

Prior to his death, John made careful plans to insure the gallery would remain open for as long as possible, with the final disposition of his estate ultimately going to endow a fund for the purpose of promoting classical painting in the manner of 19th century American and Western European artists, and to support the Center for Birds of Prey in Awendaw, South Carolina."

Jordan Sheridan was born in Northeastern Arkansas in 1989. She became a mother to her son, Samuel, in 2017 while attending graduate school at the University of South Carolina. Pursuing an MFA degree, Sheridan's work organically shifted to include her understanding of motherhood. This change in research pushed her from working primarily in 2-D painting to 3-D artmaking via large-scale textile installations.

Sheridan's studio practice unites painting, sculpture, and installation as she explores the visual dimensions of identity and motherhood. Since completing her MFA degree, Sheridan has continued exploring these textile landscapes, each installation evolving with her multifaceted experience of motherhood.

Sheridan is currently a full-time faculty instructor at the University of South Carolina, teaching painting courses. She resides in Columbia, SC, with her partner and young children, Samuel, and Kora Quinn.

The Main Branch of the Charleston County Public Library system in Charleston, SC, will present Broken Glass, featuring works by Sarah Ferreira, on view in the Saul Alexander Foundation Gallery, from Mar. 1 - 31, 2023.

Ferreira is a medium experimenter and her pieces reflect the outcome of each experiment. Her work is created using an array of mixed media paints and surfaces including acrylic, gouache, watercolor, oil paints and textiles on paper, canvas and wood.

Her exhibition Broken Glass focuses on the idea of women "breaking the glass ceiling" to celebrate women during Women's History Month. She is deeply fascinated by the elements that influence culture. Through her artwork, she enjoys creating pieces that mesh past cultural elements with contemporary visuals and progressive thinking.
