Ella Richardson Fine Art in Charleston, SC, will present *Charleston: Spires and Light*, featuring works by Donald Weber, on view from Mar. 4 - 31, 2022. The exhibition opens Mar. 4, with a gallery open house from 10am-8pm. The open house continues Mar. 5, 10am-5pm, and the artist will give a painting demonstration in the gallery 2-4pm.

Donald Weber's art education began with his study of architecture, evidenced in his sure strokes delineating the streets and skylines of Charleston. Soaring steeples and narrow streets bounded by the reach of sun or blanket of dusk, palms and planters, stucco and brick - these are the elements that beckon exploration and for Weber, expression. The paintings are a paean to Charleston.

An American artist, Weber paints in a contemporary impressionist style. His mediums include oil, oil pastel and pastel. He draws daily with graphite and charcoal. Weber earned a Bachelors of Architecture degree from the University of Kentucky and is now a retired licensed architect whose career in the entertainment industry included clients such as Paramount, Nickelodeon, Warner Brothers, NASA, SeaWorld, Crayola and KSL resorts such as Squaw Valley Ski Resort and The Hotel

"The expectations demanded from that level of international brands set my design and technical skills bar pretty high," he said, "and that drive for quality has definitely transferred over to my fine arts pursuits," said Weber.

Weber has continued his art education through self-teaching and workshops with noted artists such as Scott Burdick and Kim English. Mentors are many but some favorites include artists C.W. Mundy, Irby Brown and Masters Ilya Repin, Joaquin Sorolla, J.M.W. Turner, John Singer Sargent and Edgar Degas.

Weber and his wife Debra now make their home in Louisville, KY, but also lived in Santa Fe, NM, for 11 years. They still visit frequently in their Airstream. "I love the diversity between New Mexico and Kentucky," said Weber. "The cultures, the weather and the landscapes are so different. Each time I return to each location I am re-energized about painting what is there."

Our Queen is Dead, Long Live the Queen

No Queen has died or been hurt in the constant competition to be our Facebook Queen or King of the Carolina Arts Facebook page. Our new Queen is Susan Lenz of Columbia, SC, who has taken the crown by a record number of page views, 16,959, from Kristi Ryba, of Charleston, SC, our second Facebook Queen since July 2017. And, our first Facebook Queen was Wan Marsh of Charlotte, NC. No one has come close to becoming our Facebook King.

Did you hear that guys? No male artists have come close to becoming our Facebook King. At least not yet.

Up until Lenz came along our most popular cover came from a group cover of works by several different potters from the Seagrove, NC, area including works from both men and women. But that total was 9,223 and Lenz just blew that away in one day. And a crown can't be shared by a

Up until last month I didn't think that Ryba's crown was ever going to be taken and taken in such a big way, but it did, so all things are possible. But I don't know what kind of cover might do that or what artists living in the Carolinas could pull it off. Susan Lenz is well traveled in the Carolinas, has several popular blogs, and is well known outside the Carolinas. The Carolina Arts Facebook page is open to people all over the United States and beyond. Lenz also does a lot of art residencies and exhibitions around the country. And, she is well known in some very big Facebook groups.

So, it is good to remember that being popular and well connected on social media can also influence and reach more people about your art, maybe even boost the numbers for an artist to wear our crown.

Now I hope people don't think that other covers we have had were not that good, for the most part I select those covers under a fairly complicated process, and a few I just wanted to have. We've had some great covers that didn't for some reason attract a lot of views on our Facebook page, for one reason or another - some it was the time of the year and others had to compete for attention during major holidays. If I knew what made a popular cover I'd select them all the time, but I also pick some that I know wouldn't be that popular just for the sake that art isn't meant to be popular all the time. And, don't get me wrong, there have been covers that I didn't like at all, but in an effort to be well rounded, they are selected from time to time. You should know that if it was solely up to me they would be abstract works, one after another. And, by some of the same artists, over and over. But then that would be dull.

It should also be mentioned that Susan Lenz is a supporter of Carolina Arts. Her company is Mouse House, Inc. in Columbia, SC, and is also a framing business that has advertised with us for well over a decade. If our cover selection was influenced by our supporters, she would have been on the cover long before this and probably several times by now, but Carolina Arts has never been a "You Pay, You Play" publication. Our supporters are always at the top of our list - any and all lists, but we've had many more covers by artists that represent galleries or art venues who have never spent one dime with us. We don't roll that way. Other publications work that way - we don't. Our covers are not for sale. Our heading on every issue of our publication has stated that since 1987, "Absolutely FREE, You Can't Buy It".

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Garden & Gun Magazine Presents Exhibits on Birdwatching in Charleston

Garden & Gun Magazine is presenting a group of exhibitions at several venues in Charleston, SC, entitled BIRDWATCH-ING, on view through Apr. 3, 2022.

Drawing from nature, the splendors of bird-watching, and the interconnectivity between humans and the natural world, this immersive experience takes viewers on a journey between the Joseph Manigault House, The Dewberry hotel, and the *Garden & Gun* offices at the Cigar Factory, sparking wonder and awareness of avian conservation. Curated and artistically directed by Kelly S. Turner, each individual birdscape is inspired by eighteenth-and nineteenth-century artistnaturalists and features the work of artists Brandon Ballengée, Clare Celeste Börsch, and J. Drew Lanham.

Joseph Manigault House

Staged throughout the historic home, this immersive installation offers encounters with rare and endangered bird specimens as they soar through doorways, perch on mantles, and flutter in unexpected places. In each room, whimsical scenes showcase artifacts and objects from the Charleston Museum's vast collections alongside various contemporary works, together contextualizing Southeastern birds and bringing Lowcountry histories to life.

The Dewberry Hotel

The Dewberry Hotel, Living Room hosts a one-of-a-kind topiary installation depicting the great North American wood stork. A treasured bird of the Southeast, the wood stork is a once-endangered species now on the cusp of reemergence thanks to recent environmental stewardship efforts.

Garden & Gun Offices

Visit the first-floor gallery of the magazine's Cigar Factory offices to view works by the exhibition's featured artists, together drawing attention to avian histories long-vanished. By Clare Celeste Börsch, a collection of Earth Deity suits are on display, as well as an immersive chandelier installation titled Making the Invisible Visible. In addition, Brandon Ballengée's Frameworks of Absence prints will be shown alongside his commissioned Birdwatching creation, RIP Carolina Parakeet: After John James Audubon. Each evening, keep your eyes peeled for striking images of extinct and endangered birds by Clare Celeste Börsch projected on the smokestack outside the building, accompanied by a powerful soundscape by J. Drew Lanham.

The Artists

Artist and biologist Brandon Ballengée creates multimedia works inspired by his ecological field and laboratory research. In 2013, his first career survey exhibition debuted at the Château de Charamarande in Essonne, France, and in 2016, the first retrospective of his work opened at the University of Wyoming Art Museum. Ballengée's work has been exhibited in more than twenty countries, and his honors include a Smithsonian Artist Research Fellowship, awards from the National Academies Keck Futures Initiative, a Creative Capital Award, and a place among the 2020 Grist 50 Emerging Environmental Leaders.

Ballengée holds a Ph.D. in Transdisciplinary Art and Biology from the University of Plymouth (UK) and is currently a research associate at the Louisiana State University Museum of Natural Science. Together with his wife, sustainable food educator Aurore Ballengée, Ballengée also founded the Atelier de la Nature, an ecoeducational campus and nature reserve in Arnaudville, Louisiana.

Collage and paper artist Clare Celeste Börsch was born in Bangkok, Thailand, and has since lived in the United States, Brazil, Italy, Honduras, Argentina, and Germany. Having spent her life assimilating to different cultures and environments, Börsch draws on these diverse impressions to create dynamic collage work, incorporating naturalist imagery from across the globe to form a cohesive visual story.

Before becoming a full-time artist, Börsch earned her MPP from UCLA and spent ten years working in public policy. Both her art and policy work are guided by a vision of a more equitable, sustainable, and biodiverse world. Her artwork incorporates thousands of hand-cut images of flora and fauna to create immersive installations evocative of the planet's threatened biodiversity. In every facet of her work, Börsch is dedicated to raising awareness and inspiring action around ecological and biodiversity crises. Börsch currently lives and works in Berlin with her husband and son.

A native of Edgefield, South Carolina, J. Drew Lanham is a professor of wildlife at Clemson University, where he holds an endowed chair as an Alumni Distinguished Professor and was named an Alumni Master Teacher in 2012. His research focuses on songbird ecology, as well as the African American role in natural resources conservation. Lanham is also the author of *The Home Place: Memoirs* of a Colored Man's Love Affair with Nature, which received the Reed Award from the Southern Environmental Law Center and the Southern Book Prize, and was a finalist for the John Burroughs Medal. Lanham is an avid birder, a passionate naturalist, and a hunter-conservationist whose essays and poetry have been published in publications including Orion, Audubon, Flycatcher, and Wilderness, and in several anthologies, including The Colors of Nature, State of the Heart, Bartram's Living Legacy, and Carolina Writers at Home. Lanham currently lives with his family in the South Carolina upstate.

Gibbes Museum of Art in Charleston Offers Works by William Eggleston

The Gibbes Museum of Art in Charleston, SC, is presenting *William Eggleston: Photographs from the Laura and Jay Crouse Collection*, on view in Gallery 2 & 3, through Oct. 9, 2022.

It is said that William Eggleston's unique ability to conflate the epic and the everyday has made him one of the most impactful figures in late twentieth century photography. A native of Memphis, TN, Eggleston first photographed his local environs in the 1950s in black-and-white, but became one of the first fine art photographers to use color to record his observations in a more heightened and accurate way. Today his strikingly vivid, yet enigmatic images of parked cars, billboards, storefronts, diners, and other artifacts of the ordinary world are considered groundbreaking.

The photographs presented in this edition of the Gibbes's Charleston Collects exhibition series were selected from the Laura and Jay Crouse Collection and represent many of the pioneering artist's most notable works. This exhibition is accompanied by a full color catalogue with an essay on the artist by Simon Constantine, PhD, a lecturer on the history of photography at Birkbeck, University of London, and a longstanding consultant lecturer for Sotheby's Institute of Art, London.

The Gibbes Museum of Art is home to the foremost collection of American art that incorporates the story of Charleston. The Museum connects the city and region's

artistic past to a vibrant contemporary art scene. This is what we believe.

A bustling seaport in the 1700s, Charleston was a melting pot of cultures, religions, and traditions. Powered by the labor of enslaved peoples in the rice and indigo trades, it was the 4th largest city in America in 1790 - and the wealthiest. Like Philadelphia, Boston and New York, what distinguished Charleston then - was art.

While we were home to some of America's earliest art, collectors, and artists, who made the City both muse and subject - and took our turn as one of the nation's richest cities - in money and culture - so were we also home to America's original sin, slavery - and a war that divided our nation.

In 1888, when Charleston was financially and culturally on its knees, benefactor James Gibbes left a bequest to the City to

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build an art museum. When the Gibbes Museum opened in 1905, the nation celebrated what Charleston has always understood: the power of art - to inspire our imagination, heal our hurt, revel in our experience, rebuild what's broken, nourish our souls, and release all that holds us back.

In Charleston, we believe art is the difference between merely existing and being truly alive. That's why we immerse ourselves in every part of it - from fine art to craft - from nurturing its creation and celebrating its multicultural presentation to inviting its interpretation and ensuring its

In the presence of art, we have the opportunity to see inside the artist's heart, mind, and soul and feel what the artist felt. That understanding and compassion make us more understanding, compassionate people, who, in turn, create a more compassionate, understanding world.

The City of North Charleston's Cultural Arts Department is pleased to announce that concurrent solo exhibitions of mixed nedia works by Camela Guevara and photographs by Stephanie J. Shank will be on display at Park Circle Gallery, from Mar. 2 - 26, 2022. A free reception hosted by the artists will be held at the gallery on Mar. 25, from 5-7pm.

In render, Charleston based artist Camela Guevara contemplates the intersection of art and craft, activating ordinary art materials of canvas and plaster with fiber art and her distinctive painting style. The works evoke the tension between ephemerality and permanence, encasing knots within plaster like built up scar tissue. She contemplates our stubbornness and intractability in the face of change, and whether we can meet the needs of our society in terms of care and climate reality.

Guevara graduated from the College of Charleston in 2010 with a Bachelor of Art in Studio Art with a concentration in sculpture, printmaking, and painting and in 2016 she attended the Penland School of Crafts for weaving. She has been teach-

Her work has been displayed in several continued above on next column to the right solo and group exhibitions in local and regional venues, including Greenville Center for Creative Arts, North Charleston City Hall and City Gallery, Virago Gallery, the Gibbes Museum of Art, Public Works Art Center, and Redux Contemporary Art Center. Guevara is currently the Sculpture Studio Technician at the College of Charleston, in addition to freelance sewist and graphic designer.

In her exhibit, June, Stephanie J. Shank of Summerville, SC, presents a series of photographs that collectively represent a surrogate portrait of her grandmother's domestic life, rich with tradition, southern craft, and feminine daily ritual.

June is an investigation of memory, chore, and emotion, found through what remains of the feminine and material culture of the early 20th century. The featured photographs, presented in both pairs and grids, document the artist's process of disentangling her grandmother's narrative through her carefully collected and well curated belongings; the belongings that tie Shank's family together as a whole. Through these intimate images, the photographer aims to explore and celebrate the life of her beloved relative, while also preserving part of her own history.

Shank received her BFA in Photography from Clemson University in 2007, and quickly transitioned to Savannah College of Art and Design where she received her Master of Arts in Teaching in 2008, followed by her MFA in Photogra-

phy in 2020. She has served as Program Director for Sea Island School of the Arts, was a former Photography Instructor at Chapin High School, and has been a Photography Instructor at Summerville High School since 2018. Working as a freelance photographer since 2008, Shank has a portfolio of varied accomplishments, including numerous print publications and solo and group exhibitions throughout the southeast.

The Park Circle Gallery is located on Jenkins Avenue in North Charleston. Admission is free and free street parking is available on Jenkins Avenue in front of the gallery, as well as on the adjacent streets and in parking lots close by. Charleston Craft Co-Op Artists Bring Global Inspiration to Charleston, SC

One of the joys of travel is discovering the artisan crafts of places and cultures we visit. But you don't need a plane ticket to find and admire globally inspired fine craft. It's right here in the Lowcountry at Charleston Crafts Gallery, in Charleston, SC, where several member-artists are inspired by craft techniques from around the world.

"The gallery has many artisans who meld modern design sensibilities with traditional art forms from Japan, Italy and other countries and cultures," says Caroline Sandlin, President of Charleston Crafts. "Whether their medium is ceramic, fiber or jewelry, this fusion creates exciting and personal expressions that keep handcrafted art evolving and vital.

Regina Semko's work, inspired by the ancient Japanese technique of origami, transforms vibrantly colored papers into amazing boxes, jewelry and decorative birds and animals, many embellished with bright beads. In Semko's skilled hands, origami transcends paper folding to become beautiful sculptural art.

Jewelry designer Selma Andrews reinvents the millefiori ("thousand flowers") skill of traditional Italian glassmaking in new ways. Instead of glass, Andrews uses an intricate technique with lightweight polymer clay to create bold and colorful necklaces, earrings and brooches. Her whimsical "Charleston Lady Face Beads" are a favorite with gallery shoppers.

Fiber artist Nancy Warren is passionate about keeping art forms alive in her weaving, felting, beadwork and jewelry. Many of her jewelry designs feature kumihimo, meaning "gathered threads." This technique, thought to have originated in Japan around 700 AD, created cords for items like samurai swords and kimono sashes. Warren also combines brilliant beads into her intricately woven bracelets and necklaces to fashion stunning modern

accessories.

Mayako Blackburn's chosen materials and techniques hold history too. Growing up in Northern Japan, she has been an artist since childhood. Her ceramics on display in the gallery reflect influences of her artistic family, the elegance of Japanese pottery traditions and the natural beauty that surrounds her Charleston studio. Blackburn's refined vessels emanate a graceful presence while at the same time making a bold statement.

There are many more beautiful objects in the gallery to spark curiosity about what inspires artists' creativity and imagination. Explore them at 84 Society Street, just steps from King Street, in Charleston's cultural, culinary and shopping hub.

Established in 1989, Charleston Crafts Cooperative Gallery is a dynamic community of jury-selected artisans. All are residents of South Carolina, making this the city's only exclusively local craft gal-

The gallery is currently following COVID-safe practices.




Still Looking For Photos




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City of Charleston, SC, Features Works by Mary Edna Fraser and Jeff Kopish

The City of Charleston Office of Cultural Affairs will present Creek by Creek, featuring works by Mary Edna Fraser and Jeff Kopish, on view at the City Gallery in downtown Charleston, SC, from Mar. 18 through May 8, 2022.

Creek by Creek is a collaborative effort by artists Mary Edna Fraser and Jeff Kopish, underscoring the perils of plastic pollution and the importance of protecting the Lowcountry's unique waterways. Featuring an array of Fraser's batiks on silk and oil paintings and Kopish's ceramic and found object sculptures incorporating everything from recycled plastic to actual trash, this exhibition aims to further educate the public on environmental issues through the lens of art, and to remind viewers of the consequences of their own actions within the larger ecological systems of which they are a part.

The artists' new work, and their ecological concerns, is being presented in concert with three indispensable area groups: Charleston Waterkeeper, the Coastal Conservation League, and the South Carolina Environmental Law Project. Specifically, the exhibition will focus on eight areas of concern: the endangered African American communities of Cainhoy and Phillips, the Beidler Forest Audubon Center and Sanctuary, Captain Sam's Spit, Crab Bank, the Great Pee Dee River, Hobcaw Barony, Shem Creek, and James Island Creek.

"My work is not what is important," says Fraser. "It is the collective work done by all three groups. How they protect what we hold dear... passing the baton to win new battles. This is an environmental activist show to encourage action and counter apathy."

The pioneering work of Charleston artist Mary Edna Fraser has been collected and exhibited worldwide. Her silk batiks (an ancient resist process using wax and dye on cloth) and oil paintings range from panoramic to plein air. The common thread in her career of four decades is environmental awareness. Her art has supported the efforts of Charleston Waterkeeper, the Coastal Conservation League, SC Environmental Law Project, Water Missions International, The Nature Conservancy, Sierra Club and Environmental Defense Fund. Her blog, Delete Apathy, is a venue for activism, from local to global.

NASA recognized Fraser as their Artist of the Year in 1995 and she was featured demonstrating batik in DC at the Smithsonian Folklife Festival. The Verner Award was presented in 2016, South Carolina's highest honor for an artist. Fraser has lectured internationally in Indonesia, Taiwan, and Australia. Venues such as the National Academy of Sciences, Duke University Museum of Art, and the National Science Foundation have hosted the artist's over 100 one-woman exhibitions. National Geographic and Ted Turner have broad-

cast her endeavors. Beginning with the aerial viewpoint of her Grandfather's vintage 1946 Ercoupe plane, she has captured the bigger picture. Science has become more beautiful and accessible through the lens of Fraser's art.

Jeff Kopish has been creating art in Charleston for almost thirty years and has been using alternative materials and repurposing discarded objects in his work since elementary school. In college, he studied science and received degrees in bacteriology and environmental change; while there, he continuously took ceramic courses as stress relief. After college, he served as a US Peace Corps volunteer and saw how ingenious people can be; necessity and a lack of resources make for creative thinking. This point of view became front and center of what he considered important. He has maintained his commitment to helping the environment by creating as much art with society's debris: His giant octopus ("Pugita") at Taco Boy on Folly Beach, SC, was made from the trash of one holiday weekend. He is happily supported by family, friends, locals, tourists, architects, designers and businesses, and gives heartfelt thanks to all.

When she was 10 years old, Carole Knudson Tinsley won a blue ribbon at the Sangamon (Illinois) County Fair for an ink drawing of a little girl. Six decades later, her artwork has developed from that "realistic" work to expressionistic to

"imaginative abstraction." The exhibition relates to Tinsley's paintings from when she became a "serious painter" to the present, with examples of studies and paintings expressing her development through the years. "Interests earlier were of more realistic subjects, but later I became interested in abstracting my compositions," she says. "Many works will reflect my interest in ancient cultures, especially Native Americans characteristics of their dwellings. One will observe earlier works were created with oils, then went to watercolors. Presently I paint with acrylics and mixed media collage.'

Tinsley continues, "I paint in an impressionistic, expressionistic or abstract manner. I strive to be a good shape-maker of whatever subject I am interpreting. The subject could be reactions and feelings that I may have at a particular time. I am most often inspired by the mysteries and spirits of ancient cultures and their surroundings that influenced their lives. If so, the images may offer only fragments of those subjects or cultures. My creative journey, while painting rhythmically with values of color and textures, involves many layers before the finished painting

finally emerges." "I hope to draw the viewers' imagina-

tions and interpretations closer to these works and instill a continuing spiritual experience," she adds. "I hope the public can relate or reminisce with some of the works. For example, my farmhouse where I grew up in the Midwest. I hope to draw the viewers' imagination in – to interpret these works and instill in them a meaningful experience."

The more than 45 pieces in the exhibition will be offered for sale, with prices ranging from \$300 to \$2,800; several paintings are owned by a collector or are in the artist's collection and will not be for

Tinsley, who has a degree from Millikin University in Decatur, IL, has done post-graduate studies in art in Michigan, Virginia and South Carolina. She also has attended many workshops with nationally known artists. Tinsley taught art at Seneca (SC) Junior High School as well as privately in Pendleton, SC. She is a member in excellence in the South Carolina Watermedia Society. She has exhibited widely in juried shows and other shows regionally and nationally, winning many awards.





of vulnerability and violence that she now explores in her art-making. Moradkhani's work in drawing and sculpture has focused on the female body and its vulnerability to different social norms. It examines the experience of finding oneself insecure in one's own body.

In her drawings, unexpected images incorporated in intimate apparel intend to bring humor, surprise and a shock of recognition. Layers of shadowy images reveal stories, with the hope of leaving a mark on the audience. Two worlds – birthplace and adopted home – live alongside each other in her work, joining intimately at a single point. Moradkhani's drawings on paper and casts of her body represent non-Western aesthetics of pleasure and beauty.

Working at the intersections of drawing and sculpture, Moradkhani locates her work in a feminist response to Edward Said's "Orientalism" – ideas of womanhood in the post-colonial world and the post-revolution the science of the sci

generation in Iran intertwine with conflicts at the borders of tradition and (post-)modernity. Meanwhile, influenced by her cultural heritage, she pursues beauty and realism by deploying formality, virtuosity and delicacy in the context of contemporary art.

Moradkhani received her Bachelor of Fine Arts from Tehran University of Art (2009) and both her Master of Arts in art education (2013) and her Master of Fine Arts in drawing, painting and sculpture (2015) from Boston's School of the Museum of Fine Arts & Tufts University.

With candor and honesty, her photographs explain their free-flowing, rural days as they, with the many and mostly feral animals, inhabit the family homestead. Each photograph is a memory, as photos are, of a moment, a story, an adventure in the ever-swift current of her children's childhood and her service as their adult witness.

Coleman's children do not display the

guile of cheeseburger smiles but the lived reality of skinned knees, bloody noses, and toes caked with Mississippi clay. They are obviously accustomed to seeing mom with a camera but the photographs could be characterized as a curious amalgam of Diane Arbus's detachment and Sally Mann's warmth. Her children's days are not hampered by organized activities but filled with each other and the natural world of weeds and snakes and brush fires and carcasses. Each is a discovery to be individually examined, logged, and hopefully appreciated for life.

Coleman explains, "Children hold nothing back—living somewhat feral continued above on next column to the right days, moving from one curiosity to the next. And so my daily life is both intensely mundane and also full of wonder. There are the same clothes to wash, the same counters to wipe down, the same mouths to feed. Life pulses. Blood drains. Cats lounge. The sun sets with exuberant color. I make peace with the dichotomies of domesticity. These are moments of tension and joy."

By making peace with the dichotomies of her daily domesticity, Coleman gives us an experience of the dichotomy of beauty and death. This is particularly true of A Singular Starling whose life has ended as prey but is pictured with elegantly spread black feathers centered on pristine snow with her gaping wound's vital red preserved by the cold. Coleman photographs her children, animals, monarch chrysalises but she is the ever present omniscient narrator except in *Toad Hole*. She has put aside whatever she was doing to make egg toast for her children and there with only one bite missing is the toad hole toast discarded in the yard being thoroughly enjoyed by the resident ants, not a halcyon day

Coleman is a self-taught photographer living in rural Mississippi. Her photographs have been shown in solo and group exhibitions at the Ogden Museum of Southern Art, the Mississippi Museum of Art, the Bo Barlett Center, the University of Mississippi's Center of Southern Culture, the University of West Virginia, the University of Southern Mississippi, the Griffin Museum of Photography, the

Meadows Museum of Art, Fischer Galleries, Claire Elizabeth Gallery, Barrister's Gallery, and Soho Gallery.

Her photographs are currently part of the traveling exhibitions, *Looking for Appalachia* and *A Yellow Rose Project*. Her work is included in private and public collections, including The Do Good Fund, The Mississippi Museum of Art, and the Archive of Documentary Arts at Duke University. Ashleigh is the 2020 South-Arts State Fellow for Mississippi.

Greenville County Museum of Arts in Greenville, SC, Offers Works by Thomas Sills and Áfrican-American Masters

The Greenville County Museum of Arts in Greenville, SC, is presenting two exhibitions, including: Thomas Sills: Man of Color and Soul Deep: African-American Masterworks.

Born to North Carolina sharecroppers in 1914, Thomas Sills took a circuitous path to achieve success as an artist. When he was only 11, he traveled by train from Raleigh to Harlem, where he staved with an older brother. Over the years he worked a number of odd jobs, including theater doorman, church custodian, stevedore, and liquor deliveryman.

It was in a Greenwich Village liquor store that Sills met the artist Jeanne Reynal. The two married, and Reynal introduced Sills to her circle of friends and colleagues, who included the artists Elaine and Willem de Kooning, David Hare, Mark Rothko, and critic Harold Rosenberg. An avid collector as well as artist, Reynal acquired works by Max Ernst, the de Koonings, Marcel duChamp, and a number of others. As Sills remarked, "With paintings and artists all around me, it didn't take very long before I got stirred up to doing my own work. . . . I wanted to go my own way from the very beginning.'

Sills' first solo exhibition was held at Betty Parsons Gallery in May 1955. He experimented with color and form his entire career, moving from the action painting of Abstract Expressionism to vibrant Color Field painting with energetic palettes and juxtapositions.

Reluctant to be categorized as a "Black artist," Sills commented, "If somebody told me that I had to paint this way or that I had to do that . . . I wouldn't want it. . . . You like it or you don't like it, but I am doing what I want."

Sills worked and exhibited for almost 30 years. His final solo exhibition was in 1980. His work is included in the collections of the Museum of Modern Art, the Whitney Museum of American Art, and the Metropolitan Museum of Art, all New York; along with the San Francisco Museum of Modern Art, the Los Angeles County Museum of Art, and the Greenville County Museum of Art.

Soul Deep: African-American Masterworks features 38 works by 20 artists. Ranging from a rare 1840 poem jar by enslaved potter David Drake (c. 1800 to c. 1870) to an evocative 2020 abstract painting by Frank Wimberley (born 1926), Soul Deep spans 180 years of American

A recently discovered landscape by Henry Ossawa Tanner (1859-1937) depicts Whitewater Falls near Cashiers—one of only four paintings known to exist from the artist's brief time in North Carolina. The exhibition also includes multiple examples by three artists of the Charleston Renaissance era: William H. Johnson (1901-1970); husband-and-wife team Edwin (1882-1931) and Elise (1891-1970) Harleston; and Joseph Delaney (1904-1991).

Merton Simpson (1928-2013), Philip Simmons (1912-2009), and Leo Twiggs (born 1934) attest to the significant contributions that artists of the Palmetto State have made to the history of 20th century American art and design.

Post-World War II non-objective painting is reflected in works by Beauford Delaney (1901-1979); Hale Woodruff (1900-1980); and Frank Wimberley. A lighter, but no less powerful, touch is embodied in the lyrical organic forms of Gloucester C. Coxe (1907-1999) and the brilliant Color Field paintings by Thomas Sills (1914-2000).

Self-taught artists Ulysses Davis (1914-1990) and Winfred Rembert (1945-2021) testify to the biographical foundation of meaningful artistic expression.

The realist tradition informs iconic examples by two of America's finest practitioners, Hughie Lee-Smith (1915-1999) and John Wilson (1922-2015) whose monumental bronze head of Martin Luther King, Jr. captures the dignity and strength of the civil rights leader.



It occurred to me that I was actually using all the elements in the creation of these works and began to intentionally work though having all the elements

Crawford says Elemental Journeys is an interpretation of Earth's elements and the flow of energy. "Using bright, bold colors with upbeat music as a backdrop, the paint is allowed to dance through planned rhythmic patterns and random surprises," she explains. "It is a collaboration between energy, spirit and the vibration of light and color. All the elements are used to bring these pieces to life.

"Water - the thinning of paints and liquids to different consistencies and weights helps control the way things flow, combine and connect," she continues. "Air - breath, straws and a blow dryer create the shift of where and how the fluid colors will flow while still controlling composition. Earth – mixing in various pigments, metallic pulvers, mica flakes and actual crystals help achieve the reflection of light and sparkle. Fire – torching the surface



of each piece with a flame releases air bubbles. This gives each work a smooth dense pigments to rise to the top layer and

that is "bright, light, colorful and full of spirit," Crawford says. "There are playful patterns and tiny details as a result of the process used. Getting up close and viewing these microcosms is mesmerizing. I would like it to instill a sense of connection. A connection to the earth, a connection to spirit and a connection to each other." She began creating the works while in quarantine during the spring of 2020 and continued through the present.

The 20 pieces in the exhibition will be offered for sale, with prices ranging from \$140 to \$1,200.

Born in Lowell, Massachusetts, in addition to being a mixed media artist, Crawford is a photographer, a teacher and a creativity coach. She attended Rochester Institute of Technology for photography/ film/animation. She has gone down many other paths, such as ceramics, silversmithing, hot glass, printing, mosaic and other media. Her work has been exhibited across the Carolinas. Crawford loves working with new materials and finds that it generates new ideas and opens doors to endless possibilities.






Ariail has been a finalist for The Pulitzer Prize three times. He is a South Carolina native and University of South Carolina graduate.

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South Carolina State Museum in Columbia, SC, Offers Exhibition Focused on Faces

South Carolina State Museum in Columbia, SC, is presenting *Face to Face: Portraits from the South Carolina State Museum Collection*, on view through July 24, 2022.

This new display explores the visual expressions of human connections featured in works from the museum's collection. The art exhibition features works never before displayed.

"The themes presented in *Face to Face* speak specifically to our current culture of isolation, mask-wearing and social distancing," says State Museum Curator of Art Amy Chalmers. "This past year has taught us all the value of facial expressions, physical closeness and contact with the people in our lives. So much of our sense of shared humanity resides in what we see when we look at one another, and in our in-person interactions."

Just as there is a wide variety of ways in which we connect to one another, portraits offer a varied and fascinating view of one-on-one relationships. Face to Face highlights these relationships with portraits that show how portrait artists have posthumously portrayed the deceased, honored their idols, satirized and documented relationships through painting, ceramics, sculpture and more. The exhibit features several new acquisitions of the museum that have never before been displayed, including a portrait from award-winning Nigerian-American artist Adebunmi Gbadebo, whose works have been represented in the Smithsonian Museum of African American History and Culture, the National Museum of African Art and other major collections.

Catawba Indian Effigy jars, wood sculptures by Dan Robert Miller, contem-

porary ceramic pieces by Peter Lenzo and many more portraits by prominent South Carolina artists will encourage visitors to consider the importance of portraits throughout history, from 19th-century paintings to selfies on social media.

sculptor's most famous projects, including the *Burghers of Calais* — historical figures that Rodin grippingly depicts as they offer their own lives to save their city — and the famous unrealized masterpiece *The Gates of Hell*. This exhibition also showcases Rodin's commemorations of other artistic luminaries, including literary giants Victor Hugo and Honoré de Balzac, Romantic composer Gustav Mahler, Baroque painter Claude Lorrain, and contemporary Japanese dancer and actress Hisa Ōta, also known as Hanako ("Little Flower").

This is the first exhibition the CMA has hosted dedicated exclusively to Rodin's work and the first to feature bronze sculptures in 40 years. Visitors will learn about the artist's processes for modeling and casting as they move through four galleries of his works.

"Rodin's work has been the ultimate source for modern sculptors since the beginning of the last century," says Judith Sobol, curator of collections and exhibitions at the Iris & B. Gerald Cantor Foundation. "I am excited to be able to see the dialogue between Rodin's work and that of Anila Quayyum Agha. Light and illusion are so important to both."

Pakistani American artist Anila Quayyum Agha's immersive installations move beyond conventional concepts of sculpture. Brilliantly lit from within, they cast their own images onto the walls around them like lanterns and create intricate patterns that dance over visitors as they move through the exhibition.

Rather than solid structures yearning to be massive monuments, these elegant works — *All The Flowers Are For Me* (Turquoise) from 2017 and *This is NOT a Refuge!* from 2019 — delicately defy their steely weight. Suspended from the ceiling, these light-emitting, shadow-casting sculptures seem to turn themselves inside out, enveloping viewers in a remarkable visual environment and framing concepts of nature, culture, religion, migration, and gender.

The works in *Let A Million Flowers Bloom* use floral and geometric shapes inspired by Islamic architecture to explore notions of masculine and feminine, public and private, religious and secular, and particularly space and refuge, taking on the pain of losing one's home and agency and the hope of establishing them both anew. Agha's unforgettable art envelops viewers in an enchanting visual environment that inspires awe and invites contemplation about sanctuary and belonging.

"Having lived on the boundaries of different faiths such as Islam and Christianity, and in cultures like Pakistan and the United States, my art is deeply influenced by the simultaneous sense of alienation and transience that informs the migrant experience," says Agha in an artist's statement. "This consciousness of knowing what is markedly different about the human experience also bears the gift of knowing its core commonalities and it is these tensions and contradictions that I try to embody in my artwork."

He used the human body to incredibly expressive ends, and his works are timelessly relatable in their emotions.

The title of this exhibition comes from Rodin himself, who said that, far different from the realities of everyday life, artworks "open before us an enchanted land of contemplation and dreams."

With over 40 works of varying scale, *Rodin: Contemplation and Dreams* introduces audiences to some of the iconic

The Sumter County Gallery of Art in Sumter, SC, is presenting two exhibitions including: *Hands On, The South*, featuring works by Micah Green and *Quiet Ground*, featuring works by Wilfred Spoon, on view through Apr. 22, 2022.

Micah Green was born in Texas and lived much of his childhood in Mississippi. His nomadic way of life has taken him to Georgia, South Carolina and now Alabama. A graduate of Mississippi State

University, Green began taking photo-

graphs while working at a short-staffed newspaper and has since become an accomplished photojournalist working with "The New York Times", Bloomberg, Reuters and numerous regional publications including "The Sumter Item".

Self-taught through experimentation, Green's observations through his camera lens and also his heart have given him an understanding and an emotional tie to the region he calls home. In Green's ongoing

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series Hands On, The South at the Sumter County Gallery of Art, he focuses on the hands of the people he has met through his work as they work and worship, play and protest. Stories that often reflect the ugly, entrenched truths that abound in the South but there are also stories that radiate life and hope. This duality permeates each story that Green tells as he interacts with, rather than reacts to a scene. Green approaches his work with a sense of wonder. He spends time with the people he photographs, develops relationships, has conversations, and his documentary style becomes softer, more personal - as through the eye of an artist.

Although Green goes all over the country documenting stories with his lens, the pieces in *Hands On, The South* have a decidedly local appeal, taken mostly in Sumter and South Carolina. From Trevor Lawrence greeting a throng of fans at Death Valley to a hug captured at the funeral of a fallen deputy, to Deaconess Selena Smith preparing for a bodybuilding competition, these are Sumter's stories.

Green shares his profession, his art and nomadic travels with his wife Kayla Robins Green, a journalist and writer.

Wilfred Spoon is a Mt. Pleasant-based painter whose preferred medium is oils. Born in Charlotte, NC, he earned his MFA at Parsons School of design in New York in 1987. Spoon's influences include primitivism, early and pre-renaissance painters of religious icons, and Cubism whose artists explored new spatial relationships that finally broke with the Renaissance traditions of perspective. In his still lifes the division between foreground and background is not distinct and space, both interior and exterior, seems to be that of the Cubist-derived style.

G. Cole Miller, SCGA curator observes: "Spoon creates scenes that meander skillfully between the surreal and the naive. His landscapes and still lifes, with their primitive style yet dynamic composition of seemingly conflicting planes and

intersecting surfaces, patterns and forms, appear idyllically inviting yet uncanny. In the painting Still Life With Goldfish, a tablescape populated by a precarious cup of coffee beside a goldfish in the microcosm of its bowl reflects the pale, circular moon through the window beyond. A mysterious flamingo becomes as much a subject within the painting as the voluminous tropical plants which envelope it in Flamingo with Century Plant. Quiet *Ground* explores the harmony and conflict between abstraction and figuration where a patchwork rug on the floor becomes a triangle in geometric space, or a marsh bird can exist in a singular moment outside of time but confined within space. The moments of pause and reflection, humor and apprehension contained within Spoon's works focus attention on both the tranquility of a brooding pelican, and the mythology of modern art."

Spoon's paintings in *Quiet Ground* have an undoubted charm, a delicate decorative sense and a gentle empathy and respect for the simple, the honest and the unpretentious. His paintings demonstrate his love for the primitive as well as his extensive art education. This combination infuses his work with a surprising clarity in an unexpected world.

The Orangeburg County Fine Arts Center in Orangeburg, SC, will present Creative Spirits: Works by Chris Bilton, Dianne MunKittrick and Lisa Gilyard-Rivers, on view from Mar. 9 through Apr. 27, 2022. A reception will be held on Mar.

9, beginning at 6pm.

The conjunction of artists in this show represents three cultures: Gullah, the legacy evolved from the African diaspora; naturalism, celebrating the wilderness; and still life portraiture, perhaps a tribute to the futurism thought to have been inspired by Italian Painting. The harmony in the paintings of the three artists, nevertheless, communicate a coherence in creativity that transcends styles, themes and cultures.

Lisa Gilyard-Rivers, whose Legacy Art Gallery in Beaufort, SC, which displays the vibrant colors and characters associated with Low Country Gullah art, says her new works are progressing towards the abstract even as her themes still pay homage to close-knit communities celebrating heritage and revering history.

"My backgrounds are an expression of my desire to blend and blur colors," which she finds very rewarding because

this compliments the themes in her paintings. The work *Matriarch Julia* is present and in front of a latticed background, with detailed diamond-shaped details and jewel-like ornament, that serve to separate her from the gentle-aqua milieu associated with the Low Country. It's impossible to image *Matriarch Julia* without the delicate intricacies that seem to adorn her ensemble and protect her beauty. "Memories and stories are in my paintings. 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interpreting how I show and tell them."

Dianne Munkittrick, who lives and paints in Santee, SC, is known for her lifelike animals and landscapes that can be depicted with such meticulous representation as to be almost photographic. In her more recent works, she is offering more of herself.

"I strive to paint beyond the ordinary interpretation of nature and try to instill the awe and wonder that nature inspires into each piece. I aim to capture that elusive moment that transforms an experience with nature from mundane to magical," says Munkittrick.

The work Wren with Blue & Pink reveals the wonders in Munkittrick's natural world interpreted in brush strokes that incorporate real and utopian as if she sees them both as being one. Engaging the viewer is very important to her. "Texture, color, and mood" could be described as her three-pronged approach, with mood being the element she is confidently expressing.

Chris Bilton's Three Musicians love each other as much as they love their instruments. His figures harmonize in a spiritual blend of color and form that accentuate them individually. This invites discovery of the world of the artist, where there is as much coordination of configuration, ambience and background to appreciate as in listening to a composition of Renaissance music.

As in works by Gilyard-Rivers and MunKittrick, the background is an important part of the narrative emphasizing the

subtle tones interpreting Bilton's subjects. This is from an artist's studio in the very quiet town of Eutawville, SC.

If Bilton interprets a love of humanity through form, that love may have been influenced and honed by his time in New York City and a masters from The New York Academy of Art. However, the benevolence in his work is uniquely his fine art whether it is still life or sculpture or everything he has mastered in between.

"With the passage of each year, my sensitivity and understanding deepens, and my artistic abilities have reached impressive heights, while my skillset and interests forever expand. My art is my story," adds Bilton.

Time, place, circumstance, and symbolism are principal traits in the expressions of these three artists. They use these as conceptual and definitive narratives to tell their stories from small tranquil places: St. Helena, Santee and Eutawville, where land and water, habitats and wilderness, wildlife and humanity successfully effect harmony. Gilyard-Rivers, Munkittrick and Bilton have brought their life experiences with them, allowing the past, present and revelations to mingle in their creative spirits with the unfettered freedom to influence their works.




Caldwell Arts Council in Lenoir, NC, Features Works by J. Michael Simpson

Since the 1860s, photographs have been instrumental in promoting the West as an unexplored wilderness and the land of opportunity. Joan Myers and Steve Fitch are challenging the romantic myth of the American West to reflect the cultural, environmental, and racial complexities of our shared histories more accurately in an on-going conversation about what it means to be an American, how identity and the landscape are intertwined and what the real West looks like today.

Myers and Fitch have both lived in the West for most of their lives. They document the changing landscapes of which they are a part; their lives intimately intertwined with the history of the arid lands they call home. Their images cap ture landscapes made famous in countless Western narratives of both literature and film, but they move in closer with their lenses to reflect the details often overlooked in a sweeping landscape narrative, gently critiquing the myth of the oversized cowboy with his long gun, the absurdity of the oversized teepee selling espresso, the oversized sombrero, the seedy roadside hotels bedazzled with garish flashing neon, the derelict movie theaters and drive-ins hawking a fading American

Joan Myers has been taking photographs for more than forty years, exploring the relationships between people and the land. Myers turned to photography during the early 1970s as her life's work. Her photographs have since appeared in more than fifty solo and eighty group exhibitions throughout the United States and Europe including three Smithsonian exhibitions.

Her award-winning books include: *Fire* and *Ice: Timescapes* (Damaiani, 2016), *The Jungle at the Door: A Glimpse of* Page 24 - Carolina Arts, March 2022

Thompson, 2012), Wondrous Cold: An Antarctic Journey (Smithsonian Books/HarperCollins 2006), Salt Dreams: Land and Water in Low-Down California (New Mexico 1999), Pie Town Woman (New Mexico, 2001), Whispered Silences: Japanese Americans and World War II (Washington, 1996), Santiago: Saint of Two Worlds (New Mexico, 1991) and Along the Santa Fe Trail (New Mexico, 1986).

Steve Fitch has always been an educator, he taught photography for forty-two years at the University of Colorado, Boulder; The University of Texas, San Antonio; Princeton University and Santa Fe University of Art and Design. He has received four National Endowment of the Arts Fellowships as well as the Eliot Porter Fellowship. His photographs have been widely exhibited and collected as well a published in a number of books including: Diesels and Dinosaurs: Photographs from the American Highway (1976), Marks in Place: Contemporary Responses to Rock Art (1988), Gone: Photographs of Abandonment on the High Plains (2003), An Island in the Sky: Llano Estacado (2011), Motel Signs (2011), American Motel Signs, 1980 to 2008 (2016), Vanishing Vernacular: Western Landmarks (2018) and most recently, American Motel Signs, 1980 to 2018 (2020).

Also on view in the Mayer Gallery, from Mar. 4 through Aug. 27, 2022, will be the exhibit, *Celestial: Dare Coulter*.

With the Universe as the source of inspiration, the *Celestial* exhibit is a series of multimedia works that explore the metaphor of creation. graphs are accomplished photographers and artists. Byron Tenesaca-Guaman is a visual artist and bilingual educator residing in Western North Carolina. Born in an ancestral Indigenous community in the Andes Mountain region of Ecuador to a family of basket weavers and agriculturists, Byron's early years were spent learning the reciprocity system that exists between humans and the mountains.

His continued passion for art and education has also led him to take on the roles of artist-in-residence, kindergarten teacher aide and HiSET instructor. He received a Master of Arts in Teaching (MAT) in Comprehensive Education from Western Carolina University. A certified K-12 art instructor, Byron currently serves the mountain community as the visual arts teacher at Johnston Elementary School. He was one of 50 artists selected to be part of The Asheville Art Museum's inaugural exhibition Appalachia Now! An Interdisciplinary Survey of Contemporary Art in Southern Appalachia. His artworks, in various media, document, layer and weave the memories, culture, and history of the Andean and Appalachia Mountain regions together.

Julie Rae Powers received their MFA in Photography from The Ohio State University and their BFA in Photography from James Madison University. Recently, JR started Soft Lightning Studio, a photography publishing platform dedicated to broadening space in the photo world for image makers who are persons of color, queer, women, and others. Their work has focused on family history, coal, Appalachia, the queer "female" gaze, the butch body and queer chosen families. Their work is collected by the Institute for Research on Women and Gender at the University of Michigan and has been awarded the Ohio Arts Council Individual Excellence Award in 2016 and 2020. For their day job they work as an instructional designer.

The AMPC is a partnership between Appalachian State University's Outdoor Programs, the Turchin Center for the Visual Arts and Virtual Blue Ridge. The AMPC provides support for the university's Office of Outdoor Programs and their extended expeditions that are educational journeys of discovery that take students around the world. Corn Wagon Thunder was included in *Appalachia Now!* An Interdisciplinary Survey of Contemporary Art in Southern Appalachia at the Asheville Art Museum. Corn Wagon Thunder created this body of work while working and living in Boone. Although she is currently pursuing a Master of Fine Arts degree at the University of New Mexico in Albuquerque, she says part of her heart will always remain in the beautiful Appalachian Mountains.

Blowing Rock Museum and History Museum in Blowing Rock, NC, Features Works by John Beerman

Blowing Rock Museum and History Museum in Blowing Rock, NC, will present *Imminent Perils: To Wonder at Trifles in the Paintings of John Beerman*, on view from Mar. 8 through July 31, 2022.

John Beerman's paintings are uncommonly contemporary in their glimpses of natural and built environments. He carefully frames the landscape, illuminating its beauty without erasing the persistent trespass of human development; rigid edges of buildings, dilapidated fences, and straying power lines are just as much part of Beerman's compositions as the tranquil skies, rippling waterways, and sprawling fields. In these honest representations of precarious landscapes, Beerman quietly captures the anxiety and the awe of experiencing Nature's beauty in the 21st-century.

In a lecture given at Wellesley College in 1941 titled *The Art of Literature and Commonsense*, eminent author and critic Vladimir Nabokov urged his listeners to value experiences of wonder over commonsense

principles. Nabokov emphasized a seemingly irrational "capacity to wonder at trifles—no matter the imminent peril... and it is in this childishly speculative state of mind, so different from commonsense and its logic, that we know the world to be good."

Like Nabokov's rejection of prudence, Beerman's paintings, if given sufficient time and attention, disrupt assumptions about beautiful pictures and their ability to teach us about the world we are living in.

This exhibition gathers together new works alongside earlier paintings to trace Beerman's approach to the landscape. Often painting places that are gone, disappearing, or changing irrevocably, the artist uses a variety of techniques to articulate the uncertainty of these specific places and spaces, frozen in time on his canvas.

North Carolina Pottery Center in Seagrove, NC, Offers Works With Korean Influence Exhibition

The North Carolina Pottery Center in Seagrove, NC, is presenting *Korean Influence on North Carolina Pottery*, on view in its main gallery through June 25, 2022.

The influence of Korean ceramics on North Carolina's pottery tradition is a relatively recent development. It has its origins in some of the designs Jacques Busbee incorporated when he started Jugtown Pottery in 1917, most notably a Korean bowl form. Busbee drew inspiration for some of his designs from the collections of major museums such as the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York City. Busbee was instrumental in integrating a variety of Chinese, Japanese, Thai, and Korean design elements and aesthetics, sometimes overlapping, into the work of Jugtown, which, in turn, influenced other fledgling art potteries in the state. As North Carolina's art pottery scene developed, other art potteries in the state mimicked some of those early forms created by Jugtown Pottery.

Most of the influence of Korean ceramics on North Carolina pottery can be seen today in the works of some of our state's talented contemporary artists. Examples of their work, as well as a few early examples from Jugtown Pottery and Ben Owen

Pottery, are highlighted in this show.



"While incarcerated, we were allowed to print out cases from the law library to study," said Roland. "My cellmate and I accumulated so much that we ended up making weights out of the compiled transcripts. The drawstring bags are filled with court transcripts from North Carolina exonerees."

An additional component of Sherrill Roland: The Odds is the exploration of chance and lottery through graphic design elements. The chances of winning the Powerball jackpot are 1 in 292.2 million (or .00000034%), while the number of innocent people wrongfully convicted of a crime is somewhere between 1% and 5% of the total current prison population. These statistics have been turned into lottery posters created by graphic designer Brandon Coley as a part of SECCA's exhibition.

"It says a lot about our society that Sherrill Roland's exploration of innocence, justice, and chance is both timely and somehow timeless," said Wendy Earle, Curator of Contemporary Art at SECCA. "Every year, the criminal justice system exonerates hundreds of wrongfully imprisoned people, yet we can be sure that thousands more remain incarcerated for want of resources, access, and luck. Roland's exhibition brings together sculpture, video, and illustrated data to expose and critique the byzantine processes and capriciousness of the criminal justice

A large part of Roland's art practice has been The Jumpsuit Project, an ongoing performance art piece. The criminal justice system in the US is intentionally fragmented and often invisible to those who do not have a direct connection with it. In *The Jumpsuit Project*, Roland wears the iconic orange prison jumpsuit and

engages people in conversation, disrupting spaces in the art world, higher education, and other places where issues around criminal justice are normally absent. As a socially-engaged performance, the work aims to build a new narrative around criminal justice, working toward lasting national policy changes by disrupting local incarceration systems. The Odds will feature a video of this performance.

Taken as a whole, The Odds asks uncomfortable yet necessary questions about the role of chance and bias in our lives and communities, and the systems that govern them.

Roland was born in Asheville, NC. He received both his BFA in Design and MFA in Studio Art from the University of North Carolina at Greensboro. He is an interdisciplinary artist and the founder of The Jumpsuit Project. Roland has been an Artist in Residence at the Civil Rights Corp, Hambridge, McColl Center for Art + Innovation, and the Fountainhead in Miami. He has won awards from numerous organizations, including Creative Capital, Art for Justice, the South Arts Southern Grand Prize, and the Right to Return Fellowship.

The Southeastern Center for Contemporary Art (SECCA), an affiliate of the North Carolina Museum of Art, offers a front row seat to the art of our time through exhibitions, experiences, and education programs with a focus on regional working artists. Founded in 1956 and located on the scenic James G. The Southeastern Center for Contemporary Art (SECCA) in Winston-Salem, NC, will present Sherrill Roland: The Odds, an exhibition of new sculptures, videography, and design by interdisciplinary artist Sherrill Roland, on view in the Center's Potter Gallery, from Mar. 10 through June 5, 2022. A reception will be held on Mar. 10 from 6-8pm. The reception is free and open to the public, with a suggested \$10 donation. Sherrill Roland: The Odds is presented with support from Blanco Tackabery Law.

The exhibition interrogates the concepts of justice, innocence, and chance, drawing upon the artist's experiences enduring ten months of wrongful incarceration before his exoneration.

Sherrill Roland's interdisciplinary practice examines innocence, identity, and community, reimagining those concepts in the context of the American criminal justice system. For more than three years, Roland's right to self-determination was lost to wrongful incarceration. After spending ten months in prison for a crime he was later exonerated for, he returned to his artistic practice, which he now uses as a vehicle for self-reflection and as an outlet for emotional release. Converting the haunting nuances of his experiences into drawings, sculptures, multimedia objects,

performances, and participatory activities, Roland shares his story and creates space for others to do the same, illuminating the invisible costs, damages, and burdens of incarceration.

In 2015, at least 173 individuals were exonerated and released from imprisonment after being wrongfully incarcerated. In 2021, Wake Forest University's School of Law students, part of the Society for Criminal Justice Reform and the Art Law Society, conducted research that unearthed court documents and media coverage for 92 of these individuals, resulting in over 4,500 pages of documents. The artist has used these documents to create sculptures for the exhibition at SECCA.

and painting from UNC-G. She is a retired Instructor in Drawing at Wake Forest University. She was the W-S Artist of the Year in 1998, and is a founding board member of Artworks Gallery, a cooperative gallery in W-S. She has exhibited widely in NC, and in shows in Kentucky, Virginia, South Carolina, New York City, and Wyoming.

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paintings, prints and drawings that represent an exploration of *Transitioning*.

The large prints come from a continuing appreciation for trees, the 3-D paintings are based on the discovery of relationships amongst three dimensional and color representations of thoughts and emotions. 





"It reminds me that days of sweetness can exist even in the midst of loss and that the creative process can renew and spark even under difficult circumstances," says Bara. "I have used an ancient Korean gilding technique called Keum Boo to incorporate 24 kt gold into many of my new pieces. The gold is a brilliance arising from the blackness of the darkened silver. A sweet impossible blossom."

Chris Graebner wasn't familiar with the poem, but her new paintings are bouquets of flowers, so the title felt appropriate. "Now having read it, 'From Blossoms' feels even more appropriate. The poem is about moments of joy and beauty and of living life in those moments with gratitude. Painting flowers is an exercise in taking something brief and mysterious and making it familiar and lasting. I find that the process of painting flowers makes them part of me.

close attention to each individual flower and petal - because it results in 'knowing' a plant in a way that makes it a permanent part of my world. I hope that spending time with my *Sweet Impossible Blossoms* will do that for the viewer as well."

Ian Herdell is inspired by the beauty and structure of forms found in nature and brings that into his furniture designs. "I find that each tree has a story to tell, a snapshot into its unique life. My designs incorporate and harness the knots, splits, rot, spalting, special grain and sculpting done by insects, wind and weather. At times I also highlight these 'imperfections' with inlaid shells to



Gibbes Museum of Art, 135 Meeting Street, Charleston. Gallery 8, Through Aug. 7 - "Fighters for Freedom: William H. Johnson Picturing Justice". William H. Johnson painted his Fighters for Freedom series in the mid-1940s as a tribute to African American activists, scientists, teachers, performers and international heads of state working to bring peace to the world. He celebrated their accomplishments even as he acknowledged the realities of racism, violence and oppression they faced and overcame. Some of his fighters—Harriet Tubman, George Washington Carver, Marian Anderson and Mahatma ∍andni—are tamiliar nistoricai tigures; otners are less well-known individuals whose determination and sacrifice have been eclipsed over time. Drawn entirely from the collection of more than 1,000 works by Johnson given to the Smithsonian American Art Museum by the Harmon Foundation in 1967, this exhibition is the first-ever presentation of this series in Johnson's home state of South Carolina. "Fighters for Freedom: William H. Johnson Picturing Justice" is organized by the Smithsonian American Art Museum with generous support from Art Bridges, Faye and Robert Davidson, and the Jacob and Gwendolyn Lawrence Foundation. Gallery 9, Through Aug. 7 - "A New Deal: Artists at Work". During the Great Depression of the 1930s, President Franklin Delano Roosevelt launched his ambitious Works Progress Administration (WPA) programs that sent millions of unemployed Americans back to work, including more than 5,000 artists. The Federal Art Project, formed under the WPA, afforded opportunities to a diverse group of artists, including women, African Americans and recent immigrants from China, Russia and Germany. This monumental effort to put artists back to work resulted in a collection of artworks intended to uplift the national spirit and encourage creativity in the face of great

challenges. The Gibbes is one of a select group

Eggleston Photographs from the Laura and Jay Crouse Collection". It is said that William Eggleston's unique ability to conflate the epic and the everyday has made him one of the most impactful figures in late 20th century photography. A native of Memphis, TN, Eggleston first photographed his local environs in the 1950s in black-and-white but became one of the first fine art photographers to use color to record his observations in a more heightened and accurate way. Today, his strikingly vivid yet enigmatic images of parked cars, billboards, storefronts, diners and other artifacts of the ordinary world are considered groundbreaking. The photographs presented in this edition of the museum's Charleston Collects exhibition series were selected from the Laura and Jay Crouse Collection and represent many of the pioneering artist's most notable works. The exhibition will be accompanied by a full-color catalog with an essay on the artist by Simon Constantine, Ph.D., professor of photographic history at Birkbeck, University of London, and Sotheby's Art Institute. Galleries 1, 4, and 5, Permanent Exhibition -"18th and 19th Century American Paintings and Sculpture". American paintings, from colonial portraits to Civil War-era landscapes, occupy the Gibbes Main Gallery. Portraits of leading political, social, and military figures include works by Jeremiah Theus, Henry Benbridge, Benjamin West, Gilbert Stuart, Thomas Sully and Samuel F.B. Morse. The gallery also features landscape and genre scenes by Angelica Kaufmann, Louis Mignot, Eastman Johnson, Conrad Wise Chapman, and William Aiken Walker. The paintings collection is complemented by examples of neoclassical sculpture on view in the Campbell Rotunda, and decorative art objects on loan from the Rivers Collection. Gallery 5, Permanent Exhibition - "Miniature Portraits". The first American miniature portraits were painted in Charleston, and today the Gibbes is home to one of the most prestigious portrait miniature collections in the United States. Containing more than six hundred objects, the collection spans nearly two hundred years and represents the work of over a hundred artists. Small enough to fit in the palm of the hand, these tiny portraits were treasured remembrances of loved ones in the age before photography. Presented in state-of-the-art display cases, and in viewable storage drawers featured miniatures include works by Mary Roberts, Jeremiah Theus, Henry Benbridge, Charles Wilson Peale, Pierre Henri, Edward Greene Malbone, George Engleheart, and Charles Fraser. Gallery 6, Permanent Exhibition - "20th Century American Regionalism and the Charleston Renaissance". At the turn of the twentieth century, American artists looked to their European counterparts and beyond as they developed identifiably American artistic movements. Two particularly strong influences during this time period were French Impressionism and Japanese woodblock prints. Another prevailing theme during this period was the growing interest in American subject matter. American regionalism and social realism played important roles in the development of art in Charleston, which flourished as a destination for artists, particularly during the years of 1915 to 1945 a period now known as the Charleston Renaissance. Gallery 7, Permanent Exhibition - "Modern and Contemporary". Modern and contemporary art in America encompasses a wide range of styles, subject matter, and media. As a whole, the diversity of modern and contemporary art reflects the rich and varied heritage of our nation and the lowcountry region Works in this gallery were created over the past forty years by artists who are native to the area, who have worked here, or who have created objects that reflect the complex story of the region. The works are grouped to reflect several themes including the southern landscape, the human figure, abstraction, and the legacy of slavery in America. Visiting Artist Series, Katy Mixon, Session I: Through Apr. 3 - Mixon, born in Orangeburg, SC, is a visual artist working in painting, sculpture, quilting and photography. She earned an MFA from University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill and a B.A. from Davidson College. She is an alumna of the School of the Museum of Fine Arts, Boston. Mixon is a recipient of a Working Artist Grant and a Ruth and Harold Chenven Foundation Award. She was a finalist for a William and Dorothy Yeck Young Painters Award and a VCUarts Fountainhead Fellowship. Mixon was invited as an artist-in-residence to VCCA, VA; Kimmel Harding Nelson Center, NE; The Hambidge Center, GA; AICAD Studio Practice Residency, NY; and Byrdcliffe Art Colony, NY. In 2019, she founded Mugs for Moms, an effort that brings makers together to help raise maternal mental health awareness and find support for moms and their families. Lowcountry Image Gallery, Through Mar. 27 - "A Winter Wonderland in Color: Snow Scenes of Charleston". Heavy snowfalls are a rarity in Charleston, as the Lowcountry is more well known for its mild winters. However, our temperate winter climate occasionally experiences a snow storm that blankets the city in white for more than a mere hour or two. This exhibit showcases colorized photographs of remarkable snow days

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captured by residents of Charleston dating to the late 19th and early 20th centuries. Mar. 28 - Dec. 18 - "Explore Charleston in Sports: A Photographic History, 1890s-1960s". Ongoing - "Becoming Americans: Charleston in the Revolutionary War". Charleston played a critical role in the Revolutionary War. South Carolina was the wealthiest of the thirteen rebellious colonies and Charleston was its key port to maintain its trade with the outside world. The British would make three attempts against the city during the Revolutionary War. Their defeat at the Battle of Sullivan's Island on June 28, 1776 was a crucial patriot victory, which convinced many that independence could be achieved. The Siege of Charleston, meanwhile, was the longest siege of the Revolutionary War and the largest battle in South Carolina. These events and others are chronicled in the new exhibit, which will also features artifacts and period images that have not been exhibited at the Museum before. Richard Tuttle (b. 1941) began working in the 1960s when Minimalism emerged as a major art movement. Gerald Cantor Collections". Auguste Rodin saw the body as an envelope for the spirit, and the flickering surfaces of his modeled forms express this tension. His sculptures' poses, directly inspired by Michelangelo's powerful marble works, capture the human condition in all its elation and anguish. Rodin holds a prized place in the history of art, straddling the decades of the late 19th and early 20th centuries when the world was striving for a new modern form of expression. Visitors will learn about his processes for drawing, modeling, and casting as they immerse themselves in more than 40 examples of the artist's works in bronze. He attended the American Artist School in New York city as a teenager where he met renowned modern artists, including Piet Mondrian, who greatly influenced his abstract style. After studying architecture at the New Bauhaus in Chicago from 1946-1949, he received his graduate degree from Illinois Institute of Technology in 1952. The following year, he began working for architectural firm Skidmore, Owings and Merrill when Roger Milliken hired them to design Milliken's new research facility in Spartanburg. Upon realizing Krisel was also a sculptor, Milliken hired him to design the spray fountain outside of the facility which functions as a recycler of air conditioning water. Individual works in the collection are exceptional because of their rarity, craftsmanship, provenance, or as representative examples of particular types or methods of production or decoration.
