Main Gallery, Through Apr. 24 - "Jean-Marie Mauclet and Gwylene Gallimard: DISPLACEMENT, MEMORY, ERASURE - Collaborative Challenges in Three Parts". A closing reception will be held on Apr. 24, from 3-5pm. The artist-activist duo Gwylene Gallimard & Jean-Marie Mauclet are back. A dozen years after their memorable, gallery-wide Olympia installation at 701 CCA, the French couple and Charleston, SC, residents present a three-part project. Gallimard's massive canvases with drawings, collage and artifacts relay decades of the duo's unique art-and-activism collaborations with artists and non-artists alike. Mauclet's 3-D works are an installation-in-the-making, critiquing issues of wealth, class, culture and race in Charleston. SC State Museum, 301 Gervais St., Columbia. Through July 24 - "Face to Face: Portraits from the South Carolina State Museum Collection," an art exhibition which features works never before displayed. This new display explores the visual expressions of human connections featured in works from the museum's collection. "The themes presented in Face to Face speak specifically to our current culture of isolation, mask-wearing and social distancing," says State Museum Curator of Art Amy Chalmers. "This past year has taught us all the value of facial expressions, physical closeness and contact with the people in our lives. So much of our sense of shared humanity resides in what we see when we look at one another, and in our in-person interactions." **Ongoing -** "Bindings and Betweens: South Carolina Quilts". This new display traces the history and art of South Carolina made quilts. Featuring pieces from the museum's collection, the exhibition highlights both the objects and their makers for an in-depth look at the quilt making process and how it relates to cultural traditions throughout South Carolina history to the modern day. Dating from the early 19th century to the modern day, Bindings and Betweens will feature 43 quilts with a wide variety of styles and designs on display, highlighting traditions that were brought across oceans and passed down through generations. Through exploring these pieces, the exhibition aims to reveal the things that bind us together and the spaces and connections between us. Ongoing - "Early American Face Vessels from the George H. Meyer Collection". This new exhibit features collection of more than 100 early American face vessels, this exhibition offers a rare opportunity to trace the development of this tradition as it unfolded in regions east of the Mississippi River and Texas, from the 1820s to circa 1945, including around 20 early face vessels from South Carolina. Ongoing - "A Voice of Her Own: South Carolina Women in Politics This exhibit celebrates the 100th Anniversary of the 19th Amendment, which guaranteed women the right to vote. This exhibit features objects, images and stories showing the ways South Carolina women engaged with the political history of our state. From tribal women leaders, to the first female Governor of the state, this exhibit shows how women worked to gain a voice of their own. The exhibit is free with museum general admission. Florence County Museum, 111 West Cheves Street, across the street from the Francis Marion University Performing Arts Center, Florence. Ongoing - "Kindred Spirit: The Personal Worlds of William H. Johnson". William H. Johnson (1901 - 1970) was a man between worlds: raised in the rural South, but educated in New York; black, but his unknown father was white; American-born, but lived much of his adult life in Europe. This diverse heritage gave Johnson a unique perspective and insight, but at times it was also a difficult shadow which followed him as he traveled the world in search of his true artistic voice. Eventually, after many years away from his hometown of Florence, SC, Johnson returned to the United States. Although living in New York, his art began to focus almost entirely on the lives and experiences of African Americans in the rural South. "My travels taught me that an artist must live and paint in his own environment... This development shall continue for the rest of my life, and it is the painting of my people," said Johnson in 1941. Special Exhibits Gallery, Through July 3 - "[Non]Fiction: Margaret Curtis". Curtis is a contemporary painter living in Tryon, NC. Reviews and features of Curtis' work have appeared in Art Forum, The New York Times, Art in America, Art News, and Modern Painters. Her work is in permanent collections throughout the United States. She taught painting at The School of Visual Arts in New York for several years, and has been on the boards of both The Flood Gallery in Asheville, NC and The Upstairs Gallery in Tryon, NC. Community Gallery, Ongoing - This exhibit introduces visitors to the history of the museum and its formative collections. This gallery also exhibits the histories and diversity of the City of Florence, and the incorporated municipalities of Florence County. Additionally, the Community Gallery communicates the lives, stories and accomplishments of significant past and present citizens of Florence County and members of it's communities. This gallery is one of two permanent exhibit spaces designed by award winning exhibit design firm, HaleySharpe Design. Pee Dee History Gallery, Ongoing - This is the largest gallery space in the facility, comprising 3,300 sq. ft. of exhibit space. This permanent collections gallery occupies the entire second floor, east wing of the building. Artifacts are supported by historical images and narrative interpretation, giving a comprehensive introduction to the Pee Dee region from prehistory to the present.
