Greenville Technical College in Greer, SC, is presenting the 32nd Annual Upstate High School Art Exhibit, on view at the Benson Campus Galleries, through Apr. 21, 2022. A reception and awards presentation will be held on Apr. 21, from 6-8pm. Both will take place outdoors in the newly completed Benson Campus plaza and amphitheater behind Building 301. The exhibition itself fills the galleries on the second floor of Building 301. The public is welcome.

The Department of Visual Arts at Greenville Technical College is thrilled to announce the 32nd Annual Upstate High School Art Exhibit. After a couple of quiet COVID years, the AUHSAE has roared back. 38 instructors from 20 Upstate high schools submitted a total of 143 works that represent the best of their programs. Upstate high school art students demonstrate proficiency in 13 different two- and three-dimensional categories, including traditional media such as drawing and painting but also the more specialized media of ceramics, fiber, metals, and animation.

AUHSAE is a juried exhibition. The initial jurors are the Upstate high school instructors who choose works to represent the quality and diversity of their own programs. All of their selections are on view. A professional artist with no connections to Upstate high school programs then chooses award winners from among the entries. Each AUHSAE cash award is divided between the winning student and that student's high school art program.

The 32nd AUHSAE juror was Janet Orselli, a multidisciplinary artist working in sculpture, site-specific installation, drawing and performance. She has enjoyed over fifteen solo exhibitions, including OK Harris Works of Art, New York City, Gibbes Museum of Art, Charleston, SC and 701 Center for Contemporary Art, Columbia, SC. She has been awarded a Pollack-Krasner Foundation Fellowship and three North Carolina Regional Artist Project Grants. A recipient of an MFA degree from Clemson University, Orselli lives and works in Columbus, NC.

With great care, persistence, and many trips back and forth through the galleries comparing works, Orselli singled out 30 works as award winners. She states, "As an artist and as a juror, I was greatly impressed by the quantity, quality, and variety of works in the 32nd Annual Upstate High

School Art Exhibit. The vast majority of works were well executed and thought-provoking. Most addressed concerns about the state of our world from fresh perspectives using both new and known media. The large number of self-portraits in the exhibition provided a subjective view from the inside out, seeking a connection in a chaotic external world."




