Located in coastal Brunswick County, NC, Sunset River Gallery caters to both area visitors and a growing local community of full-time residents seeking fine art for their



homes and businesses. Featuring works by over 100 fine regional artists including Betty Anglin Smith, Marcus McClanahan, Pat Puckett, and Richard Staat, among others, the gallery is well known in the area for its selection of oil paintings; watermedia; pastels; photography; hand-blown, stained, and fused glass; pottery and clay sculpture; turned and carved wood; unique home décor items; and artisan jewelry.



Cameron Art Museum in Wilmington, NC, Offers Exhibit Focused on American Quiltmaking


The Cameron Art Museum in Wilmington, NC, is presenting *The Work of Their Hands: American Quiltmaking*, featuring the work of over twenty textile artists, on view through Oct. 20, 2024.

The anchor work of *The Work of Their Hands: American Quiltmaking* is a tulip quilt made 170 years ago by an now unknown, enslaved woman in North Carolina. Through her masterful stitchwork and timehonored design, this unknown artist sewed a story of strength and perseverance.

UNC-Wilmington in Wilmington, NC, Offers Works by Donald Furst

The University of North Carolina at Wilmington, NC, is presenting *Fifty Years of Printmaking: Donald Furst 1974-2024*, on view in the CAB Art Gallery, through Mar. 26, 2024.

Furst, who joined the University of North Carolina Wilmington's faculty in 1985, will retire from his teaching career in May 2024.

The exhibition begins with drypoint prints from 1974 and finishes with work completed in 2024. Printmaking media include drypoint, engraving, etching,

Spinning forward from this quilt and its practice, the exhibition explores the continuing legacy of quilt-making and the evolution of textile art, starting with traditional quilts made for bed coverings to contemporary fabric artworks by artists including: Brittney Boyd Bullock, Celeste Butler, Robin Cowley, Michael Cummings, Page 24 - Carolina Arts, March 2024 Unknown Artist, Enslaved Woman (American) "Untitled", (Quilt, Tulip Design) c.1850. Cotton, Collection of Cameron Art Museum

Gee's Bend quilters, Michael James, Precious Lovell, Katie Pasquini Masopust, Carolyn Mazloomi, Mary Pal, Hattie Schmidt, Beverly Smith, The Advocacy Project, and others.

The Cameron Art Museum provides a cultural gathering place that enriches the lives of museum visitors and the community through high-quality exhibitions, lifelong learning in the arts, dynamic public programs, and stewardship and interpretation of the collection. CAM's four core values: commitment to community, to lifelong learning in the arts, to support of artists, and to collecting, preserving, documenting and interpreting a permanent collection of art. The museum has been a collecting institution since inception, with approximately *continued above on next column to the right*

linoleum cut, lithography, metal relief, mezzotint, monotype, screen printing, Solarplate intaglio, vitreography (glass plate printmaking), and woodcut.

Works from the 70s and 80s feature landscape images with implied movement into the distance, frequently with winding roads or streams. Works from the 90s and after emphasize architectural images of ladders, hallways, and doors. These interiors often present ambiguity and risk in the suggestion of directions the viewer can choose to venture into the space. The dominant technique for these works is copperplate mezzotint, a method that allows dense blacks and an unusually broad range of tones.

Many of the prints in this exhibition were previously displayed in national and international print competitions in over twenty-five nations.

Career highlights include art colony residencies as a Yaddo Fellow in 1981 and a MacDowell Fellow in 1983. The North Carolina Arts Council awarded Artist's Fellowships in 1996 and 2006 as well as

an Artist's Project Grant in 1995 to create the 10-print suite "421 Nights." The North Carolina Museum of Art invited Furst to exhibit prints in the 12-artist exhibit "Interiors" in 2000.

Furst took two visits in 2011 and 2012 to the renowned Tamarind Institute of Lithography in Albuquerque to create stone lithograph editions.

In 2021 Furst was chosen as one of 28 printmakers worldwide to exhibit in the 10th Leonardo Sciascia Estampes exhibit, which traveled to six Italian cities, ending with Milan at the Sforza Castle.

Furst lives in Wilmington, where he operates Ars Longa Press, an atelier

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
