Ron Herzog creates beautiful and unique wood pieces using a process known as intarsia. It is a woodworking technique using interlocking pieces of wood from different species allowing for variations of color, grain and texture. The pieces are cut, shaped individually, and fit together to achieve the desired design. The art of intarsia dates back to at least the fifteenth century. Herzog has been working with wood for over 22 years. He graduated from the University of Illinois and is a veteran Army pilot.

While these members are in the spotlight, the work of all the Gallery's members are also on display and available for purchase, including jewelry, wood puzzles, encaustic paintings, mixed media collages, fiber art, apparel and accessories, as well as functional and decorative objects in wood, ceramic and glass.
