Said is a ceramic artist from the Fustat area of Cairo, Egypt, who currently lives and works in Greensboro, NC. He is inspired by the strong lines and bold shapes of ancient Egyptian works. Ibrahim holds a Diploma of Technical School, Cairo.

Watson resides in San Francisco as a visual artist, educator, and the Executive Director of the Bay Area arts non-profit, Public Glass. He received his BA in history from Centre College before pursuing his graduate degree from California College of Arts. Watson is currently faculty at the California College of the Art and is known for his artwork that addresses complex social issues.

Featured metal artist Phillip Harrison will lead the iron pour during the finale with the help of guest artists Julia and Robin Rogers, filling molds created by artists and scratch molds created by Firefest attendees. Harrison is a Chicago born metal artist

and Director and Founder of The Global Diaspora Community Sculpture Project. He attended the University of Minnesota and the University of Wisconsin for Chemistry and Material Science and Lake Forest College and L'Atellieer des Batissures Medievaux in Aix-en Provence, France for Art.

Special guest artists include delegates from Western North Carolina Sculpture Center, Julia & Robin Rogers, and Eric Serritella. Western North Carolina Sculpture Center is an organization dedicated to connecting people and enriching the community through exhibitions, and educational programming. Julia and Robin Rogers are a glassblowing couple known for their collaborative artwork that uses both traditional and unconventional glassblowing techniques. Eric Serritella is an internationally exhibiting ceramic trompe l'oeil artist specializing in hand-carved sculptures transforming clay into birch, charred and weathered logs.

Other Firefest activities include an art sale and exhibition, live music by The Radio and a sculpture bonfire. Finale events, slide shows, demonstrations, live entertainment and observing artists at work are all included in the price of admission.

Reynolda House Museum of American Art in Winston-Salem, NC, is presenting, Black Is Beautiful: The Photography of Kwame Brathwaite, is on view Mary and Charlie Babcock Wing Gallery, through May 8, 2022. The exhibition is the first major exhibition to focus on this central figure of the second Harlem Renaissance whose art popularized the "Black Is Beautiful" cultural movement that began in the 1960s in the United States. Through more than 40 iconic photographs of Black men and women with natural hair and clothes that reclaimed their African roots, Black Is Beautiful reflects how Brathwaiteinspired by the writings of famed activist and black nationalist Marcus Garveyused his art to effect social change in the late 1950s and 1960s. Reynolda House Museum of American Art in Winston-Salem, NC, Offers Two New Exhibitions

The Reynolda House Museum of American Art in Winston-Salem, NC, is presenting two new exhibits including: *Substrata*, featuring the spirit of collage in 76 years of art will be on display in the West Bedroom Gallery, through July 31, and *Louise Nevelson: Architect of Light and Shadow*, on view from Apr. 22 through Sept. 18, 2022, and is in the Northwest Bedroom Gallery.

Substrata, the spirit of collage in 76 years of art examines the influence of collage. Beginning in 1912, Pablo Picasso, Georges Braque and Juan Gris were the first art to explore collage in a self-consciously modern way, in relation to both the history of art and to the culture of their time. Their Cubist collages were a radical break with the "window on the world" depictions of Renaissance painting. But after the Cubists' defiant, "punk" attitude of those early years, they returned to painting. With select works from Reynolda's collection and several borrowed ones, substrata seeks to "peel back" some of their layers to see how collage, as an artistic approach, has formed the basis for artworks that are not collages. The exhibition includes work by Robert Motherwell, Romare Bearden, Robert Rauschenberg, Stuart Davis and Jasper Johns among others. Substrata has been curated by Paul Bright, Director of Art Galleries and Programming at Wake Forest University Art Galleries and Collections.

The *Louise Nevelson* exhibition was curated by Dr. Jennifer Finkel, the Acquavella Curator of Collections at Wake Forest University. In addition to works from Reynolda's collection, the exhibition will include artworks from Wake Forest University's art collection, the Weatherspoon Art Museum and two private collections.

Sculptor Louise Nevelson (1899–1988) described her artistic goals in this way: "My total conscious search in life has been for a new seeing, a new image, a new insight. This search not only includes the object, but the in-between places, the dawns and dusks, the objective world, the heavenly spheres, the places between the land and the sea." This statement captures Nevelson's strikingly personal iconography-often centered around celestial or earthly bodies or phenomena such as moons, night, dusk, dawn, tides, skies, rain, light, wind, shadows, and stars-as well as her interest in structure, exploring, in her large-scale wooden assemblage pieces, the "in-between places." Louise Nevelson: Architect of Light and Shadow is made possible in part by The Robert and Constance Emken Fund of the Winston-Salem Foundation and Richard D.
