Greenville County Museum of Art, 420 College Street, Greenville. Mar. 27 - Sept. 8 - "Horace Day in the Lowcountry." A plein air realist, Horace Day helped to extend the Charleston Renaissance into the post-World War II era by modernizing the genre, combining the punch of brilliant colors and textured brushstrokes with the same love of place expressed by Alfre Hutty, Alice Ravenel Huger Smith, Anna Heyward Taylor, and Elizabeth O'Neill Verner. His fresh interpretations of Carolina Lowcountry subjects documented vibrant city streets and their inhabitants, bucolic landscapes, rural cabins hidden beneath massive oaks, and churches still identifiable today by their distinctive architectural details. This exhibition will focus on the artist's work that was painted over four decades of traveling along the coast - from Charleston to Hilton Head Island. Through Mar. 10 - "Jasper Johns Prints: Juggling Fragments," includes more than 30 works by this American master. Through May 5 - "From Cassatt to O'Keeffe," which highlights selections from the museum's permanent collection of American Impression work by Mary Cassatt, Frank Duveneck, Gari Melchers, and Kate Freeman Clark, this exhibition invites viewers to consider the ideas and techniques that opened the door to modern visual expression as seen in works by William H. Johnson, Patrick Henry Bruce, and Georgia O'Keeffe. Through Mar. 3 - "Andrew Wyeth: Running with the Land". Regarded as one of the most important American artists of the 20th century, Andrew Wyeth (1917 0 2009) launched his career in New York City in 1937 with a sold-out exhibition of his watercolors. Ongoing - "Collection Highlights: African-American Art," features 17 works by as many artists. At the forefront of the exhibition is a realistic sculpture by John Wilson, whose monumental bronze head of Martin Luther King, Jr. captures the dignity and strength of the civil rights leader. Post-World War II non-objective painting is reflected in works by Beauford Delaney, Hale Woodruff, and Frank Wimberley. A lighter, but no less powerful, touch is embodied in a brilliant Color Field painting by Thomas Sills. The exhibition also includes evocative examples by Romare Bearden, Frederick Brown, Jacob Lawrence, Betye Saar, Merton Simpson, and Bob Thompson. Through Mar. 24 - "All in the Family (Connections)," revisits the work of

the first family of American painting, in light of several rarely exhibited examples on loan from a private collection. Ongoing - "Andrew Wyeth: Running with the Land". This stunning retrospective showcases 59 works on paper, capturing Wyeth's preference for painting intimate subjects that were tied to the homes established by his father in both Chadds Ford, Pennsylvania, and Cushing, Maine. Wyeth drew inspiration from the distinctive characteristics and denizens of these locations, revealing universal traits in his depictions of landscapes, objects, and people. Ongoing - "All in the Family (Connections)," which assembles work by three generations of Wyeths--the first family of American painting-taking advantage of several rarely exhibited loans from a private collection and complementing the exhibition "Andrew Wyeth: Running with the Land".
