open, after pollination they begin to change color and in several days they become a bright fuchsia.

Nancy Smith was inspired by the song Oleander to create a portrait. The song speaks about a mother's giving her beautiful daughter a poisonous name for protection. In creating the painting, Smith imagined the daughter holding onto her innocence despite living the legacy of her mother's curse. The images in Deep December Dreams provided fertile inspiration for the Hillsborough Gallery of Arts' 21 visual artists.
