College of Charleston, SC, Offers Annual **Student Competition and Exhibitions**

The College of Charleston in Charleston, SC, is presenting the Young Contemporaries 2022, the 37th annual juried student exhibition and the Salon des Refusés, on view in the Halsey Institute of Contemporary Art and in the exhibition space of the Cato Center for the Arts, through Apr. 23, 2022.

Now in its 37th year, the Halsey Institute and the College of Charleston Studio Art Department are proud to present Young Contemporaries 2022, the 37th annual juried student exhibition. The annual exhibition is a celebration of talented artists at the College of Charleston. With works selected by a nationally renowned juror, the exhibition reflects the strength and diversity of practice in the School of the Arts' rigorous programs. Featuring a wide range of media, including paintings, sculpture, photography, and prints, the exhibition showcases the efforts of the student body at the College.

Artist Ron Bechet served as the juror and awards judge for Young Contemporaries 2022. Bechet was born in New Orleans and lives in the Gentilly neighborhood. He began his college career with an athletic scholarship at Mississippi State University but returned to study art at the University of New Orleans where he earned a BA degree. He went on to earn an MFA degree in Painting from Yale University School of Art. He is known for intimate large-scale drawings and paintings. This work is inspired by his experiences and observations of the consequences of forces of nature and time, on place and the human experience.

For Bechet, his improvisational mark

making is grounded on those experiences and in the cultural practices of the African diaspora and New Orleans African-American culture and ritual. In the work, the revelation of the effects of terrain, light, and water symbolize human contention and harmony, and ultimately the hope of reconciliation and spiritual transformation. In addition to his studio practice, he has worked on several community-based projects using the arts in collaboration with other artists and community members. He is also the Victor H. Labat Professor of Art at Xavier University of Louisiana where he has been teaching for more than twenty years. Believing in reciprocity and giving, he is an active community member currently serving as Chair of the Joan Mitchell Foundation Board of Directors and as a member of the board of Trustees at the Ogden Museum of Art as well as Antenna Works in New Orleans.

Concurrent with Young Contemporaries is the Salon des Refusés, showing in the exhibition space of the Cato Center for the Arts. The works in the Salon are chosen by Studio Art faculty. The origin of the Salon des Refusés dates to Paris in 1863, when artists who had been rejected from the official Salon caused such a protest that Emperor Napoleon III ordered another exhibition held for them. Among the painters in the original Salon des Refusés were Camille Pissaro, Henri Fantin-Latour, James M. Whistler, and Edouard Manet.

Redux Contemporary Art Center in Charleston, SC, will present two new exhibitions including: Junk Food, featuring works by Taylor Lee Nicholson, on view in the Center's Main Gallery, from Apr. 1 through May 21, 2022, and Even further beyond thought- is the sky I watched as a child. With Love, from Earth, featuring works by Shelby Corso, on view in the Center's Gallery 1056, from Apr. 8 through May 21, 2022. A reception will be held on Apr. 1, from 5-8pm.

Redux's solo exhibitions showcase the practice of a single artist, emphasizing the unique mixture of media that can compose a retrospective exhibition.

Junk Food is a kitschy, irreverent, and at times unnerving exhibition that brings attention to our participation in consumer culture. Whether we're inhaling content from the internet or shopping on Amazon, consumerism depends on "junk food" something we consume to satisfy a craving, but is ultimately temporary. Our addiction to consuming indicates a deep and significant void inside, a hunger that junk food cannot really satisfy.

Taylor Lee Nicholson (b. 1990, they/ them) is a new media and conceptual artist who loves to mix kitsch and creepiness for comically grotesque results. As an absurdist and a surrealist, Nicholson has been told that they are like a depressed Pee Wee Herman. She transforms lowbrow, banal materials such as junk mail and tabloids into art to dissect themes of hyperreality, consumerism, and death. Nicholson is a studio

artist at the McColl Center, and their work has been shown in numerous galleries and art spaces around the United States including Goodyear Arts, Charlotte; Artspace, Raleigh; and House of Venus, Boston. Nicholson has collaborated with brands like Vans, Microsoft Surface, Bojangles, and Almond Breeze, and their works have appeared in Vogue and Oprah Daily among

Redux Contemporary Art Center is pleased to announce a debut solo exhibition of work from Shelby Corso. The exhibition, Even further beyond thought- is the sky I watched as a child. With Love, from Earth, will be opening Apr. 8, 2022, from 5-8pm, and will run until May 21, 2022.

In her paintings, drawings, and sculptures, Corso explores her relationship to symbolism, ritual, and mythmaking. Her work renders bright images of flowers, bodies, windswept, dreamy fields and brightly colored atmospheres. She often sources imagery from nature, stories, found objects, dreams, and imagination, working somewhere between abstract and representational. Corso works to synthesize visual and emotional information to describe the phenomenon of being on earth. She

Torres Weiner's work celebrates the rich history and changing demographics of the South. She uses her art to document social conditions and raise awareness about issues affecting immigrant communities like family separation, racism, and moving beyond common stereotypes.

The gallery will occupy the first floor (yes, bigger) of the building which has a garden and driveway/patio. The second floor will be a living space for someone lucky. We asked Erickson in what ways do you relate to your art? "It is my life. It is never simply a career. Being a creative person is following a passion that fills your days and nights. I dream of painting. Every day I don't get to paint is a day I can never get back."

"The artist's life, to me, is a way of life, a lifestyle which includes a spiritual journey. I feel closest to God when I am out on location painting, so much so that I have been moved to tears by the splendor of my surroundings. To be able to share that beauty through my art is why I am here, and I am

and landscapes, which are characterized by detailed brushstrokes and vivid colors. Intrigued by the way the eye relates to the vibrancy that exists in the color spectrum, Regina has a tendency to use the full color spectrum in her paintings so the viewer's eyes can playfully enjoy bouncing from one color to the next. The variation in numerous brushstrokes gives her work a unique texture and pattern.

"In the process of painting, I find myself drawn to the relationship of colors, textures, patterns, and transitions," Lee explains. "My goal is for the viewer to become more attentive to the natural beauty around them and to notice the details of what the eye can see. Beauty is everywhere if we take time to observe the wonders of life."

Regina Lee was born in Fairbanks, AK. She and her family traveled often and though she relocated several times as a child, art was something constant in her life. She realized early-on that she loved art and took advantage of many opportunities to develop her talent.

Lee completed her Associates Degree in Fine Arts at Coastal Carolina Community College in Jacksonville, NC, in 2004. In 2007 she earned a bachelor's degree with distinction in art and emphasis in painting from the University of North Carolina in Asheville. Her work has been displayed in several solo and group exhibitions locally, as well as in Maryland and North Carolina. Lee is a member of the Charleston Artist Guild and creates out of her home studio in Charleston, SC.

Brenda Gilliam's acrylic paintings capture simple moments in life - a subtle expression on someone's face, something noticed while on a walk, a memory. Her work utilizes layers of color, texture, pattern, composition, and line, and stylistically reflects her background in graphic design and illustration.

In her exhibit, *Here and There*, Gilliam presents paintings that reflect the influence and inspiration drawn from the environ-

ments in St. Louis, MO, and Charleston, SC, both places the artist considers home. The darker, earthy colors with gray light in the Midwest contrast with the lighter sun colors that grace the Lowcountry. "In this exploration, I am discovering so many similarities in these two markedly different places," Gilliam explains. "It helps explain why I feel so grounded, here and there."

Brenda Gilliam has an extensive background in graphic design and illustration, with an appreciation for the aesthetics of mid-century to 70's. Never formally trained in art, she learns by doing and has been working as an artist since 1983. Her paintings have been displayed and won awards in a number of solo and group exhibitions throughout the Lowcountry, as well as in St. Louis, MO. Gilliam has also illustrated a number of children's books.

Brown, a Hilton Head native and Gullah descendant, continues a family tradition and celebrates her heritage through making dolls. One doll sports a COVID mask, others wear military camouflage. Two have mermaid tails and button eyes.

"These dolls are an expression of Gullah culture that everyone can relate to," says Amy Wehrman, Art League Academy manager. "They are at once familiar and approachable - a wonderful use of fiber arts to evoke a time and place not easily understood by everyone."

Brown can trace her roots on Hilton Head Island since before the Civil War. For generations, the tradition of sewing has passed down through her family; she herself was taught the art of hand sewing by her great-grandaunt, and the use of a

sewing machine by her mother when she was 12. "I always think about that time when I am making the dolls." Brown continues the tradition by hand making dolls in the Gullah style - dyed muslin, patterned cotton, yarn and thread.



"Your work came to mind as an interesting counterpoint to mine as far as material, but with some strong process oriented connections. At first glance, there is our mutual use of organic geometry. Even more than that, I think our process is quite similar... we layer, erode, dig, and excavate repeatedly to get to our final images," said Browning.

"Part of it, for me, is this back and forth with the surface and the texture of trial and error. I work in a circular way, painting across multiple supports simultaneously, taking from one adding to another," said Mixon. "I've tried to create a structure that will support this process while also paying attention to the by-products of this approach like the paint-stained rags from which I construct the quilts. I see this in your work, too - the way certain forms repeat so that each painting is a kind of stage on which various relationships play out. I'm interested to hear how you think about these interactions. Do you plan them out? Or, do you find them in the process of making and unmaking?", added Mixon.

The South Arts State Fellows project, it seems, meets a critical moment in which calls for more equality, equity, and social justice are loud. The earth burns and floods all at once, while science deniers deny and monied interests whistle to the tune of après moi, le déluge. Citizens of color are killed by police and others, but now in plain, recorded view. Alternative facts, internalized fiction and doublespeak beat Orwell at his game. Some pandemic politics present protective masks as shackles of totalitarian rule. If it seems that humanity is quickly becoming irredeemable or its demise, irreversible, the South Arts artists didn't get the memo or haven't resigned themselves to such a fate.

This doesn't mean these artists are naïve or wide-eyed optimists; it's the very recognition of issues and problems that is the impetus for their work. And they push back, providing hope that improvement and reversal remain possible. Such engagement is no surprise; most of the artists have first-hand experience with issues surrounding race, ethnicity, identity, belonging, colonialism and gender – and typically not as members of dominant grouns.



fellowship recipients of the South Arts Southern Prize & State Fellows project, which launched in 2017. The artists and State Fellows hail from the South Arts region – Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina, and Tennessee.

The artistry on display is a testament to the strength of art in the south, presenting diverse themes, visions, and styles. The 2021 Southern Prize winner, Marielle Plaisir, creates lavish, grand, elaborate artworks in a wide range of media populated with contemporary, colonial, and other historical figures against lush, Caribbeaninspired backdrops.

Southern Prize Finalist, Fletcher Williams III, addresses Southern history and culture using found and natural materials, focusing on "our desire to establish a home and self" within the South. As a

group, the 2021 South Arts Fellows bring multiple identities to the table, individually and combined. This cohort demonstrates not only the aestheticism of art, but the power of creativity to provide hope and perspective.

In addition to Plaisir and Williams, the artists in the current exhibition are Tameca Cole of Alabama, Raheleh Filsoofi of Tennessee, Joyce Garner of Kentucky, Myra Greene of Georgia, Jewel Ham of North Carolina, Ming Ying Hong of Mississippi and artists duo Keith Calhoun and Chandra McCormick of Louisiana. The 2021 cohort of South Arts fellows is the most diverse group to date. Of the six American-born artists, all but Garner are African American. Filsoofi is from Iran, Plaisir was born in France but has roots in Guadeloupe and Hong was born in China but raised in Los Angeles.

South Arts is a nonprofit regional arts organization empowering artists, organizations, and communities, and increasing access to arts and culture.

Wim Roefs is an independent curator, author, art consultant, exhibition designer, and the owner of if ART Gallery in Columbia, SC. He is the former chair and a co-founder of Columbia's 701 Center for Contemporary Art (CCA) and was the organization's founding volunteer Executive Director from 2008 until February 2013. He organized and curated numerous exhibitions for 701 CCA and edited a dozen catalogues and other publications for the non-profit. Roefs is the organizer, curator and catalogue editor for South Arts' annual Southern Prize & State Fellows exhibition. He has curated over 100 exhibitions for his own gallery and other art institutions. Through his gallery, Roefs has published more than two dozen exhibition catalogues and written a number

of essays about artists and their work. Roefs, a native of The Netherlands, was a member of the Art in Transit Advisory Committee (ATAC) of the Charlotte Area Transit System (CATS), supervising the implementation of the light rail system's public art component. He has taught courses in contemporary art and African-

American art at the University of South Carolina Art Department and Honors College.

The Bechtler Museum of Modern Art in Charlotte, NC, Features Works by Annemarie Schwarzenbach

The Bechtler Museum of Modern Art in Charlotte, NC, will present *Annemarie Schwarzenbach: Departure Without Destination*, on view in the Fourth-Floor Gallery, from Apr. 2, through June 19, 2022.

The exhibition presented in collaboration with Zentrum Paul Klee in Bern, Switzerland, is the first major retrospective dedicated to the photography of this Swiss writer, photographer, and journalist Annemarie Schwarzenbach (1908–1942).

Despite her early death, she left behind an impressive body of work that is of great emotional intensity and political relevance. Consumed by wanderlust, a desire for social progress, and a sense of adventure, between 1933 and her death in 1942, she travelled extensively through Europe, Asia, Africa, and the United States, documenting in both text and image, the social and political struggles, tensions, and conflicts of the period leading up to World War II.

Schwarzenbach's photographs also convey personal themes, such as life in exile, the search for identity, homosexuality, or the desire to transgress conventional gender roles. Above all, though, they express Schwarzenbach's unbridled passion for travel - and her search for encounters with the unknown, the "departure without destination" as an existential experience.

When her literary work was rediscovered in the 1980s, she became celebrated as a writer, female pioneer, and gay icon. It was not until recently, however, that her contributions in photography have been recognized. The focal point of this exhibition is Schwarzenbach's estate of approximately 4,000 photographs, preserved within the Swiss Literary Archives (Schweizerisches Literaturarchiv), located

in Bern. Relatively unknown to date and rarely exhibited, these photographs have recently been digitized by the Swiss Literary Archives and made available for research, exhibition, and publication. Here, for the first time, the parallels between both of her practices, as a writer and as a photographer, are presented in a compelling exhibition accompanied by archival materials and film.

Annemarie Schwarzenbach: Departure Without Destination is an exhibition produced by the Zentrum Paul Klee, Bern, Switzerland. The presentation at the Bechtler Museum of Modern Art will be adapted from the exhibition's first iteration to include English translations, regionally specific photographs, and a series of programs specifically designed for Bechtler audiences.

The Bechtler Museum of Modern Art is named after the family of Andreas Bechtler, a Charlotte resident and native of Switzerland who assembled and inherited a collection of more than 1,400 artworks created by major figures of 20th-century modernism and donated it to the public trust. The Bechtler collection comprises artworks by seminal figures such as Alberto Giacometti, Joan Miro, Jean Tinguely, Max Ernst, Andy Warhol, Alexander Calder, Le Corbusier, Sol LeWitt, Edgar Degas, Nicolas de Stael, Barbara Hepworth and Picasso. Only a handful of the artworks in the Bechtler collection have been on public view in the United States.

Zoe Dohrmann is a printmaker from the DC area. She has experience working professionally as a screen printer, graphic designer, and embroiderer. She incorporates this experience into her work. Jo Proctor is from Spartanburg, SC. He is interested in furthering his knowledge of multi-process prints and currently is experimenting with life-size images. Zach Holtzclaw is from the Simpsonville area. His work includes photographic and drawn techniques from the lithographic, silkscreen and intaglio processes. Nancy Sexton is from Columbia. She found her love of printmaking late in life and continues to find delight in exploring the many facets of the craft.

Also on view from Apr. 25 - 29, 2022, will be *Withered Vim*, featuring works by Baylee McCourt.

"The intention for this collection of work is to delve into the deeper parts of myself, encouraging an intimate connection between the viewer and their own inner voices," says McCourt. "The human experience is one that cannot be defined by a singular body, as our mortality is omnipresent. My purpose as an artist is to ignite a discussion that encompasses both lightness and darkness, through the comparison between life and death."

"Throughout my work, I implement a saturated color palette curated with fluorescent and vibrant colors, juxtaposed with muted and dull colors to create hypnotic scenes that appear both euphoric and unnerving. The use of symbols in my artwork allude to decay and death, along with energetic vitality."

"The deconstruction of life that appears in my work is in reference to the lack of control I feel in my own life. Feelings of insecurity, anxiety, and loneliness contribute to the process of creating gruesome, yet compelling and alluring pieces," adds McCourt.

"My intention is to communicate the

correlation between life and death and how it is associated with the overwhelming insecurities and doubts that tangle around my mind."

Born and raised in Chapin, SC, McCourt has been captivated with creative expression since she was a toddler. Coming from a family of artists, She was encouraged to decorate nearly every blank surface she could find growing up. Today, McCourt is a 22-year-old senior in her last semester earning a Bachelor of Fine Arts at the University of South Carolina. She finds interest in a variety of mediums including acrylic paint, charcoal, collage, and photo manipulation. McCourt's intentions are to continue creating themed artworks, and she is eager to share her creations with the world.

701 Center for Contemporary Art in Columbia, SC, Offers Works by Jean-Marie Mauclet & Gwylene Gallimard

701 Center for Contemporary Art in Columbia, SC, is presenting *Displacement, Memory, Erasure: Collaborative Challenges in Three Parts*, featuring works by Jean-Marie Mauclet & Gwylene Gallimard, on view in the Center's Main Gallery, through Apr. 24, 2022. A closing reception will be held on Apr. 24, from 3-5pm.

The artist-activist duo Gwylene Gallimard & Jean-Marie Mauclet are back. A dozen years after their memorable, gallerywide Olympia installation at 701 CCA, the French couple and Charleston, SC, residents present a three-part project.

Gallimard's massive canvases with drawings, collage and artifacts relay decades of the duo's unique art-and-activism collaborations with artists and non-artists alike. Mauclet's 3-D works are an installation-in-the-making, critiquing issues of wealth, class, culture and race in Charleston.

An Apr. 9 workshop of the Charleston collective TINYisPOWERFUL, of which artists are members, explores art tools and other techniques for social engagement. The event, Tiny is Powerful: A Day of Communicating & Learning Together, will take place from 9:30am-5pm.

Gallimard (b. 1948, Paris, France) and Mauclet (b. 1942, Meru, France), Charleston residents since 1984, have worked independently and collaboratively for some four decades. Their collaborative works include Charleston's popular community-oriented French café Fast & French, which they owned for decades, and which was conceived to offer "all the features of an art, social justice and economic sustainability project." The duo has created installations and exhibitions tackling the health insur-

A 2006–08 collaboration, You Comin, brought eight artists and educators to the World Social Forum in Nairobi, Kenya. Their long-running project The Future Is On The Table between 2001 and 2013 was at South Carolina State University in Orangeburg and in Lexington, KY, Charleston, SC, and Jackson, MS. The project led Gallimard and Mauclet to residencies in India and France and an experimental conference on the Trans-Siberian train. Why do they want to be rich without us? in 2007 was part of the project The Changing Face of Charleston. Gallimard & Mauclet 2009 residency and 2010 exhibition Olympia at 701 CCA explored the history and culture of the historic mill district in Columbia where the center is located. Conversations With Time was a 2011 intergenerational art project in West Baltimore, MD.

Gallimard & Mauclet's work has received support from France's Ministère de la Culture; the South Carolina Arts Commission; Charleston's Spoleto Festival; Alternate ROOTS; Alternate Visions; the Humanities Foundations; and the National

"When I look back at my arrival to the US nearly four years ago, I remember feeling a sense of displacement because immigration to a new country seemed like entering an unknown world. I became pretty much disconnected from my family, which was the most challenging part for me. My new feelings of isolation and displacement were even more accentuated by my lack of ability to relate to the American culture and language," said Abdollahbeigi.

loves using pictures to communicate with her audience. My stories use pictures based on a combination of artworks that even though, on the surface, seem to be showing ordinary people in their daily life, reflect on deep feelings that an immigrant develops because of living far away from her homeland. Each image will describe the emotions, intentions, and motivations that I have personally experienced during the process of immigration."

"I will discuss distinct qualities through symbolic visual language to demonstrate how the theme of our dreams, needs, and senses like homesickness, isolation, and missing our loved ones are universal. These interactions and elements are all motivated by my personal experiences, emotions that have developed after immigrations, and my exposure to a new culture and environment. These emotions constitute the central theme in my artworks, primarily derived from my personal feelings associated with a sense of displacement, being an outsider, and living in isolation. My work is a constant attempt to inspire people to learn how to relate to feelings that immigrants experience and to gain a deeper understanding of what these people lose and gain through this change in their lives. Breaking down walls and building bridges between the immigrants and the native residents is the main goal that I hope to address in this project," adds Abdollahbeigi.

Nakisa Abdollahbeigi is an Iranian-born visual artist. Her work is deeply connected with her own personal and cultural experiences in her homeland country, Iran. Her work aims to probe these experiences by integrating historical motifs with imagery taken from popular culture and contemporary media. She uses elements of the relationship between individual stories and collective memory. In her practice, Abdollahbeigi explores the possibilities of representing Iranian art and culture using inspirations from her personal background.

On view from Apr. 11 - 15, 2022 - Lauren Kennedy: Consequences of Our Actions: Fragility of the Body.

"I have loved and been fascinated by the human body my entire life. In the end, however, it has betrayed me time and time again. I watched my mother go through cancer and her body fail her. I feel my own body fail because of previous injuries or conditions that I have. I struggle with the idea of the fact that our bodies that are meant to sustain and protect us inevitably fail us, and that failure is painful. Pain and entropy are part

of the human experience, but why? That is what I explore using plaster, once used to heal bones, and making books. I demonstrate my frustration and questioning of the human experience through performance and tearing these books apart, hoping that I will come to terms with the ideas of pain and entropy," says Kennedy.

Lauren Kennedy works and resides in Columbia, SC. She creates sculptural work using folded paper books and coats them in plaster before utilizing performance art to crush them and tear them apart, unveiling words underneath that are her own personal ramblings about the struggles of pain and entropy.

On view from Apr. 18 - 22 - Nick Brutto: Us. This body of work examines topics in relation to three shared attributes of human nature: the mind, body, and soul. The experiences accumulated throughout life create an individual whose mind, body, and soul are unique. Careful examination of my own perspective allows me to address these ever-changing attributes in relation to concepts of connectivity, collaboration, and identity. Through the incorporation of collaborative pieces, this body of work also offers the viewer the opportunity to examine their own perspective and display it through participation. Encouraging the viewer to examine their own perspective as well as my own turns the conversation away from you and I towards *Us*, said Brutto.

Nick Brutto is an MFA candidate in Studio Art specializing in Ceramics and

Printmaking. Prior to being admitted into this program, he received his BA in History and MAT in Art Education from the University of South Carolina. During college, he has worked and volunteered with a large number of programs in Columbia including 701 Center for Contemporary Art, ARC of Columbia, and Palmetto Center for the Arts. His work has been shown in galleries throughout the state in both juried and invitational exhibitions. As a graduate student, Brutto has won awards for both Distinguished Service and Juried Student Exhibitions.

In the spring of 2013, Gardner and her public art class worked with the Center's

Archaeologist Chris Judge to create the spear point installation located behind the reception desk in the Center. Judge identified the various arrowheads, spear points, and pottery sherds by date, while Gardner and her class created a curtain-like timeline installation of the artifacts.

"There likely would be no Native American Studies Center if it weren't for Fran Gardner," said Director of Native American Studies Dr. Stephen Criswell. "She was instrumental in getting this project off the ground and has been a longtime supporter of and contributor to our work. It is fitting her work be featured in the Center. Not to mention, she makes incredible art!".

The Center is a 15,000 square foot facility in historic downtown Lancaster. Guests will have the opportunity to tour the NAS Center's gallery spaces, archives, classrooms, and archaeology, language, and audio-visual labs. Home to the world's largest collection of Catawba Indian pottery, the NAS Center will offer exhibits of regional Native American Art, classes and programs focused on Native American history, culture, archaeology, folklore, and language.



Asheville Art Museum in Asheville, NC, Offers Photography Exhibition

Asheville Art Museum in Asheville, NC, will present *Gillian Laub's Southern Rites*, organized by the International Center of Photography, on view in the Museum's Appleby Foundation Exhibition Hall, from Apr. 1 through July 4, 2022.

American photographer Gillian Laub (born New York, 1975) has spent the last two decades investigating political conflicts, exploring family relationships, and challenging assumptions about cultural identity. In *Southern Rites*, Laub engages her skills as a photographer, filmmaker, and visual activist to examine the realities of racism and raise questions that are simultaneously painful and essential to understanding the American consciousness.

In 2002, Laub was sent on a magazine assignment to Mount Vernon, GA, to document the lives of teenagers in the American South. The town, nestled among fields of Vidalia onions, symbolized the archetype of pastoral, small town American life. The Montgomery County residents Laub encountered were warm, polite, protective of their neighbors, and proud of their history. Yet Laub learned that the joyful adolescent rites of passage celebrated in this rural countryside—high school homecomings and proms—were still racially segregated.

Laub continued to photograph Montgomery County over the following decade, returning even in the face of growing—and eventually violent resistance from community members and local law enforcement. She documented a town held hostage by the racial tensions and inequities that scar much of the nation's history. In 2009, a few months after Barack Obama's first inauguration, Laub's photographs of segregated proms were published in the New York Times Magazine. The story brought national attention to the town and the following year the proms were finally integrated. The power of her photographic images served as the catalyst and, for a moment, progress seemed inevitable.

Then, in early 2011, tragedy struck the town. Justin Patterson, a twenty-two-year-old unarmed African American man—whose segregated high school homecoming Laub had photographed—was shot and killed by a sixty-two-year-old white man. Laub's project, which began as an

exploration of segregated high school rituals, evolved into an urgent mandate to confront the painful realities of discrimination and structural racism. Laub continued to document the town over the following decade, during which the country re-elected its first African American president and the ubiquity of camera phones gave rise to citizen journalism exposing racially motivated violence. As the Black Lives Matter movement and national protests proliferated, Laub uncovered a complex story about adolescence, race, the legacy of slavery, and the deeply rooted practice of segregation in the American South.

Southern Rites is a specific story about 21st century young people in the American South, yet it poses a universal question about human experience: can a new generation liberate itself from a harrowing and traumatic past to create a different future?

Southern Rites was curated by Maya Benton and organized by the International Center of Photography.

Established by artists and incorporated in 1948, the Asheville Art Museum is committed to being a vital force in community and individual development and to providing lifelong opportunities for education and enrichment through the visual arts. The Museum's mission is to engage, enlighten, and inspire individuals and enrich community through dynamic experiences in American art of the 20th and 21st centuries. 

"The colors of paint that I choose are warm and bright, echoing the Spring colors that are emerging in nature. In creating this body of work, I focused on birds and the amazing skies of Spring," says Coleman.

Coleman can't remember a time when she wasn't an artist. "I believe that all children are artists, and I never grew out of it." After she received her degree in Fine Art, she went on to design and create a studio pottery line with her husband. Upon discovery that she and her daughter share a passion for painting, Coleman began her newest creative journey. She began on this path of mixed-media due to her passion for nature and her love of painting, and through this journey, she has found herself immersed in painting her unique portraits of birds and nature.

Defining them by more than simple appearance, Coleman goes further by layering information, sourced by vintage books and maps, onto each specific piece. She searches used bookstores to find vintage books on birds and nature, and using the pages to apply visual texture to her paints, she applies more information specifically to each piece. The result is a very unique combination of visual texture and defining text, which presents a unique work. Her painted portraits of birds and nature are completed in acrylic paint on wood

panels, and she often creates frames that further identify and explain each piece. Giving a warmth and light to each piece she creates, she attempts to reveal the true character of each distinctive image.

Coleman's painting of *The Peacock* is mixed media, acrylic, feathers, and book pages on wood. "I love the dramatic opening of the peacock's feathers. This unique bird brings beauty to the world."

The Tanagers is a 24" x 52" piece in mixed media, acrylic, book pages and wood. "The male and female Scarlet Tanagers' differences in color intrigues me. I truly enjoy spotting this beautiful bird from time to time," said Coleman.

On Sunset in the Blue Ridge Mountains, a work in acrylic, "This is a common scene from my home – the Red-Tailed Hawk with mobbing crows. Sunsets here are striking and each one is unique."



American Folk Art in Asheville, NC, Offers Annual Face Jug Show

American Folk Art in Asheville, NC, will present the *10th Annual Face Jug Show*, on view from Apr. 5 - 21, 2022.

This year marks the 10th consecutive April that American Folk Art has dedicated to the storied regional tradition of Face Jugs. These jugs began to appear in these parts in the very early 1800s. Grimacing faces, snakes, and other examples of foreboding iconography were added to the jugs used to store moonshine as a clever way to frighten children away from the liquor. In those days, self-sufficiency ruled, and thus handmade, locally-crafted clayware was common. Our regional soils contain all the elements needed to make hardy clay, and our forests plenty of wood for the fueling of kilns.

Many of the potters represented in the Face Jug Show are still digging and creating their own clays and firing in wood-fired kilns. While these techniques are labor-intensive, the passionate pursuit by these skilled craftspeople is evident in the pottery they create. The Face Jug has become an eagerly sought after & widely collected part of our mountain heritage. American Folk Art curates a wide selection of these jugs, made by select potters who use their own knowledge & creativity to explore and expand upon the beloved & creative Face Jug concept.



Margaret Curtis renders her anxiety during one of the world's most challenging times, in her obsessive painting, Portrait of My Anxiety (Wallpaper).

As we continue to navigate this devastating pandemic, we have all been altered in both small and large ways. We were forced to stay at home, if possible, and learned to work from home, go to school from home and "see" our friends and family from a computer screen while remaining at home. This forced pause in our normal lives caused a great deal of self-searching among many of us. We have reevaluated ourselves, reestablished our priorities and realigned our goals. In short, we have done a lot of personal reflecting and inward gazing. What do we truly want from my life? With this new self-seeking, what can we learn from how artists have portrayed themselves and is there relevance to be found in their selfseeking for our own?

Mirror Mirror follows the successful High Anxiety, an exhibition at 22 London in 2020 which examined our unstable times through a multiplicity of artistic positions and voices. High Anxiety brought new perspectives to bear on themes such as identity, forced migration, politics, technology, pandemics and corporate culture. 2018's exhibition SAY IT LOUD illustrated the struggles and achievements of African Americans and challenged dominant historical perspectives with powerful work that is visceral

Self-portraits have been made since we first glimpsed our reflections in water, but it was not until the mid-fifteenth century when the mirror was made from more reflective silvered glass, that artists can be frequently identified depicting themselves as either the primary subject or as an important character in their painting. They were the one model always readily available.

The twenty-four artists in Mirror Mirror assert themselves into their work in a variety of ways. Abraham Cruzvilleges, in *Blind* self-portrait listening to the Beetles while scratching a notched stick so to invoke the universal magic of the power of destruction, presents himself in the accumulated detritus from his daily life, turned into a massive painting that, each time it is installed, takes on the space in a new way.

Trenton Doyle Hancock's *Torpedo Boy* Steps and Screws Wearing Some Cutty Black Shoes, sees himself as a superhero football star who tackles good and evil in his epically detailed painting.

different yet complementary styles reflecting the chaotic nature of the modern world and finding respite in nature and art. The exhibition celebrates the artists' vibrant abstract work and their interconnection with Western North Carolina and its longstanding arts culture.

Gritta grew up in Chicago and moved to Asheville in 2005. She has studied at the New York Studio School and holds a BFA from Converse College in Painting and Printmaking. Originally a figurative painter, she has steadily moved towards abstract work, as it gives her the freedom to dive deeper into aspects of the human condition. She paints in a pensive expressive style with a mastery of the interplay of color.

Gritta's work is reminiscent of Richard Diebenkorn's beautiful early Berkeley abstracts which, at times, can be read as landscapes. She has been featured in numerous solo and group exhibitions in North Carolina and the East Coast. Her work is included in many corporate collections in the Carolinas and Boston.

Gritta explains, "On any given day, we are surrounded by the relentless noise of social media. More than ever before, in these times of dizzying change and chatter, we long for and need a place of quiet and repose".

In 2004, Hill moved to Asheville with husband and family and began painting in earnest. She has a love of the outdoors and a great respect for Eastern philosophy, which is reflected in her haiku inspired titles, vibrant colors, textured layers, bursts of

energy, and a style uniquely her own.



Reynolda House Museum of American Art in Winston-Salem, NC, Offers Two New Exhibitions

The Reynolda House Museum of American Art in Winston-Salem, NC, is presenting two new exhibits including: Substrata, featuring the spirit of collage in 76 years of art will be on display in the West Bedroom Gallery, through July 31, and Louise Nevelson: Architect of Light and Shadow, on view from Apr. 22 through Sept. 18, 2022, and is in the Northwest Bedroom Gallery.

Substrata, the spirit of collage in 76 years of art examines the influence of collage. Beginning in 1912, Pablo Picasso, Georges Braque and Juan Gris were the first art to explore collage in a self-consciously modern way, in relation to both the history of art and to the culture of their time. Their Cubist collages were a radical break with the "window on the world" depictions of Renaissance painting. But after the Cubists' defiant, "punk" attitude of those early years, they returned to painting.

With select works from Reynolda's collection and several borrowed ones, substrata seeks to "peel back" some of their layers to see how collage, as an artistic approach, has formed the basis for artworks that are not collages. The exhibition includes work by Robert Motherwell, Romare Bearden, Robert Rauschenberg, Stuart Davis and Jasper Johns among others. Substrata has been curated by Paul Bright, Director of Art Galleries and Programming at Wake Forest University Art Galleries and Collections.

The Louise Nevelson exhibition was curated by Dr. Jennifer Finkel, the Acquavella Curator of Collections at Wake Forest University. In addition to works from Reynolda's collection, the exhibition will include artworks from Wake Forest University's art collection, the Weatherspoon Art Museum

and two private collections. Sculptor Louise Nevelson (1899–1988) described her artistic goals in this way: "My total conscious search in life has been for a new seeing, a new image, a new insight. This search not only includes the object, but the in-between places, the dawns and dusks, the objective world, the heavenly spheres, the places between the land and the sea." This statement captures Nevelson's strikingly personal iconography—often centered around celestial or earthly bodies or phenomena such as moons, night, dusk, dawn, tides, skies, rain, light, wind, shadows, and stars—as well as her interest in structure, exploring, in her large-scale wooden assemblage pieces, the "in-between places."

Francis Marion University in Florence, SC, is presenting *Megan Mosholder: Vertically Challenged*, on view in the newly named Steven F. Gately Gallery (formerly University Place Gallery), through Apr. 22, 2022.


Mosholder pushes the boundaries of painting and reacts to the social-political landscape through site-responsive installations. Her three-dimensional drawings, often enhanced by light, emphasize obscured elements within recognizable places correlating symbolism with lived experience.

In July 2020, Mosholder had her leg amputated. This surgery was one of over 30 surgeries that she has endured since a catastrophic car accident in 2018, where she was trapped inside her burning car. The result of this accident changed the installation artist's life forever. Mosholder currently relies on a wheelchair for long distances and a crew of assistants to help her build her larger-than-life installations. Due to her mobility issues, she has had the opportunity to see the world from a new vantage point.

Vertically Challenged was conceptualized while Mosholder was stuck in bed recovering from her amputation. This exhibition challenges the viewer to see the world the way she sees it from her wheelchair.

The *Vertically Challenged* exhibition is largely composed of a site specific installation which has been crafted specially for the gallery, keeping in mind the intricacies of the architectural and aesthetic space. The exhibition also includes medium scale sculptures.

A graduate of Savannah College of Art and Design with an MFA in painting, Mosholder boasts numerous awards from institutions such as the Foundation for Contemporary Arts and the Hambidge Center for Creative Arts and Sciences. She is often

commissioned by leading corporations such as Google, and is included in public art programs, museum exhibitions, and art fairs. Interest in her installations have led to international projects, evidenced by her inclusion within the European Cultural Centre's 2022 Personal Structures exhibition presented during the Venice Biennale and a public art space in Sydney, Australia (2017). These works speak to the power of site-specific work to make a lasting impression upon the viewer.

Mosholder continues to create installations that relay her devotion to her work and the communities she engages. Currently, she resides in Atlanta, GA, is a Professor at Kennesaw State University and has worked as a full-time professional artist for seven years.





Guest Curators Bios:

Alejo Benedetti is Associate Curator, Contemporary Art at Crystal Bridges Museum of American Art. In his role at the museum, he has focused on art since 1960 and oversees the Contemporary Art Galleries and the outdoor sculpture program. This spring he will act as the venue curator for *The Dirty South: Contemporary Art, Material Culture*, and the *Sonic Impulse*, originally organized by the Virginia Museum of Fine Arts.

In 2020, he co-curated *State of the Art* 2020, bringing together 61 contemporary artists from across the United States in an exhibition that opened at Crystal Bridges and the Momentary in February 2020 and is now traveling. Benedetti also organized the 2019 exhibition, *Men of Steel, Women of Wonder*, which looked at art-world responses to Superman and Wonder Woman and traveled to the San Antonio Museum of Art and the Addison Gallery of American Art.

He is originally from Texas and earned his master's degree in Art History from Texas Christian University in Fort Worth and his bachelor of arts from the University of Missouri, Columbia.

Born in London of English and Māori (Ngai Tai) descent, Dr. Maia Nuku is Curator for the Arts of Oceania at The Metropolitan Museum of Art in New Page 32 - Carolina Arts, April 2022

York. Nuku's doctoral research focused on eighteenth century collections of Polynesian art and she completed two post-doctoral fellowships at Cambridge University (2008-2014) in England as part of an international research team exploring Oceanic art collections in European institutions in France, Spain, the Netherlands and Russia. Researching the collections alongside Pacific artists, practitioners and scholars, the work was collaborative and sought to create access to these collections both in the physical and digital domains.

During her time at the Met, Nuku has evolved a curatorial approach that centers indigenous Pacific perspectives, grounding the presentation of visual arts from Oceania in the unique cosmological connections that make art from the region so compelling. Her most recent exhibition Atea: Nature and Divinity in Polynesian Art (2018 - 2019) explored the close material and genealogical relationships that bind Polynesian islanders with the natural world. She is currently working on a major reinstallation of the Oceania galleries that will reimagine the collection for 21st century audiences and animate the galleries with Pacific voices.

Michael Rooks joined the High Museum as Wieland Family Curator of Modern and Contemporary Art in January 2010. Besides his responsibilities at the High, Rooks was appointed Commissioner and co-curator of the US Pavilion at the 12th International Architecture Exhibition, La Biennale di Venezia in 2010 and was a committee member of ActArt, President Obama's initiative bridging contemporary art and social action.

art and social action. Prior to joining the High Museum, Rooks held curator positions at the Museum of Contemporary Art Chicago, The Contemporary Museum Honolulu, and the Honolulu Academy of Arts. At Chicago's Museum of Contemporary Art, Rooks curated several group exhibitions and solo projects in addition to survey exhibitions of work by Roy Lichtenstein (1999) and H. C. The NCMA's environmental program originated in the experimental 1989 site plan Imperfect Utopia: A Park for the New World. Among its groundbreaking concepts was "throw[ing] the Museum outdoors" to create an open landscape within which sculpture and recreation complemented the Museum, expanding access to a more diverse public.

The Museum's 2021 Museum Park Preserve Vision Plan defines a new environmental plan for the Park Preserve, an expansive area featuring woods, a stream, the sunflower field, and more, designed by Andropogon, Biohabitats, and WK Dickson. It responds to historic impacts on the site, the climate emergency, and the NCMA's ongoing obligations as stewards

Contemporary artists respond to environmental concerns; related exhibitions explore environmental impacts of the NCMA and society. The exhibit highlights contemporary artists' responses to current environmental concerns through an immersive multimedia exhibition and outdoor sculpture installations. Curated by the NCMA, Fault Lines includes works by 13 artists, including John Akomfrah, Olafur Eliasson, LaToya Ruby Frazier, Allison Janae Hamilton, Richard Mosse, Jennifer Steinkamp, and Christine and Margaret Wertheim.

"We're excited to present these artists' perspectives on such critical topics as climate change, environmentalism, and what it means to interact with the natural

exhibition invites visitors to reflect on the future of the environment."

Focusing on humanity's relationship to nature, the featured artists address urgent environmental issues and the consequences of inaction as well as possibilities for environmental stewardship and restoration, presenting alternative ways to move forward that are sustainable and renewable. Exploring the transience and fragility of the natural world, the project features video, photography, sculpture, and mixedmedia installations both indoors and

timely response to the imminent threat of climate change, showcasing these leading contemporary artists' responses to present environmental concerns alongside the Museum's own work toward this cause."

Situated on 164 acres, the NCMA blurs the line between museum and park. The site, once a Civil War training camp and later the location of a youth prison, has been transformed from a degraded landscape into a welcoming and accessible public space that connects art, nature, and people. Among the largest of its kind in the world, the Museum Park expands the traditional museum experience by positioning site-specific, temporary, and permanent works of art throughout so visitors can explore sculpture informally on trails and paths.

As part of Fault Lines, the NCMA hosts a Satellite Reef, part of the Crochet Coral Reef project by Christine and Margaret Wertheim and the Institute For Figuring, a Los Angeles-based organization dedicated to the poetic and aesthetic dimensions of science and mathematics. North Carolina fiber artists, crochet enthusiasts, craftivists, and crochet beginners have been invited to create individual parts of the Satellite Reef included in the exhibition.

Fault Lines also provides opportunities for robust public programming centered around the themes of the exhibition, with the intent of inviting multiple viewpoints

and encouraging community dialogue. Programs include outdoor slow-art appreciation, workshops to process "ecogrief," and a day of teen activities focused on environmental art and youth activism. A two-day observance planned for Earth Day, Apr. 22–23, includes an outdoor film screening, a volunteer service project in the Park, and a Family Day with hands-on activities and environmental organizations distributing information about how people can take action.

Fault Lines reflects the Museum's ongoing efforts to present art that invites visitors to engage in new ways of connecting to the world around them, and its commitment to building climate resiliency, raising environmental awareness, and creating opportunities for future artist projects in all corners of its campus. Fault Lines includes a pendant exhibition, TO BE RATHER THAN TO SEEM, that explores the history of the Museum Park and its original master plan, Imperfect Utopia, as well as the new Museum Park Preserve Vision Plan, focused on an expansive area featuring the visitor-favorite sunflower field and beyond, connecting to the Greenway bridge through a wooded zone. The area is a popular place to spot songbirds, falcons, deer, and more.

In the exhibit, Reic Serritella: Trompe l'Oeil Ceramics, Chapel Hill artist Eric Serritella creates his ceramic sculptures as conduits to emotion through inquiry, recognition, and familiarity. Through aging and decay, Serritella's sculptures challenge the viewer with both the nature of the material and the messages within. Each organic creation is filled with metaphor, both literal and implied. Anthropomorphic elements and vessel forms link humanity as timelessly inseparable from its interactions and relationships to its natural surroundings. Each sculpture in Eric Serritella: Trompe l'Oeil Ceramics fosters awareness to affect viewers' behaviors toward the environment. Through this consciousness they can acquire new appreciations and ways of seeing.

Finally we have the exhibit, Frank Lee Craig: Near Distance. Of the many forms

of visual art that have emerged in the last two centuries, collage and its threedimensional sibling, assemblage, probably come closest to representing the process of human memory. Most of us summon up the past only in scattered bits and pieces that require instantaneous reassembly in order to literally "make sense" of recollected experiences each time we need to remember something. Every memory is a new collage of ephemeral thoughts, feelings, and impressions. "

Frank Lee Craig: Near Distance features multimedia work, collages, paintings, and sculptures by the late architect and NC State College of Design Graduate, Frank Lee Craig (B. Arch '77). The bulk of the very substantial body of work we celebrate in this exhibition parallels his efforts to make sense of the mortal circumstance he suddenly confronted when diagnosed with a fatal illness, as well as his need to keep seeing the world through the lens of endless opportunities and possibilities. The exhibition was co-curated by Dr. Margret Kentgens-Craig and Roger



Sending a message with her art

An established artist herself, Torres Weiner has paintings in the city of Charlotte and in the Smithsonian.

"When I started painting about immigration and social justice, a lot of my friends, artist friends, they said, 'You're not going to sell. You're not going to make it.' And I said, 'I'm not here to sell, I'm here to send a message."

As an artist, her continued focus is on her message and telling people's stories

"It's not like I just paint," she said. "I talk to people, I listen and then I create art. I tell them that they can tell their stories, they can express themselves and especially, I tell them, art heals."

Chris Graebner wasn't familiar with the poem, but her new paintings are bouquets of flowers, so the title felt appropriate. "Now having read it, From Blossoms feels even more appropriate. The poem is about moments of joy and beauty and of living life in those moments with gratitude. Painting flowers is an exercise in taking something brief and mysterious and making it familiar and lasting. I find that the process of painting flowers makes them part of me. Perhaps it is some sort of Zen - paying close attention to each individual flower and petal - because it results in 'knowing' a plant in a way that makes it a permanent part of my world. I hope that spending time with my Sweet Impossible Blossoms will do that for

the viewer as well."

Ian Herdell is inspired by the beauty and structure of forms found in nature and brings that into his furniture designs. "I find that each tree has a story to tell, a snapshot into its unique life. Work by Cameron Alexander Gibbes Museum of Art, 135 Meeting Street, Charleston. Gallery 8, Through Aug. 7 - "Fighters for Freedom: William H. Johnson Picturing Justice". William H. Johnson painted his Fighters for Freedom series in the mid-1940s as a tribute to African American activists, scientists, teachers, performers and international heads of state working to bring peace to the world. He celebrated their accomplishments even as he acknowledged the realities of racism, violence and oppression they faced and overcame. Some of his fighters—Harriet Tubman, George Washington Carver, Marian Anderson and Mahatma Gandhi-are familiar historical figures; others are less well-known individuals whose determination and sacrifice have been eclipsed over time. Drawn entirely from the collection of more than 1,000 works by Johnson given to the Smithsonian American Art Museum by the Harmon Foundation in 1967, this exhibition is the first-ever presentation of this series in Johnson's home . state of South Carolina. "Fighters for Freedom: William H. Johnson Picturing Justice" is organized by the Smithsonian American Art Museum with generous support from Art Bridges, Fave and Robert Davidson, and the Jacob and Gwendolyn Lawrence Foundation. Gallery 9, Through Aug. 7 - "A New Deal: Artists at Work". During the Great Depression of the 1930s, President Franklin Delano Roosevelt launched his ambitious Works Progress Administration (WPA) programs that sent millions of unemployed Americans back to work, including more than 5,000 artists. The Federal Art Project, formed under the WPA, afforded opportunities to a diverse group of artists, including women, African Americans and recent immigrants from China, Russia and Germany. This monumental effort to put artists back to work resulted in a collection of artworks intended to uplift the national spirit and encourage creativity in the face of great challenges. The Gibbes is one of a select group of institutions across the country that houses a historic collection of Federal Art Project prints. Gallery 2 & 3, Through Oct. 9 - "William Eggleston Photographs from the Laura and Jay Crouse Collection". It is said that William Eggleston's unique ability to conflate the epic and the everyday has made him one of the most impactful figures in late 20th century photography. A native of Memphis, TN, Eggleston first photographed his local environs in the 1950s in black-and-white but became one of the first fine art photographers to use color to record his observations in a more neigntened and accurate way. Today, his strikingly vivid yet enigmatic images of parked cars, billboards, storefronts, diners and other artifacts of the ordinary world are considered groundbreaking. The photographs presented in this edition of the museum's Charleston Collects exhibition series were selected from the Laura and Jay Crouse Collection and represent many of the pioneering artist's most notable works. The exhibition will be accompanied by a full-color catalog with an essay on the artist by Simon Constantine, Ph.D., professor of photographic history at Birkbeck, University of London, and Sotheby's Art Institute. Galleries 1, 4, and 5, Permanent Exhibition -'18th and 19th Century American Paintings and Sculpture". American paintings, from colonial portraits to Civil War-era landscapes, occupy the Gibbes Main Gallery. Portraits of leading political, social, and military figures include works by Jeremiah Theus, Henry Benbridge, Benjamin West, Gilbert Stuart, Thomas Sully and Samuel F.B. Morse. The gallery also features landscape and genre scenes by Angelica Kaufmann, Louis Mignot, Eastman Johnson, Conrad Wise Chapman, and William Aiken Walker. The paintings collection is complemented by examples of neoclassical sculpture on view in the

Campbell Rotunda, and decorative art objects on

Permanent Exhibition - "Miniature Portraits". The first American miniature portraits were painted in Charleston, and today the Gibbes is home to one of the most prestigious portrait miniature collections in the United States. Containing more than six hundred objects, the collection spans nearly two hundred years and represents the work of over a hundred artists. Small enough to fit in the palm of the hand, these tiny portraits were treasured remembrances of loved ones in the age before photography. Presented in state-of-the-art display cases, and in viewable storage drawers featured miniatures include works by Mary Roberts, Jeremiah Theus, Henry Benbridge, Charles Wilson Peale, Pierre Henri, Edward Greene Malbone, George Engleheart, and Charles Fraser. Gallery 6, Permanent Exhibition - "20th Century American Regionalism and the Charleston Renaissance". At the turn of the twentieth century, American artists looked to their European counterparts and beyond as they developed identifiably American artistic movements. Two particularly strong influences during this time period were French Impressionism and Japanese woodblock prints. Another prevailing theme during this period was the growing interest in American subject matter. American regionalism and social realism played important roles in the development of art in Charleston, which flourished as a destination for artists, particularly during the years of 1915 to 1945 a period now known as the Charleston Renaissance. Gallery 7, Permanent Exhibition - "Modern and Contemporary". Modern and contemporary art in America encompasses a wide range of styles, subject matter, and media. As a whole, the diversity of modern and contemporary art reflects the rich and varied heritage of our nation and the lowcountry region. Works in this gallery were created over the past forty years by artists who are native to the area, who have worked here, or who have created objects that reflect the complex story of the region. The works are grouped to reflect several themes including the southern landscape, the human figure, abstraction, and the legacy of slavery in America. Visiting Artist Series, Katy Mixon, Session I: Through Apr. 3 - Mixon, born in Orangeburg, SC, is a visual artist working in painting, sculpture, quilting and photography. She earned an MFA from University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill and a B.A. from Davidson College. She is an alumna of the School of the Museum of Fine Arts, Boston. Mixon is a recipient of a Working Artist Grant and a Ruth and Harold Chenven Foundation Award. She was a finalist for a William and Dorothy Yeck Young Painters Award and a VCUarts Fountainhead Fellowship. Mixon was invited as an artist-in-residence to VCCA, VA; Kimmel Harding Nelson Center, NE; The Hambidge Center, GA; AICAD Studio Practice Residency, NY; and Byrdcliffe Art Colony, NY. Select exhibition venues include the North Carolina Museum of Art, Raleigh; GreenHill Gallery, NC; the Southeastern Center for Contemporary Art, NC; Ackland Art Museum, NC; Spartanburg Art Museum, SC; Coker University, SC.; A.I.R. Gallery, Brooklyn, NY; The Painting Center, New York; Target Gallery, Va.; Rubber Stamp Projects, FL; Allcott Gallery, NC; 701 Center for Contemporary Art, SC.; among others. Maria White, Session I: Through Apr. 3 - White is a Mexican American studio potter and independent filmmaker. White was born in Las Vegas, NV, and raised in Summerville, SC. White first learned to make pottery while earning her degree in Art from Winthrop University. She continued to focus on ceramics with scholarship and studio assistant opportunities at Penland School of Craft and Haystack Mountain School of Craft, then went on to apprentice with sculptor and inventor, Michael Sherrill. White began her professional ceramics career in Los Angeles where she spent over a decade creating ceramics for celebrated chefs, top interior designers and the sets of major motion pictures and television series. Her ceramics have earned the Award of Excellence from the American Craft Council and her pieces have been published and collected internationally. Outside of her ceramic work, White's independent films have won awards from top international film festivals. While living in California, she co-founded the Los Angeles Women's Film Collective to help empower women working across all filmmaking disciplines. White is a survivor of postpartum anxiety and depression and an advocate for maternal mental health. In 2019, she founded Mugs for Moms, an effort that brings makers together to help raise maternal mental health awareness and find support for moms and their families. White is the mother of two and lives in Charleston, with her family. Ruth and Bill Baker Art Sales Gallery, Through May 1 - "Stranded," featuring works by past visiting artist Cameron Alexander. She takes viewers back in history to the Transatlantic Slave Trade, when over 500 ships were lost at sea over the 400-year period. Americans: Charleston in the Revolutionary War". Charleston played a critical role in the Revolutionary War. South Carolina was the wealthiest of the thirteen rebellious colonies and Charleston was its key port to maintain its trade with the outside world. The British would make three attempts against the city during the Revolutionary War. Their defeat at the Battle of Sullivan's Island on June 28, 1776 was a crucial patriot victory, which convinced many that independence could be achieved. The Siege of Charleston, meanwhile, was the longest siege of the Revolutionary War and the largest battle in South Carolina. These events and others are chronicled in the new exhibit, which will also features artifacts and period images that have not been exhibited at the Museum before. 

He attended the American Artist School in New York city as a teenager where he met renowned modern artists, including Piet Mondrian, who greatly influenced his abstract style. After studying architecture at the New Bauhaus in Chicago from 1946-1949, he received his graduate degree from Illinois Institute of Technology in 1952. The following year, he began working for architectural firm Skidmore, Owings and Merrill when Roger Milliken hired them to design Milliken's new research facility in Spartanburg. Upon realizing Krisel was also a sculptor, Milliken hired him to design the spray fountain outside of the facility which functions as a recycler of air conditioning water. 

By bringing together work grounded in Inuit artmaking across generations, as well as through multifaceted and evolving practices, we hope to kindle conversations around the meaningful stories that are deeply rooted in community, placemaking and engage with ongoing legacies of creation. The featured artworks were selected because of the stories they tell and the connections they visualize. Our curatorial model stems from an embrace of the collective and highlights community through thoughtful portraiture as well as collaborative, familial and multigenerational art making. To Remain Connected presents rich layers of stories told through a multitude of interwoven voices rooted in land, memory and Inuit ways of being. While Inuit are linked together through art, language, food, and more, there are many unique Inuit communities, dialects, and lifeways across lands that have been renamed Alaska, Russia, Greenland, Canada and beyond. Gallery B, Through May 7 - "In the Garden of Healing: Dara Mark". "The paintings in this exhibition were made over the five year period after my husband died. Each of them reflects my emotional state during the process of grieving and healing and describes in abstract terms an arc of personal growth. The paintings were not conceived of as therapy per se, but as the only way forward for me as an artist. The medium watercolor on Yupo paper – and the formal issues of transparency, flow and balance, were and are a continuation of my longtime studio practice. Color is always key. For the first year I used black, white and blue exclusively, because that felt right. Two years later, diagnosed with breast cancer, I was drawn to the warm colors of the spectrum: red, pink, orange, yellow," said Mark. 



Exhibition highlights the career of the storied NC architect who designed the National Museum of African American History and Culture in DC. The exhibition celebrates the accomplished North Carolina architect Philip G. Freelon (1953–2019) and his remarkable career of over four decades designing public buildings with his firm, The Freelon Group, and later as design director of Perkins&Will North Carolina. "We're honored to help tell the story of Phil Freelon and his incredible accomplishments. The symbolism and metaphors in the buildings he designed celebrate Black communities and histories in a lasting way," said Museum Director Valerie Hillings. "Freelon served on the North Carolina Museum of Art Foundation Board from 2008 to 2012, so we are especially pleased to present this exhibition focused on his groundbreaking career." This exhibition, organized by a team of faculty and students led by Dr. Emily Makas from the School of Architecture at the University of North Carolina at Charlotte, debuted at the Harvey B. Gantt Center for African American Arts and Culture in Charlotte, NC. It examines Freelon's work, which includes museums, libraries, cultural centers, and public parks, with a focus on projects that embrace Black communities and identities. Meymandi Exhibition Gallery and in the Ann and Jim Goodnight Museum Park, Apr. 2 - July 17 - "Fault Lines: Art and the Environment." highlights contemporary artists' responses to current environmental concerns through an immersive multimedia exhibition and outdoor sculpture installations. Using both figurative and abstract images from the Museum collection, "To Be Young: Coming of Age in the Contemporary" offers an introspective overview of coming of age across various communities throughout the 20th and 21st centuries. The exhibition explores how youths process development through concepts such as identity, community, and kinship to form new perspectives on the world. East Building, Through July 3 - "PARTICIPATE: Activate the Senses Exhibition". The exhibition encourages visitors to interact with art through a variety of experiences tailored to the senses. Reynolda House Museum of American Art, Reynolda Road, Winston-Salem. Mary and Charlie Babcock Wing Gallery, Through May 8 - "Black Is Beautiful: The Photography of Kwame Brathwaite". This is the first major exhibition to focus on this central figure of the second Harlem Renaissance whose art popularized the "Black Is Beautiful" cultural movement that began in the 1960s in the United States. Through more than 40 iconic photographs of Black men and women with natural hair and clothes that reclaimed their African roots, Black Is Beautiful reflects how Brathwaite - inspired by the writings of famed activist and black nationalist Marcus Garvey-used his art to effect social change in the late 1950s and 1960s. West Bedroom Gallery, Through July 31 - "Substrata: the spirit of collage in 76 years of art," examines the influence of collage. Beginning in 1912, Pablo Picasso, Georges Braque and Juan Gris were the first artists to explore collage in a self-consciously modern way, in relation to both the history of art and to the culture of their time. Their Cubist collages were a radical break with the "window on the world" depictions of Renaissance painting. But after the Cubists' defiant, "punk" attitude of those early years, they returned to painting. Northwest Bedroom Gallery, Apr. 22 - Sept. 18 - "Louise Nevelson," the exhibition was curated by Dr. Jennifer Finkel, the Acquavella Curator of Collections at Wake Forest University. The artists simultaneously exemplify and defy-yet continue to redefine the perceived norms around concepts of Blackness as we see it in our world. They resist the nullifying commodification of blackness into a type of monolith and do so by creating works that reify the world on their own terms. **Potter Gallery, Through June 5 -** "Sherrill Roland: The Odds," explores innocence, justice, and chance with works informed by the artist's wrongful incarceration. A reception will be held on Mar. 10, from 6-8pm. Roland's interdisciplinary practice examines innocence, identity, and community, reimagining those concepts in the context of the American criminal justice system. For more than three years, Roland's right to self-determination was lost to a wrongful incarceration. After spending ten months in prison for a crime he was later exonerated for, he returned to his artistic practice, which he now uses as a vehicle for self-reflection and as an outlet for emotional release.
