Featuring over 30 portraits and related objects from the 1960s to the present, the exhibition will delve into varied stories of individuals from across the Gullah Geechee corridor. As co-curator Angela Dore notes, "Many of us identify with the culture in terms of the sense of place that we have from our family roots being here and being raised within the corridor, many of us remain actively engaged with the cultural practices, and others identify with the culture because of their lineage. For example, their parents or grandparents may have grown up within the corridor and passed the dialect, spiritual beliefs, and foodways down to them. We still cook like our grandmothers did. We remember the stories, values, and lessons that our elders taught us, and we teach those things to our children." Originally from Boston, MA, Randi Reiss-Mc-Cormack currently lives and works as an artist, adjunct professor at Maryland Institute College of Art (Baltimore, MD) and as the Associate Director of Sol Print Studio, a small artist's press. For the last eight years, she has been the Artistin-Residence at the St. Francis Neighborhood Center. She obtained her undergraduate degree in painting and printmaking at Cornell University (Ithaca, NY), spent a year working in various printmaking and painting studios in Paris and earned her graduate degree at The Maryland Institute College of Art. Through Apr. 16 - "Jennifer York - Estuary Blues." York is a lifelong artist and explorer. She grew up in rural Indiana, earned a BFA in Sculpture with an Art History minor from Pratt Institute and a MFA in Fibers from Savannah College of Art and Design. In 2003, she founded Jennythreads Studio in Asheville, NC, producing tine nandmade apparei for styllsn women, crafting an independent, creative living for 19 years. In 2018-19, York traveled to a dozen countries for four monthlong international art residencies, where she filled sketchbooks with observational drawings and created a series of collapsible carousel pop-up book sculptures that fit in her carry-on suitcase.
