When talking about the discovery of this process she says, "I was inspired by a trip to The Art Institute of Chicago several years ago. I admired a painting called "Saint George and the Dragon" by Bernat Martorell. He created a relief within his painting made with fresco-secco plaster and gilded it in some select areas. This was my "ah ha moment" where I felt I could enhance my figurative painting, which I love, with casting texture that I had been testing for a few months."

For this show, Stratton has not only drawn inspiration from master works but also from her own childhood. "I have always liked the making of things. Drawing was the easiest for me at the time and I was encouraged. Now I want to express more than just technique. I deeply want to share stories of my own or others. I want my paintings to be timeless."

To create these timeless pieces Stratton, who works with live models, says, "Once I start a photoshoot it becomes more of a collaboration. The model and I play around until I think I have the image that screams

The Robert Lange Studios in Charleston, SC, will present *Transcendence: Dimensional Gilded Paintings* by Savannah based artist June Stratton, on view: March 3 - 28, on view from Mar. 3 - 28, 2023. A reception will be held on Mar. 3, from 5-8pm.

Stratton, who partially paints but also sculpts and layers her work using plaster, gilding, and oil. Internationally recognized for her extremely unique techniques in paint application, she says, "Her process has evolved over decades" and that she strives to create works that, "keep your attention focused on the art and keep your eyes circulating on the painting, which sparks some feeling or emotion."

The title of the show, *Transcendence*, perfectly describes the artist's journey from traditional oil painting to working with handmade casting molds created from plant life, specimens, and various possessions. These objects are carefully cast and then adhered to each painting. Stratton then paints or gilds them depending on how she wishes the texture to interact with a figurative oil painting that she has already begun to create.

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out at me to be painted."

One such image is a stand out in the show and depicts a young girl with axe in hand, standing strong, splattered with blood; the piece is titled "Hickory/Reckoning." The richness of the red blood is contrasted with gold flowers that merge the figure into an ethereal background.

The painting loosely depicts the story of Lizzie Borden, a young girl that famously was tried but acquitted for murdering her father and stepmother in the late 1800s. Stratton said, "This painting was hard to paint, as it was originally based on my own personal experiences with abuse and harassment. My protagonist wilds a bloody axe as a cinematic superhero as she has defeated those who have wronged her. I do not believe violence is a way to solve problems but painting it is a cathartic form of expressing my anger."

While working on the piece and a number of paintings for the show, Stratton was faced with not only historical cruelties but also confronted with present day events. She said, "Once I started to hear about the atrocities against women in Ukraine and Liobally.

Overall the exhibit, with its unique painting effects and strong imagery, is inspiring viewers to take a second look. Gallery owner Robert Lange says of Stratton's work, "Each painting is filled with moments of heaviness that feel authentic because they are contrasted by such beauty and light." There will be over 10 masterful works in the show ranging from smaller 12-inch paintings to larger life sized 5-foot paintings.

Robert Lange Studios is a gallery space run by artist and gallery owners Megan and Robert Lange. As such, it is dedicated to the development of an on-going dialogue between artists from a diverse range of artistic disciplines at differing levels of their careers.

Gallery owners Megan and Robert Lange are committed to providing a forum for art based on individuals, subjective style and awareness. This dedication has created a reputation for the gallery of consistently finding new and interesting artists that stand out for their imagination and distinctive personal touch.
