City of Charleston, SC, **Features Works by Nigel Parry**

The City of Charleston Office of Cul tural Affairs presents Untitled Places, an exhibition at City Gallery that assembles liminal landscapes by photographer Nigel Parry, on view from Mar. 1 through May 5, 2024. A reception will be held on Mar. 1, from 5-7pm and an artist's talk on Saturday, March 16 at 2pm.

Parry, a renowned portrait photographer who has photographed US Presidents, celebrities, and other luminaries, will show more than forty of his impressionistic landscapes, photographed in the Lowcountry and upstate New York, almost exclusively on film.

Over his 35-year career, Parry has been lauded for his portraits of artists, politicians, and celebrities for publications like Vogue, The New York Times Magazine, Time Magazine, among others. "I arrange the light, lines, composition, and color into an immediate impression of their being," said Parry. When the pandemic left him without people to photograph, he returned to photographing the landscape, a hobby he enjoyed as a youth.

"My landscapes use all the same means of visual storytelling and intentions to show my highly personalized representation of the environment around me. These photographs are not necessarily meant to be a direct representation of the view I see, but more of a feeling of what it's like to be there" adds Parry. The resulting landscapes of the Lowcountry and upstate New York offer abstract impressions of Parry's surroundings.

"Unwittingly referencing Rothko, I am drawn to separate the photograph into distinct slabs of color in which subtle details of the world around us are discovered: the wind through the marsh grass, the abrupt clash of sky and land, or the horizon where heaven and earth meld into one and details are barely perceived," said Parry. The photos are almost exclusively from film cameras, and, adds Parry, "their inherent imperfections – lens aberrations, grain within the film's various layers, chemical development, digitization, and printing processes – combine to transform the photographs into something more abstract and pointillistic, recognizable yet

Born in a small mining village in South Yorkshire, England, Nigel Parry spent his formative years drawing and painting. He earned a graphics degree in college, where typography and design inspired the compositions of his photography, which later became his primary focus. While designing books for publisher Faber&Faber in 1987, Parry was invited to exhibit his photographic portraits of members at the newly formed Groucho Club in London to rave reviews. A week Later the London Sunday Times Magazine gave him his first



Parry soon left his design position, and undertook portrait shoots in London for Vanity Fair, The New York Times Magazine, ad agencies and film companies. In 1994 he moved to New York City, where his career photographing portraits for the most prestigious clients continued to grow, and now includes the current and former US Presidents, world leaders, Hollywood royalty, entrepreneurs, and other luminaries. He is most well-known for his celebrity portraits, but Parry has been capturing the landscape since his early teens. The same approach to understanding the subject, storytelling and emotion is evident in all his work, be it a face, food, or landscape. His photographs have won many awards, and he has published two monographs - 'Sharp' and 'Blunt' (both published by Powerhouse books).

Parry first visited Charleston on assignment in 1995. He immediately fell in love with its warmth and charm, and eventually married one of its daughters. With his wife, Rachel, Parry now lives in Charleston, where last year he debuted his first show of Landscapes at the Corrigan Gallery. Having recently moved from New York, he continues his love for all disciplines of photography from his base here in the Lowcountry.

City Gallery, located at Joe Riley Waterfront Park, is owned by the City of Charleston and operated by the City of Charleston Office of Cultural Affairs, presenting an annual program of exhibitions and events featuring the finest contemporary art from local, regional, national and international artists, with a focus on the Lowcountry.

I like to receive information about visual art exhibits and other related events, but I'm not the general public. Carolina Arts presents info about visual art exhibits taking place in both North and South Carolina. We like to offer complete details of these events so we can present it to our readership representing all points in the Carolinas and beyond. Our goal is to give our readers the info they need to go see those exhibits which | the facts - just the facts. And, by deadline, if might appeal to them - that means the Who, | not before. We're not all the same.

What, Where, and When. As far as the Why goes - so people can enjoy the art being produced and presented by artists living in the Carolinas and beyond. Some of those people

Art groups, art organizations and art museums who use Constant Contact, Mail Chimp, and other mass e-mail programs are not using those programs correctly - in my

First off, *Carolina Arts* should not be included on these e-mail lists. We are not the general public. These people need to send us a detailed press release with info about exhibitions. They should also be sending a few high resolution images of artworks from those exhibits to make the press release more appealing.

Most of these mass e-mail are targeted at people who have already interacted with the sender - that's how they got on an e-mail list, so it's more like a reminder to return for another event. Many just include a reception date and time for an exhibit and not much more. We need more info than that. We need beginning and ending dates for the exhibits, detailed descriptions of the exhibits and something which will give readers a reason WHY they would go see this exhibit over the dozens and dozens of exhibits being offered during a period of time. Competition for the public's eyeballs is pretty fierce in the Carolinas, but a good press release can break through the public's many choices and say, "I'm the one you don't want to miss!".

And I don't need "links" to transfer files or other sites to find the info - send it to us directly in plain text in an e-mail with im-

present Judy McSween - Free Your Mind, on view from Mar. 1 - 30, 2024, A reception will be held on Mar. 1, from 5-8pm, during the Charleston Art Walk.

McSween offers the following statement regarding her upcoming show, "It's a liberating experience for me to approach my work without a preconceived image - with having only one goal to push myself beyond my comfort zone. That comfort zone originates from the process I've been following for years, so as I began painting for *Free* Your Mind, I asked myself, "How do I start differently?" No value studies, no multiple sketches, and no blocking in compositions as usual - I decided to create backgrounds comprised of patterned printed surfaces."

"I wanted playfulness and curiosity at the starting line. So I layered natural images printed directly on the surface with overlap-

The Dare Gallery in Charleston, SC, will | ping textures pressed onto the panels, and with washes of transparent color rubbed onto the piece and dripping to its edges. The resulting surfaces pulsated with rhythm, depth and color, making me wonder about imagined universes."

"The process morphed into me throwing open my supply drawers, making everything accessible and anything possible, adds McSween. "That's the seed from which Free Your Mind has grown. Many of my new paintings are purely abstract, resulting from "mind moments" where the fluidity of lines are untouched and the overlapping colors intuitive. It also happened that the paintings flowed one into another, too. Working on multiple pieces of different sizes let me plant a 'mind thought' in a new place to see how it manifested."

"As I've painted, the idea of freeing my continued above on next column to the right

mind has taken on the meaning of immediacy, of letting one moment flow into another. and of banishing my tendency to overthink. Where thoughtful composition became absolutely necessary, as in the new paintings incorporating figures, I still wanted to convey the feeling of awe and inspiration that opening your mind brings. Those paintings are meant to direct viewers outward and upward - to the future - as well as to look inside themselves to what it means to be joyfully free of distraction and have an open mind.

McSween continues, "A free mind truly opens you to a universe of thought, beliefs and opportunity. I know it's not a coincidence that I've recently been reading about the artist Mark Rothko and discovered his inspirational words that seem perfect for my new work: A painting is not a picture of an experience; it is an experience. The artist invites the spectator to perform an aerial feat of flying from point to point, attracted by some irresistible magnet across space, entering into mysterious recesses."

Judy McSween is a Charleston based artist who paints familiar abstracts to document inspiring life experiences. A native



of Warren, OH, and a graduate of Bowling Green State University with a BFA special ization in painting, McSween also taught elementary and middle school art in Ohio and South Carolina for over twenty years. She credits her students with teaching her to interpret her surroundings with fresh eyes and to instill joy in her work.

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

He was director of the Waterworks Visual Arts Center in Salisbury, NC, from 1985 until 1990 when he became the first full-time director of Winthrop University Galleries in Rock Hill, SC. For 10 years he served as chair of Winthrop's Department of Fine Arts

Stanley offered the following statement: "The work in the Hampton III exhibition looks at paintings from two studios and, as such, a transition in my work. First of all it includes the last pieces completed before leaving South Carolina to a new home 140 miles north in Durham. With grad school, and later, a professional life at Winthrop, thirty-three years in South Carolina left a lasting impression. But moving somewhere new marked an op-

portunity to grow again, a hope that there were more discoveries to be made."

"Works completed in the new studio represent a rethinking of painting and subject matter," adds Stanley. "Although the first works produced in Durham still relied upon mechanical drawing, they would eventually be free of representational imagery. And then the most recent series goes a step further. Titled *Uncharted* Water, these works not only abandoned symbolic images like boats, houses or interiors, but a long held, hard-edge practice is largely replaced by spontaneous color."

"Regardless of what changes this relocation might have brought to my work, or meant to me personally, I am ever mindful that we live in the midst of troubled times We feel powerless to affect what we see and hear all around us in our shared world. So I have to ask, does this environment influence how I think, how I work? Are these paintings attempting to draw a map in response?"

"I am a privileged individual with a warm space in which I can put acrylic on canvas," says Stanley. "And yet in the midst of everything, I honestly do not know if these works hold meaning for anyone else. Unlike earlier work, these have no concrete imagery to rely upon as points of reference. And despite their evolving energy, I don't think there is a statement that clearly explains my intentions. I see these paintings merely as steps in acknowledging the world that I have come to know in my seventy-four years, and the possibility that some kind of joy might still exist. And all the while I cannot ignore the current environment in which we live. As an artist, I must work."




Unchartered Water #10, 2023, Acrylic on Canvas, 30 x 36 inches



Edwards then began an academic career and developed his unique artistic technique – embossed Prismacolors – to create stained-glass-like images. 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Mint Museum Randolph in Charlotte, NC, Celebrates The Delhom Service League

Charlotte, NC, is presenting The Delhom Service League: 50 Golden Years, on view through Aug. 11, 2024.

The Delhom Service League (DSL) provided a half-century of generous support and impactful initiatives to The Mint Museum, helping to fund the acquisition of more than 200 works of art in the Mint's collection.

The Delhom Service League: 50 Golden Years celebrates the Delhom Service League's enthusiastic support for the Mint by proudly displaying significant works funded or gifted by the affiliate group, plus selected publications, photographs and other memorabilia. In 2022, the Delhom Service League made the difficult decision to dissolve as a Mint affiliate. The league nevertheless remains an indelible part of the Mint's history, and its many contributions rightly deserve the museum's never-ending recognition and

In 1965, The Mint Museum purchased the exceptional collection of British, Euro pean, and Asian ceramics from Chicago collector M. Mellanay Delhom. Two years later, once the museum finished building a new wing that included a large gallery to display her holdings, Miss Delhom - as she preferred to be called - began offering weekly classes, open to the public, to discuss the works on view.

Many of the class attendees started volunteering their time in the Delhom Gallery to answer questions from museum visitors and offer tours. As the popularity of the gallery steadily increased, those volunteers realized that they needed a more formal structure for handling the increased demand for their services. They initiated discussions with museum leadership, and in 1972 the Delhom Service League (DSL) was established as a Mint affiliate.

Throughout the next 50 years, the

museum and its ceramics collections in a myriad of ways. It sponsored world-renowned speakers, hosted public symposia and study trips, financed Mint publications and books for the museum's library, and funded acquisitions for the museum's permanent collection. In 2005, the Delhom Service League founded an event that was to become an immensely important and widely cherished part of its legacy to the Mint: The Potters Market Invitational.

The league invited some 40 potters practicing their craft in North Carolina to sell their wares in a large tent on the front lawn of Mint Museum Randolph. The first Potters Market Invitational was so successful that the DSL continued to organize the event (now called Potters Market at

The Orangeburg County Fine Arts Center in Orangeburg, SC, will present Retrospection • Introspection: Works by Susan Livingston, on view in the Lusty Gallery, from Mar. 5 through May 31, 2024. A reception will be held on Mar. 13, from 6-8pm.

Every major event in Susan Livingston's life has found expression in the fiber and mixed media works she has created over the years. And each work comes with a history or story, that inspired the work or was inspired by the finished piece. She calls this collection, spanning over four decades, Retrospection • Introspection.

Self Portrait (1981) is the earliest piece in the exhibition, which she calls the beginning of Retrospection • Introspection. "I started this when I was pregnant with my daughter. It was a self -portrait that became a little bit more," says Livingston. An arm resting, horizontal, and delicately visible beneath the tunic-shaped fabric, has acquired more meaning. "The arm is under there because I couldn't figure out how to handle the stitching there. Now it seems to represent the arm I have a little bit of a problem with due to dead nerves. Someone else pointed out that when you're pregnant that is very often how you



Like Self Portrait, Livingston's work, over the years, has not only taken on depth of meaning but a deepening, exquisite symbolism expressed through placement of continued above on next column to the right found objects she's integrated and stitched into acquired and rendered fabric. She has undertaken this with the competencies that only a mastery of needlework and imagination could accomplish. Life is Round (2023), which could be described as the work that nspired the title of the exhibition, gives new neaning to the term "work of art," through its intricate patterns of illustrations. The magnetism evoked by its stitching, embracing of found and treasured objects narrate the meaning of life as Livingston perceives it in this period of her life.

"You start thinking back about what you have done, what you want to do, and how what you've done in the past influences where you are now," adds Livingston. "Life is Round is based on our beginnings, our middle and how we circle back to different parts. Life is round. We begin life as a small egg, developing our many character traits within. As each of us leaves the womb, we move into our first nest. We grow and our nests become more elaborate, expanding with our needs. With age, we often return to our smaller, more intimate nest, surrounding ourselves with memories and family."

She Stands Alone (2022) is a statement piece from Livingston, whose years included the eras that saw the rising profiles of women pursuing roles outside the home, inserting their voices and choices but still facing the persistent realities of misogyny and exploitation. It is a formidable abstract, stark, effectively forbidding, meant to evoke the many

"We think the women's movement has made great strides, but we still have to keep fighting and still try and stand up for ourselves." She in She Stands Alone is positioned in the top right of the piece, her sword arm out, ready to defend herself. "To me it's a position that as a woman we're in often and it's sad to me that we are still in that position quite often. This is my tribute to the 'Me Too Movement' and I feel like it's a very special piece," says Livingston.

In Livingston's Artist Statement she says, "For many years, I have been using a needle and thread to explore, to define, to illustrate - each piece becomes a part of my personal biography. I often feel my work is simply a representation of the many ongoing conversations I have with myself."

Retrospection • Introspection is a very special conversation, an intimate collection that communicates stories that can be deeply heard through what we see.

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Columbia Museum of Art in Columbia, SC, Offers Exhibition Focused on How Americans Live & a Fundraiser Exhibit

lumbia, SC, is presenting *Interior Lives*: Modern American Spaces, 1890 - 1945, on view through May 12, 2024.

Through the lenses of interior scenes and material culture, Interior Lives explores the ways everyday Americans lived, worked, ___ played, and evolved their identities in the first half of the 20th century. Homes, workplaces, and the spaces between were newly envisioned in response to socioeconomic and technological shifts. American artists, many of whom continued to work in a representational style, bore witness to the inception of a modern world and interpreted it as it manifested before them. The works on view in this exhibition — primarily portraits, genre scenes, and still lifes — are often modest in scale and humble in subject yet penetrating in their cultural and psychological implications.

The exhibition takes the 1890s as its starting point, a decade that encompassed the late Gilded Age and saw the beginnings of the Progressive Era reform movement. It extends through the end of World War II, when the United States entered a new period of global influence and when abstraction took over as the dominant artistic style. Over the course of these six decades, the widespread implementation of the telephone, the building of mass transit systems, and the proliferation of industrially manufactured goods inspired a new, rapid






The Asheville Art Museum in Asheville, NC, is thrilled to announce the upcoming exhibition, The New Salon: A Contemporary View, guest-curated by Gabriel Shaffer. On view from Mar. 8 through Aug. 19, 2024, The New Salon takes the tradition of the salon in art history as a site of rebellion against the norm, infusing it with the diverse and often fantastical narratives prevalent in New Contemporary figurative art. founded Juxtapoz Magazine, sending out a rallying cry to artists, many of whom were inspired by Surrealism, Pop art, Graffiti, and Street Art. With a design that referenced comic books and psychedelic rock posters, the magazine created an alternative art space for a generation of artists and art collectors who were disillusioned with the direction of the mainstream art world.

"If there was one question I could ask the majority of these artists who have been around since the nineties, it would be, 'Where were you when you read your first copy of *Juxtapoz*?' stated guest curator Gabriel Shaffer. Multiple sub-genres of art have blossomed out of its countercultural foundation, giving rise to countless artists furthering the styles it once championed. Jux helped make it possible for cartoon imagery, illustration, craft, Graffiti, Fantasy, and good old-fashioned art mayhem to have a diverse and broad audience.3

Reynolda House Museum of American Art in Winston-Salem, NC, Features Works by Grant Wood

The Reynolda House Museum of American Art in Winston-Salem, NC, is presenting Art for the American Home: Grant Wood's Lithographs, on view in the West through June 30, 2024.

In 1934, the Regionalist artist Grant Wood made an agreement with Associated American Artists (AAA) in New York to create a series of lithographs. Wood, the creator of Reynolda's iconic 1936 painting "Spring Turning," ultimately produced 19 lithographs, about a quarter of his mature work. His consummate drafting skills made him a natural for the medium.

The AAA produced the lithographs in editions of 250 and sold them for \$5 to \$10 each. The opportunity to create affordable art during the Great Depression appealed to the artist. This small exhibition will focus on Wood's narrative lithographs ("Sultry Night," "Honorary Degree," "Shrine Quartet," "The Midnight Alarm") and still lifes. The colored still life lithographs of fruits, vegetables and flowers represent the fecundity of Iowa's farmland.

"Grant Wood was interested in making art that was accessible to ordinary people, not just wealthy art collectors," Allison Slaby, curator, said. "Consequently, at the height of the Great Depression, he made

affordable lithographs and public murals that told the stories of his native Iowa. The lithographs in this exhibition range from the amusing to the poignant."



The Immense and the Intimate: Slow Painting as a Practice of Contemplation, features works by Katherine Colburn, who is an artist living and working in Cincinnati, OH. She received her BA in Studio Art and English from Xavier University and her MFA in Studio Art with a focus on Drawing and Painting at the University of North Carolina Greensboro. Her work engages with themes of sanctuary and threshold, exploring the place of painting in a culture that values speed and production while saturated with an abundance of imagery.

Colburn has completed residencies at Vermont Studio Center and the Burren College of Art in Ballyvaughan, Ireland. Her work has been published internationally in ArtMaze Mag and she has exhibited her work around the United States. Recent exhibitions include solo shows at the Weston Art Gallery, ROY G BIV Gallery, Kansas City Artist Coalition, and Greensboro Project Space, as well as group shows with the Bolivar Gallery at the University of Kentucky, Site: Brooklyn in New York City, and the Weatherspoon Art Museum in Greensboro, North Carolina.

Colburn most recently has taught at Northern Kentucky University and Xavier University and continues to work out of her studio in Camp Washington

"My studio work is fueled by a desire to alleviate the contemporary pressures of a culture propelled by competition and production. I use framing and perspectival shifts to process images and structures at a time when - as a result of late capitalism and global crises - the concepts of home and rest are in constant flux. In an attempt to counter feelings of distance, upheaval and anxiety, painting is my quiet resistance: it encourages reflections upon transience and domestic life and offers space to navigate transition. It is an attempt to fix the unfixable - to pin down the fluid concept of the sacred," says

"Inspired by hermeneutic philosophy



and apophatic theology, I find myself swinging between contradictory states of belief," adds Colburn. "I am chasing steadiness in a liminal place that encompasses a simultaneous coming and going. This experience manifests itself most often in protected spaces, thus I've been led in my work to themes of threshold and sanctuary. My works create a respite and an entryway. They remind us that painting, in its stillness and imaginative capabilities, teaches us to rest where we do not live."

James Ray is a self-taught artist of all trades, currently focused on wood turning. His goal is simply stated as, "to reveal what mother nature has already created". A native of South Carolina, he spent much of his youth and young adult years studying music and didn't attempt wood working until much later. Though raised as a frame carpenter by his father, the idea of wood as medium of artistic expression didn't occur to him until helping his parents remove a fallen tree at their home on Lake Murray and noticing the complex patterns created from the struggle of life. From the creation of his first piece, a simple guitar pic, to turning bowls and other pieces on a wood lathe, he has continued to experiment with what is possible to create with natures help.

In his mid-twenties Ray began a career as a commercial printer and has continued in that field for the last twenty years. Currently he works as a production manager of a print shop for the state of South Carolina and resides in his hometown of Saluda.

Ray gives most of his art away to friends and family but occasionally will sell items at craft shows.

more like a revelation every time I create anything with wood," say Ray. "I will often begin a project with a specific shape or idea in mind, but it rarely comes out exactly as planned. There may be a defect in the wood that needs to be avoided or I may find something hidden that is just too beautiful to cut away. Those are my favorite things to work on. When I find something truly unique that could not have even been imagined."

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World. There in those cities, a succession of explorers, artists and mathematicians created new maps that introduce the expanding world. The golden period for the production of decorated and colored maps embraced the late seventeenth century through the eighteenth century, with each expedition to the Americas resulting in a better understanding of the coastal and inland topography of the continents.

The early cartographers relied heavily on Native American descriptions, unsubstantiated reports and hearsay in the development of their maps. As a result, topographic features of this period were often exaggerated or misrepresented; however, they are amazingly accurate given the methods used.







Museum of the Cape Fear in Fayetteville, NC, Features Images of US Colored Troops

The Museum of the Cape Fear in Fayetteville, NC, is presenting Seventeen Men: Portraits of the Men of the 25th US Colored Troops, on view through June 2,

Learn how the discovery of a tiny pocket-sized photo album led to a monthslong research project for genealogist and artist Shayne Davidson, culminating in a series of 17 life sized portraits. The Seventeen Men were soldiers with the 25th US Colored Troops Co. G from 1864-1865. Each portrait is accompanied by a short biography of the man's life and a reproduced image of the original albumin print or tintype Davidson used to create

A native of St. Louis, MO, Shayne Davidson holds a BFA from California Institute of the Arts and an MFA in Medical and Biological Illustration from the University of Michigan. After she retired from commercial illustration, she focused her attention on genealogy. While creating a family tree for a friend, she was told about an album owned by Captain William Prickitt containing tiny photos of 17 Civil War soldiers who served under Prickitt in the USCT. Fascinated by the photos, she extensively researched the men's lives and drew their life-sized portraits. The resulting work became a traveling exhibit titled



In addition to Seventeen Men, the exhibit gallery features information about the US Colored Troops (USCT) that fought in the Cape Fear region during the Wilmington Campaign. USCT regiments were present at the Battles of Fort Fisher and engaged Confederate troops as the Union army moved up the peninsula from Fort Fisher to capture the city of Wilmington, the last major supply line of the Confederacy. Most notably, during the Battle of Forks Road where the 5th USCT led a frontal assault on the deeply entrenched enemy. More than 50% of the Union casualties on the campaign to reclaim Wilmington were men from the USCT Regiments, and without their sacrifice, Wilmington would likely have stayed Page 26 - Carolina Arts, March 2024



Jordan Grace Owens uses paint, sewn canvas, and wooden constructions to explore a fluidity of physical form and a complexity of maternal autonomy. Allison Coleman creates dreamlike worlds with oil paint, exploring the narrative through pigment and texture. Thin washes of paint signify the deterioration of human memory and the passage of time and bold strokes explore ideas of permanence and urgency. And in Tina Marcus' work she incorporates the ordinary material of cardboard paper in her figurative sculptures to express soul-stirring narratives of ambiguity, and relationships



between resilience and vulnerability.

Jordan Grace Owens says, "My work explores a fluidity of physical form through fragmented figures and shifting, relational abstract shapes. Using multiple mediums including paint, sewn canvas, and cut wood. I'm interested in exploring design, materiality, and the intersections between two dimensional and three-dimensional planes.

"My interest in figure builds upon my decade-long career in portrait illustration. After having two children and shifting into the challenging new paradigm of artist/ young mother, I began focusing on studio work in earnest," adds Grace Owens. "I was inspired by the surreality of my own changing physical form, as well as the intensely bodily relationships between myself and my young children. In my work, undulating organic shapes suggest the unreliability of physical boundaries. Shapes press against, fold around, and intersect one another, reflecting the complexity of maternal autonomy.'

"The negative spaces created by these relationships are treated with as much importance as the shapes themselves. In further effort to explore a fluidity of form, much of my work straddles categories of two- and three-dimensions. My wooden paper dolls are primarily two-dimensional, but they are playfully inserted into a viewer's three-dimensional space, suggesting the

On the surface, love and anarchy may notions. Love is synonymous with care, compassion, and affection, while anarchy is generally accepted as an absence of authority, a state of disorder, or an ungovernable condition. These concepts, more than tangentially related, are often intertwined and even sometimes mutually dependent. Indeed, moments of disarray and frustration are intrinsic to love, while love sometimes emerges out of disorder and chaos. Drawn from the Nasher Museum's extensive historical and contemporary collections, Love & Anarchy demonstrates some of the ways in which these two concepts have inspired artists, visually and conceptually, over millennia.

Love has been a subject in art for eternity. In antiquity, Aphrodite, goddess of beauty and love, and her offspring, Eros, repeatedly appeared in painting, sculpture, and pottery. From an ancient Greek depiction of the goddess to a 12th century sculpture of the Virgin enthroned to Marc Quinn's 21st century rendering of animal carcasses in Mother and Child, Aphrodite's image resonates across eons.

Contemporary depictions of love reveal recognizable poses, gestures, or touch as in Zanele Muholi's photograph, Katlego Mashiloane and Nosipho Lavuta, Ext. 2, Lakeside, Johannesburg.

similarly personified motifs. War, for example, repeats in works ranging from a 6th century, BCE Greek amphora to Dapper Bruce's colorful recent drawings. In resistance to war, power, and oppression, depictions of a chaotic psychological or social state are suggested in Lou Stoumen's dancers at a rock concert from the late 1960s, Kambui Olujimi's decimated monument in Late Stage Love Affairs, and many other works. Some artists poignantly interweave the concepts of love and anarchy, as in Sherrill Roland's With Heart, Letter #021414, illustrating their interconnectedness and interdependence. As a result, Love & Anarchy exhibits the nuanced ways these two seemingly disparate themes intertwine over time throughout our visual culture.

potential for actual physical movement and even inviting viewers to touch and interact with them. It's important to me to imbue a sense of movement into all of my compositions, creating undercurrents of temporality

Tina Marcus says, "Paper it is ordinary, mundane and it is embedded in our lives. We package, store, transport, consume and discard it and we assume it is always accessible; until it is not. Paper is integral in my work and its messages, as it underscores how fragile life can be revealing a relationship between resilience and vulnerability; the experiences of being human."

"My work documents snapshots of defining thought-provoking moments I experience, witness, and think about. The cardboard paper material I use is something we use every day; it is unremarkable and common, and we take for granted it is always there," adds Marcus. "While common expressions describe each work, these narratives are ambiguous. Paper's perishable characteristics encourages viewers to peel away layers into each work narratives and to consider: what happens to these paper sculptures or society when subjected to adverse factors? Will these paper figures. or we, deteriorate or persevere? If subjects do not deteriorate does this indicate issues will not go away. Or could this mean people are more resilient and able to overcome obstacles and endure? Or have we become overexposed and desensitized to issues and just not care. With every nook, cranny and paper fold, my work is not to dehumanize; rather they are open vessels exposing life and experiences. Imperfections within each story reveal there is beauty within us and even within the frailties of life."

Allison Coleman's narrative paintings are a reflection on her fascination with the past and her concern for the present. Using the cheerful imagery of the 1950s and 60s she creates a sense of longing and nostalgia , while also acknowledging the darker realities that existed just beneath the surface.



Through painting, she highlights how vantage points can both quell our fears and bolster our positions. Using storytelling and pictorial devices such as scale and perspective, with a vivid color palette,

Coleman warps image and memory into an interwoven power dynamic. Her paintings teeter between comforting recollections and psychological distress, and space is given to the viewer so they may challenge their own viewpoints and lived experiences.

Interested in the enigmatic and the absurd, these paintings both confront and celebrate. Dream- like worlds and faded memories merge to become representations of the human condition. Just like in life, cherished memories and deep seated fears exist side by side. Ultimately, her work strikes a balance between the past and the present, acknowledging the challenges of the past while also celebrating the beauty and the resilience of the human spirit.

"My travels taught me that an artist must live and paint in his own environment... This development shall continue for the rest of my life, and it is the painting of my people," said Johnson in 1941. 





The eradication or management of invasive species on land, while economically and environmentally challenging, is possible. The successful management of these species underwater is nearly impossible. This exhibition addresses

on a global scale, conferring visibility to species normally unseen. Gallery A and Petti/ Peiser Galleries, Through May 4 - "Considering Carbon: Kathleen Thum". "The exhibition, Considering Carbon, consists of a series of drawings and cut-paper wall installations which explore the theme of fossil fuels, specifically oil and coal. This exhibtion commemorates the centenary of the influential Spanish sculptor Eduardo Chillida (1924–2002). Presenting a selection of sculptures and works on paper from the Bechtler Museum's permanent collection, this intimate exhibition offers a focused look at the artist's pioneering and varied practice. Renowned for his monumental sculptures, Chillida also created domestically-scaled sculptures, drawings, collages, and prints, examples of which will be on view. Together these works illustrate the great influence that Chillida's upbringing in the Basque region of Spain and his early training in architecture had on his unique artistic vision, and demonstrate his enduring exploration of space, light, form, and material. **Through Aug.**

Blurring the boundaries between art and science, American artist Alyson Shotz (born 1964) is widely acclaimed for her sculptures and installations that use synthetic materials such as glass, mirrors. plastic, and stainless steel to harness intangible forces of the natural world like gravity, space. and light. On loan from the Bank of America Collection, this single-work installation is a dazzling sculpture made of glass beads and wire that hangs from the ceiling, "Coalescence" (2006) resembles a hovering cloud, a massive spider web glistening with morning dew, or a cluster of atoms magnified to monumental scale. Using toy-like reproductions to inhabit unexpected environments allows the viewer's imagination to take hold. Visualizing a world reduced to a scale one twelfth the size of our everyday reality, where a landing on a staircase may becomes a treelined avenue or a leaf may be the same scale as a park bench. These images refer to ideas of place, belonging, refuge, escape, and fantasy. The spaces imagined through these images are reverie: Fantasies of places that never were. tinged with nostalgia and wistfulness for what never was or could be—illusions that seek to conflate reality and hope to become real or surreal. Since the inception of the project, these images have grown to include diorama elements such as classical ruins and have escaped the confines of the safe space of the "home." The more recent images are against and within nature and may be combined with famous historic views of Italy. In "Between Will and What Will Be" by James Keul, this series, which I have been developing and expanding over the past ten years, is an exploration of humankind's relationship with nature, the way in which we are prepared to deal with our environment as it relates to humancaused climate change. One piece, titled "Fish in Troubled Waters", reflects on difficulties faced by people living on islands who, while often not big contributors to the problem, are often the first to be affected by a rise in sea levels as a result of a warming planet. This was inspired in part by nine months I spent living in Western Samoa as a youth. The idea for the "Sweet Sixteen" series came to Paula Smith in 1999, my daughter had a "My Size Barbie" it was a gift from Santa in 1993. We had moved the doll up to the attic, but the whole idea was germinating in my head for years. My daughter had known that I was not a fan of Barbie dolls, the whole-body image thing, those dolls go against my grain. I am a feminist. So, she asked Santa for the doll, not me. My life and art involve around my family, so a lot of my inspiration comes from home. Anyway, back to the "My size Barbie" concept, I guess I saw it standing in the attic and thought I can make a series based on just the torso of this doll. So. I took the doll, after getting permission from my daughter, to the band saw and cut the head, arms and legs off the torso and made a mold of just the torso. **Ongoing** – At Waterworks, all exhibitions are free to see (donations gladly accepted). 



Imogen Cunningham was one of the most experimental photographers of the 20th century. In this exhibition, unusual and rare images are presented alongside iconic ones, revealing why this American artist is one of the most important pioneers of photography and demonstrating how the unseen for Cunningham was eternally as important as the familiar. Embracing the times in which she lived, Cunningham (1883–1976) created images that reflect crucial movements and developments in art and photography during her 70-year career. Her photographs, seductive and dynamic, are inspired by a multitude of genres, including portraiture, family photographs, still lifes and street photography. This exhibition consists of 60 silver gelatin prints from the Imogen Cunningham Trust. West Bedroom Gallery, Through June 30 - "Art for the American Home: Grant Wood's Lithographs". In 1934, the Regionalist artist Grant Wood made an agreement with Associated American Artists (AAA) in New York to create a series of lithographs. Wood, the creator of Reynolda's iconic 1936 painting "Spring Turning," ultimately produced 19 lithographs, about a quarter of his mature work. His consummate drafting skills made him a natural for the medium. The AAA produced the lithographs in editions of 250 and sold them for \$5 to \$10 each. The opportunity to create affordable art during the Great Depression appealed to the artist. This small exhibition will focus on Wood's narrative lithographs ("Sultry Night," "Honorary Degree." "Shrine Quartet." "The Midnight Alarm") and still lifes. Northwest Bedroom Gallery, Through Oct. 27 - "Good Impressions: Portraits Across Three Centuries from Reynolda and Wake Forest". Portraits are often taken at face value—as accurate representations of a person's appearance, sometimes removed by decades or centuries. Sometimes they capture the subject engaged in his or her occupation, whether pausing during study or painting in his or her studio. Sometimes they celebrate an auspicious occasion, such as a recent engagement or the imminent birth of a child. This exhibition features three centuries of portraits of men and women, Black and White, solitary and companionate, classic and modern. "Good Impressions" was mounted to mark the recent conservation treatment of John Singleton Copley's 1762 Portrait of "Mrs. Daniel Rogers" (Elizabeth Gorham Rogers) in the collection of Wake Forest University, and Reynolda House's recent acquisition of Kwame Brathwaite's 1973 photograph "Changing Times" Master Bedroom Gallery, Through Dec. 31 -"Still I Rise: The Black Experience at Reynolda" "Into a daybreak that's wondrously clear / I rise." 


