A closing reception will be held on Mar. 10, from 4-6pm. Liddell's "Whispering Pines" animation is a playful and piquant look at male bonding and everyday rituals; the animation serves as a conceptual and physical springboard for her paintings and sculptures. Unspecified male figures with "heads" resembling football helmets and trucker caps cavort in beer-soaked revelry under cover of the night. The lushly painted sur faces and extra saturated lighting set the stage for these humorously discomforting theatrics. Phillips has two series in the show: oil paintings of suburban nightscapes bathed in artificial light and collages of churches lit against black vinyl foreboding skies. Hidden narratives lurk in the shadows of these figureless spaces. The church facades glower out and force their presences in not necessarily welcome ways. Small Gallery, Through Mar. 10 - "Warren Hicks - BEGAT". A closing reception will be held on Mar. 10, from 4-6pm. Using humor to address his frustration with religious hypocrisy, Hicks removed all religious references from the Gospel of Matthew from the Christian Bible. Through 191 illustrations and the extremely redacted text, Hicks revealed a world filled with elves, cannibalism, UFOs, talking fruit, explosions, and more. The exhibition includes prints and 2-D paper sculptures based on his book Downstairs Gallery, Through Mar 10 -"Upstair's 5th Drawing Marathon". Over six decades much has changed, but the community's passion for and commitment to visual art has not. The Cameron Art Museum has partnered with the arts collective Eighteen Forward to present "Black Lives Do Matter at CAM," an eighteen-letter installation displayed on the museum grounds. The public is encouraged to view these eight-foot-high letters as they meander through CAM's outdoor space. The installation joins the museum's other outdoor works, including the recently opened PNC USCT Park featuring the Stephen Hayes designed sculpture Boundless, activating the museum's 9.4-acre grounds. Ongoing - Cameron Art Museum presents the only sculpture park in the country created to honor the United States Colored Troops and their fight for freedom. The opening of PNC USCT Park marks the one-year anniversary of the unveiling of Boundless, the public sculpture by artist Stephen Hayes that commemorates the United States Colored Troops and the Battle of Forks Road. This park creates a gathering space for the more than 60,000 visitors from across the country who come to CAM each year and the 8,000 school children who visit the museum on field trips.
